Class of 1963 Selects Official B. H. S. Ring

As its theme for this year, the Oracle makes use of the new Bangor High School ring selected by the class of 1963. The selection of the official school ring marks the beginning of a new tradition at Bangor. For years to come this same ring with the appropriate class numerals inscribed will be the symbol of B. H. S. students.

Another milestone was passed during the senior year of the class of 1963. In October of 1962, school and city officials took part in the ground-breaking ceremony for the new high school. The building to be completed in April of 1964 and the official ring selected by the class will give Bangor High a new countenance; the undaunted spirit the school has had throughout its long history will receive added impetus.

The 1963 Oracle utilizes the various parts of the ring's crest to symbolize the different roles of the student in school and in the community. The masque of comedy and tragedy symbolizes the varied extra-curricular activities offered to all students. The winged foot symbolizes the athletics in which Bangor has a tradition of victory, while the open book and pen stand for academic accomplishments—the basic purpose of Bangor High School. Finally the Ram is a symbol of the spirit and enthusiasm shown by the entire student body.

B. H. S. Achievements Mirror Long and Proud History

Bangor High School has a long and proud history of traditions starting in 1835 when the first free Bangor High School was established. The first R.O.T.C. in the country was started in 1862 at Bangor and continues to this day, bringing the school new honors every year. The Oracle was first published in 1892 and has been published consecutively each year since. The present high school was built in 1913 after the Bangor fire of 1911, and it is expected that it will be replaced in 1964 by a new building.

Throughout the years B.H.S. students have achieved high honors in drama, sports, public speaking, publications, and in nearly all aspects of school life. Each year several Bangor scholars attain honors in the National Merit Scholarship Examinations, and a large percentage of students go on to higher education in schools and colleges nation wide.

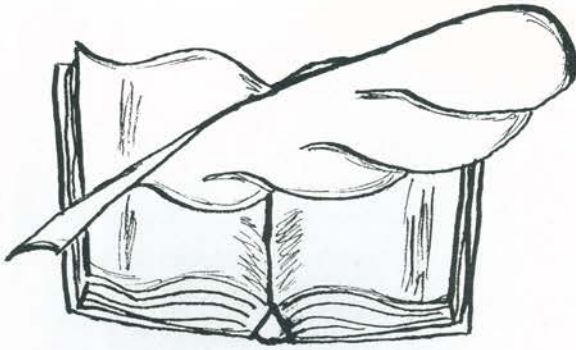

Administration Maintains Smooth-Running School

The Administration attempts to maintain a smooth-running school for the teachers and students of Bangor High. The largest task now facing the Administration is that of setting up the curriculum for Bangor's forthcoming new school. This new curriculum is designed to vitalize the material now being taught in Bangor High, to include new courses, and to provide courses suitable to both college-bound and terminal students. Many extra-curricular activities are also being planned, to make use of the increased facilities.

In the new high school, a much more extensive program of activities will be offered. In addition to more classroom space, the new school will have increased facilities for the physical education program, for assemblies, and for the school library. Courses are also being planned to give students a more complete background in the fine arts, such as music, painting, and sculpture.

It is a difficult task to maintain a well-run school, and doubly so to plan a curriculum for a new school at the same time. The Administration faces a demanding but rewarding task in planning ahead for the new school.

Guidance Helps Students Reach Goals

The basic philosophy of the Guidance Department rests on service to individual students. The department helps students in many ways through individual appointments, group counseling, and information on finding a suitable college or vocation. Although the Guidance Department uses various instruments and equipment to carry out its program, personal counseling is usually the most valuable to the student.

The Cumulative Records, made up of test results, grades, teacher evaluations, and the entire educational history of each student, are kept in the Guidance Office. These are useful in helping a student decide whether he is suited for a certain job, training and/or education. Information concerning colleges or vocations may also be obtained through the Guidance Office. Students at various times during the year have an opportunity to listen to career tapes and make appointments with college or career representatives who call at the school annually.

The Guidance Department seeks to help and counsel students in a nonjudgmental atmosphere. Its ideal is to have each student recognize his own capabilities and reach his goal through self-understanding.



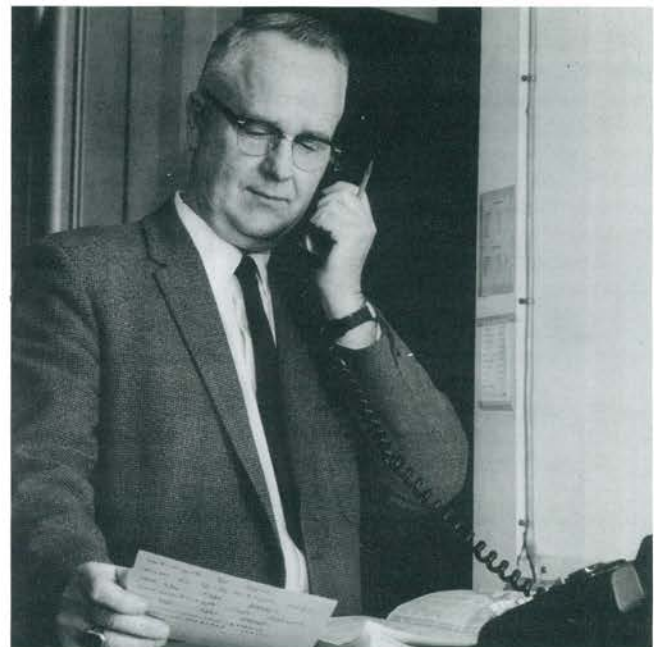

Mr. Halkett Joins School Board

The School Board, consisting of Dr. Edward C. Porter, Chairman; Milford F. Cohen, Grace A. Overlock, and Dr. Richard A. Gaillard, welcomes new member James Halkett, who succeeds Charles F. Bragg II. Mr. Halkett is the District Manager of the New England Life Insurance Company and the Chairman of the Planning Board for the city of Bangor. The members are also responsible for the instructional program, for the employment of personnel, and for the erection, maintenance, and operation of all school property. The school board members are currently making plans to renovate Bangor High as a junior high when the new school is finished.

