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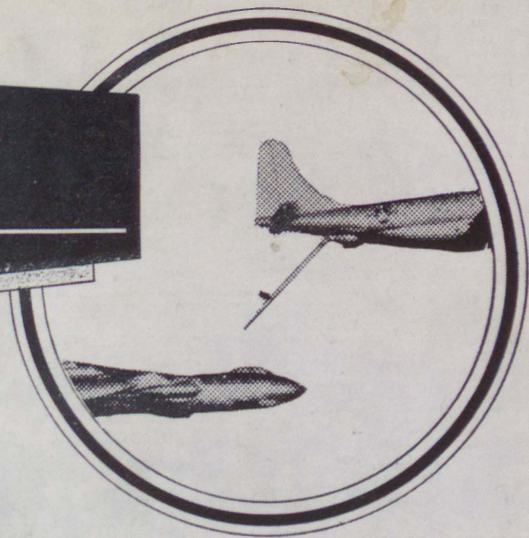

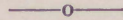

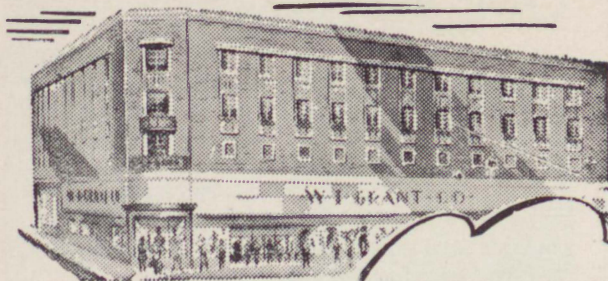

Dow Air Force Base

was named, in January 1942, in honor of 2nd Lt. James Frederick Dow of Oakfield, Me., who was killed during a training flight in June of 1940.

A graduate of the University of Maine, class of '38, he was active in various school organizations. For three seasons, he was a first string halfback on the Black Bear football team.



After graduation from the U. of M., Lt. Dow went to Parks Air College in St. Louis and then to Randolph Field, San Antonio where he won his wings in March, 1940.

Three months later, he was killed in a collision of two bombers flying over Queensborough, N. Y.

Introduction to Dow

This booklet has been designed to help you become acquainted with your new station. It covers where to go and who to see for information pertaining to your on and off duty hours. The back portion of the booklet, titled Community Resources Section, includes a wealth of information on the educational and recreational facilities available in the the greater part of Maine.

Story of SAC

The Strategic Air Command is a powerful force for peace, but if war comes, SAC will be ready.

The Strategic Air Command, known to the world as SAC, is the global retaliatory force that could instantly counter-attack in event of sudden aggression.

To keep SAC ready, aircrews flew approximately 100,000 individual missions during 1953 in simulated fighter and bomber strikes. The simulated bombing missions were carried out during daylight and night hours at extreme altitudes. Targets sited were those that had a similarity to objectives SAC may be called upon to strike in event of war.

Through such realistic training exercises, precision bombing has been improved many hundreds percent since the Strategic Air Command was first organized as a major Air Force unit, March 21, 1946, with headquarters at Bolling Field.

Headquarters for SAC is now at Offutt AFB, Omaha, Neb. It includes the Second Air Force, the Eighth Air Force, the Fifteenth Air Force, the Seventh Air Division and the Fifth Air Division.

In keeping with the global concept, SAC's

combat wings are frequently deployed to overseas bases for periods of training.

SAC's planes include the ten-engined B-36 intercontinental bomber, the 600 MPH B-47 Stratojet medium bomber, B-50's reconnaissance planes, refueling tankers, cargo aircraft and F-84 strategic fighters.

Refueling in the air from KC-97 or KB-29 tankers, a technique pioneered by SAC, boosts the range of SAC's planes. Air refueling hook-ups during 1953 was the equivalent of one refueling operation every 15 minutes each day and night of the year.

The intercontinental B-36 bombers with their combat range of 4000 miles with an 84,000 pound payload or 10,000 miles with 10,000 pounds has now been replaced by the all-jet B-52, now in full scale production.

The addition of the B-52 to the striking force of SAC will help provide the strength so necessary to our nation, for as General Le May said, "If SAC is strong enough and ready enough, the danger that America will ever come under actual attack is diminished. The penalty would be too great."

History

Dow AFB had its beginning on August 19, 1923 when General "Billy" Mitchell landed with the entire Air Corps - 15 Martin bombers and 11 DeHavilland scout planes - on a strip of the F. F. Rich farm on Cooper Road.

Gen. Mitchell was quoted as saying, "I see a great future for Bangor as an air base. It is a natural air center and ideally suited as an airdrome." His words came true in September, 1954 when the United States Air Force declared Dow a permanent base.

