Sgt. Crane To Attend Husson College Soon

Staff Sergeant Robert W. Crane, NCOIC of the Engineering Emergency Night Crew with Installations Squadron, will soon attend Husson College in Bangor for approximately six months under the Air Force's Operation Bootstrap Program.



Operation Bootstrap is a program whereby all military personnel on active duty can apply for a civilian college of his choice if he has less than six months to go before receiving a degree. If sent through proper channels and approved the individual will get a basis subsistence allowance of \$2.57 per day plus his regular pay during the period of TDY.

After completing this six months of school Sergeant Crane will receive a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration.

When he entered the service in 1953 the sergeant had only completed his sophomore year in high school. Since then he has continuously moved upward through the many education programs the Air Force offered him and will soon be awarded a degree for his achievements.

Sergeant Crane first started on his college degree in 1956 when he arrived at Dow from French Morocco.

Both he and his wife Patricia are natives of Maine and presently reside at 446 North Main Street in Brewer.

SCHOOL TDY IN U. S. RULES RELAXED

Overseas officers in grade less than colonel may now attend special training in the U. S. in a TDY status if the course is less than 60 days and the officer has a year's retainability at the overseas station after finishing school.

Headquarters delegated to major commands authority to ignore paragraph 4th (1) (b), AFR 50-9 and Part I, USAF Training Prospectus, which prohibits TDY return to ZI of officers below the grade of colonel.

Fighters Once More At Dow AFB

With the arrival of the 75th Fighter Interceptor Squadron from Presque Isle AFB, Maine, many questions have been "floating" around the base. Is this the first fighter unit Dow has ever supported? What fighter units have operated out of Dow. What type of did they use?

The year 1946 saw the 14th Fighter Wing arrive at Dow. They were credited with "ironing out" the bugs of the first F-84 Thunderjets. In 1949, the 14th left Dow and the base was deactivated. Dow was reactivated in February 1951 and almost immediately the 132nd Fighter Wing of the Nebraska-Iowa Air National Guard was called to duty here. At the time of activation Dow was under the Air Defense Command and in April, with the arrival of the 132nd Dow was transferred to SAC. In January, 1952, the base was transferred to TAC. June of 1952 saw the 132nd transfer to Alexandria AFB, La., and on July 1, Dow was reverted back to the command of SAC.

In January of 1953, the 506th Strategic Fighter Wing took over Dow. The 506th was placed on training status and were assigned the Korean-tested F-84G Thunderjet. During the latter months of 1953, the 506th took a three-month tour on TDY to Japan with

During the coming week the operation will be in full force in order to meet the implementation date of July 1.

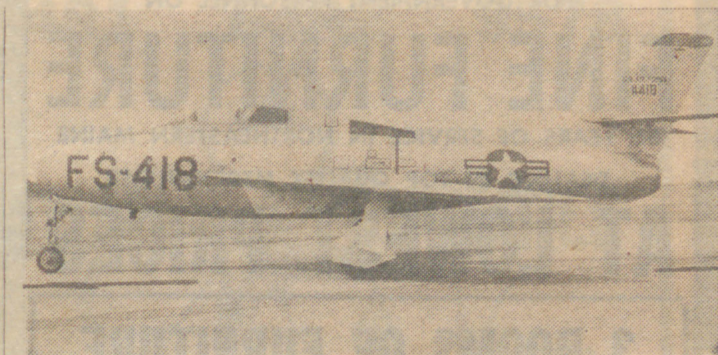
It was officially announced this week by the reorganization project officer, Lt. Col. James R. Curran, that the new deputy commanders have been named.

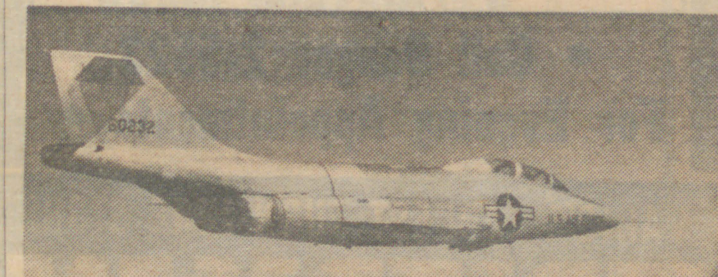

(SAC PS) — The price of being a well-dressed man is high. Between the cost of imported fabrics, the finest of tailors and expensive accessories such as gold cuff links, diamond stickpins and hand-made shoes, the price of an expensive wardrobe can run into thousands of dollars.