Mr. McIntosh Chairs Curriculum Committee

The Curriculum Director for the Bangor school system, Mr. Alvah McIntosh, has a wide assortment of responsibilities. He is chairman of the Curriculum Committee, which has three new programs planned for the coming years. The first is an extension of the oral French program for the eighth grades; the second, a pilot study for academically talented pupils; and the third program, a more comprehensive high school program of studies.

Mr. McIntosh interviews all teachers employed in the school system, and hires substitute teachers. Besides recommending curriculum changes, Mr. McIntosh confers with department heads and supervisors in selecting instructional materials. In planning the budget, he and the superintendent provide for the purchase of educational equipment for the Bangor school system.

New Post Created

Mr. Roger Miles, Physical Education teacher in the afternoon session for the past three years, was named Director of Buildings and Grounds for the Bangor Public School Department. Superintendent Wendell Eaton announced his appointment to this newly created position in January, 1963.

A native of Old Town, Mr. Miles was graduated from Old Town High School and received his B.S. at the University of Maine. He taught Physical Education in Mattanawcook Academy, Lincoln, Maine, for two years before coming to Bangor.

Mr. Miles supervises the maintenance and smooth operation of the Bangor Schools. He also is responsible for hiring and supervising maintenance personnel.

English is the native language of millions of people all over the world. Because English serves as a bridge of communication for so many people, a strong English department is essential in any high school.

Each student studies English for four years of high school. The English department at Bangor High has an extensive program adapted to the needs of every student. The main objective of this program is to instill in the student a working knowledge of the English language and an appreciation of literature.

Much time is devoted to the study of English and American literature. Students read not only English classics, such as Shakespeare's plays and Chaucer's poetry, but also works of modern American and British poets. In addition to reading these authors' works, students also study their biographies, for the circumstances of an author's life are often reflected in his works. As a supplement, the literature of foreign lands is studied to give an insight into differences and similarities, and the effect of one kind of literature on another.

