(SAC PS) — The price of being a well-dressed man is high. Be-tween the cost of imported fab-rics, the finest of tailors and ex-pensive accessories such as gold cuff links, diamond stickpins and h...i-made shoes, the price of an expensive wardrobe can run into thousands of dollars thousands of dollars.

A cotton tan shade 505 uniform - on the other hand - costs on-ly a few dollars at any clothing sales store or base exchange. But for all the money he has now, or ever will have, a rich man can't pay for the right to wear that uni-form. It has to be earned.

Not by wages, but by years out of his life. Not just "any old years," but by dedicated, loyal and faithful years. Those particu-lar years have to be dedicated to his country. his country.

As for the accessories . every item added to the original uniform, the "earn" rate is higher. Every stripe added signifies more skill, greater knowledge, and more responsibility. Each cluster on the longevity ribbon represents more years of dedication. Each decoration, campaign ribbon, and battle star has had price, but it wasn't paid with cash.

Because of the privileges and respect extended to people who wear such uniforms, laws have been passed to assure they will not be worn by "unauthorized" per--sons.

True, the cost of the cloth and accessories that compose an ex-pensive wardrobe can be quickly calculated . . . so can the price of a cotton tan shade 505 uniform. follows: And if money is no object a per-son can buy one, the other, or assigned both.

But only a select group can actually WEAR the uniform. It's a privilege that can't be bought.

Captain Raymond B. Morales, chief of maintenance for the 75th Fighter Interceptor Squadron ar-rived at Dow A.F.B., earlier this week to take command of establishing the maintenance program for the 75th FIS.

Captain Morales entered the U. S. Army Air Corps in 1942. He received preflight training at Santa Ann, California, primary flight training at Mortons Air Academy at Blythe, California, basic at Marana, Arizona, and advanced training at Luke Field, Arizona.

Shortly after receiving his gold bars in April of 1944 he attended Instructors' Course at Randolph Field until the following month when he was assigned to Yuma Army Field. Leaving Yuma in 1945, the captain was assigned overseas. He was released from active duty in April of 1945.

Your Base Commissary Is

Valuable Fringe Benefit By LT. COL. WILLIAM A. CRAWFORD, Base Commander The Base Commissary is one of the fringe benefits which service families have come to expect over the years. The first duty of the commissary is to procure, store and issue all food used by the air-men's dining halls on this base. Its second function is to operate a

resale store for the convenience of military personnel and their dependents All items in the commissary are sold exactly at cost. Items in the meat and produce department are adjusted each week so that there will be no loss to the government and no gain from the customer.

All commissary personnel give the best possible service which can be provided. Service is limited especially on pay days because of the inadequate space in the store. This can be improved, however, if customers who can afford to, will wait about three days after pay day or during the week preceeding pay day to do the bulk of their shopping. There are many days in the average month when the store is not crowded and shopping can be done more easily. During the pay day rush it is not possible to keep every item completely stocked within the limits of inadequate space. The commissary store is a privilege not to be taken lightly. Abuse of this privilege such as result of items purchased in the commission of the store is a privilege of the store is a

of this privilege, such as resale of items purchased in the commis-sary to unauthorized persons, could result in a loss of commissary privileges. This could amount to an increase in the family grocery bill of several hundred dollars in a year's time.

Q. Isn't U. S. talk about a "po-

sition of strength" evidence of ag-gressive intentions? A. Certainly not.

'position of strength" is for defense, not aggression. Agression of any kind is abhor-

rent to the American people. Furthermore, our Government is so constituted as to make it difficult -indeed virtually impossible-for the United States to launch an ag-gressive war. It can respond in-stantaneously to an attack, but it cannot initiate war without first getting the approval of the people's representatives in Congress. This would require time and public debate, and the American people would never agree to begin an at-tack. Nor would we agree to help any other nation that does so.

Naturally, we would prefer to

have gone ahead, in keeping with Article 52 of the U. N. Charter, to form collective security arrangements for our mutual defence, and in the words of the Charter-to "make every effort to achieve pacific settlements of . . . disputes . . . before referring them to the Security Council.'' (AFNS.)

Often long into the night or oft before we wake, one of your hospital laboratory personnel is diligently at work, mixing reagents, reading colorimeters or looking at blood smears under the micro-scope. The Lab man, as he is known to the medical staff, is the spe-cially trained Airman or NCO whose responsibility it is to perform the many varied and exacting laboratory tests requested by the medical officers

Medicine as practiced today is intimately associated with bio-logical and chemical analysis. Your hospital laboratory is equipped and staffed to perform the major portion of all tests requested of it. Although diagnoses may be reached clinically after a review of medical history and physical examination, often the test tube holds in its depth the reason for many of the ills which befall us. By means of chemical analysis, staining techniques, and microscopic study, various body fluids and tissues are called upon to give up their bidden data.

Among the "raw products" entering the laboratory are blood.

Among the raw products entring the holdary are blood, urine, and stool specimens, spinal fluid, gastric and nasal secretions, collections of fluid from chest cavities, cysts and abscesses, various body materials for bacterial culture, body perspiration and finger-nail scrapings, all the ingredients, it would seem, for a witch's brew, These are actually many of the necessary materials which are sub-ject to learned scrutiny by the Lab men in white. This individual, rigorously trained and entrusted with often life





The civilian and military personnel, on hand for welcoming ceremonies, were invited to "look over" the Thunderchiefs at close range. The F-105's, built by Republic Aviation, will provide TAC with a versatile aircraft capable of speeds better than 1300 miles an nour. The plane can be used as a

fighter, bomber, interceptor or supersonic tanker. Its internal bomb bay can house nuclear or non-nuclear bombs. The needlenosed airplane can mount Sidewinder missiles under its wings.

Testing of the F-105's has been







New Proposal To Bar "Grey Area" Reenlistments HQ. SAC (SAC PS)-The direc-

forward to USAF with a proposal that would put a quality control "shillelagh" into the hands of D/P Basically, it is a means of bar-ring from reenlistment—anywhere "grey area" or borderline airman.

For example, a borderline air-man's performance can be suffi-ciently acceptable to preclude ac-tion under any of the quality con-trol measures, but he still can be denied reenlistment by his commander. Under the present set-up, however, this same airman may apply to the recruiting service or another Air Force base and be reenlisted since his mental and physical qualifications are within acceptable standards. SAC's pro-posal, if adopted, will keep that from happening.

In its proposal, SAC recom-mended that Special AF Forms 75 mended that Special AF Forms is (performance report- be prepared —in duplicate — identifying the reasons for not recommending re-enlistment. One copy would ac-company the airman's records to USAF and the other would ac-company the DD Form 214 to the company the DD Form 214 to the 500th USAF Recruiting Wing. In addition each Form 214 would have an entry in item 32 that reads "RE-4, not recommended for enlistment or reenlistment." Airmen applying for enlistment

or reenlistment through the re-cruiting service or an Air Force base consequently would have to have an approved wafver from USAF before being allowed to reenter.

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