A cotton tan shade 505 uniform — on the other hand — costs only a few dollars at any clothing sales store or base exchange. But for all the money he has now, or ever will have, a rich man can't pay for the right to wear that uniform. It has to be earned.

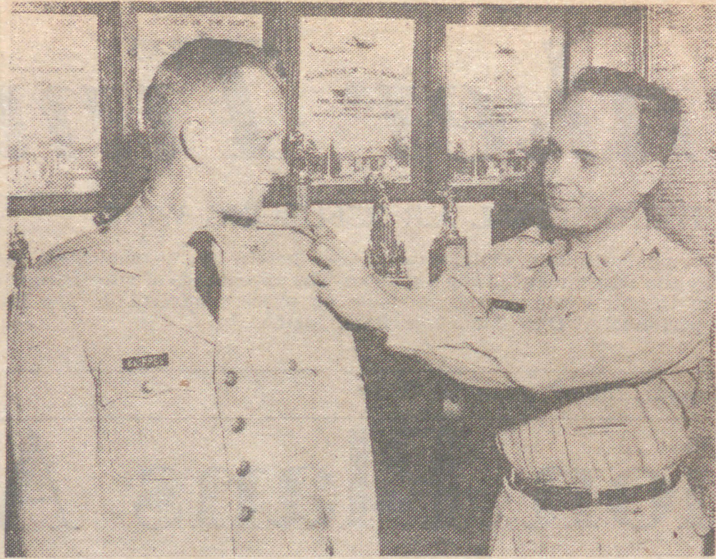
Not by wages, but by years out of his life. Not just "any old years," but by dedicated, loyal and faithful years. Those particular years have to be dedicated to his country.

As for the accessories . . . for every item added to the original uniform, the "earn" rate is higher. Every stripe added signifies more skill, greater knowledge, and more responsibility. But only a select group can actually WEAR the uniform. It's a privilege that can't be bought.

Senior And Chief Master Assignments Established

HQ. SAC (SAC PS) — Dow Senior Master Sergeants will be interested to learn that SAC's directorate of Personnel has released its policy on the assignment of senior and chief master sergeants.

Governed by criteria established by USAF, SAC's policy on the assignment of senior and chief master sergeants (E-8 and E-9) is as follows:

Chief master sergeants will be assigned only to CMSgt. positions. Senior master sergeants will be assigned to SMSgt. positions or CMSgt. positions until such time as the latter are filled by CMSgts.

Senior master sergeants whose specialties are unauthorized or surplus to their units will be reported for reassignment. Where two or more airmen possess the same specialty, and one or more are to be reported as surplus, airmen with the earliest FSSD will be reported in order not to attract overseas levies which will require withdrawal of individuals filling authorized positions.

Of these selected for reassignment, airmen who are highly vulnerable for foreign service will (1) be reassigned to a SAC overseas area, provided a requirement exists, or (2) be reported to USAF for overseas reassignment against a world-wide requirement.

Remaining airmen will be reassigned to a SAC ZI unit where a requirement exists, or, if surplus to the needs or this command, they will be reported to USAF for reassignment. Where practicable, ZI assignments will be made to units under the jurisdiction of the major subordinate command in which the airmen is presently assigned.

Foreign service selection lists for CMSgts. will be published as soon as possible. During the interim, vulnerability of SMSgts. will be determined on the basis of the most vulnerable MSgt. seven-level AFSC leading to the eight level possessed by the individual concerned.

75th Maintenance Chief Now Here

Captain Raymond B. Morales, chief of maintenance for the 75th Fighter Interceptor Squadron arrived at Dow A.F.B., earlier this week to take command of establishing the maintenance program for the 75th FIS.

Captain Morales entered the U. S. Army Air Corps in 1942. He received preflight training at Santa Ann, California, primary flight training at Mortons Air Academy at Blythe, California, basic at Marana, Arizona, and advanced training at Luke Field, Arizona.

Shortly after receiving his gold bars in April of 1944 he attended Instructors' Course at Randolph Field until the following month when he was assigned to Yuma Army Field. Leaving Yuma in 1945, the captain was assigned overseas. He was released from active duty in April of 1945.