From 1925 until 1940 the area was an airport owned by Edward R. Godfrey, who leased it to various flying services. Northeast Airlines, whose flights leave Dow daily, has been in operation here since 1933.

On August 15, 1940, construction began on a combined military and commercial, Class IV airport, with the agreement that Bangor would supply the land and the Federal government the funds.

During World War Two, Dow played a major role in the defense of the United States. The 43rd Bombardment Group, a unit of the Fifth Air Force, received its training at Dow and in February, 1942

left here to become the victors of such battles as the Coral Sea, Bismark Sea, New Guinea, Dutch East Indies, and the liberation of the Philippines.

The Eighth Air Force, which Dow is now an integral part, established the 332 Sub-depot here in 1942, using the base as a staging area and final check-up point for various fighter and bombardment groups.

The North Atlantic Wing of the Air Transport Command operated at Dow from 1941 until December 1945, ferrying tactical aircraft to all points of defense.

Among other operations of equal importance were: the anti-submarine patrols of the 92nd Reconnaissance Group, the State of Maine Aircraft School which trained hundreds of civilian personnel in electrical, mechanical and sheet metal specialties, the training of recruits, quartermaster troops and ordnance, signal and service units for combat groups, and the training of 5,000 highly specialized aviation engineers.

During 1942, Dow was under the control of the First Air Force, although all tactical aircraft arriving here were under the direct jurisdiction of the

eighth Air Force and the ATC.

Some of the aircraft maintained at Dow during the war were B-17 Flying Fortresses, B-24 Liberators, P-38 Lightnings, A-29 Anti-submarine aircraft, B-25s, A-20s, C-47s, C-46s and C-45s.

A total of more than 18,700 fighters were ferried to and from the U.S. by the ATC at this Maine installation and nearly 100,000 combat crews en route to theaters of war or returning to the U.S. processed here, and millions of pounds of vitally needed cargo were flown by Dow planes.

At the end of the war until the arrival of the 14th Fighter Wing in 1946, Dow was placed on a stand-by status.

During the period the 14th was stationed here, they were credited with "ironing out" the bugs of Republic Aviation's first F-34 Thunderjets.

In October 1949 the 14th left Dow and in December of the same year the base was deactivated.

The Maine Air National Guard, which was stationed here since the war ended began using Dow as a training camp in December of 1950 and two months later, the 101st Fighter Interceptor Wing of the Maine ANG was called to active duty.

Dow was reactivated in April 1951 and almost immediately the 132nd Fighter Wing moved here.

The 132nd was formerly the Nebraska-Iowa ANG group which was called to duty on the same day and was transferred to Dow from bases in Lincoln, Neb., Des Moines, Iowa, and Sioux City, Iowa.

At the time of the reactivation, Dow was under the command of the Strategic Air Command, but in January 1952, the 132nd Wing and the base was transferred to the Tactical Air Command.

In June of 1952 the 132nd Fighter-Bomber Wing was transferred from Dow to Alexandria AFB, Louisiana, and a month later Dow was reverted to the Strategic Air Command, while the base itself was under the command of the 4009th Air Base Group.

In January 1953, the base command changed again from the 4009th ABGp to the 506th Strategic Fighter Wing. The latter was placed in a training status and was assigned the Korean-tested F-84G Thunderjet.

During the latter part of 1953 the 506th Strat Wing performed a three-month TDy tour in Japan with its primary mission set as the defense of the northern part of that country.

On January 15th, 1954, the 506th became the first operational organization of the United States

Air Force to receive the F-84F Thunderstreak, marking the second time a Dow unit "checked-out" first with a Republic jet aircraft.

In addition to the 506th Strat Wing, Dow was also the home of the 49th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, a unit of the Air Defense Command.

In March, 1955 the 4060th Air Refueling Wing officially replaced the 506th Strategic Fighter Wing, which transferred to Tinker AFB, Okla.

Dow gives logistical support to the Deblois Bombing Range, Columbia Falls, Maine; the 907th AC & W Sq., Bucks Harbor, Maine; Portsmouth AFB, Portsmouth, N. H.; and Plattsburg AFB, Plattsburg, N.Y., and the 765th Aircraft Control and Warning Sq. at Charleston; Maine.

Dow is also the home of the 101st Fighter Interceptor Wing of the Maine Air National Guard.



HEADQUARTERS 4060th AIR BASE GROUP

Mission

To organize and train a force capable of immediate and sustained air-to-air refueling operations in any part of the world, utilizing the latest technical knowledge and advanced procedures. To be prepared to perform those tasks assigned in current emergency plans and related operations orders. To participate in the reserve training program to the maximum extent by training and administering assigned reserve personnel and units. To be prepared to supervise and participate with assigned units in disaster relief and other domestic emergencies. To perform such missions assignments as may be directed by higher headquarters.

