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Origin, Organization and Endowments

Under terms of the will of Hon. Samuel F. Hersey, who died in 1875, the city of Bangor was left a certain part of his estate, to become available in 1900 as a fund whose income should be used "for the promotion of education, the health and good morals of the citizens." The sum of \$100,000 was accepted by the City in 1882 in full of all claims against the Hersey estate, and the City Government voted to use the entire sum for the establishment of a public library. The management of the legacy was entrusted to a board of five members, known as the "Trustees of the Income of the Hersey Fund," which now consists of the City Treasurer, ex-officio, and four citizens, one or more appointed biennially by the City Council to serve for terms of six years.

These Trustees agreed with the Bangor Mechanic Association, which had for many years maintained a library and reading room for its members, to combine interests and establish the Bangor Public Library, with the 20,000 volumes of the Mechanic Association as a nucleus, and the \$12,000 of its invested funds and the \$100,000 Hersey Fund as endowments. The Trustees of the Income of the Hersey Fund and four representatives chosen annually by the Bangor Mechanic Association constitute the Board of Managers of the Bangor Public Library.

When in 1893 the question of erecting a library building began to be agitated, the Board of Managers was incorporated under State law as the "Trustees of the Bangor Public Library" with power to acquire and hold real estate; the personnel of the two bodies being the same but their functions quite distinct.

The Bangor Mechanic Association, which was founded in 1828, maintains its organization, holds an annual meeting the second Tuesday in January and the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer elected at that time serve as members of the Board of Managers of the Bangor Public Library. The Association also administers funds, the income of which it pays to the Board of Managers of the Bangor Public Library, as follows: The Mechanic Association Fund of \$12,000, used for upkeep, and the Edward Ellison Fund of \$10,000. The Edward Ellison Fund, bequeathed in 1918 by Mary Harris Ellison Curran (Mrs Nicholas F. Curran), Librarian from 1888 to 1913, in memory of her father, is "for the purchase of books, other than works of fiction" of which only one copy is to be bought and that "may never be taken from the Library."

The Trustees of the Bangor Public Library administer funds with a principal of \$833,968.12, as follows, and use them in accordance with the terms of the bequests or gifts:

The John F. Patten Fund of \$4,000 bequeathed by Grace D. Patten (Mrs John F. Patten) in 1900 in memory of her husband, augmented by a \$2,000 bequest of Thomas Upham Coe in 1927, the income of both for "the purchase of books to make, or help make, entire some important department of the Library," now used for books on the fine arts.

The Luther H. Peirce Fund of \$75,000, bequeathed in 1915, the income for "the purchase of books or for any other purposes within the walls of said Library building," now used for operating expenses, which is a part of

The Trustees Fund of \$208,193.20, the balance being an invested fund of which the income only is now used, and that for operating expenses.

The Frederick W. Hill and Marianne Hill Fund of \$582,534.92, bequeathed in 1920, "for the purpose of purchasing books . . . and no part . . . for the erection or repair of any building, or to purchase real estate."

The Stodder Fund of \$37,240, bequeathed in 1924 by George T. Stodder, "for the purchase of books, except that no fiction which has not been published two years at date of purchase shall be bought."

Report of the Trustees of the Income of the Hersey Fund

Bangor, January 24, 1939.

To the City Council of the City of Bangor:—

The Trustees of the Income of the Hersey Fund submit their annual report. They have received from the City Treasurer the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) in quarterly payments, which have been paid to the Treasurer of the Board of Managers of the Bangor Public Library.

They also submit, herewith, the annual reports of the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the Bangor Public Library, and the Treasurer of the Board of Managers of said Library, and of the Librarian.

