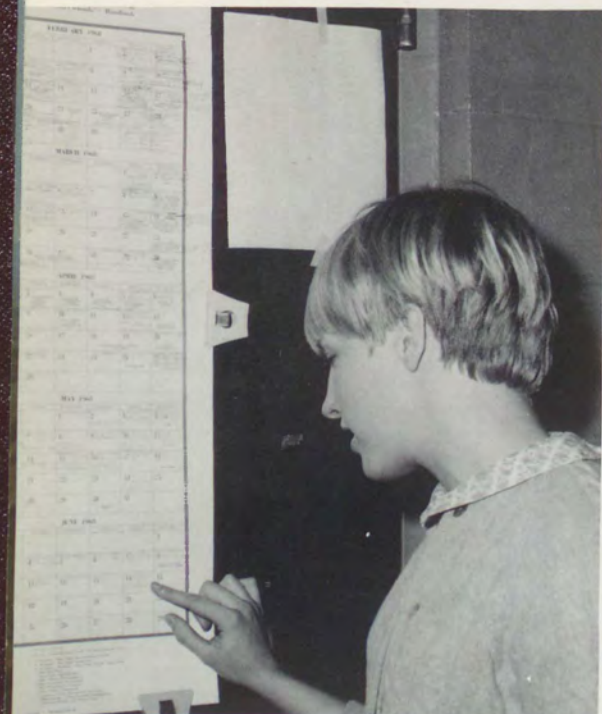

Team Administration Is Firmly Established

In a constant effort to provide the newest and most efficient methods of teaching to the students of Bangor High, Mr. Dana M. Simmons, principal, and Mr. Rodney Bartlett, assistant principal, are leading a unique administrative venture. The key to its success is "team administration."

The Curriculum Committee, consisting of the Administrative Committee, the Athletic Committee, the Student Activity Committee, and the Educational Policies Committee, has been firmly established. The subcommittees include the department heads, the athletic directors, the advisors to all student activities, and teacher representatives from each department. Their combined efforts aid in the planning of the operation of Bangor High School.

Bangor High School has reason to be proud of its Administration for providing its students with an extensive and flexible curriculum. Because of the combined efforts of the staff, in several instances Bangor High School has received not only statewide and national recognition, but also international acclaim. Throughout the year Bangor High was toured by several groups of

Canadian visitors and also a group from Italy. The purpose of these visits was to obtain ideas to improve and develop their programs of study and to become familiar with the construction of modern school facilities.

During the academic year the administration faced the task of compiling a report to send to the Accreditation Committee on the progress of the implementation of recommendations given by the committee during the evaluation in 1966-1967, at which time Bangor High received a ten year accreditation.

Mr. Dana M. Simmons has not only been honored through the recognition given to Bangor High as a whole, but also individually by an appointment to The National Association of Secondary School Principals' National Advisory Committee on Curriculum.

Superintendent Wendall G. Eaton Implements Policies

In his position Mr. Eaton has many duties to fulfill. He must carry out the policies of the School Board; this he does by working with the principals of the various schools. He is also the one who must establish rapport between the School Board and the city administration and who must keep the public informed. Not only does he work with the city administration, but he also works closely with the state and federal government on educational legislation.

During the next two years Mr. Eaton hopes to be able to retain the high standards of education in Bangor in the face of any financial difficulties which might arise. One of the foremost items on Mr. Eaton's agenda is to continue to maintain fine personnel relationships throughout the entire educational system. In all the areas in which Mr. Eaton is involved he has shown himself to be a credit to the educational system and to the people of Bangor.

Assistant Superintendent Alvah I. McIntosh Supervises Curriculum

Alvah McIntosh, Assistant Superintendent of the Bangor School System, has the responsibility of establishing the entire curriculum for the Bangor Schools. During the 1966-1967 school year Mr. McIntosh worked diligently to enlarge and rearrange the program of study for the 1967-1968 year.

Mr. McIntosh also works in the area of budgeting and is in charge of setting up the budget for the school system during the year. He works with the federal government to receive new federal grants to allow Bangor to expand its educational system. Mr. McIntosh is the one who introduced the system of "teacher aides" to Bangor Schools.

This year's school board members are Mrs. Charles Brontas, David Cutler, Dr. Richard Gaillard, James