Checking In

PERSONNEL All personnel being assigned to Dow Air Force Base are required to report to the Air Base Group Central Clearance Section for assignment to organizations and to obtain incoming clearances.

VEHICLES Vehicle registration and dependent passes should be cleared at Pass and Registration, Bldg. T-51.

UNIFORMS Check at your sign-in point for uniform regulations but please note that the Class A uniform will be worn at all base functions. This includes clubs, theatre, base exchange and snack bar. Civilian clothes are authorized only on special occasions.

Education

“Operation Bootstrap” is very much in evidence at Dow, where a fine Education Services Section affords interested military personnel with an extensive and diverse off-duty education program. Located in Bldg. T-220, Education Services Section’s facilities include the comprehensive correspondence course and testing service of the USAFI, notably high school, college and technical “courses by mail”, and a GED testing section. Also available are the ever-popular group study classes which are offered on both high school and college levels, educational and vocational guidance service, and many other features tailored to fit individual educational needs.

Close cooperation is maintained between the base and nearby civilian educational institutions. In fall and winter, the Bangor Evening School offers high school level courses to adults, and Dow personnel are entitled to enroll to earn regular high school

credits or just for general interest purposes. The University of Maine, located seven miles away in Orono, offers class work on the college level to our people. Their courses are normally offered week-nights on the base through the University Extension Division, as well as classes conducted on campus every Saturday. They are taught by regular university professors and may be taken either on credit or non-credit bases. In addition, Husson College in Bangor has an excellent night school program, specializing in Business Administration and Secretarial subjects, and also Liberal Arts courses.

In today’s modern, highly technical and specialized Air Force, educated men make better airmen, and just as important is the aspect of self-improvement through learning. With these things in mind, you should visit your Dow Education Services Section. It’s open during normal duty hours, Monday through Saturday.

Housing

The Bangor Garden Homes have been reserved, for a period of 60 days after each unit is completed, for military personnel; after that they can be rented to anyone. These Cape Cod type homes have two and three bedrooms. Two bedroom units rent for \$80.00 per month, plus utilities. Three bedroom units rent for \$90.00, plus utilities. Ranges and refrigerators are furnished. Application should be made at the J. F. Singleton Realty Company, 16 Broad Street, Bangor, Maine.

Fairmount Terrace is a temporary housing unit in Bangor. Government owned, it is controlled by the Base Housing Officer, and is strictly for military personnel. There are two apartment and six apartment units with 150 individual apartments in all. These are furnished with the exception of living room furniture, bedding, dishes, pans, etc. The cost of these units is \$35.00 per month rental fee and \$15.00 utilities fee. Total - \$50.00 per month. Units are assigned according to rank.

There are 116 family housing units on the base proper. These quarters are converted barracks with

four and six apartments to a building. They are furnished with everything except living room furniture, bedding, dishes, pans, etc. They are controlled by the base Housing Officer and assigned by rank.

Bachelor Officers and Visiting Officers are quartered in Building T-229 and T-233 with the office for both in Building T-229. In the buildings are spaces for 34 bachelor officers, 18 visiting officers, and 5 VIP's. A CQ is on duty 24 hours a day to take care of incoming personnel. This office also controls a Guest House (located in Building T-223) which consists of one four room apartment and one five room apartment. These are available to anyone for a period of seven days. Reservations are accepted in advance.

Airmen Transient Quarters are located in Buildings T-219. A CQ is on duty 24 hours a day to assign incoming personnel.

Civilian rentals in Bangor vary. In the official housing report by the USAF Bangor is listed under Category C, "Adequate family housing extremely limited and high cost."