Prior to being recalled to active duty in 1951 Captain Morales worked with Phoenix Junior College, Phoenix, Arizona as a teacher in aviation subjects and as a flight instructor.

From the time of his recall until 1954 his duties were mostly those of an instructor.

Early in 1955 Captain Morales was stationed with 36th Fighter Bomber Wing in Korea; in 1956 he returned to the United States and was assigned to the 23rd Fighter Group at Presque Isle Air Force base as liaison maintenance officer.

The Captain and Mrs. Morales have five children: Raymond, Robert, David, Katherine and Vera Mae.

The AF Falcons and the Annapolis Middies are scheduled to begin their football wars on Oct. 15, 1960, at Baltimore, as a home game for Navy. The teams will not clash on the Falcon's home ground, in Colorado, until Oct. 1966. The initial meeting of the Falcons and the Army football team is booked for Oct. 31, 1959, at Yankee Stadium, New York City.

AF Falcons Progress

Progress, with a capital "P", is quite evident in a recap of the accomplishments of Air Force Academy intercollegiate athletic teams for the 1958-59 academic year.

Blessed with four classes (but still with about only 45 per cent of eventual enrollment), the 1958-59 Falcons posted a dual-meet record of 101 wins, 56 losses and 2 ties for a sparkling .643 win average. These figures include all of the Academy's 15 intercollegiate sports except skiing, which could not be computed on a dual basis. Triangulars were counted as double duals for the purpose of including the highest number of athletic contests in the computations.

The schedules in almost all sports were stepped up. Foes in 1958-59 included schools from coast to coast and border to border.

Outstanding among the team efforts were the undefeated season and Cotton Bowl invitation for the football team, Rocky Mountain and College Invitational championships by the gymnastics, and the Western Intercollegiate Conference title by the fencers.

Individually, Brock Strom was named to the all-America football consensus squad, Bob Beckel made the Helms all-America basketball second team, Bob Siteman was named to the National Rifle Association's college all-America second team, and Fencer Harlow Halbower won an unprecedented third consecutive Western Intercollegiate Conference individual crown.

New Changes Made In SAC

HQ. SAC (SAC PS) — Activation of two air divisions, a strategic missile squadron and an air refueling squadron, plus the reorganization and reassignment of several other units was published in recent SAC general orders.

Hq. 13th Air Division, Warren AFB, Wyo., and Hq. 18th Air Division, Fairchild AFB, Wash., will be activated on July 1. Both will be assigned to Fifteenth Air Force, March AFB, Calif.

The 703d Strategic Missile Wing (ICBM-Titan) at Lowry AFB, Colo. and 706th Strategic Missile Wing (ICBM-Atlas) at Warren AFB will be assigned to the 13th AD. The 92d Bomb Wing at Fairchild AFB and 4170th Strategic Wing at Larson AFB, Wash., will be assigned to the 18th AD.

Also on July 1, the 4128th Strategic Wing at Amarillo AFB, Tex., will be reassigned from the 47th Air Division, Walker AFB, N. M. to the 310th Air Division, Biggs AFB, Tex. The 47th AD will be transferred to Castle AFB, Calif., and 93d Bomb Wing at that base will be assigned from Fifteenth AF to the 47th.

The 924th Air Refueling Squadron will be activated at Castle AFB and assigned to the 93d BW.

The 865th Strategic Missile Squadron (IRBM-Jupiter) at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., has been redesignated 865th Technical Training Squadron.

On Aug. 15 the 566th Strategic Missile Squadron (ICBM-Atlas) will be activated at Offutt AFB, Neb., and assigned to Second Air Force.

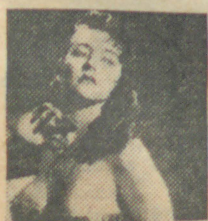

Your Base Commissary Is Valuable Fringe Benefit

The Base Commissary is one of the fringe benefits which service families have come to expect over the years. The first duty of the commissary is to procure, store and issue all food used by the airmen's dining halls on this base. Its second function is to operate a resale store for the convenience of military personnel and their dependents.

All items in the commissary are sold exactly at cost. Items in the meat and produce department are adjusted each week so that there will be no loss to the government and no gain from the customer.