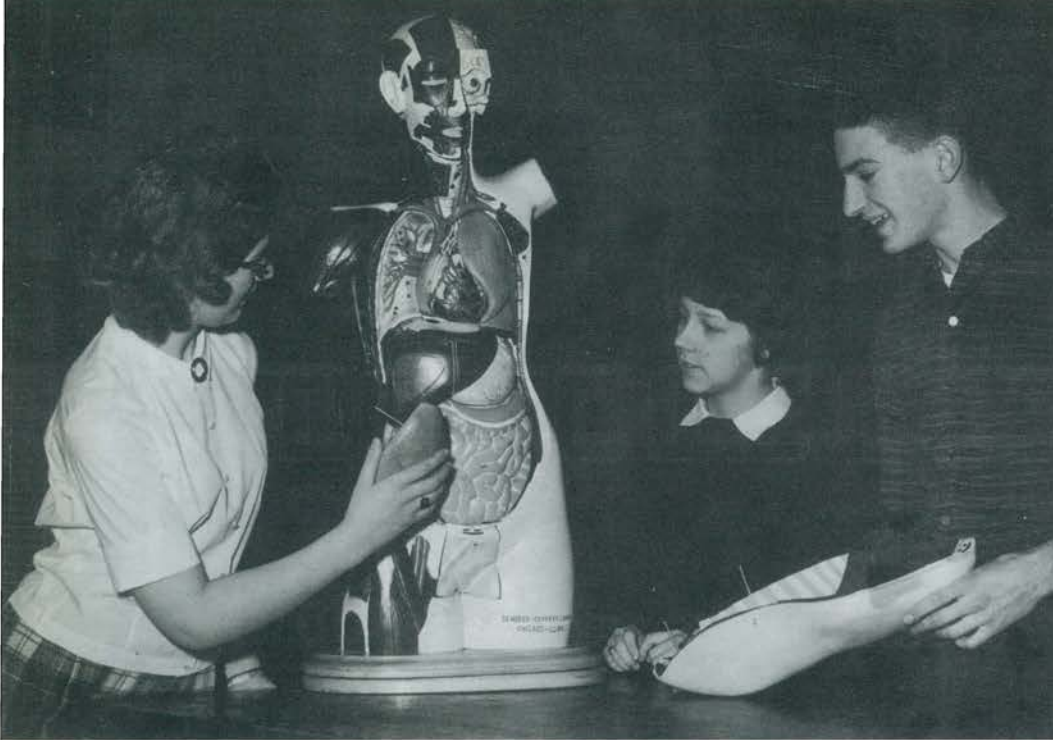

Speech and Music Enrich Fine Arts Program

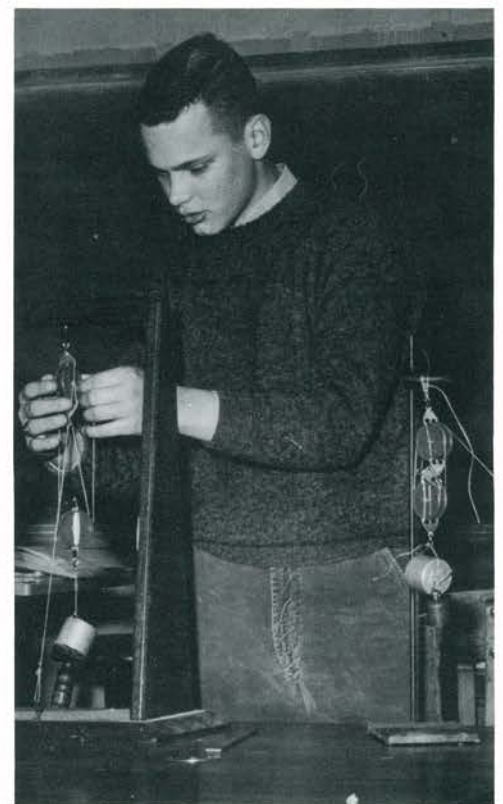

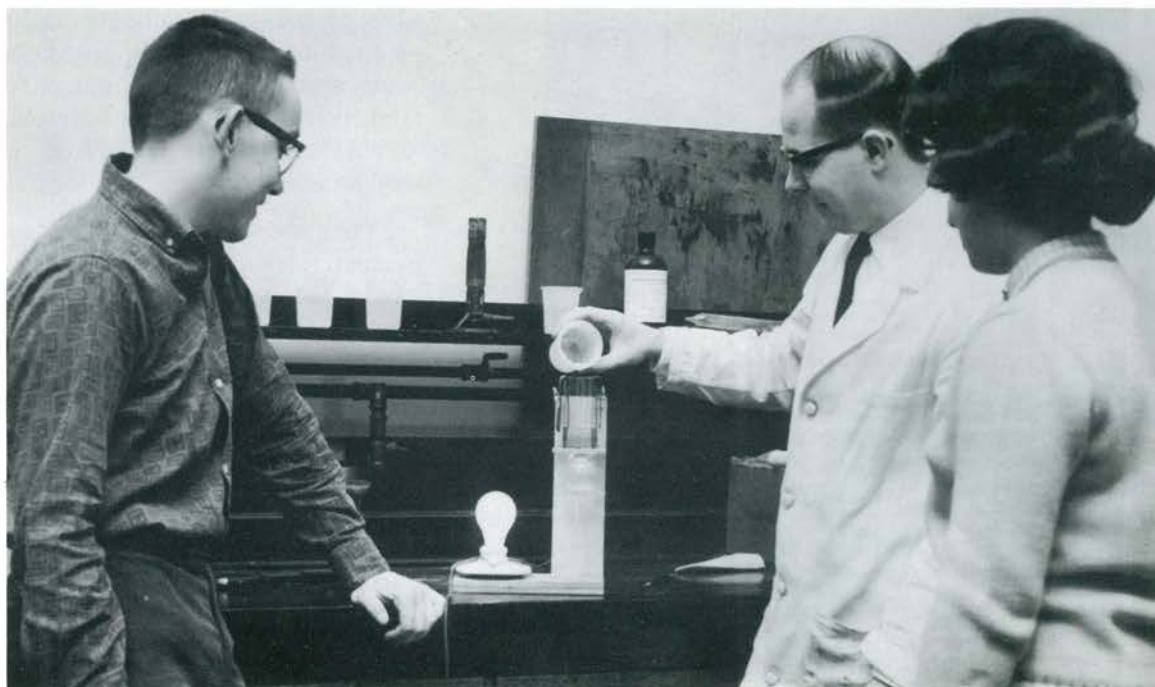

Foreign Languages Add Interest To Curricula

As the world gets smaller every year because of better communication and travel methods, knowledge of foreign languages is becoming very important today. Since countries are often only hours apart, foreign language teachers at Bangor High introduce into the curricula history and culture of the countries through grammar, vocabulary and literature of the language.

Every other year, many second and third year French students go to the French-speaking province of Quebec, where they can apply their knowledge of the language. In May of 1963, the trip was made with Mr. Efthim Economu, Mrs. Viola Woodard and Mrs. Rubena Pressey as chaperons.

Although far from any Spanish-speaking country, Spanish students begin conversing almost immediately in the first year. They gradually progress through simple grammar and vocabulary until they are able to read more difficult stories in Spanish literature.

Spanish and French students alike benefit from Bangor High's language laboratory. The students

may listen to tapes or to their own voices, and thus improve their comprehension and pronunciation.

An innovation in the Foreign Language department is the Temac German course. Offered to seniors, this course is self-teaching and consists of twelve tapes and ten books. The German student starts with simple vocabulary and grammar, and progresses to more difficult sentences. If there is sufficient demand, this course will be offered in the future.

Many students study Latin at Bangor High. During the first year, special attention is given to grammar and vocabulary. Second and third year students progress into the study of Caesar's campaigns and the works of Cicero and Virgil. Through the study of Latin, students gain a basis for the study of a foreign language and a finer appreciation of ancient civilizations and modern culture.

New Techniques Used In Math This Year

Important innovations have taken place in the B. H. S. mathematics department. Besides new additions to the teaching aids, there have been additions to the curriculum.

For the first time this year, students of Algebra I and calculus have used Temac, a self-teaching device published by the Encyclopedia Britannica that allows students to work at their own rate of speed. The practical approach to mathematics is the aim of the consumer math classes. Students learn such skills as buying houses, figuring income taxes, and making down payments.

The challenge of today's advancements has been met by the staff of the mathematics department. From calculus and advanced math to business and consumer math, the instructors have well prepared the students of B. H. S. for a future in a scientifically oriented world.

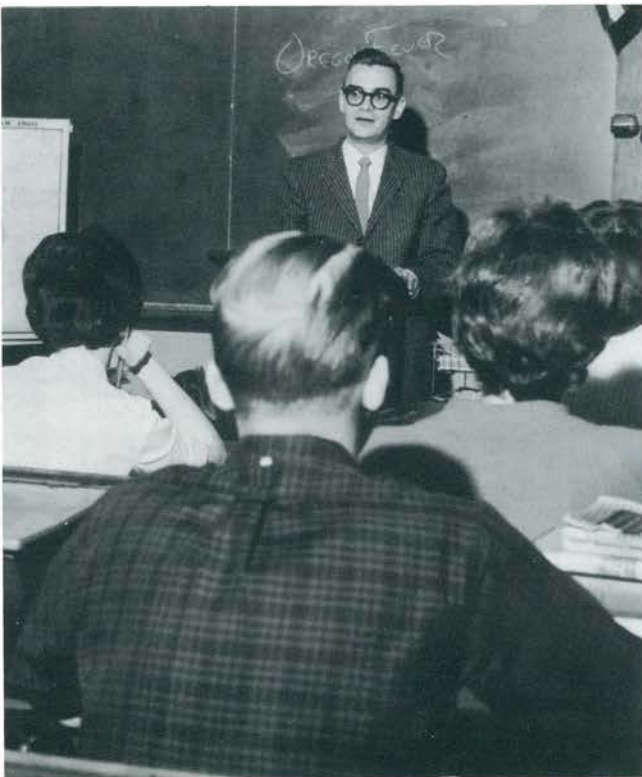

Social Studies Help Students To Explore

Leading the pathway for exploration in American History, Medieval and Modern History, Civics, and Government and Economics has been the occupation of the Social Studies department for the past year. Many hours were spent guiding B. H. S. students through the hallways of history.