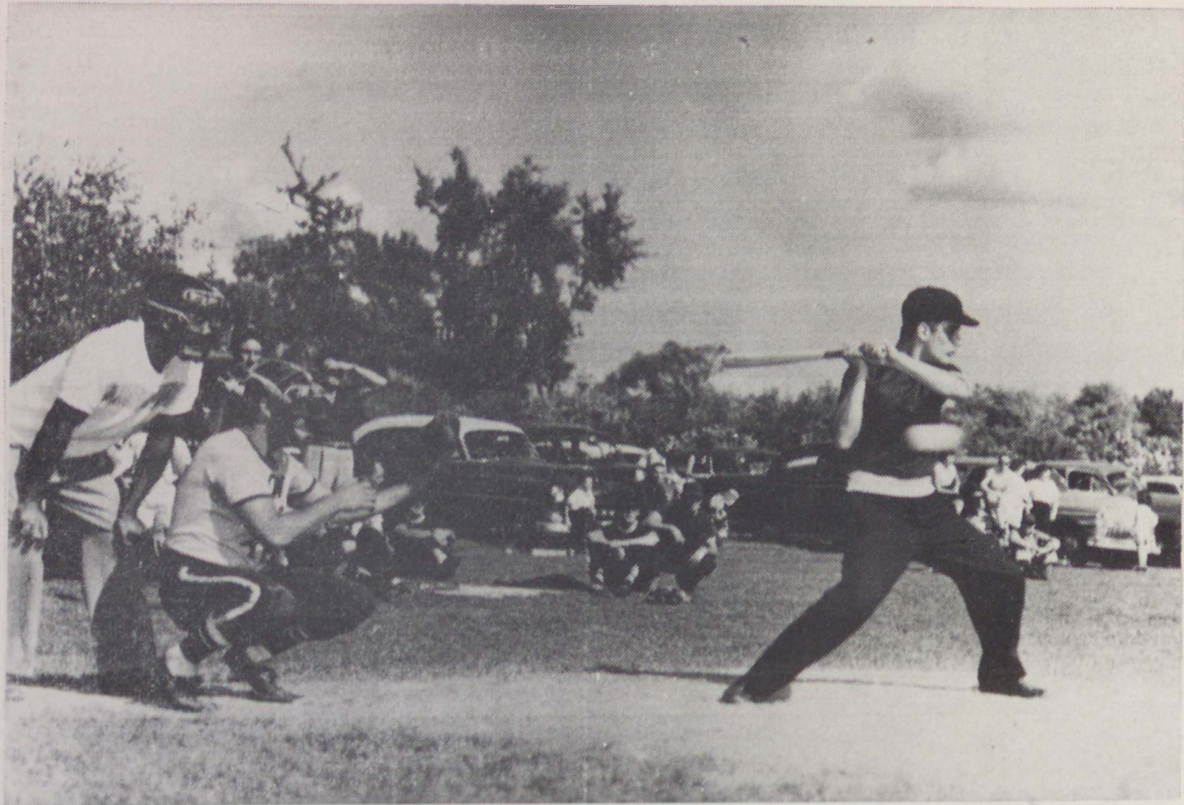
Office hours are 0800 to 1700 hours Monday through Friday, 0800 to 1200 hours on Saturday and closed on Sunday.

Bar hours are from 1620 to 2330 hours. Saturday from 1120 to 2400 hours.