All commissary personnel give the best possible service which can be provided. Service is limited especially on pay days because of the inadequate space in the store. This can be improved, however, if customers who can afford to, will wait about three days after pay day or during the week preceding pay day to do the bulk of their shopping. There are many days in the average month when the store is not crowded and shopping can be done more easily. During the pay day rush it is not possible to keep every item completely stocked within the limits of inadequate space.

The commissary store is a privilege not to be taken lightly. Abuse of this privilege, such as resale of items purchased in the commissary to unauthorized persons, could result in a loss of commissary privileges. This could amount to an increase in the family grocery bill of several hundred dollars in a year's time.

Your Question

(If you are overseas now, or are planning to go overseas, you should know the answer to questions of the kind asked in this week's Q&A column.)

Q. Isn't U. S. talk about a "position of strength" evidence of aggressive intentions?

A. Certainly not. America's "position of strength" is for defense, not aggression.

Aggression of any kind is abhorrent to the American people. Furthermore, our Government is so constituted as to make it difficult—indeed virtually impossible—for the United States to launch an aggressive war. It can respond instantaneously to an attack, but it cannot initiate war without first getting the approval of the people's representatives in Congress. This would require time and public debate, and the American people would never agree to begin an attack. Nor would we agree to help any other nation that does so.

Naturally, we would prefer to make effective use of the Security Council of the United Nations. But the Soviet Union's persistent use of the veto in the Security Council has made this difficult. However, we and other free-world nations have gone ahead, in keeping with Article 52 of the U. N. Charter, to form collective security arrangements for our mutual defence, and in the words of the Charter—to "make every effort to achieve pacific settlements of . . . disputes . . . before referring them to the Security Council." (AFNS.)

Your Medical Team

Often long into the night or oft before we wake, one of your hospital laboratory personnel is diligently at work, mixing reagents, reading colorimeters or looking at blood smears under the microscope. The Lab man, as he is known to the medical staff, is the specially trained Airman or NCO whose responsibility it is to perform the many varied and exacting laboratory tests requested by the medical officers.

Medicine as practiced today is intimately associated with biological and chemical analysis. Your hospital laboratory is equipped and staffed to perform the major portion of all tests requested of it.

Although diagnoses may be reached clinically after a review of medical history and physical examination, often the test tube holds in its depth the reason for many of the ills which befall us. By means of chemical analysis, staining techniques, and microscopic study, various body fluids and tissues are called upon to give up their hidden data.

Among the "raw products" entering the laboratory are blood, urine, and stool specimens, spinal fluid, gastric and nasal secretions, collections of fluid from chest cavities, cysts and abscesses, various body materials for bacterial culture, body perspiration and fingernail scrapings, all the ingredients, it would seem, for a witch's brew. These are actually many of the necessary materials which are subjected to learned scrutiny by the Lab men in white.

This individual, rigorously trained and entrusted with often life saving responsibility, can often be seen hurrying through the hospital corridors carrying his trade-mark — a white open canister containing pipettes, syringes, syrettes, and reagents.

Looked upon by the patient often as an ancient bloodletter, he is an indispensable part of your hospital team, and responsible for performing an average of 3,500 laboratory determinations each month.

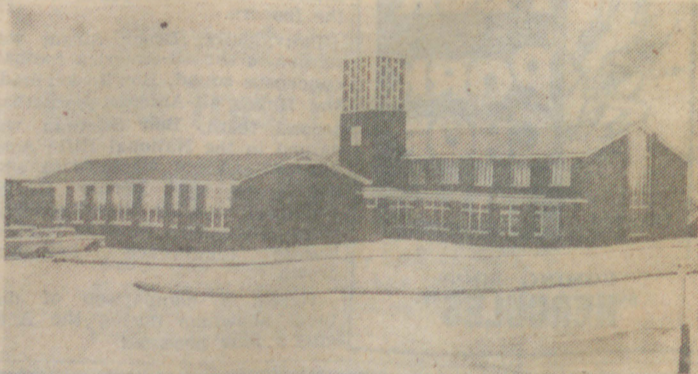
Other first place awards were shared by Army and Navy members.

F-105 Fighter Bombers Join TAC Wing At Johnson Base

(AFNS) The Air Force's newest and fastest fighter-bomber, the F-105, arrived at Seymour Johnson AFB, N. C., this week, with a boom.