In American History, for example, students who wished a deeper background in American History could apply for the Foundations of American Freedom course. This was a two hour course which proved to be very beneficial to the students in it.

Discussions, films, current-events, and library research papers have added many interesting supplements to all the social studies courses. Also, the addition of a new section of new history, social, and economic books in the school library has helped the students tremendously in their history assignments. No longer do students have to wait to get the newer history books from the public library; the books are now available in the school library.

Industrial Arts Program Develops Interests

The Industrial Arts Department of Bangor High School consists of four different sections—Mechanical Drawing, Wood Shop, Metal Shop, and Electric Shop. The program is intended to develop in each student an insight and understanding of industry and to help students gain an appreciation of good workmanship.

Mechanical Drawing, under the direction of Vincent Cuozzo, is provided for the beginning students. It is a study of the arrangement of diagrams according to drafting rules. Students receive training in lettering and in the correct use of drafting instruments. The making of blueprints is also included in this course.

Metal working, under the direction of Gerald Covert, is designed to give the student a basic understanding of machine tool operations and procedures. Films, lectures, and projects are used as various methods of instruction.

Woodworking, headed by Charles Landerkin, offers students an opportunity to use common hand tools and to operate some basic woodworking machines. Each student also learns about various woods used in the trade. Safety in the use of all shop tools and equipment is stressed.

The Electrical Shop, which was added to the Industrial Arts Program in 1959, is headed by Merle Lounsbury. This department provides students with a wide background in electricity and various electrical circuits. Students study basic electrical components, their constructions, and uses.

When a student enters the Industrial Arts Program as a freshman, he enrolls in a different shop each quarter. In his sophomore year, he takes a semester in each of two shops, and in his junior year enrolls in the other two shops. When he reaches his senior year, he may specialize a full year in any one shop.

Students taking the Business course at Bangor High may take courses in two different areas. They may elect the secretarial course, which promotes shorthand and transcription, or they may elect the clerical course, which stresses salesmanship and management. Both these areas include typing, general office practice, bookkeeping, filing, and the operation of business machines.

Proper etiquette on the job is often considered as important as accuracy in the work. For this reason, students gain practical "on the job" experience at several business establishments in Bangor. In this system, students not only learn the mechanics of the work, but also gain experience in public relations, which are important in holding any position.

B. H. S. Initiates Reading Program

"A developmental reading program is one in which there is systematic instruction in the curriculum of reading skills. The reading instructor at the secondary level recognizes the teaching of reading skills as a continuation of the reading skills taught in the elementary grades. At the secondary level, the skills are presented, refined, and intensified in a planned program of sequential instruction to meet the needs of the students," Mrs. Charlotte L. Haskell, Reading Supervisor at Bangor High, affirms.

In September, the Nelson-Denny Reading Test was administered to 330 juniors; as a result of this test, about sixty students were selected to take a new reading course for the first semester, and sixty more were chosen for the second semester. The Reading Department is well equipped with multi-level materials, such as the *S. R. A. Laboratories*, the *Literature Sampler*, *Tactics in Reading*, and *Book Series*. Students also make use of the Reading Accelerator, a machine which helps to speed up a student's rate of reading and increase his comprehension. Each student works at his own rate of comprehension. Students learn that different materials should be read at different rates—for example, skimming a magazine article is much faster than reading for a history test.

The reading course is purely voluntary, and students give up two study halls per week to participate in it. No homework is assigned, and no credit is given. Those included in the reading classes are from all tracks; however, the majority are college-bound students who wish to improve their study habits, reading comprehension, vocabulary, and speed.

Distributive Ed. Trains For Business World

The Distributive Education Department of Bangor High prepares students for the selling of goods and service in retailing, wholesaling, and service organizations.

In order to enter this program, a student must be at least sixteen years of age. Each student under this program receives classroom training for four class periods in the morning and in the afternoon has a part-time job at an approved place of business in the city. Both the employer and the school coordinator supervise the student while he is on the job.

Special Class Prepares For Future

Except for boys' gym and health classes, students in the Special Education Class have only one teacher—Mr. Bradbury—for all their subjects. Next year, it is hoped that girls in the Special Education classes will enter the school's home economics classes.

Students in the Special Education Class take only academic subjects for their first year. The main goal of these courses is to prepare them for later life. For example, English is concerned with basic reading, and Social Studies teaches the student to get along with others. During their second and third year, students spend half of their school day learning academic subjects and the other half gaining experience on a job. In their fourth year of high school, students spend all their time on a job supervised by Mr. Bradbury. The object of the entire Special Education Class is to make its students contributing, working citizens of their community.

Library Serves Students

Bangor High school has an extensive library containing approximately 3,500 volumes. There a student may borrow books for a research paper, for an English book report, or for unassigned pleasure reading. 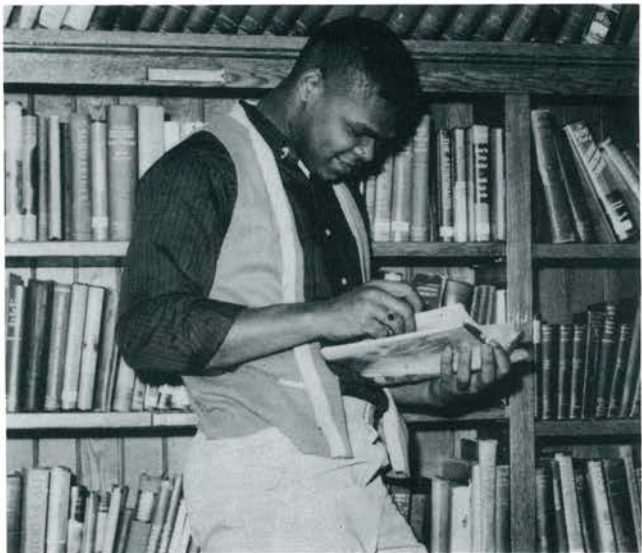

