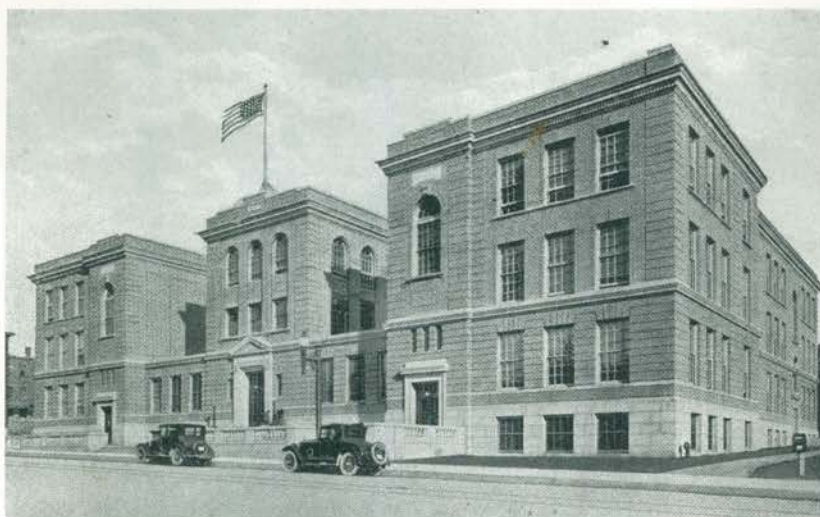

ORACLE Reflects Seventy-Five Years Of Progress

1967 marks the 75th anniversary of the **Oracle**. The first issue was published in 1892, and ever since that time students have read and enjoyed the **Oracle**. Times have changed, but two factors have remained constant—Bangor High School and the **Oracle**.

When the **Oracle** was first published, the high school was in Abbott Square across from the present Bangor Public Library. The yearbook was then a magazine which came out monthly and had a June issue devoted to the Senior class. It was more literary than social, and it cost forty cents for one year's subscription. The last edition of the 1892-1893 **Oracle** announced a graduating class of forty-two students.

As the student body of the high school grew, the **Oracle** played an increasingly important role. This publication served as a link between teachers and students, for it was something that everyone had in common. Then came the fire of 1911, and the high school in Abbott Square burned. Spirits were dampened, but only temporarily.

In 1913 the "new" Bangor High School opened on Harlow Street, and with it came new school spirit. The first issue of the **Oracle** at the new school praised its better facilities and the co-operation of the students in sports, debating, Student Council, and the **Oracle** Board. The graduating class numbered 119 at the end of this first glorious year in the beautiful school! The best addition to the new **Oracle** was pictures. It was the first time photographs could be afforded; the pictures were well received.

By the late 1930's the seniors numbered almost 300. The **Oracle** began to turn into the yearbook which is similar to the present-day book, with smaller installments throughout the year, which were much like the **Orascope**, the present newspaper. Photographs were more abundant, including a separate picture of each member of the graduating class. The student population was still increasing; Bangor High School started to get crowded, and split sessions became imperative. Finally in 1964, the students and faculty made another move—this time to the present Bangor High School on Outer Broadway.

This school is modern and beautiful, the faculty of 82 is one to be proud of, the senior class numbers 368, ideas are new and good, and the **Oracle** is more truly representative of the academic program, student activities, the military, sports, underclassmen and seniors.

B. H. S. Seniors Reflect on Past Three Years

The class of 1967 has the privilege of being the first group to complete three years at the new Bangor High School on Outer Broadway. The Seniors have been fortunate, for they have been able to see precedents formed as well as traditions upheld.

The 1964-65 school year started with an impressive dedication ceremony of the new ultra-modern B.H.S. This event set the scene for many innovations; such as free study halls, chit-chat sessions with the administration, "dress-down" day, and winter carnivals. Many new courses of study were offered because of the increase in the number of teachers, in the size of the building, and in the available audio-visual aids. The faculty suites and the make-up periods provided for close student-teacher relationships.

The second year at B.H.S. held many rewards for the progress made. In the fall of the year, the sculpture,

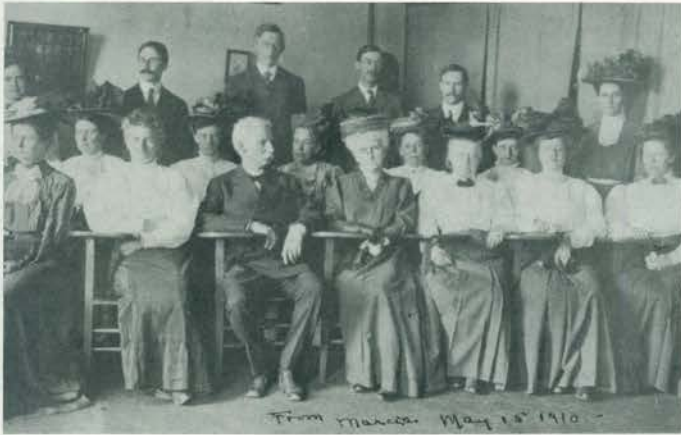

Bangor High School, its students, its administration, and its faculty have joined in this search. B.H.S. was well rewarded in this endeavor by receiving the Pacemaker Award which was presented to the school by the National Education Association for leading the way to better education. In the spring of the year, B. H. S. was visited by an evaluating committee, who judged the facilities to qualify the school for accreditation. Accreditation, which Bangor High has held since 1931 from the New England Committee, is a proof of excellence in all fields.

To the graduating seniors, the new building was strange at first, but has now become "their" school. The innovations have become traditions, and the seniors have watched this happen.

That responsibility was realized by Mr. Dana M. Simmons, principal of Bangor High School, as he con-

Alvah McIntosh, Assistant Superintendent of the Bangor School System, certainly carries a tremendous load upon his shoulders—the responsibility of the entire curriculum in the Bangor schools. With the help of the Curriculum Committee, Mr. McIntosh enlarged and rearranged the curriculum of study in the Bangor School System and a new program of studies for 1968 was devised.

This year, 1967, the Assistant Superintendent also dealt in two other distinct areas. Several months of concentrated study were spent by Mr. McIntosh in his role of preparing the school department's budget. The other project that demanded much attention from the Assistant Superintendent was the creation of the many new federal programs which enabled Bangor to expand its educational facilities. Through this project Mr. McIntosh introduced "teacher aides" to Bangor High School.

School Board Achieves Outstanding Progress In Education

The City of Bangor has been most fortunate to have a diligent school committee supervising its educational activities. The committee has shown this by its outstanding accomplishments in the Bangor public school system. The School Board and the city administration have achieved a remarkable state of cooperation. The progress for the advancement of education in Bangor is the result of the work of the committee.

The School Board and local school officials have formulated educational policies which have guided the Bangor school system. The decisions of the School Board have been important because of their governing nature. The Board's zealous willingness to work with educators has resulted in the operational unity of all Bangor schools. Agreement by the committee to approve all

funds requested in the annual budget of over four million dollars demonstrates its unity.

Not only immediate problems, but also those of long-range importance confronted the School Board. One of these problems was the repercussions resulting from the deactivation of Dow Air Force Base. Indeed, that problem has been one of profound challenge and magnitude. The school system faced two major problems. It would be losing not only students but also revenue. An official resolution pertaining to the possible re-use of government-built schools located in Bangor was necessary. Although an issue of the future, the Dow Air Force Base issue has required the immediate consideration of the School Board. Its solution will extensively affect the public schools of Bangor.

Filling the place of Dr. Edward Porter was Dr. George Wood, who was appointed to the position on January 1, 1967. (Dr. Porter had resigned to accept membership on the Bangor City Council.) The other School Board members are Mrs. Charles Broutas, Milford Cohen, Dr. Richard Gaillard, and James Halkett. The citizens of Bangor can be proud of their School Board and its achievements.