Coming in from Eglin AFB, Fla., four ultrasonic "Thunderchiefs" sped high above the Johnson base at 45,000 feet, purposely creating for spectators the thunderous rumble of a sonic boom.

The sound signaled the advent of the F-105 as part of the Tactical Air Command's 4th Tactical Fighter Wing. Present plans call for three squadrons to be equipped with about 65 of the "Thunderchiefs" by the end of the year.

Testing of the F-105's has been taking place at Eglin. The arrival of the four jets at Johnson marked the first combat assignment of the single-seater tactical fighter.

Leading the four jets down for a landing was Brig. Gen. Joseph Moore, Commander of the 4th Tactical Fighter Wing. The civilian and military personnel, on hand for welcoming ceremonies, were invited to "look over" the Thunderchiefs at close range.

The F-105's, built by Republic Aviation, will provide TAC with a versatile aircraft capable of speeds better than 1300 miles an hour. The plane can be used as a fighter, bomber, interceptor or supersonic tanker. Its internal bomb bay can house nuclear or non-nuclear bombs. The needle-nosed airplane can mount Sidewinder missiles under its wings.

With the added ability of carrying 2.75 mm rockets, napalm, or high demolition bombs, the Thunderchief can be used to provide necessary ground support. It also has a fast firing, dual-feed 20-mm cannon in the nose.

The 63-foot long jet, with a 34-foot wingspread, is a big plane, especially designed to handle both

a large fuel supply and any "bomb package" required for a specific operation.

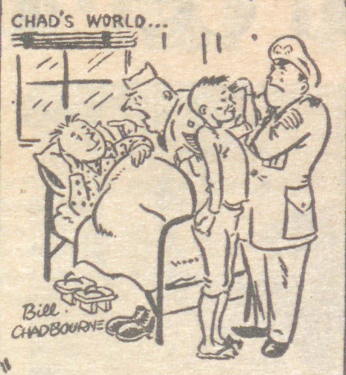
Behind the wings, the F-105 slims down to a "coke bottle" shape, a design supposed to help reduce air drag when the plane hits transonic speeds.

The forward wing edges are distinguished by air intake ducts which flare out on both sides. In flight, the F-105 scoops air in at an estimated one million cubic feet a minute.

Under the tail section is a ventral fin, which helps stabilize the jet when traveling at high speeds.

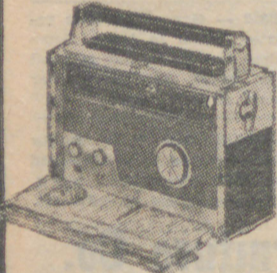

1. Strong black coffee will offset most of the effects of alcohol. True or false?

2. Just two drinks may reduce your visual "sharpness" greatly. True or false?

3. People who take two or three drinks (social drinkers) and then drive a car are a bigger problem than out-and-out drunk drivers. True or false?

4. During the Christmas holidays about one out of four drivers involved in a fatal auto accident has had something to drink. True or false?

5. About one out of five adult pedestrians killed has been drinking. True or false?

Answers:

1. False. Coffee or other stimulants, will not offset the effects of alcohol. "Only time," it says, "can eliminate alcohol from the blood stream."

2. True. Two cocktails may reduce your visual acuity as much as if you were wearing dark glasses at night. "Imagine," the council says, "trying to drive at night wearing dark glasses."

3. True. "As a group, social drinkers can be a greater problem than obvious drunks," Why? "There are more social drinkers and they're harder to detect. When a drunk gets behind the wheel of a car, he usually attracts attention because his actions are so pronounced others notice his impairment. The social drinker, however, usually is able to escape detection until an emergency gets him into trouble."

4. False. Not one out of four — closer to one out of two. This is almost twice as high as the annual average.

There are a lot of misconceptions concerning drinking and driving. Smart drivers know you don't have to be drunk to be dangerous.