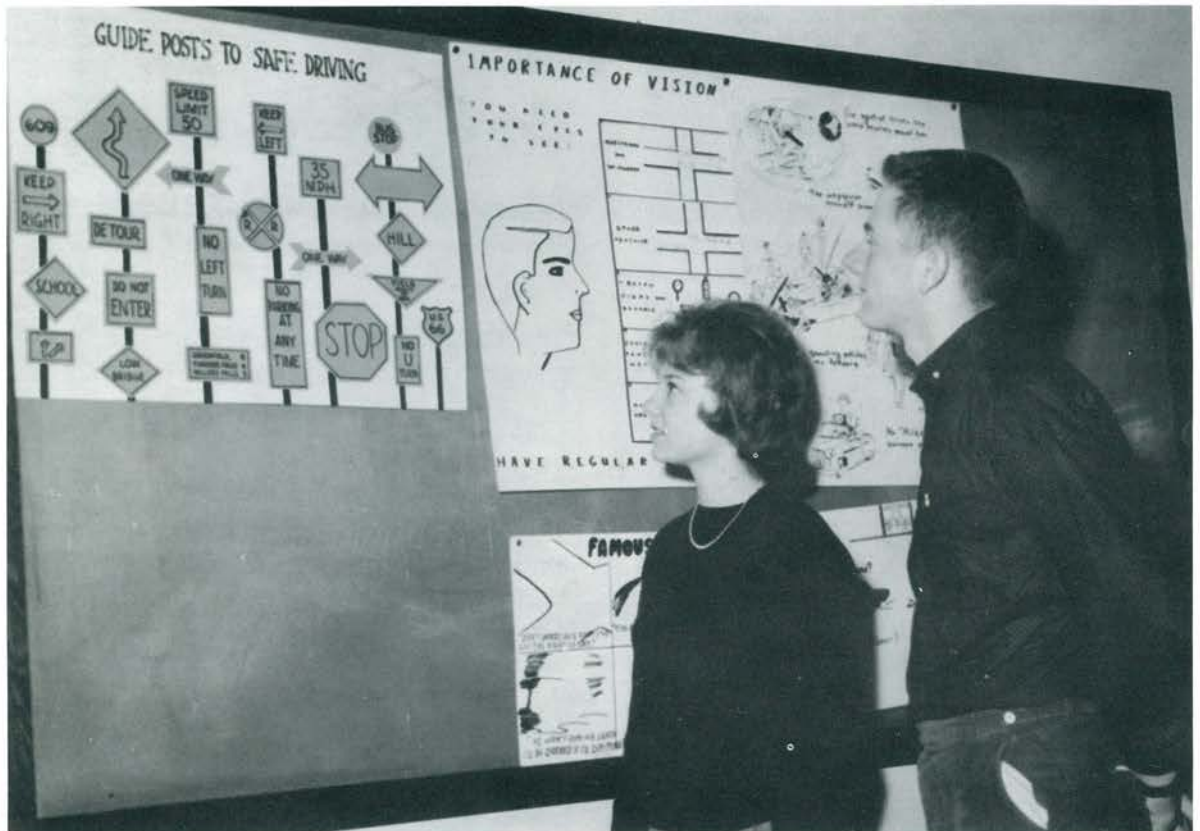

During the first session of the current Congress, a bill was introduced suggesting that the Junior R. O. T. C. Program throughout the country should be abolished. Because Bangor High was the first school in the United States to have such a program, its students were especially interested in the bill. The Orascope staff conducted a poll to let the students express their opinions. The girls and boys from every class were in favor of keeping the program. A group of Junior Cadets wrote letters to the 254 other high school units in the country, requesting them to write their Congressmen to help save R. O. T. C. Their efforts helped persuade the Congressmen to retain Junior R. O. T. C.

This decision relieved those interested in the R. O. T. C. Department at B.H.S. Boys enrolled in the department are not the only students involved, for many social events, clubs, and sports are related to the department. The Military Ball, attended and enjoyed by many non-R. O. T. C. students, would not have been possible without the Junior R. O. T. C. Department. Extra-curricular activities, such as the girls' and boys' rifle teams, the Stetsons and the Stetsonettes, and the N.C.O. and the Officers' Clubs, are also dependent on the department. Bangor High School would have lost a great many of these activities if Congress had decided to abolish all high school R.O.T.C. units.

