Raymond J. Knoepfel, and Mrs. Knoepfel, of New York. Ray was for two successive years President of the New York Club, has served as Governor of the 29th District, and also as a Director of Rotary International. At present he is a member of important Rotary International Committees, has the honor of having had a leading part in drafting the Constitution and By-Laws of Rotary International. He is a "Rotarian to the core", an excellent speaker, and comes to us as the Official Representative of Rotary International.

Donald A. Adams, and Mrs. Adams, of New Haven. Don is Past President of Rotary International, a charter member of the New Haven Club, for many years an outstanding and highly esteemed leader in the affairs of Rotary International, and one of the first citizens of his own city.

Norman Hapgood of New York City is an eminent man of letters, a distinguished lecturer and publicist, and a former Minister to Denmark. For nine years he was editor of Collier's Weekly, and later editor of Harper's Weekly, and is the author of "Industry and Progress", "The Advancing Hour", and various other works. His wide acquaintance with national leaders, past and present, will enable him to bring a timely and exceedingly significant message regarding the situation in the United States.

Alden G. Alley of Newark, N. J., has been for many years a professor of History at Dana College. His intimate knowledge of the important problems affecting Europe and America today will make his address on "Danger Spots in Europe" a memorable feature of the program.

Rules of Procedure

ORDER OF BUSINESS

1. The regular order of business, as shown on the program, shall be strictly adhered to, and new business will be in order each session only at the conclusion of the regular program.

SPEAKERS—WHO AND WHEN

2. No person, exclusive of those assigned set speeches and discussion, shall be allowed to speak more than twice and not more than three minutes on any subject without the unanimous consent of the Conference.

RESOLUTIONS

3. Resolutions are not to be read from the floor. All resolutions must be typewritten on letter size paper on one side only and delivered in triplicate to the Secretary of the Conference or Chairman of the Resolutions Committee not later than noon of May 15th.

WHO MAY VOTE

4. Every member in good standing of a member club in the District who shall be present at the Conference shall be entitled to vote upon all questions and matters properly presented, except in the selection of the nominee for District Governor.

VOTE FOR DISTRICT GOVERNOR

5. In accordance with Article XII, Section 7, of the By-Laws of Rotary International, the number of delegates permitted to vote for District Governor shall be one for each twenty-five club members, or major fraction thereof. Each delegate present shall have but one vote. No proxies will be allowed.

HOW TO NOMINATE DISTRICT GOVERNOR

6. Any delegate desiring to present a candidate for the office of District Governor shall have the right to do so upon being recognized by the presiding officer. Each nominating speech shall consist only of the announcement:

"..... of the Rotary Club
of places in nomination
for the office of Governor of the Thirty-Eighth District, of
Rotarian of"

This form and this form only shall be employed.

Two seconds, and no more, will be permitted for any nomination.

This form only shall be employed in seconding:

"..... of the Rotary Club
of seconds the nomination
for the office of Governor of the Thirty-Eighth District, of
Rotarian of"

The question of calling the roll for nomination shall rest with the Chair, subject to the will of the Conference.

FAILURE TO NOMINATE

7. In the event of no candidate for the office of District Governor receiving a majority of votes cast, the one receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped and another ballot taken for the office. Announcement of the hour for the ballots necessary subsequent to the first, will be made by the presiding officer immediately following the report of the Elections Committee that there has been no election.

QUALIFIED VOTERS

8. The Credentials Committee will supply the Elections Committee with a list of qualified voters, and it is imperative that the Credentials Committee receive notice of any change in the delegates or alternates, but nothing in this rule shall be construed to prevent the permanent substitution of an alternate for a delegate during the period of the Conference.

HOW TO SECURE RECOGNITION

9. Any person desiring to secure recognition of the Chair is required to mention his NAME and CLUB and either his given name or the word "Rotarian" in place of the prefix, "Mr."

PROPER CONFERENCE BUSINESS

10. This District Conference may take appropriate action on matters of local importance in its own District, provided such action shall be in accord with the Constitution and By-Laws and established rulings of Rotary International, and in keeping with the spirit and principles of Rotary. It shall also consider and act upon all matters submitted by the Board of Directors or Officers of Rotary International and may adopt resolutions recommending action or legislation to Rotary International.

PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

11. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be the parliamentary authority for all matters of procedure not otherwise specifically covered. These rules of procedure shall not be suspended, added to or amended except by a two-thirds vote.