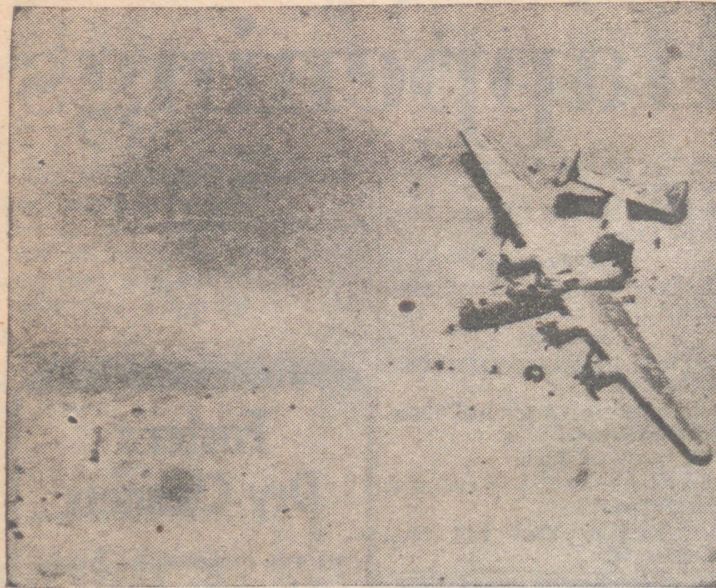

Release Of Capehart Units At Dow Has Been Delayed

Due to unforeseen difficulties, particularly the weather, there has been a delay in the release of Capehart Housing to the Air Force.

The Eighth Air Force Acceptance Inspection team was sched-

uled to start the inspection of the first 194 units on June 22. This inspection has been rescheduled for June 29 and the inspection is scheduled for seven or more work days. After and during the inspection discrepancies noted will be cancelled. When the housing is finally acceptable by Air Force standards, an Air Force acceptance team must purchase the housing. The purchasing period usually lasts three days.

Altogether the inspection, correction of discrepancies and purchase, will total at least twelve work days under ideal conditions. Since weather and labor conditions have not been ideal July 15 is the new target date set for the occupancy of Capehart Housing.

Again all concerned are cautioned against making arrangements for moving from private rentals until they have been assigned an apartment.

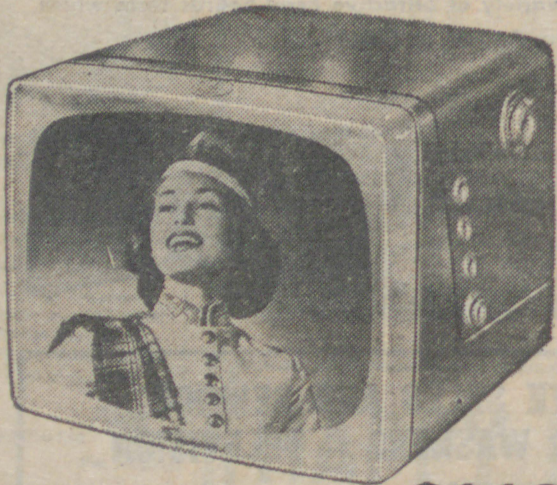

New Wing At Command Hq Is Nearly Finished

HQ. SAC (SAC PS) — A new three-story wing to the Strategic Air Command headquarters is rapidly nearing completion. The entire wing will be used to house the men and machines of the missile trajectory center.

Headed by Col. Jack Whitson, the center employs the brains of highly skilled mathematicians, computer technicians and programmers to accomplish the infinitely detailed task of giving missiles their orders.

Colonel Whitson explains his unit's responsibility as "computing guidance presettings for every missile in the SAC inventory," and adds that it is done by "feeding bits and pieces of information into an electronic computer."

Of course, all of SAC's aircraft and missiles have pre-assigned targets in the command's emergency war plans. The problem to be tackled with missiles is "aiming" them prior to launch, since alteration of flight path after firing is impossible.

Working with SAC's directorate of intelligence, the trajectory center will obtain its information on missile targets from the maze of intelligence data which flows into the headquarters daily.

Target priorities do not remain fixed. They change constantly as different target complexes become more strategic, that is, more important to the enemy's war-making capacity.

Thus, rapid programming of missile trajectories becomes a matter of vital concern to SAC's commanders and planners. Due to the compression of time brought on by modern weapons systems, there can be no allowance for slow computation. One missile trajectory may require as many as 650 items of data to be programmed.

Personnel of the trajectory center will be under the 544th Reconnaissance Technical Group, a unit which has doubled its personnel strength since SAC entered the missile age.