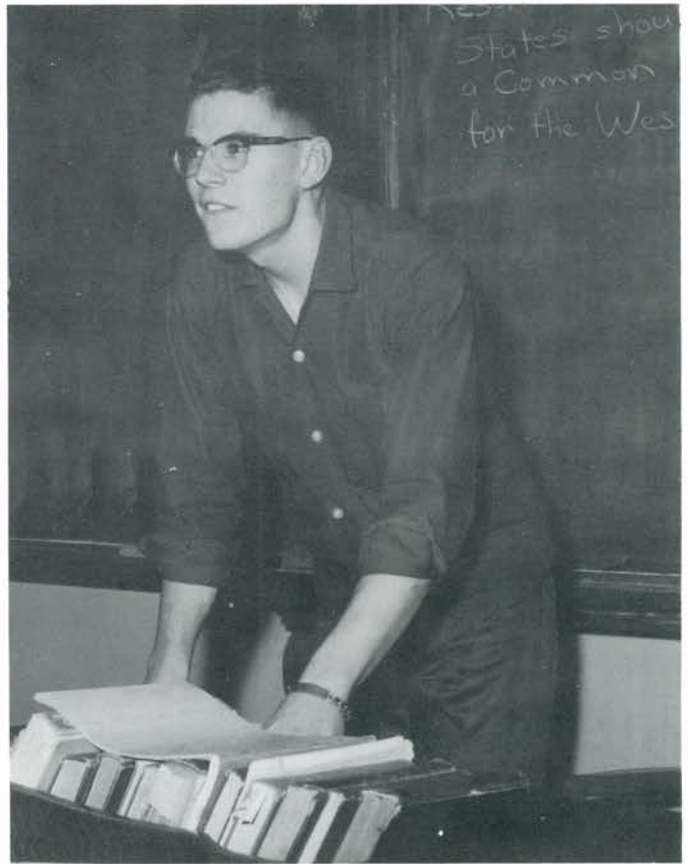

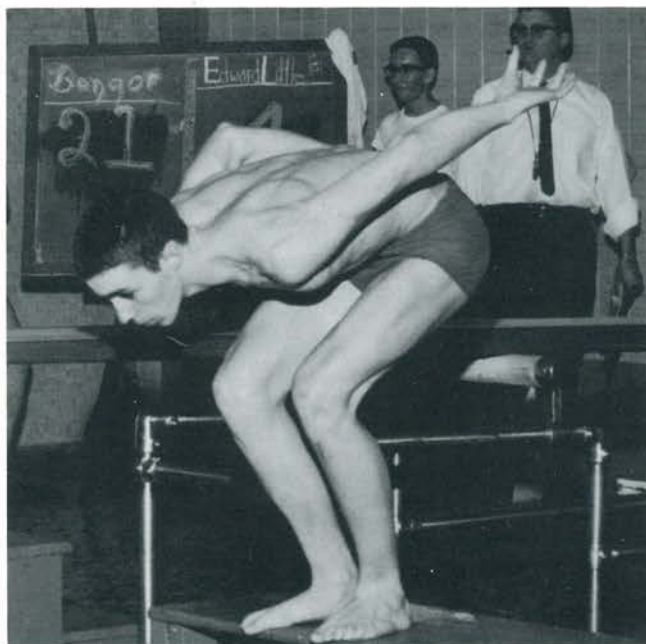
Swim Team Takes Second In State

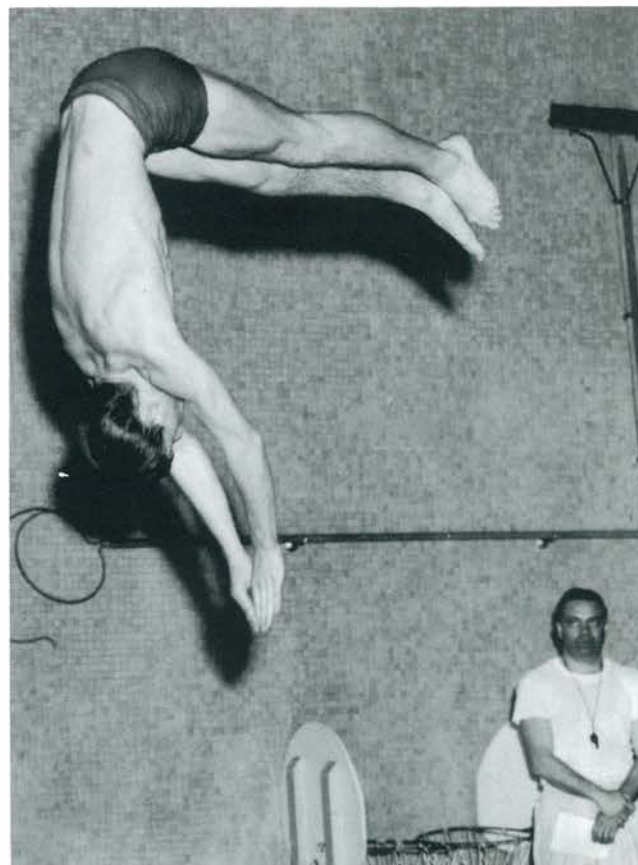

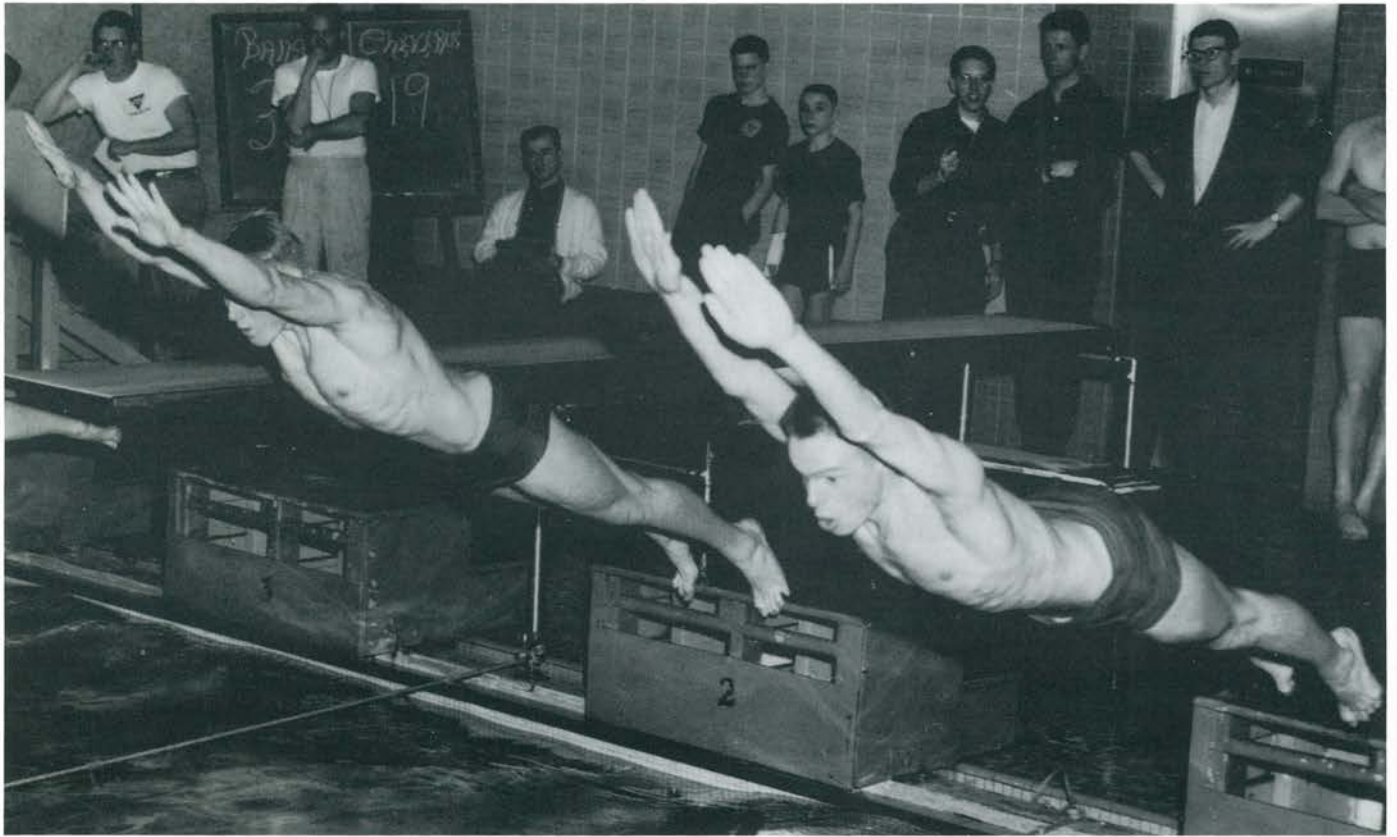