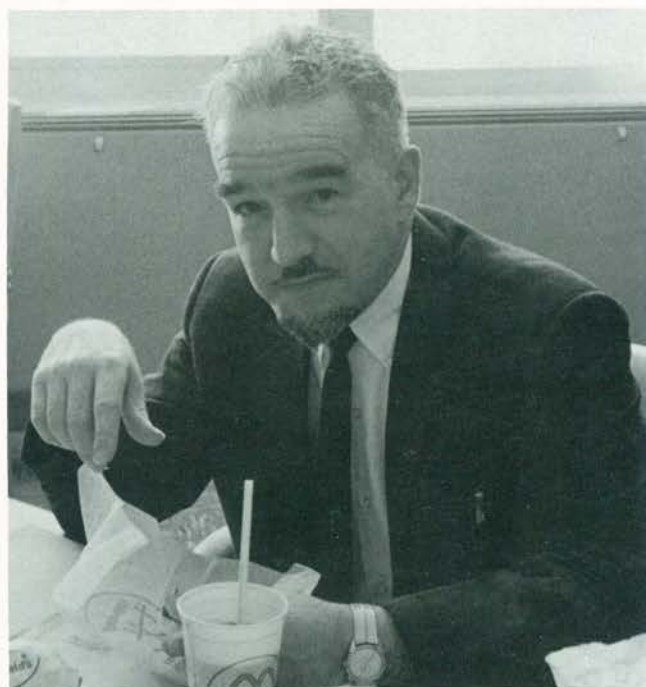
Guidance Department Aims For Self Understanding

Innovations Spark English Department

Members of the English department have been greatly encouraged by the solid commendations accorded their program by the State Accreditation Committee as the result of the three-day visitation held during May of 1966. At that time a comprehensive study of all aspects of English instruction at Bangor High School was conducted by two outstanding English teachers—Dr. John Hankins, head of the English department at the University of Maine, and James Vickery, senior English teacher at Brewer High School—and their official report constituted a complimentary endorsement of the quality of English instruction and the course content on all grade levels.

Since the visitation, there has been further expansion of the English program with the inclusion of a course in creative writing. This course is a senior elective subject offered on a semester basis for a half credit. Under Mrs. Rafalina Patterson's direction the students have had the pleasure of seeing many of their creative efforts appear in print, thanks to the cooperation of the Graphic Arts department; and the members of the class also produced for general distribution a literary magazine called **Rampages**, which was appreciatively received by students and faculty alike.

During the year temporary exchanges of English classes by various teachers became more common, with Mrs. Castillo, Mrs. Small, Mrs. Peakes, and Mrs. Trowbridge teaching special units to the several sophomore classes; and Mr. Woodcock and Mr. Abbott exchanging classes for special units in Russian literature and modern poetry.

Future developments of the English program will undoubtedly see many more such innovations and expansions that will help gear English instruction to the changing needs of BHS students and the society in which they will live.

Psychology Provides A Better Understanding Of Man

The survival of man depends on an understanding of the complexities of his own behavior. This is the purpose of the Psychology Department with Mrs. Helen Gillespie as the instructor. The students become acquainted with the necessary terms used in psychology, such as I. Q., personality, and maturity. They also study the causes of certain human behavior patterns.

The students are encouraged to do reports on different areas connected with psychology. Along with the reports, the students perform psychological experiments, have discussion groups, and put on skits. The classes discuss topics that include dating, religion, adults, marriage, drinking, and other subjects of interest to the youth in today's society.

A background in anthropology, biology, and sociology is also provided by the course. It is hoped that the students may better understand man, his heredity, and his environment after studying psychology.

Valuable Reading Skills Are Stressed

The Reading Department in Bangor has continued with the teaching of the vitally important reading skills, under the direction of Mrs. Charlotte Haskell. Study skills, as well as correct habits for pleasure reading, have been stressed in the program this year. This program, with Mrs. Haskell as head, is offered in grades 7 through 12 through the Bangor School system.

The classes have been conducted to suit the individual student with some emphasis being placed on his own problem area in reading. The students, working at their own speed, with the aid of modern equipment work to improve vocabulary, reading techniques, note taking, and study habits. Periodic testing has shown an improvement in the reading students' work.

The B.H.S. band, under the direction of Aime

Simoneau, performed many times during the football and basketball seasons but did not stop there. This year was the first for the band to take part in the annual Mid-Season concert, held in December. In addition, the group traveled to Mexico, Maine, in April for an exchange concert. Mexico's students were welcomed here on the twenty-ninth of the same month, joining with the BHS band in a performance.

Students also showed their interest in music by participating in the All-State Music Festival. A group of twenty-seven was chosen to represent Bangor High. Accepted were four from the band, seven from the choruses, and sixteen from the orchestra.

Although there was no Music Theory this year, a special Choral Lab class was taught by Miss Kathleen Hewes, in addition to several half-period classes for members of the mixed chorus.

With the program at BHS, interested students have ample opportunity to explore the fascinating world of studying and creating music.

Fine Arts Provide Freedom To Create

By forming an atmosphere of the spirit rather than of formal discipline, the Speech-Drama Department encourages its students to become involved in the communicative speech arts. Certainly the aim and purpose of the department have been realized this year, for many students have wholeheartedly involved themselves in varied and exciting projects.

As a class endeavor, the Oral Interpretation students worked out a program for the educational television health series. Each student took part in writing and acting in the dramatization called "The Inside Story on Your Health and You." Special reports came from the Muscle, the Throat, the Lung, the Tooth, the Brain—and the Baby Factory!

The Dramatic Arts class, under student directors, produced lively scenes from the following: **Only an Orphan Girl, Guys and Dolls, Harvey, and Teahouse of the August Moon.**

Students in the Foundations of Speech classes did not sit idly by but rather gave spirited talks on such sophisticated subjects as: "Life in a Mexican Labor Camp," "Hunting Wild Boar in Southern Turkey," and "Temple Rubbing in Thailand."

Several Bangor High School students participated in competitive activities with very favorable results. In the Spear Speaking Contest, Monica Harris took first place with David Emery in second place. Bangor High won eight out of a possible nine medals in the Maine Speech Festival. Those receiving superior rating were Tracy Bronson, David Emery, James Emery, Judith Files, Dianne Johnson, Bruce Verrill, and Horace Priest, who won two medals in the event. Ilene Wittner received an excellent rating.

The Fine Arts Survey class continued to be one of the biggest successes in the school curriculum. Instructors Mrs. Lesa Comeau, Mr. Aime Simoneau, and Mr. J. Palmer Libby were on hand to act as guides only, while most of the teaching was done by the students themselves. Lectures, demonstrations, discussions—all were employed by the students. The course studied the Modern period first, then regressed in time, giving all who participated in it a broad understanding of life through the ages.

The Art Department also encouraged its students to participate actively, believing that practical application is the best method for learning. Students in Art classes worked individually at their own projects with guidance always available when needed. The Art Club continued its interesting work with an eye towards service to the school. Students designed signs for all departments, viewed slides of Renaissance painting, did character drawings, watched a paper mache jewelry demonstration, and contributed a booth for All-Bangor Night.

Foreign Languages Form Stepping Stones To Understanding

Foreign languages are proving to be the stepping stones to world peace and understanding. The students at Bangor High School are fortunate to have offered to them, courses in Latin, French, Spanish, German, Russian, and Classical Civilization. German and Russian were taught for the first time this year, and were well accepted by the students. The former was taught by G. Craig Abbott, a member of the English department. The latter was taught by Robert Robles. These foreign language courses offer not only a grammatical background, but a knowledge of the country, geography, people, and culture.

Next year there will be several changes made in the Foreign Language Department. Russian and German will both be offered on a two year basis; Latin I and II will be offered only to the juniors and seniors.