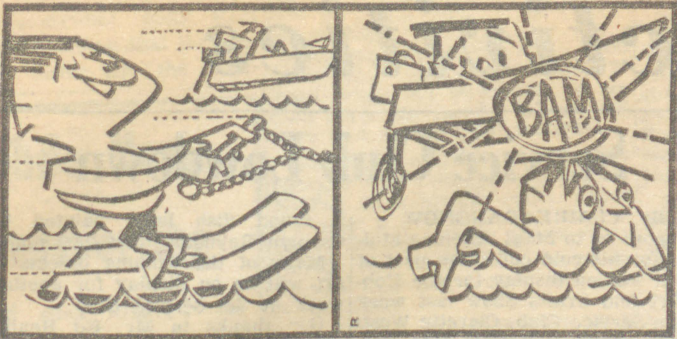

Dowman Recommended For Award Of Soldiers Medal

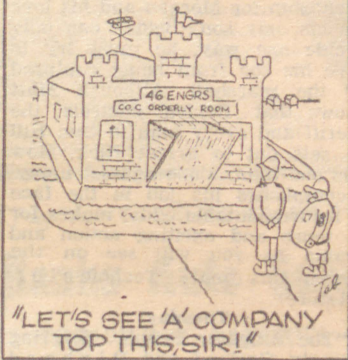
Airman First Class Joseph B. Pruitt of Dow's A & E Squadron saved the life of seven year old Richard McTague on April 25, 1959.

On this day Airman Pruitt and TSgt. Frank A. Skellen also of A & E Squadron were fishing from a bridge over a stream that flows into Green Lake. A short distance from them was a group of children also fishing. At approximately 3 p. m. Airman Pruitt heard a loud splash and saw that one of the kids had fallen from a rocky bank into the frigid water. Without hesitation, completely disregarding his own personal safety, Airman Pruitt jumped, fully clothed, from the bridge into the water and swam for a distance of 25 yards, reaching the infant as he was going down for the second time. Airman Pruitt held the struggling boy's head above the water and swam to the edge of the stream where Sergeant Skellen pulled them both on the bank to safety. The small boy was immediately given artificial respira-

tion by both Airman Pruitt and Sergeant Skellen.

For his act of heroism involving voluntary risk of his life Airman Pruitt has been recommended for the Soldiers Medal.

AIRMAN'S BOOKSHELF

POPULAR AND PROFESSIONAL AEROSPACE BOOKS

Sam Levenson tells an anecdote about Johnny who was about to be punished by teacher for striking a classmate.

"Why did you hit him?" teacher asked.

"I was defending myself," Johnny retorted. "I hit him back before he could hit me first."

In essence, this is the Soviet concept of "pre-emptive war" and the major theme of Mr. Dinerstein's book, "War and the Soviet Union." Such a war may be unleashed by the Soviet Union to forestall an attack they are convincing themselves is inevitable. In Communist ideology, "pre-emptive" war is different from "preventive war." The latter, the Communists charge, is what the "capitalists" shall begin when they are convinced they can destroy the Soviet Union without major retaliation.

"Pre-emptive" war is quite new in Soviet military ideology, according to Mr. Dinerstein. It is the third of three phases through which Soviet military thought has passed since the end of World War II. In the first, identified with the late Joseph Stalin, it was believed that victory in war depended upon quality and quantity of Army divisions, the organizational ability of their leadership, the morale of the Army and the stability of the rear.

The second phase began after Stalin's death in 1953. Malenkov and others argued the concept of mutual deterrence, that possession of nuclear weapons in quantity could assure the USSR of immunity from attack. The Malenkov faction adopted the idea that a thermonuclear war could destroy

human civilization itself and that the "capitalists" themselves realized this. Thus, after a nuclear buildup, Soviet military expenditures could be kept at a level to permit the USSR to use part of its resources to raise living standards at home.

This concept came in for attack by the Khrushchev faction which branded reliance on a deterrent posture as complacency that could lead to disaster. Thereupon ensued a conflict between two ideas of warfare which became part of a larger struggle for control of the Soviet Union.

Mr. Dinerstein is a senior staff member of the RAND Corporation a non-profit organization that produces research studies in many fields primarily for the United States Air Force. He has amassed a wealth of data to prove his thesis, but it must be kept in mind that his is largely an intellectual exercise of weighing words and balancing ideas that he found on a printed page. Could a Soviet in-

telligence analyst make an equally convincing case for any thesis about U. S. military intentions by sifting words and selecting from the voluminous military writing that appears in the English language? Who speaks for us—General Maxwell Taylor, General Thomas D. White, or Admiral Leigh Burke, or all of them — in part. But what part?