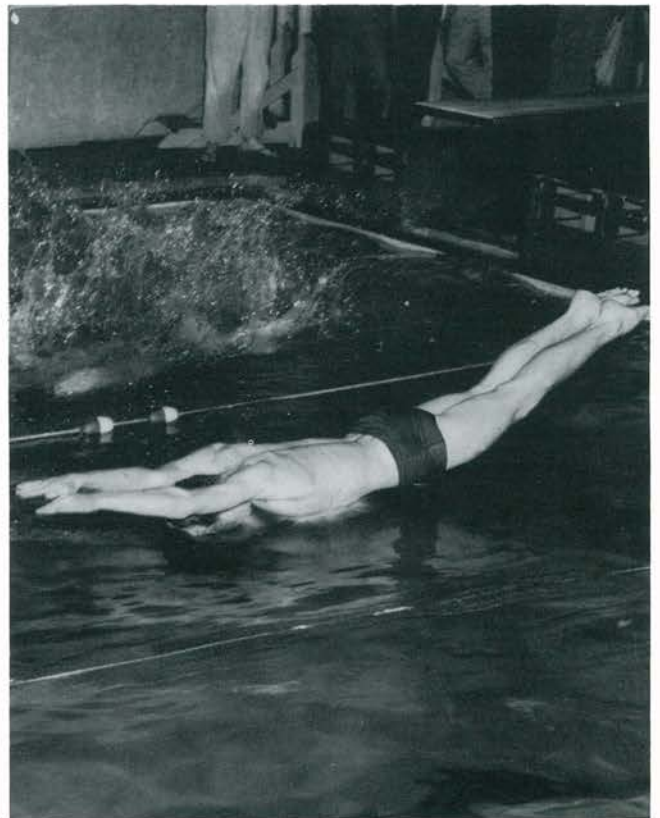

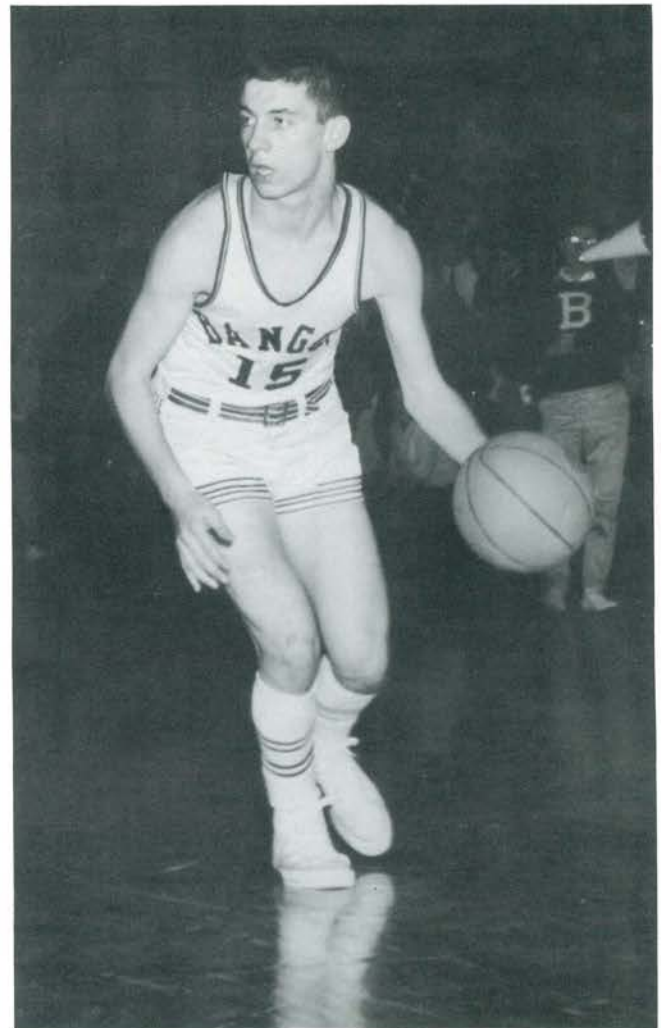

Loyal fans and good sportmanship helped make for interesting and well attended games all season.