The students became more involved in their courses by putting on skits, learning songs and dialogues in the modern language laboratory, and by making posters in observance of National Foreign Language Week. In March, the advanced third year French and Spanish students journeyed to the Colby College campus in Waterville to attend classes and to spend the day listening to speakers from the Colby faculty. The advanced French III class went to Waterville again in May to see a French play put on by a theatrical touring company. Also in May, all the French III and some French II students traveled to Quebec City, Canada, for a week-end. The purpose of this trip was to let the students experience the actual situation of living with the French people.

With constant additions and expansions in the curriculum, the Foreign Language Department is keeping pace with the improved communication among the peoples of the world. Although Foreign Languages may help man to attain peace and understanding, it is only a means, not an end solution.

There were two new faculty additions to Foreign Language Department this year, Mr. Alvaro Diaz, a Spanish teacher from Moscow, Colombia, and Mrs. Lorraine Staples, a French teacher from Montreal, Quebec, Canada.

Progress Is Keynote Of Science Department

Bangor High School's Science Department has surpassed its previous achievements. Even more modern equipment and expanded curricula are available to the students. Many more pupils are taking advantage of the regular courses and of the recently orientated CBA Chemistry and BSCS and advanced Biology classes.

In the fall of 1966 the main trail was marked for the Prentiss Woods Nature Center. Last winter, Public Works, under City Forester Roland Perry, cleaned the main trail along with cutting and removing all hazardous trees in the woods area. This spring signs were erected denoting the area's plants and trees of interest and the beginning of the main trail. Biology students helped in the identification of the plants and trees. Long range plans include excavation of the pond below Grandview Extension and clearing of side trails.

With such advances as these, the Science Department strives to stimulate in every student a greater interest in himself and his surrounding environment. BHS students should be well-prepared to meet the advancing scientific world.

Today's Math Is More Effective For Today's Student

With the increasing importance of a solid mathematical background for college or job bound students, the Math Department of Bangor High has found it necessary to incorporate a different method of teaching in the various courses. Since its arrival in 1962, the "new math" has been proved more successful than the traditional math, based on College Board tests. Students exposed to learning under the new system scored higher than those with only the standard mathematics background. As a result, teachers and future college professors are now expecting more from today's math student.

Although the TEMAC self-teaching method is no longer part of the Algebra I course, it is used as a supplementary aid to calculus students who are under the direction of Gordon Smith. Students are urged to work on their own level in this advanced course, but this form of independence is stressed in all the classes.

Aside from the college-preparatory geometry, algebra, and advanced pre-college math, BHS also offers Math 2 and Math 3 to students who are not planning to enter college. Math 2 stresses areas, volumes, percents, geometric figures, and related subjects. Math 3 teaches the fundamentals of algebra, trigonometry, and geometry.

The Math Department understands the need for students to learn theories and concepts at their own rate. Therefore, learning proceeds at a comfortable speed, neither pushing nor restraining the student. To insure that he is placed in a class where he will work to his capabilities, yet not feel "over his head", a test is given after Algebra I and must be passed in order to go on with geometry. Only the student who is fairly competent in math is allowed to take advanced courses.

And as before, a math course at the University of Maine may be elected by a senior interested in pursuing mathematics on a higher level.

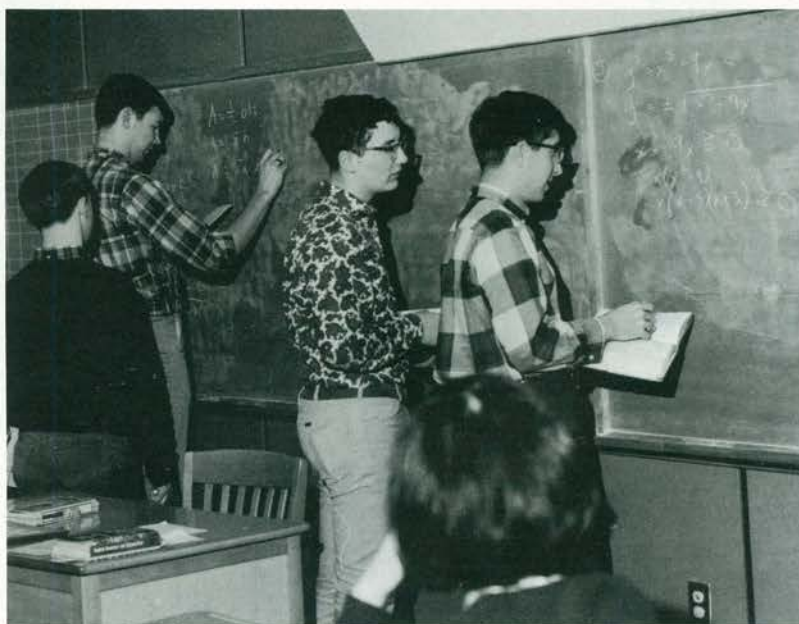

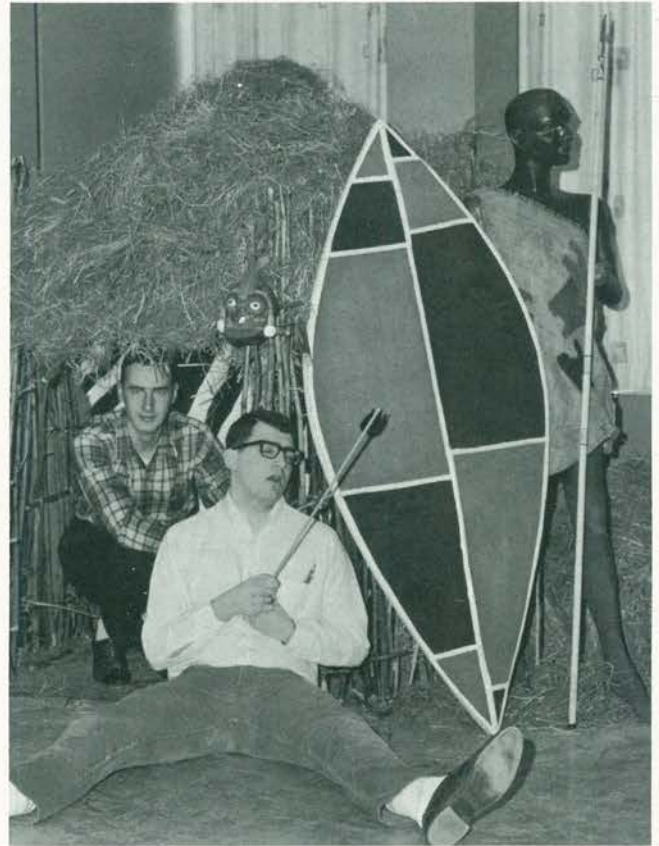
Team Teaching Finds Place In Social Studies

An outstanding feature of this year's Social Studies curriculum was a new approach to teaching. Through the combined talents of Robert Jones, James Quine, Thomas Robinson, and William Fleming, approximately one hundred students were better able to comprehend and to appreciate the history of our United States. A varied program was offered, consisting of both large and small group instruction. The larger class, which provided informative lectures and films, served as a base for the more intensified study of the smaller class and was often host to guest speakers. Among these were Dr. Robert York, who spoke on Maine history, and Mr. Howard Cousins of the B & A Railroad. This experiment in cooperative teaching is most worthwhile and will be continued, if possible, in succeeding years.

Joining the department this year was Thomas B. Robinson. A retired Air Force Major, he has studied at Stanford University and received his degree from the University of Maine.

This year has proved to be a highly successful one. Possessing capable teachers and a fine program of study, the Social Studies Department continues to enlighten and inform. The Bangor High School student becomes more aware and is able to relate his own learning experience to the surrounding world.

A three-year sequence which allows intensive study in each of these units is offered to those girls interested in majoring in Homemaking. Senior Special, a comprehensive survey course covering all areas is offered to those business and college bound senior girls who have had no previous formal training in Homemaking.