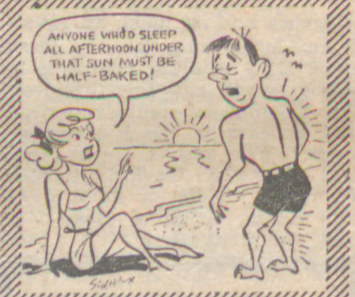

New Proposal To Bar "Grey Area" Reenlistments

HQ. SAC (SAC PS)—The directorate of personnel here has gone forward to USAF with a proposal that would put a quality control "shillelagh" into the hands of D/P.

Basically, it is a means of barring from reenlistment—anywhere—a "grey area" or borderline airman.

For example, a borderline airman's performance can be sufficiently acceptable to preclude action under any of the quality control measures, but he still can be denied reenlistment by his commander. Under the present set-up, however, this same airman may apply to the recruiting service or another Air Force base and be reenlisted since his mental and physical qualifications are within acceptable standards. SAC's proposal, if adopted, will keep that from happening.

In its proposal, SAC recommended that Special AF Forms 75 (performance report—be prepared—in duplicate—identifying the reasons for not recommending reenlistment. One copy would accompany the airman's records to USAF and the other would accompany the DD Form 214 to the 3500th USAF Recruiting Wing. In addition each Form 214 would have an entry in item 32 that reads "RE-4, not recommended for enlistment or reenlistment."

Airmen applying for enlistment or reenlistment through the recruiting service or an Air Force base consequently would have to have an approved waiver from USAF before being allowed to re-enter.

Make A Movie

Vandenberg AFB, Calif., is the movie production lot for the filming of "Thor at Vandenberg", an official 40-minute sound and color motion picture depicting the various sequences and actions of crew procedures from the time a missile arrives at Vandenberg through the launching process.

An actual Thor launch will climax the film.

First Missile Division men will appear in the film which will be used to train all personnel who work in the Thor weapon system. Additional prints will be made for showing Air Force-wide.

Dowman Attends Training Forum

Reenlistment For Schooling Now Permitted USAF

HQ. SAC (SAC PS) — USAF has re-established a program that will allow eligible airmen to reenlist for formal school training.

As part of Change B to AFM 35-11, which also concerned "base-of-choice" enlistments, this new policy will allow airmen to apply for retraining four months prior to discharge. The request will go through channels to the Air Training Command where a quota will be established for him. When discharged, the airman will then reenlist to fill the quota.

Criteria for eligibility for reenlistment for technical school will be as outlined in AFR 39-8.

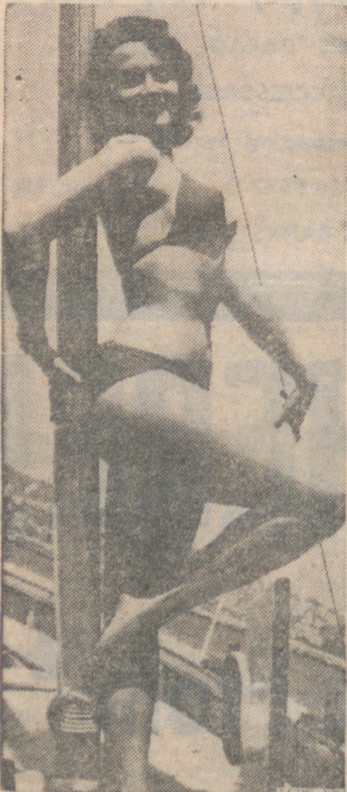
Its primary mission of defending the northern part of Japan.

On January 15, 1954, the 506th became the first operational organization of the Air Force to receive the F-84F Thunderstreak, marking the second time a Dow unit "checked out" first with a Republic Aviation jet aircraft. March of 1955 saw the 506th being replaced by the 4060th Air Refueling Wing currently at Dow.

Also operating out of Dow at this time is the 101st Air Defense Wing of the Maine Air National Guard. They utilize the North American F-89 Scorpion.

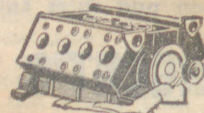