Report of the Librarian

To the Board of Managers of the Bangor Public Library:

The average annual growth of the number of volumes in the Library for the ten years from 1929 through 1938 has been 6,728. At this rate, which is not excessive considering the large use made of our books, we shall in 1941 have to erect new shelves in the last space now remaining in our stack section. The shelves that can be installed in 1941 will, if the rate of growth is not increased, accommodate our additions until 1946, but not beyond. Before 1946 we shall have to seek funds for the erection of an addition. It is not too soon for us to begin to consider ways and means of obtaining them.

A STOREHOUSE OF KNOWLEDGE

While we have been making a net gain of 6,728 volumes a year we have also been withdrawing, on the average, 3,889 volumes a year. We have avoided accumulating mere numbers, but we withdraw nothing simply because it is old, for we recognize our obligation to be a storehouse of knowledge. Our permanent collection is made up of books that deserve permanence.

USE OF MUSIC GAINED 50%

There was a 50% increase in borrowing at the Music Branch during 1938. The total of music issued amounted to 12,866 pieces, as compared with 8,594 in 1937. The figure is over 600% higher than the figure for 1930, the first full year of operation of the Music Branch. The gain was largely in music for the use of choruses and choirs.

Elsewhere in the Library there was no marked growth or decline in lending. Though the total of items lent in the entire

Library system was 389,785, second only to 1933 as the largest total in our history and representing an increase of 4,984 over 1937, most of this gain is accounted for by the increased use of the Music Branch. Viewing the system as a whole, our circulation totals have not varied over $1\frac{1}{2}\%$, up or down, in four years.

A FEW STATISTICS

The general reading trends of the past few years were continued. Adult non-fiction made up 27% of the circulation, as against 26% in 1937; adult fiction, 49%, as against 50% in 1937, and juvenile, 24%, the same as in 1937.

The book stock now totals 195,726 volumes. Of the total, 76% is adult non-fiction, 13% adult fiction, and 11% juvenile.

Special services to show a considerable growth were: book reservations, which averaged 1,628, a month as against 1,367 a month during 1937; borrowing for Bangor readers 119 books from 19 specialized libraries elsewhere; the use of the library halls for 141 meetings and 8 exhibits; and the gift of 3,826 discarded books to 44 organizations in 35 towns.

BOOKS FOR DOCTORS

In affiliating ourselves with the Boston Medical Library as a "Professional Member," thereby obtaining the privilege of borrowing medical books for any Bangor doctor or any other doctor who may become a card holder here, we materially increased our medical resources. In spite of wide notice being given to this service little use has been made of it. It will be continued during 1939, but unless it is more largely used its continuance beyond that time cannot be recommended.

17,855 BORROWERS

Under our new rules, whereby all non-resident borrowers must pay individual fees for the service which Bangor residents get entirely free, our contracts with the towns of Orrington, Glenburn, and Veazie for the registration of all residents who

might apply were not renewed when these expired March 31. We furnished school room collections to Orrington and Veazie; registered 44 Orrington students in the Brewer High School whose borrower's fees were paid us by the town; granted group memberships to one organization in each of the following towns, Hampden Highlands, Orono, and Farmington; and registered 695 other non-residents who paid our non-resident fee. Our total registration is 17,855, which is 17 fewer than in 1937.

Full statistics for the year are found on pages 16-26 of the appendices to this report.

BUILDING

Improvements to the building were the installation of humidifiers in our blower system for winter use; the replacement of 35 radiator traps; and the completion of the railing on the winter step covers.

GIFTS

A record of gifts to the Library appears on pages 24-26 of the appendices. No bequests were received. By the will of Alice D. Merrill (Mrs. Henry Merrill), which was filed for probate in March 1938, a trust for the benefit of relatives was set up, upon the termination of which, if, in the unlikely event that no lineal descendants of the beneficiaries survive, the Library is to receive what remains in trust. Our appreciation of Mrs. Merrill's thought is sincerely recorded here and her provision that if the Library does benefit by her will the sum is "to be used for the purposes of said organization as may best fit the needs thereof" is quoted as a model for all generous minded persons who may be planning bequests to the Library.