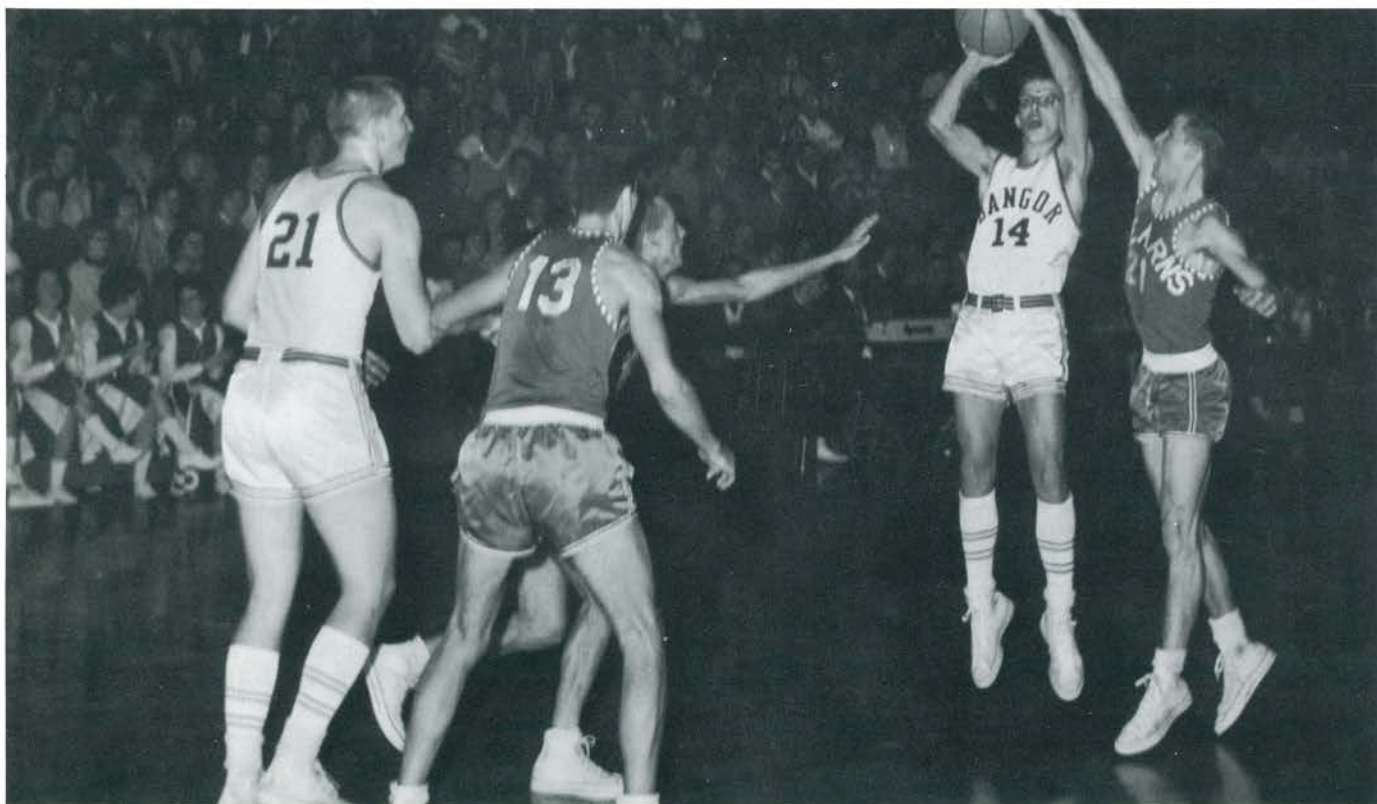

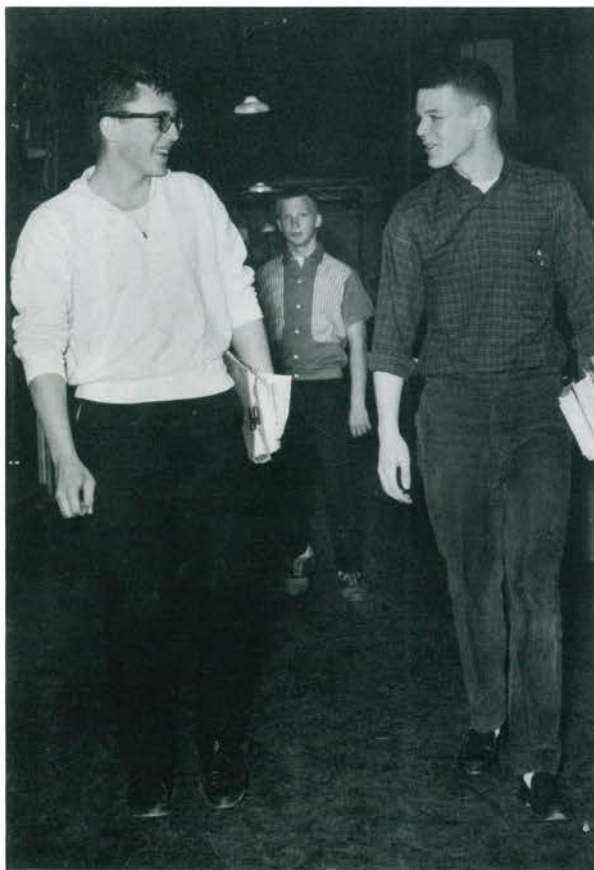

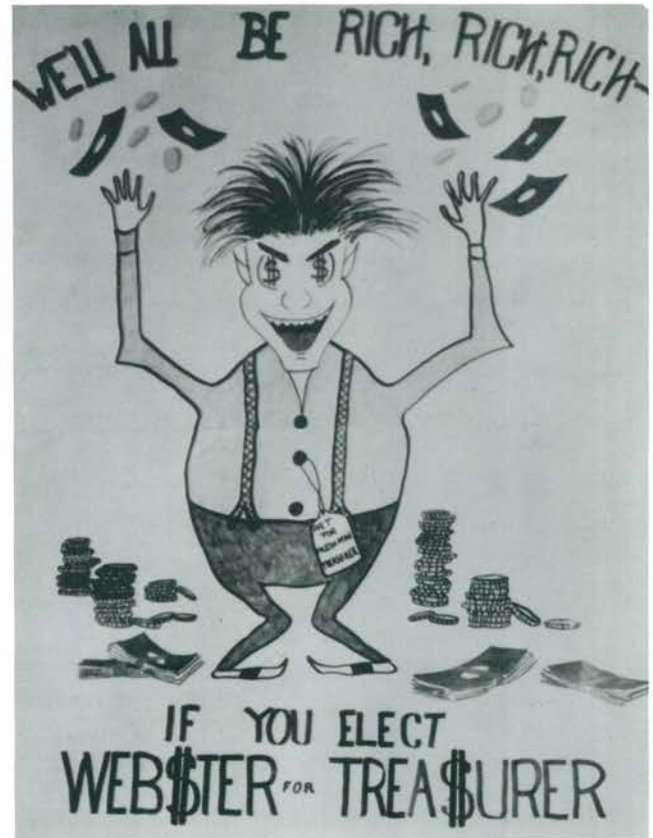
Freshmen Move In