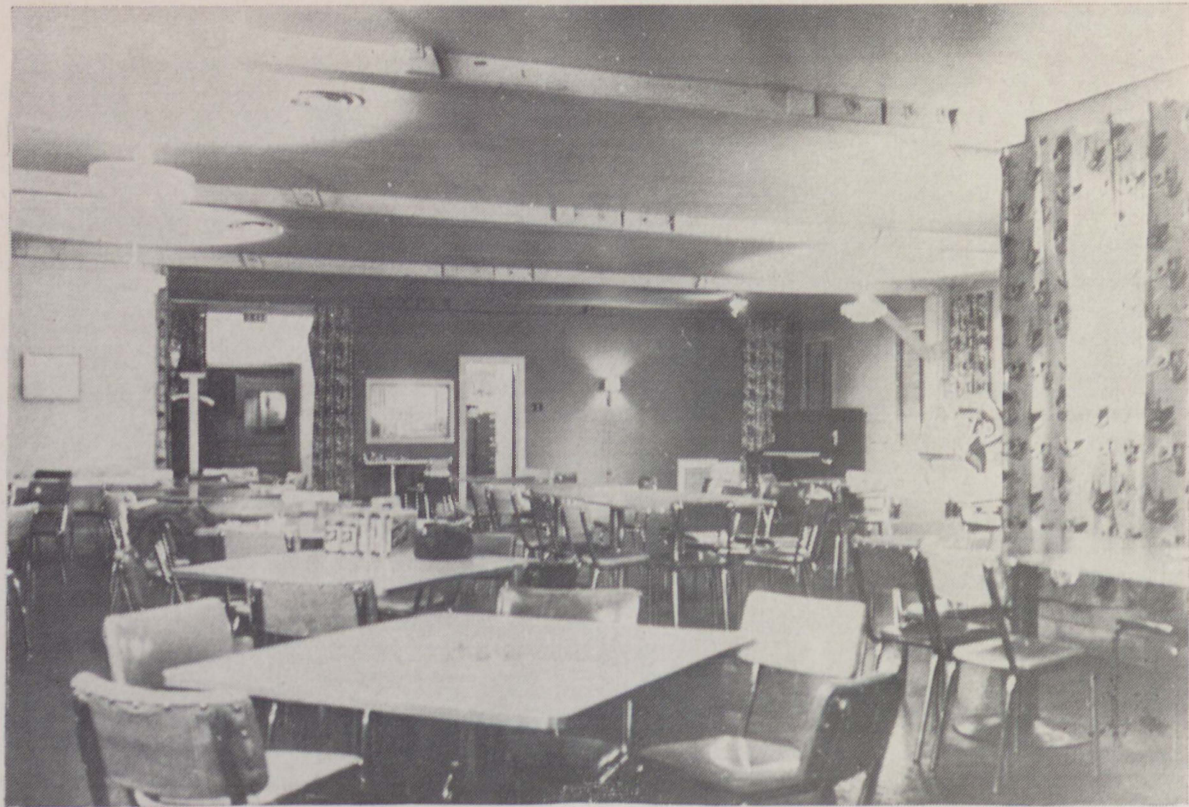

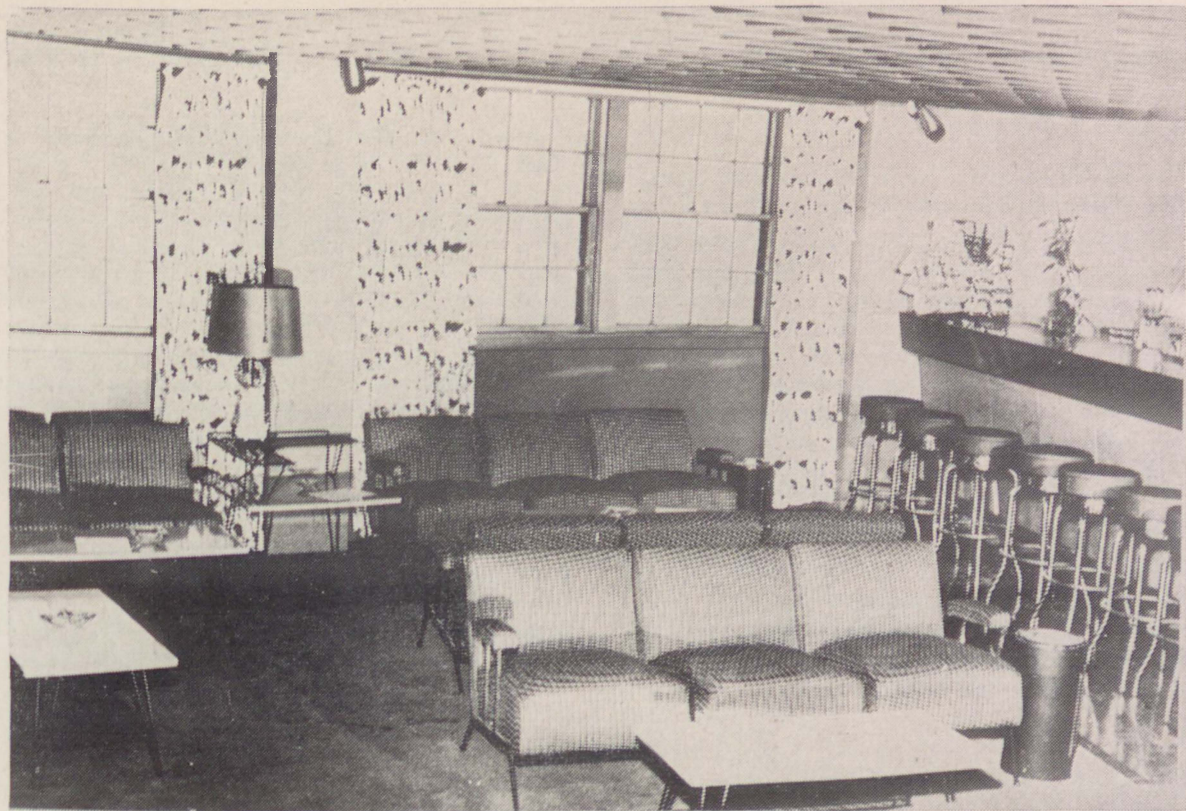
ACTION AT THE PLATE

Personnel Assistance

PERSONAL AFFAIRS:

Located in Building T-100. The Personal Affairs Office is geared to provide the following:

Advice on availability of service for dependents overseas duty information, data on insurance and savings, processing of pay allotments, Social Security, Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act, Federal Employees Compensation Benefits, Home Loan Benefits, absentee voting data, educational benefits, Service Men's Indemnity and Insurance Acts, Casualty Assistance and maintenance of personal affairs file.

AIR FORCE AID:

Located in Building T-100. Can provide assistance with loans and or grants for emergency food or housing problems, emergency leaves in event of death of dependent or member of family. For loans you should first contact your squadron Commander,

then visit the Red Cross or Aid Society as he suggests.