The curriculum is set up on a semester basis. The plan allows for more girls to take advantage of the program and allows more to specialize. Marriage and Family Life, a new course set up this year, is offered to both boys and girls and covers all aspects of marriage and family life. It is the aim of the Homemaking Department of Bangor High School to send out into the world well-rounded, future homemakers.

Industrial Arts Program Offers Students Valuable Training

Constructing useful or decorative articles requires a skill which the student in the Industrial Arts program develops through the use of machines and various hand tools. Always striving to develop skill in performance and a knowledge of the related principles and theories in many fields, the Industrial Arts Department at Bangor High School now offers to the student 25 courses. These courses are on a semester basis. This allows for more students to take advantage of this program. About 225 students take Industrial

Arts courses each year. The semester program also allows for the student to specialize in areas especially interesting to him.

Problem solving is not for Math students alone; it gives the Industrial Arts students a chance to employ the creative thinking and to apply the industrial techniques and mathematical computations needed for the complicated industry world of today. The knowledge of the safe use of tools and machines augments the mental maturity. Students gain these valuable technical skills through carefully planned activities.

Mechanical Drawing, or Drafting as it may be called, is offered on three levels. The students draft house plans, the construction of heavy machinery, and blueprints to gain experience and a basic knowledge of drafting. Mechanical Drawing covers the many areas of drafting, placing emphasis on the size, shape and description of inanimate objects.

Electricity is now offered on four levels: basic electricity, basic electronics, which includes transistors and

tubes, residential wiring, and small appliances. In all these courses, the basic concepts of electricity are taught to the student. This year, for one semester, the Special Class took advantage of this course. Students gain skill and valuable experience through repair work and electronic construction.

The Graphic Arts program has become indispensable to the school by its services performed for many school organizations. Students cover the basic fundamentals of printing and put these to use by printing programs, tickets, and books for school groups. Students learn the fundamentals of developing pictures in the dark room in the Graphic Arts Lab. Offset lithography is also offered to the students.

New equipment, techniques, and pleasant working conditions contribute to make Woodworking more interesting to the student. Good workmanship and appreciation of design are the aims of the Woodworking program.

Students develop an understanding of the metalworking industry, as well as safe work habits when using tools and materials. Metalworking offers to the students welding, forging, art and sheet metal, and foundry. The more advanced students explore fields such as electric and gas welding and strengthen their knowledge by applying the theoretical principles they have learned.

The Transportation course attempts to develop in each student a knowledge of the technical operations and skills in the power-transportation industries. This year a course in aerospace has been added to the Transportation program. Students make their own model rockets and this June an official blast-off was attempted.

Through these six shops, the student acquires skill and gains a knowledge of the industrial world of today.

