Report of the Librarian

January 25, 1949

To the Board of Managers of the Bangor Public Library:

Sixty-one per cent (18,140) of the 29,822 people of Bangor are registered as library borrowers. On the average, each registered borrower took home 15.92 books during the year. The total number of books lent for home use in 1948 was 310,727. The library owns 257,860 books, which is 8.65 books for every inhabitant. Books added to the library totalled 8,800; removals, 2,056; making a total net gain of 6,744 books in the year.

Seventy-three per cent of the total cost of the library was met from the income of trust funds; 3%, from fees and fines; a minute fraction of 1%, from a state grant; and the remaining approximately 24%, from city appropriation.

The library operated not merely from its central building, but from a total of 142 different locations: 1 central library, 2 branches, 116 collections in all public and parochial schools, and 23 collections in institutions.

Most popular of the library distributing points outside the central library—as indicated both by the statistics and the appreciative comments of users—was the patients' library at the Eastern Maine General Hospital. There two members of the Bangor Public Library staff each spend ten hours a week lending reading matter throughout all the wards and rooms. They issued 11,119 books in the hospital in 1948.

In all, 72,314 Bangor Public Library books were issued from 141 locations outside the central library. This was 23% of the circulation of the library. The other 77% of the circulation was handled from the central library.

The issuing of books for home use is by no means the only important service of the library. The central library building is open twelve hours daily six days a week for reading and reference. The reference department handled 10,256 questions requiring research by the library staff and directed innumerable inquirers to the right book sources for their own research. The juvenile department handled 1,053 such questions. The great collection of 257,860 books was continually maintained in order. Sixty-five classes, numbering 1,754 young people, were instructed in the use of the library and of books. Forty-eight organizations held seventy-seven public meetings and seven exhibits in our various rooms.

Other and more detailed statistics of the library, referring to the many phases of the work not covered in these few short paragraphs will be found on pages 18 to 26 of this report.

A half floor of new shelving was added in our stack room. This, including its electric wiring, cost \$14,027.00. All of this money came from the one trust fund that may be used for building repairs; none, from city appropriation. This shelving will provide space for growth for not more than five years. After that an addition to the building will be necessary. Preliminary plans for such an addition are being drawn. The money for this construction is not in sight, for this project is too large to be accomplished by the fund that erected the 1948 shelves without depleting the principal so far as seriously to reduce the income, the great part of which is needed for current operation.

Principal additions to equipment, other than the shelves, were a heater at the entrance to the stack room, a 65-tray extension of the main catalog and a 15-tray extension of the shelflist, a Kardex installation for the periodical records, and a 5,000-division set of guide cards for the main catalog. Important repair and maintenance jobs were replacement of the electric wiring in the lecture hall; replacement of the worn-out electric floor receptacles in the children's room and read-

ing room; repairs to two of the lavatories; and replacement of the main water service, an item not anticipated in the budget and which was accomplished without overdrawing the budget, by omitting other items that had been planned.

The death, on October 19, of Eva E. Rand, a member of the regular staff of the library since 1911, and for many years the chief of the accessions and classification department and who helped the librarian in the preparation of the work schedules, was a severe blow to the library. Miss Rand is remembered with gratitude as a tremendously interested and efficient worker and a fine person.

The individual members of the staff have adapted themselves with the best spirit and with real success to many changes in personnel with resulting changes in duties. Pauline E. Tartre resigned early in the year as chief of the extension department and took an extended leave, to return as first assistant in the accessions and classification department, where the death of Miss Rand almost immediately placed the whole burden of this new work upon her. Charlotte M. Torrey was promoted from first assistant to chief of the extension department. Upon the resignation of Eileen B. Parker, to become librarian of the Garland Street Junior High School, Dorrice M. Wetzler was placed in charge of periodicals and binding, a detailed and complicated job.

New people have been added to the staff in the beginning positions to replace the individuals promoted, or in anticipation of resignations to become effective early in 1949. The conduct of the music branch has been in several hands and because of this our service there has not been as completely efficient as could be wished. The worker in this department should, for the sake of remaining fully in touch with library procedures, divide her time between central library and music branch.

Alice G. Bibber, who was assistant in charge of the music branch from its opening in 1929 until her retirement on

August 31, 1947 under the provisions of the Employees' Retirement System, died October 28, 1948.

For many years we have been saving on cataloging costs by the extensive use of Library of Congress printed catalog cards. Of late years the Library of Congress has been experimenting to such an extent with their cataloging that the utility of their cards to us has constantly diminished. This year we have ordered only one copy of each Library of Congress card, which we use as an authority for certain details, and have typed most of our own cards. This radical departure from previous practice has worked well.