DEPENDENTS ASSISTANCE:

Located in Building T-100. The Dependents Assistance Program was established throughout SAC to aid your dependents in time of need, especially if you are away on temporary duty for long periods. Air Force Personnel and women volunteer groups are ready at all hours to help you with your problems. Call on them.

CASUALTY ASSISTANCE:

Located in Building T-100. Casualty assistance program is a function to provide rapid and immediate assistance to next of kin of deceased personnel, to make official notification to next of kin, to arrange for Military Honors, Funerals etc., to assist next of kin on claims etc.

Commissary

The Commissary extends a welcome to newcomers at Dow Air Force Base, and invites them to take advantage of its facilities.

The Commissary serves a two-fold purpose: to provide subsistence for the military personnel assigned to the base, and to operate the sales store. All issues and sales to organizations and authorized military personnel will be made in accordance with present regulations.

The issue warehouse is located in building T-105. Troop issues are made directly from warehouse stocks.

The commissary sales store which is located in Building T-104 operates between the hours of 1000. Through 1730 Monday thru Thursday, and 1200 thru 2000 hours on Friday. On Saturday the

hours are 0930 thru 1330.

It is closed on legal holidays. Identification (DD 39101, DD 720, DD2AF or Form 1060) will be presented to the cashier prior to checking out sale. Unauthorized persons will not be permitted entrance to the store. The store consists of three sections: subsistence, meat market and produce section. Every effort is expended to give the military personnel the best possible selection of subsistence at the least possible cost. Store customers are reminded that all items are sold at cost prices plus a surcharge of 3% to cover certain store overhead and operating costs. Telephone orders are not accepted, and no deliveries will be made. All sales will be for cash. The Commissary invites your inspection, and careful attention will be given any suggestions made by patrons.

Medical Facilities

A 50 bed hospital is at Dow Air Force Base to provide medical care for you and your family. It is the policy of the Base Commander and the Base Surgeon to provide the best medical and dental care consistent with the personnel and facilities available. Services include: Out patient clinic for air crew members, Building T-316, Dependents Clinic, Building T-304 is open during normal duty hours and treatment is by appointment. After normal duty hours, weekends and holidays, emergency treatment will be provided by the Medical O.D. at Bldg. T-304. All cases requiring specialized treatment not available at this base will be transferred by MATS air evacuation to one of the large military hospitals in the northeast area. This applies to hospitalized patients only, both military and dependents.

Complete prenatal, delivery and postnatal care is available for obstetrical patients.

Vaccinations and immunizations for overseas travel for dependents are given at the Dependent's Clinic. Appointments may be made by calling Ext. 545.

House calls will be made only under unusual circumstances, however, ambulance service will be provided in emergencies.

The dental clinic is in Building T-318, with complete service for military and limited emergency treatment for dependents.

A pharmacy, veterinary, laboratory and x-ray facilities are also available. Base regulations require all pets be registered with the veterinarian and immunized against rabies.

New Construction

Dow Air Force Base is now in the midst of a huge face lifting. Under the Military Construction Program, workmen may be seen daily putting the finishing touches on the new permanent-type buildings. (Dow was made a permanent base in September, 1954.)