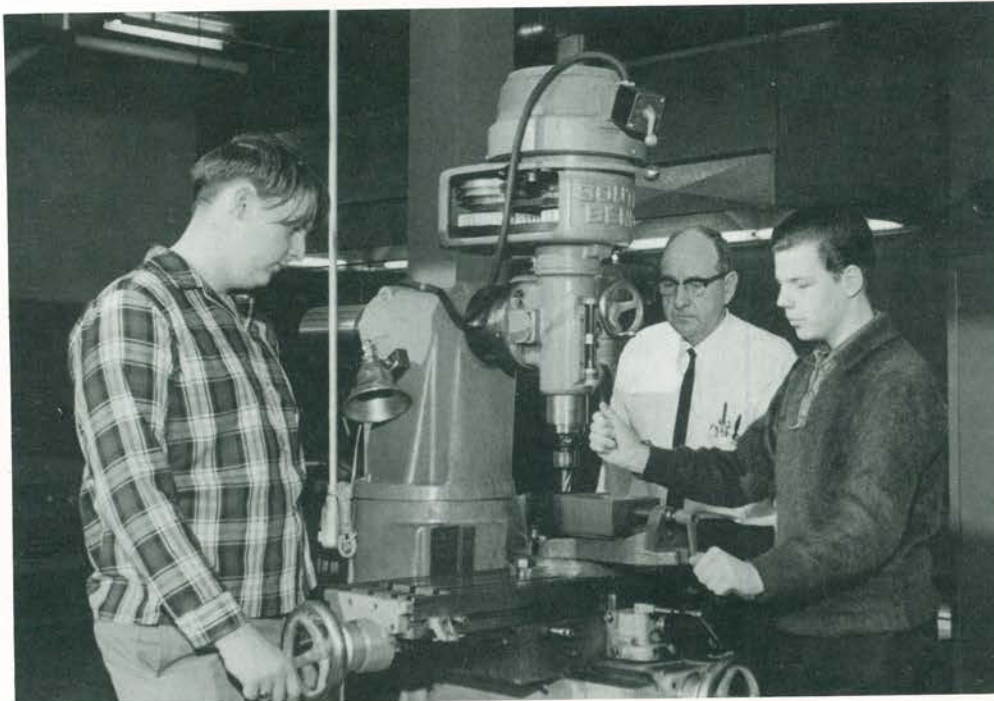




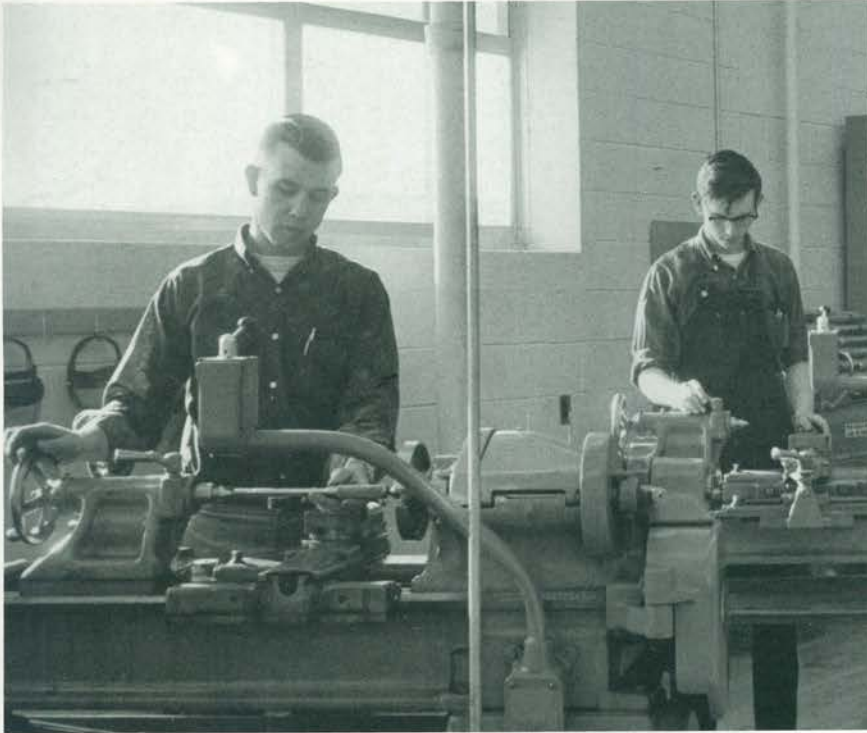

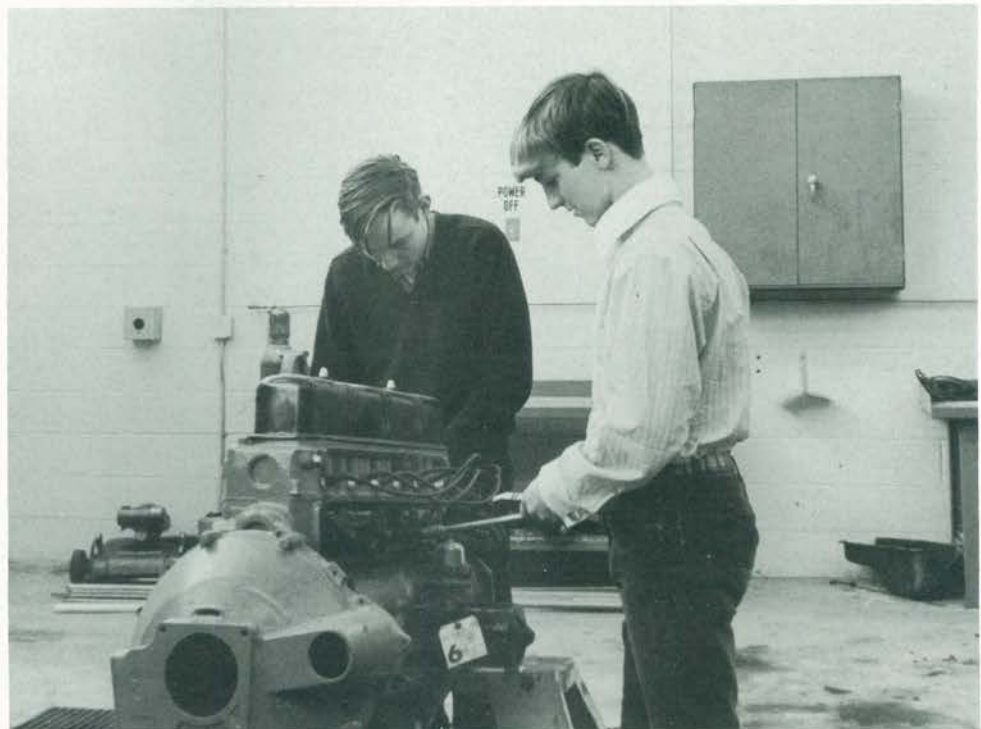

Students Mature Rapidly Through R. O. T. C. Training

December 1966 marked the 105th anniversary of military instruction for male students at Bangor High School. The objectives of the present-day R.O.T.C. program are to prepare the young citizen for possible future military service by the presentation of basic military science. The department intends to develop the traits of self-discipline and leadership in the cadet through practical exercises and drill training.

The curriculum is one prescribed by the Department of Army for more than 400 high schools in the nation that have an R.O.T.C. program. Courses of instruction include military customs and organization, weapons instruction, first aid, map reading, tactics, and methods of instruction.

With the offering of such a varied program, the interested cadet is given the opportunity to learn valuable information and to attain rank. He may exercise authority he never thought possible and gain maturity in a short length of time.

Students having a special interest in weapons firing may participate in the two .22 calibre rifle teams sponsored by the Instructor Group. Also sponsored as a part of the department's extra-curricular program are a girls' drill team and a cadet drill team for public and school demonstrations.

Practical Education Proves Just That

Recognized as being the most diversified program at Bangor High School, the Practical Arts Department is continuing to offer its students a selective course of studies. With teacher-aid Mrs. Bissell's help, the students in the PRA program learn through various methods, all contributing to their general mental attitude toward themselves, others, and the role they will eventually play in today's world.

Boys and girls in the PRA program are offered the widest possible range of studies, including Foods (offered to both boys and girls), Wood Shop, Power Mechanics, Graphic Arts, Sheet Metal, and Sewing. Adding to these courses the required English, Social Studies, and a special lab-oriented Biology class for Juniors, it is apparent that the Practical Arts student gains a well-rounded education.

The learning process does not end with the classroom, however. The students' individual problems are discussed as frequently as desired with the theory that, by capable guidance, each one may help himself toward understanding and dealing with his particular problem. Tape recorders are also utilized as a student aid device; and job orientation is taught twice weekly to Seniors.

In addition to being students, the boys and girls are employees, as well. Seniors end their classes after the second period and go directly to their jobs in the community, where they receive pay and credit toward graduation. All Juniors work in the school with pay and credit after the fourth period. Thus, learning is a two-fold experience.

This marks the first year for the Practical Arts Department to offer a complete course, including all three classes. The program has proved successful and has assisted its students in helping themselves to a rewarding future.

