HIGHLIGHTS IN THE LIFE OF FATHER JOHN BAPST

1815. Born in Switzerland.
1845. Exiled from Switzerland with all other members of the Jesuit Order.
1848. Transferred from France to do missionary work among the Indians on Indian Island at Old Town. Maine.
1851. Transferred from Old Town to Eastport.
1854. Moved his headquarters from Eastport to Ellsworth, Maine, where he built a new Church and erected a central house from which he planned to serve all the Catholics in Eastern Maine who were inaccessible to the priests in Eastport. He took up his residence in Ellsworth early in January.
1854. (October 12) Tarred and feathered in hatred of the faith by a band of bigots (Know-Nothings) at Ellsworth.
1854. (October 13) Left Ellsworth to reside in Bangor. He never returned to Ellsworth, not even on a visit.
1854. (November) Tendered a tumultuous reception by the citizens of Bangor--men of all creeds, races and classes joining in the demonstration.
1854. (Dec. 8) Bishop Fitzpatrick of Boston, assisted by Bishop Bacon of Portland, laid the cornerstone of the present St. John's Church on York Street, erected under the supervision of Father Bapst. Beneath the cornerstone was placed a bottle containing a piece of clothing and some of the tar and feathers removed from Fr. Bapst at Ellsworth. Into the bottle went this explanatory note written by Bishop Fitzpatrick: "This is a piece of the clothing worn by the builder of this Church, Rev. John Bapst, S. J. on the night of October 13, 1854, when he was tarred and feathered, in hatred of the Faith, by the "Know-Nothings" of Ellsworth".
- 1854-1859. Pastor of St. John's Church on York Street.
1859. Transferred to Boston where he and Father Fulton, also a Jesuit, became co-founders of the present Boston College. The present Church of the Immaculate Conception, an edifice of massive proportions on Harrison Avenue in Boston, was erected under the supervision of Fr. Bapst.
1880. Wrote his act of resignation. "Sume, Domine, et suscipe accipe meum intellectum".
1887. He died on November 2, the Feast of All Souls, in Baltimore and his remains were interred three days later at Woodstock, Md.

WAR ACTIVITIES

Joining in the war effort with a vim, John Bapst did its part during the past year. The students showed a patriotic spirit of cooperation in every venture.

At the first of the year a call came out from Civilian Defense Headquarters for scrap metal and the students responded whole-heartedly, soon filling the bins in front of the school with scrap iron, steel, tin, and rubber. In this drive John Bapst showed a splendid record.

A special war stamp drive was inaugurated during the mid-year period and the results were gratifying. In a short campaign the students showed their patriotic fervor by passing the \$500.00 mark in stamps and bonds. NEW COURSES ADDED THIS YEAR

RED CROSS COURSE

At the beginning of the second semester, the Seniors and Juniors started the Standard Course in First Aid with Brother Dennis Joseph and Brother Martinian as instructors. Both of these teachers are certified by the Penobscot County Chapter of the American Red Cross. Classes were held on Mondays and Wednesdays before school and much interest was displayed by the students in learning the various skills of the Course. AERONAUTICS

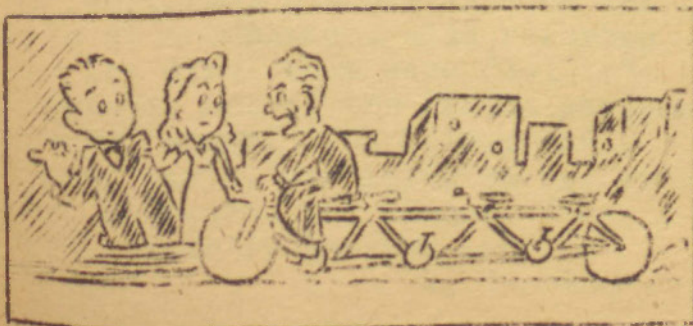

John Bapst graduates who have not yet reached their twenty-second birthday and would like to take the Federal Examination on April 2 to qualify for the Officers Training School - army or navy, may secure information concerning this examination at the high school office. Those who pass it successfully and satisfy physical and moral requirements will be placed in college at Government expense and under Government discipline. Upon completion of their college courses, they will be officers in either the army or the navy of the United States. The examination is nationwide.