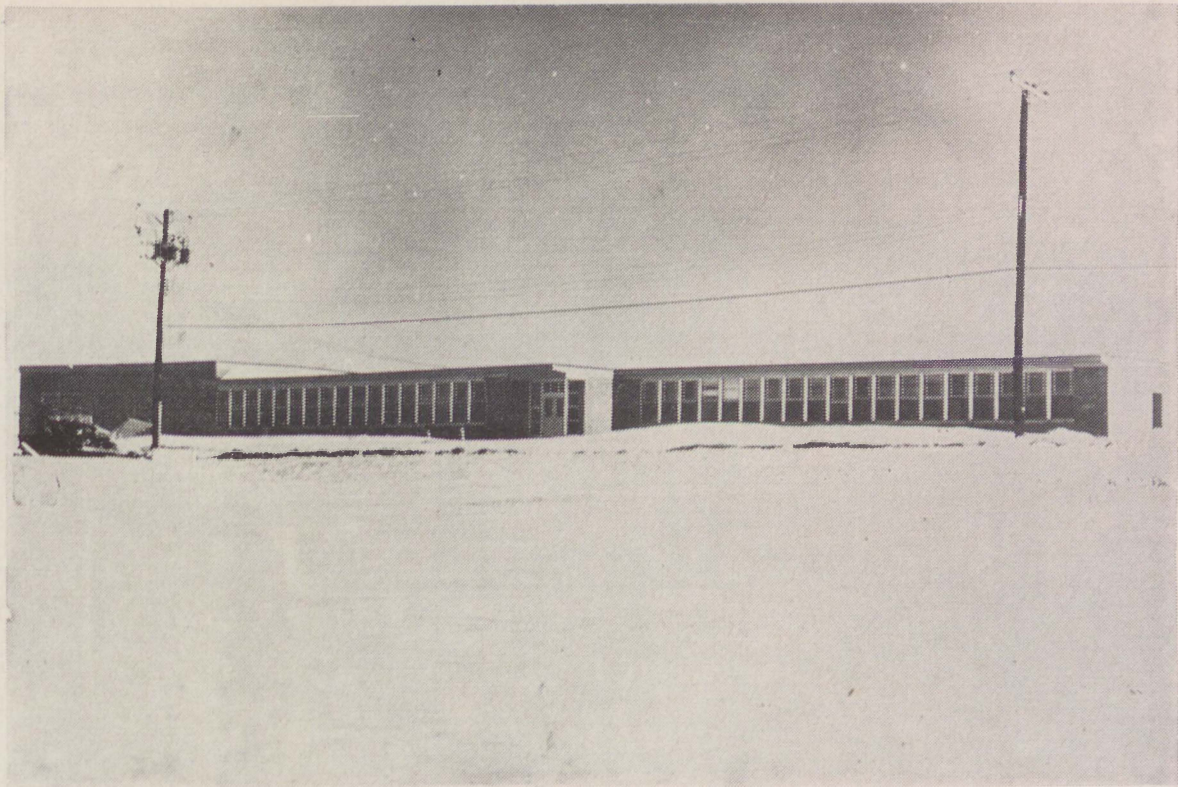
Already completed and in operation is the new, brick-faced base operations buildings. Other buildings, which will be completed soon, or will have become operative by the time this "booklet" is published, are the new wing headquarters building, air base group headquarters building, squadron operations buildings, central heating plant,

telephone exchange, control tower and three new airmen dormitories and dining hall. A Base Photo Lab is also nearing completion, as well as two multi-purpose hangers.

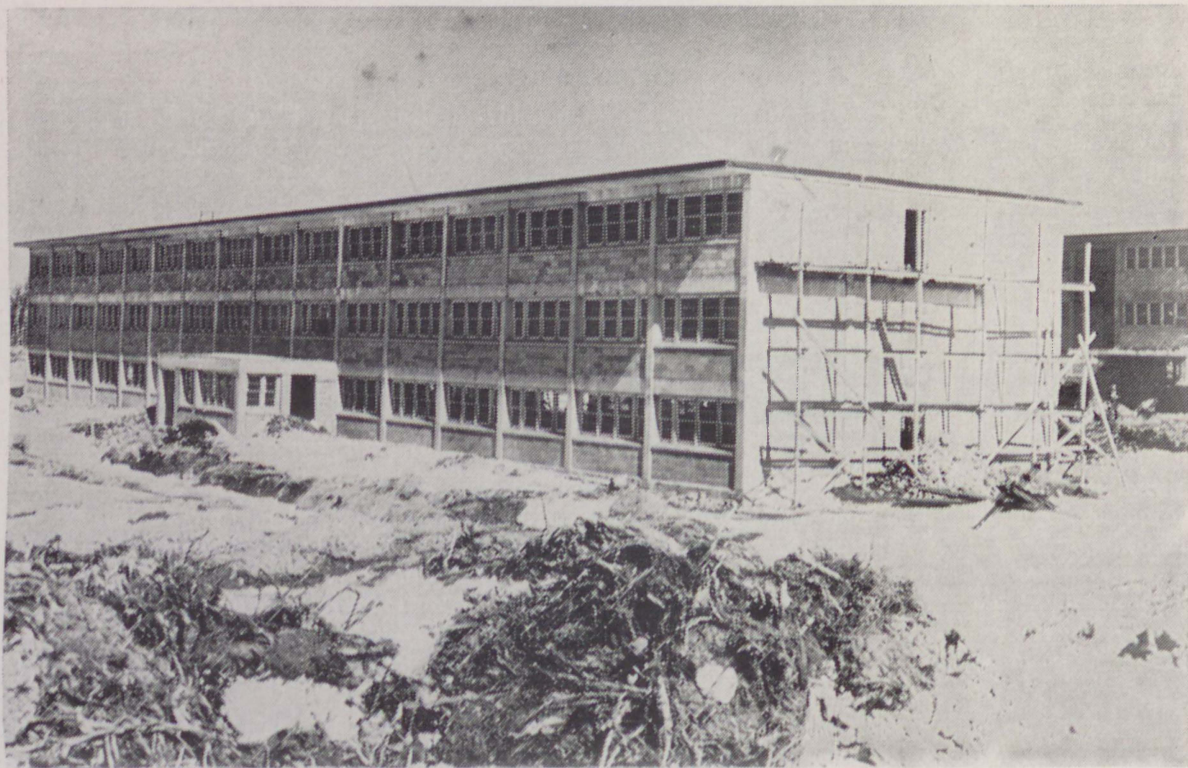
Work has begun on the new 11,000 ft. runway which will enable any size aircraft now in existence in the Air Force to land or take-off from Dow.