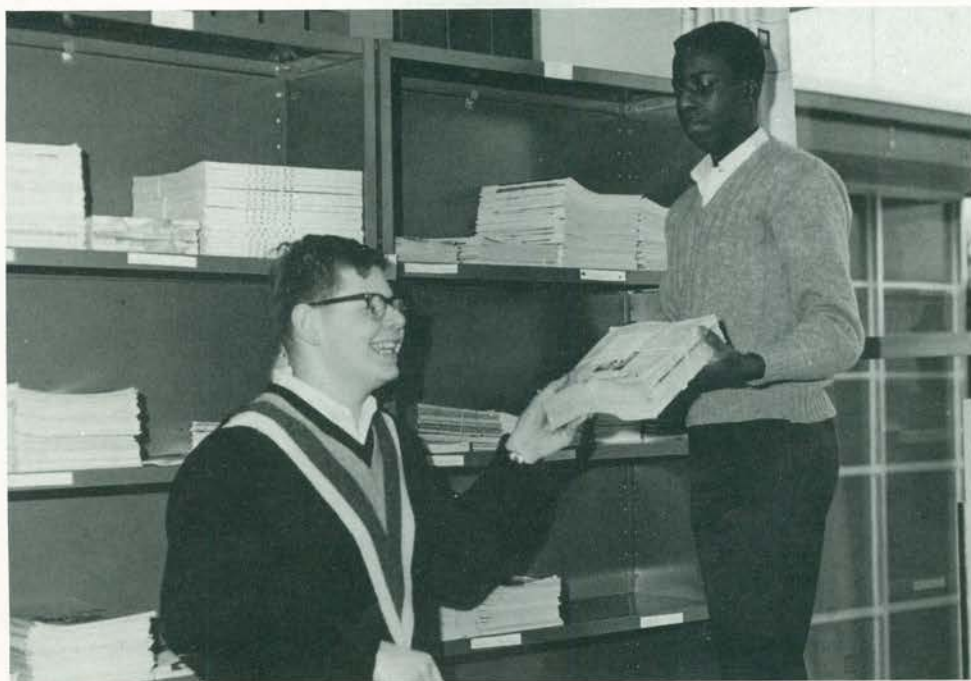

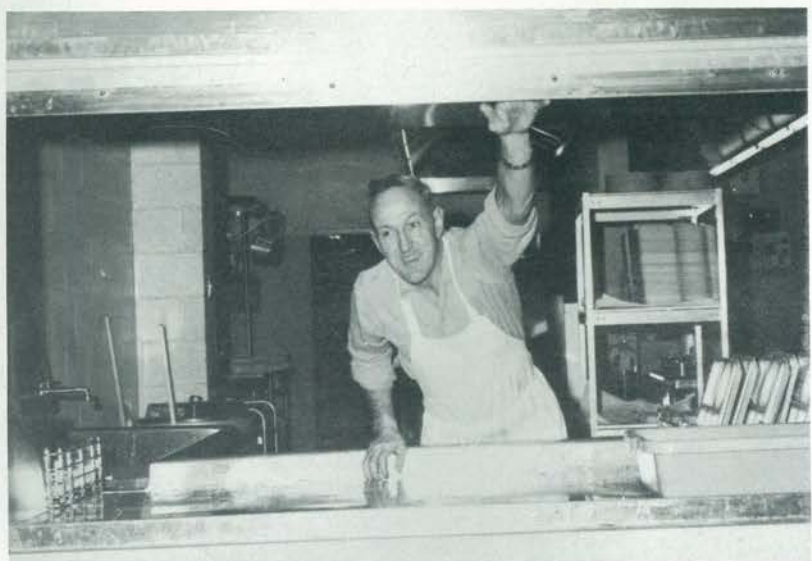

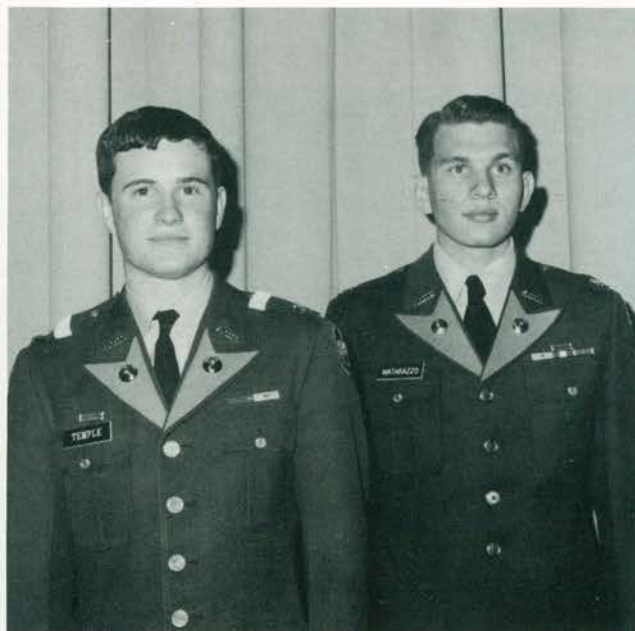
R. O. T. C. Stresses High Goals

The program, which emphasizes leadership training, offers the cadet a broad military education. He learns basic military procedures during his sophomore year, then applies this knowledge during his junior and senior years. The program of studies includes customs and ceremonies, weapons, first aid, method of instruction, military organization, map reading, and tactics. As the cadet progresses, he has the opportunity to gain responsibility by acquiring rank; extra-curricular activities offer further experience.

The combination of a competent teaching staff, enthusiastic and experienced cadet officers, and an interested cadet corps make the ROTC Program a source of pride to the cadet, the high school, and the community.

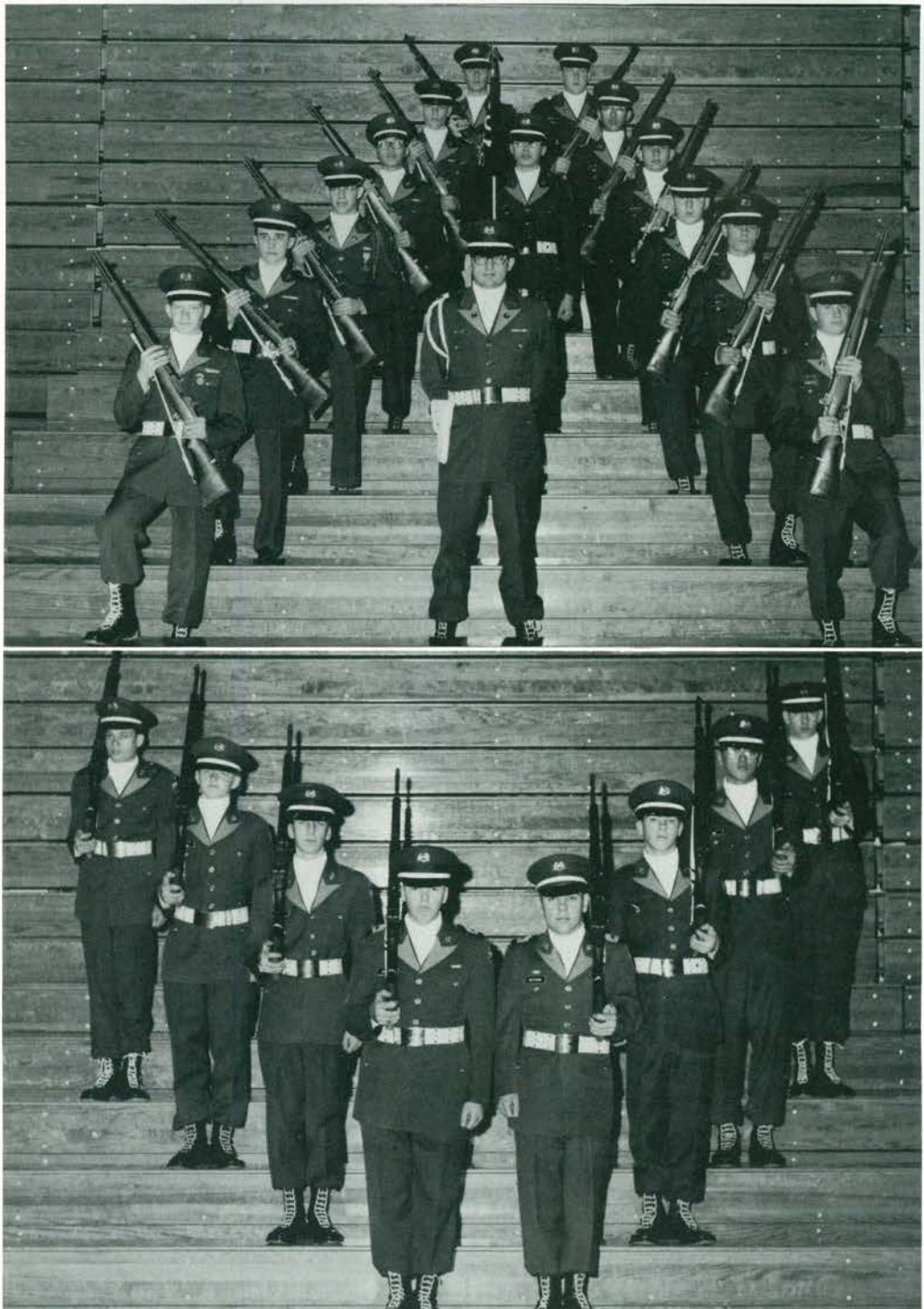
Stetson Rifles Finish Active Season

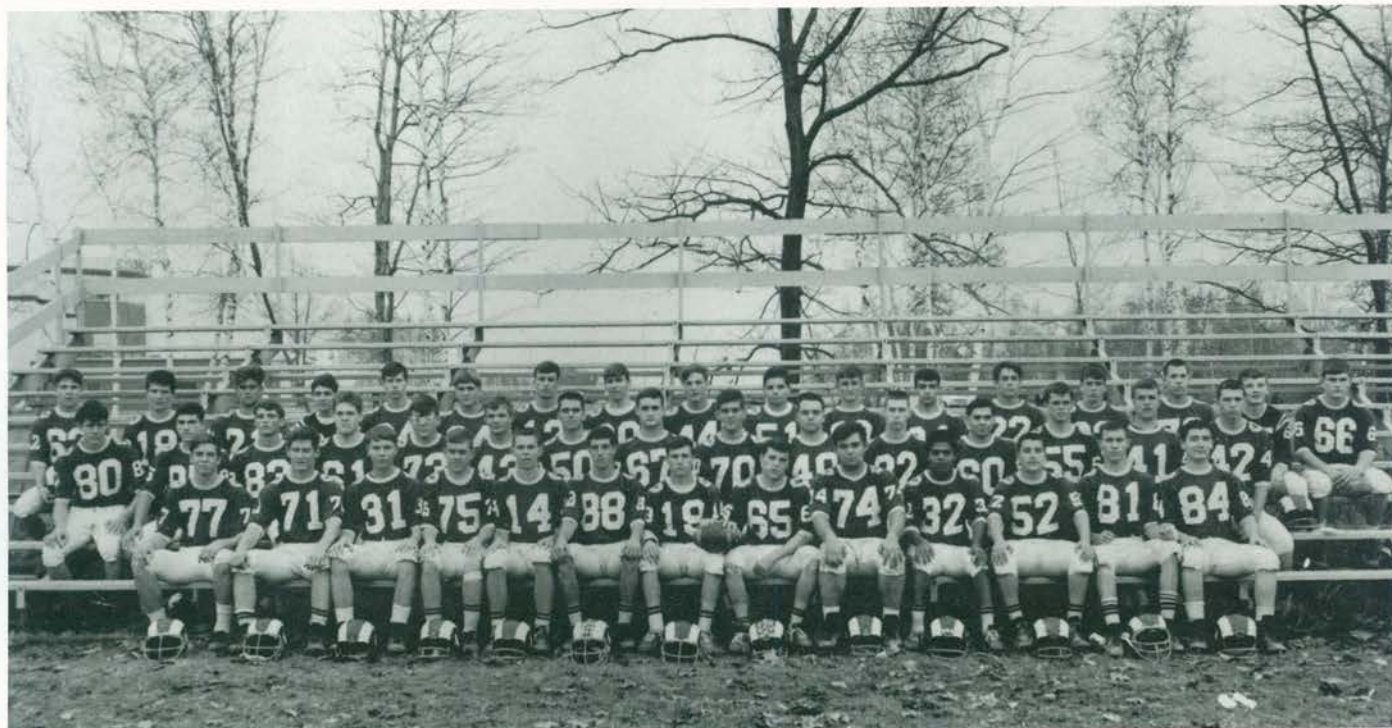


SPORTS

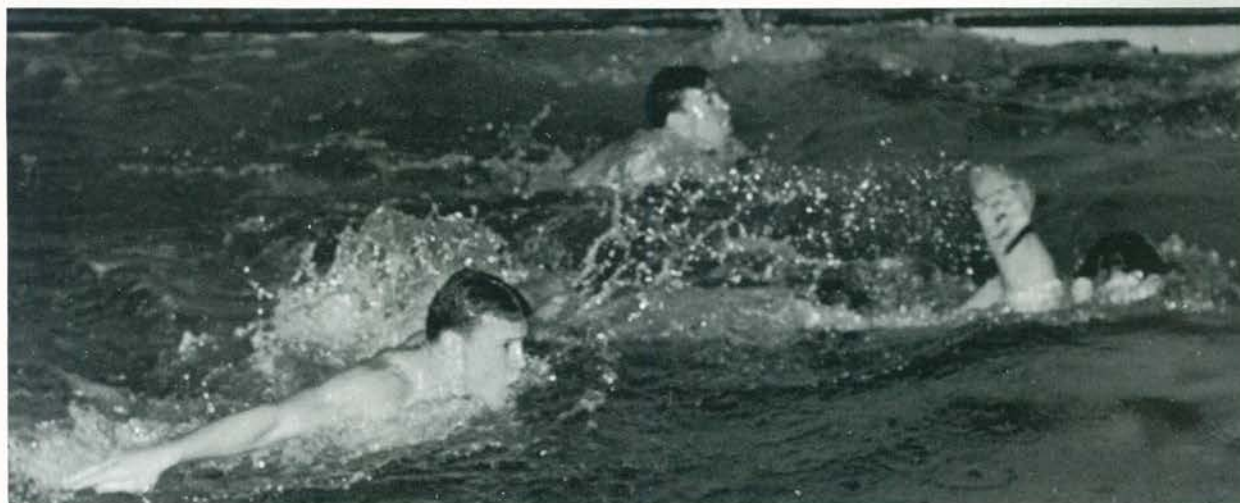

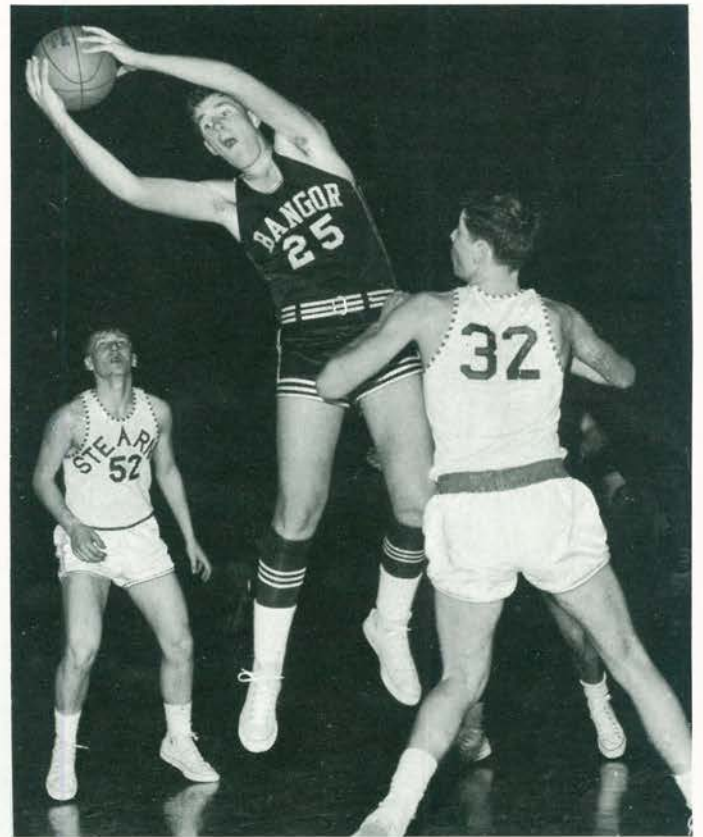