Plans call also for a new officer's club, NCO Club and Service Club.

When the construction is completed at Dow, the base will be one of the finest in the world. All buildings are steel, brick and cinder block constructed.

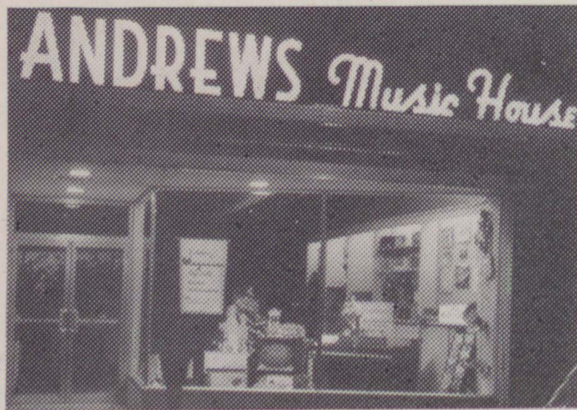

STATE AND NATIONAL PARKS IN CENTRAL MAINE

General Information

State Parks are under the control of Park Rangers, who are willing to render assistance to visitors. Information and rules relative to use of the park may be obtained at the office of the Custodian.

Bathing is restricted to areas designated for that purpose. Where facilities are provided, changing of clothes in automobiles prohibited. Fires may be built in places designated. Firearms and fireworks within park areas is prohibited.

All dogs or pets must be kept on a leash. No intoxicating beverages may be brought into, sold, or consumed within any park.

General admission, 20 cents; children under 12 years, free.

Note: The area is practically in its wild state, and is used mostly for mountain climbing. Some of the scenic views are excellent. Deer, bear, moose, beaver and other wild life may be

photographed - but not hunted.

Mt. Katahdin, 5267 feet above sea level, the highest mountain in Maine.

The state park is a wild life sanctuary and no fishing or hunting is permitted. Fish and game of all sorts may be observed and photographed in their natural habitats.

The park is open from Memorial Day to Oct. the 15th.

Acadia National Park - Located 20 miles from Ellsworth, Me. Route 1 from Bangor, and route 3 from Ellsworth. 27,860 acres.

This is the first National Park east of the Mississippi River.

Office of the Park is located in Bar Harbor, corner of Main and Park streets. Open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Guide service may be obtained free for nature trails. The Park Naturalists and assistants conduct a program designed to acquaint visitors with geology, plant and animal life and history of the park.

Museum - An archeological museum is located in the park containing relics of the stone age period of Indian culture.

Motor Roads run all through the park to the summit of Cadillac Mountain, and on Schoodic

Peninsula near Winter Harbor another motor road offers a shoreline drive of interest.

Trails and Footpaths - Acadia is primarily a trail park and has about 150 miles of trails and footpaths.

MOUNTAIN CLIMBING - HIKING

Mountain climbing perhaps furnishes better physical exercise than any sport but to the novice it is dangerous.

Mountain climbing should not be undertaken unless careful preparations are made and an experienced guide or mountain climber is in the party. Above all avoid climbing strange places in darkness.

Equipment

On a small climb the climber should carry rain equipment and food, matches, extra sweater and wool shirt.

Shoes must be well broken in - thick soled and at least one-half size larger than street shoes. Wear one or two wool hose over the regular lisle socks.

Carry a compass, matches, flashlight or lantern.

Be sure to study the trail in advance and carry a trail map with you.

Places to Climb

The Baxter State Park in northwestern Maine is the best place to climb, but should not be undertaken by the novice. Mount Katahdin is the highest mountain, the trails are provided with open-front shelters, and a fire tower. A

warden will be of assistance.

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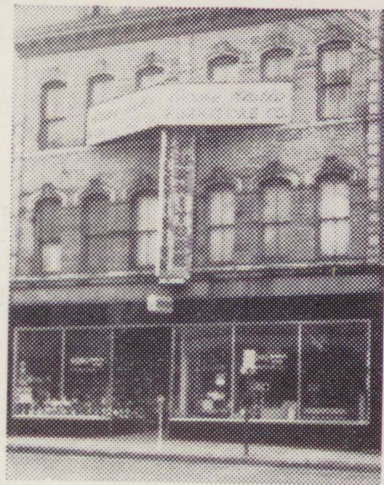
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