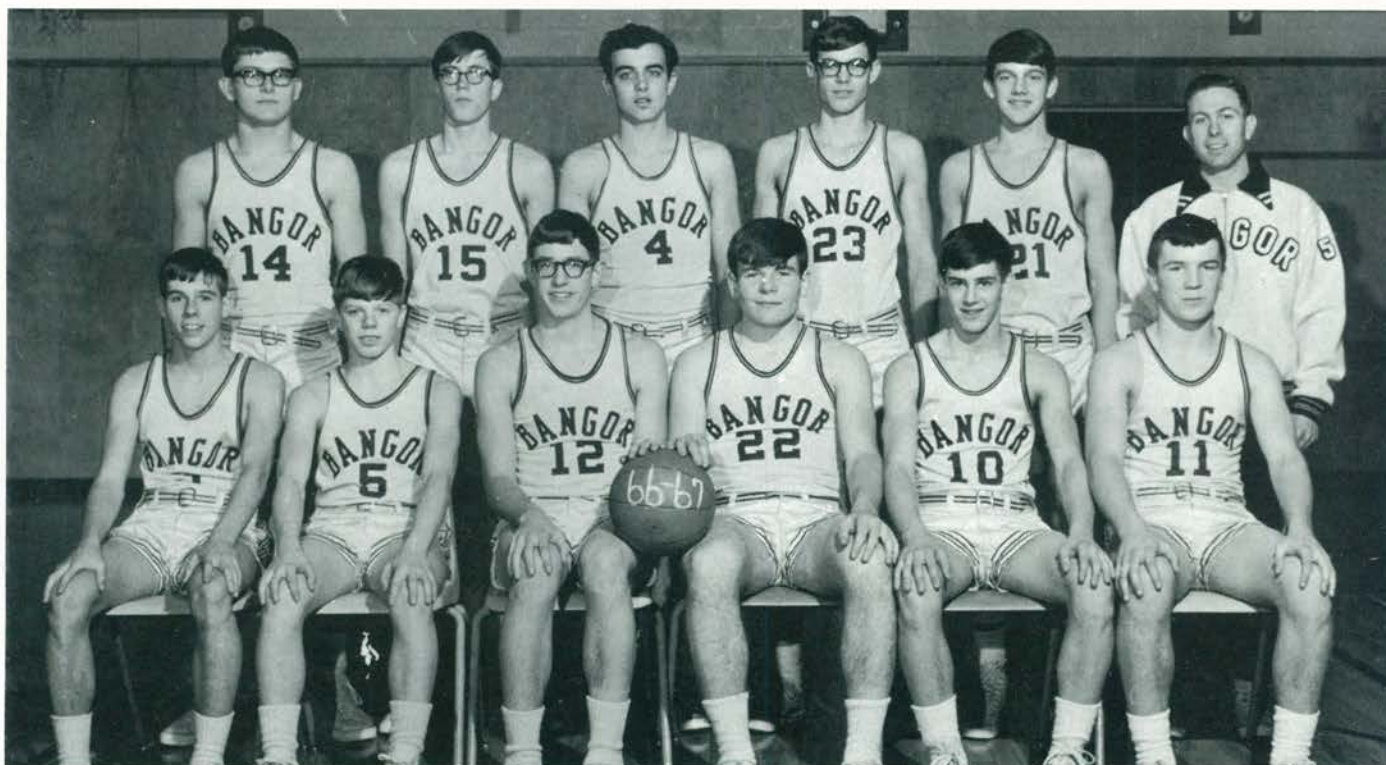

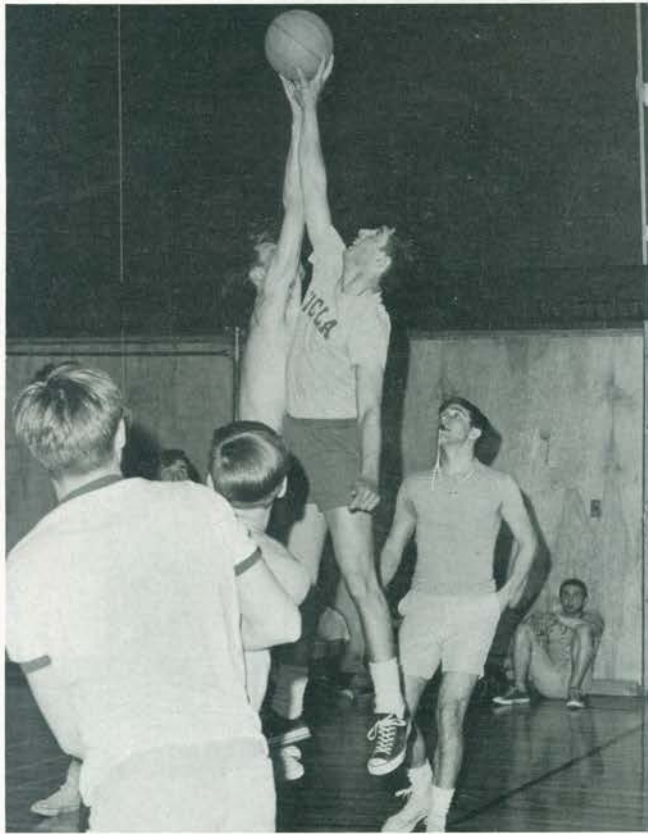

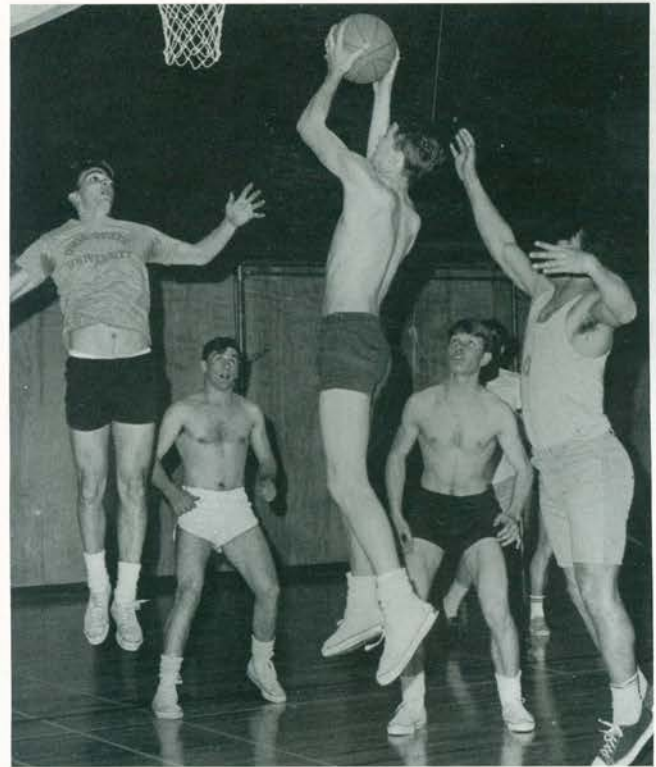

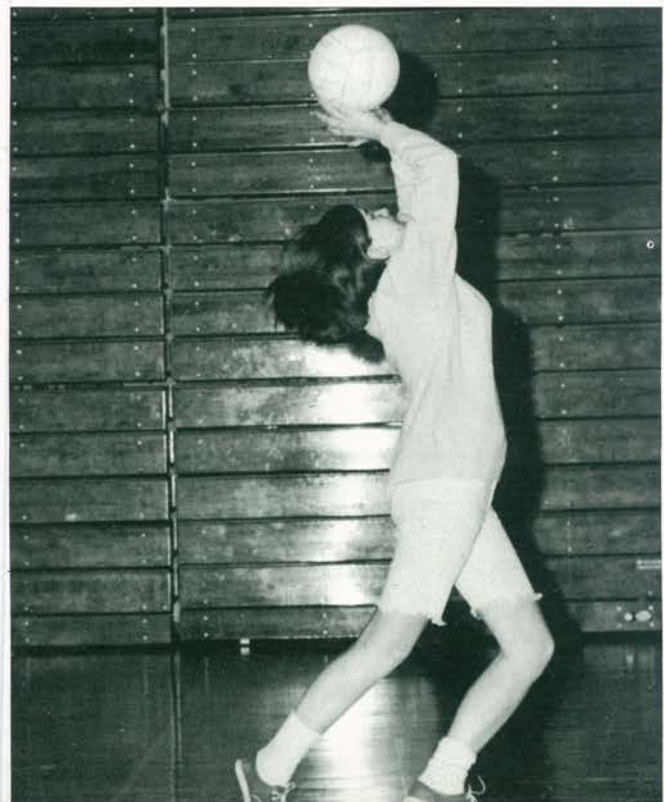

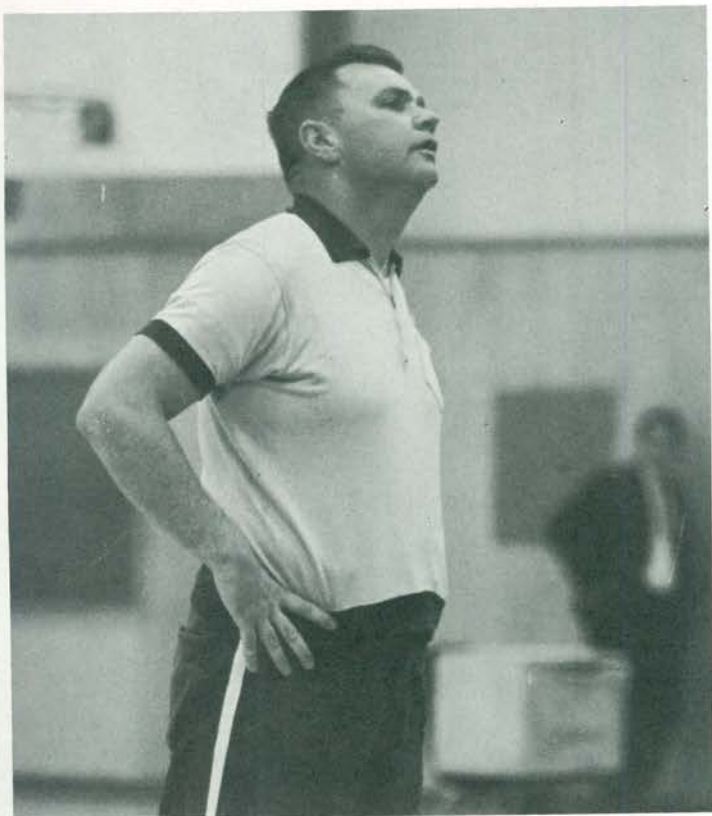