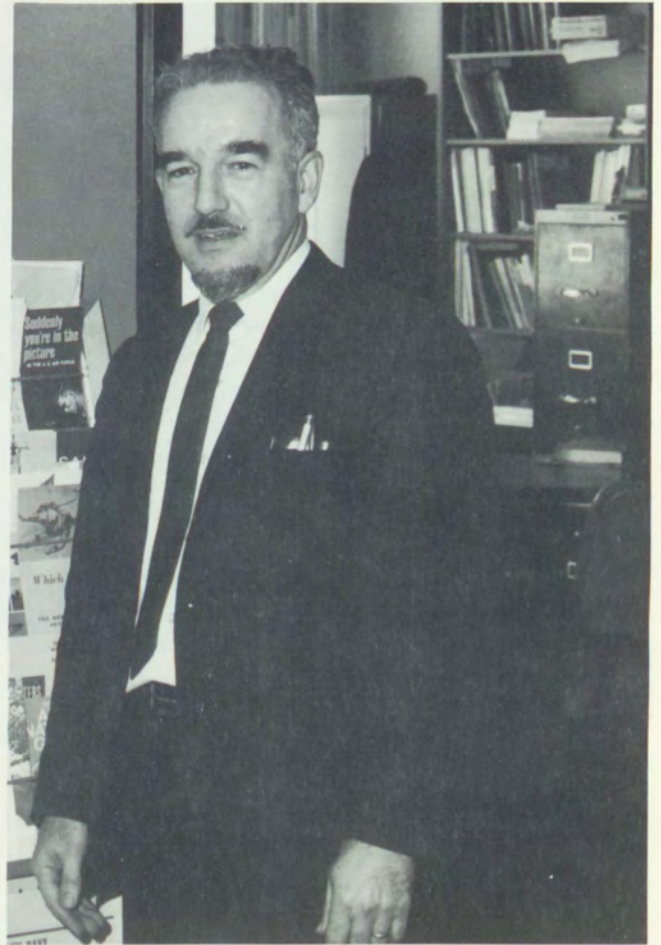

Under the guidance of Mrs. Helen Gillespie, today's psychology students do just this.

Not only is a background given in psychology, but such fields as anthropology, biology, and sociology are introduced into the course, giving the student a well rounded view of human behavior.

Not only do the Journalism students study in the area of school publications, they also study the production of newspapers and magazines for the public. A trip to the Bangor Daily News is an annual event. Here, the students see first hand the actual production of a newspaper.

The first concert, which was an outstanding success, was held at the Fruit Street School in February.

Foreign Language Department Promotes Understanding Through Knowledge

In order to understand, one must have a basis of learned facts on which to build a solid foundation. Bangor High's language department has unofficially donned its mason suit and piled up the bricks and mortar, all ready to lay in a solid foundation for each and every language student in Bangor High. This foundation is not merely a means of learning to speak a foreign language, but is a starting point for many future adventures. It opens the doorway to a myriad of experiences. The self-awareness of a student's inner self and surroundings is a result of hard work put into this learning experience.

Every opportunity to take advantage of the experience of learning a foreign language is offered the student at Bangor High. Individual students and classes as a whole put on skits, sing songs, and have conversations

in the language which they are studying. Regular sessions in the language laboratory along with records, tapes, and special guests bring new interest and life into the classroom.

Spanish and French are offered on a three year basis. A new program in which Bangor High sophomores, who have taken French I as freshmen and now take French II, has become part of the curriculum with the eventual result that French IV will be offered to seniors starting in 1970. Two years of Latin are offered to juniors and seniors. The influence of the Roman Empire on the world of today, and the fact that Latin is a basis for the English language are the major factors for the continued study of Latin. German and Russian are now being taught on a two-year basis; and next year the language department hopes to continue the program by adding a third year German course. These languages have become an integral part of Bangor High School's efforts to keep up with the ever increasing complexity of modern living. Bangor High School has succeeded in bringing understanding to its students through knowledge by creating knowledge through understanding.

Modern Math Is Brought Into All Classes Of Mathematics

Bangor's Math department has reached a peak throughout the city. The children in elementary schools, when brought to the high school, will understand more quickly and easily the continuous discovery of new ideas in the fields of mathematics. More is expected of today's math student, and this early teaching will better prepare students for that which is expected of him.

Bangor High School's program provides a wide range of math courses for college and job-bound students alike. At Bangor High, college-preparatory geometry, algebra, and advanced pre-college math, along with Math II and Math III, for students with no plans for college, are offered. For aid in college math, students with the correct background may take a program offered in calculus which this year was directed by Gordon Smith. The students are urged to advance at their own rate, so that they can fully understand the new ideas. The TEMAC self-teaching method is used as a supplementary aid in calculus.

A study of college board scores shows a significant improvement since the arrival of the "new math" in 1962. Students in the new program received higher scores than those with the traditional background.

With today's world continuously developing in the constant rise of mathematics, it is important for the student to have a good understanding of math. Bangor's program is now giving its students opportunities to learn these new concepts. Learning is programmed at a comfortable rate, and a test is required after Algebra I to insure that a student doesn't get in "over his head." Courses are designed to meet the challenges of higher education and the business world.

As in previous years, a senior who is interested in a math career may elect a math course offered at the University of Maine.

Social Studies Focuses On Modern World

In order to make the students of Bangor High School aware of the ever-increasing complexity of both the national and international scenes, the Social Studies department has altered those courses which had antiquated characteristics, and has taken on a modern concept of teaching. Modern and Medieval History has been reduced to Modern History, along with the acceleration of the United States History courses, making it possible to spend more time on the post-Civil War period. Problems of Democracy and Current World Problems also continue in this aspect. Both courses depict problems in government that the average student would not normally be aware of.

A series of lectures such as those on the development of the Arts given by Mr. Wallace Woodcock, head of the English department; Mr. Aime Simoneau of the Music department, and Mr. Palmer Libby, head of the Art department, have continued to enlighten the students of the team teaching program in United States History. The four teachers who took charge of this program in its second year were Mr. Philip Gonyar, Department Head; Mr. Robert Jones, Mr. James Quine, and Mr. William Fleming.

Foundations of American Freedom, a double period class taught by Department head Mr. Philip Gonyar, strives for understanding through individual research projects and intimate class discussions. Operation "Backhoe," introduced during the past year, is designed to give its students a full understanding of the world around them. In this 90 minute course the practical aspects of history are taught in such a manner that the students may apply them to everyday life.

In the latter part of January, Mr. Philip Gonyar and Mr. Robert Jones attended an assembly on Anthropology at Phillips' Exeter Academy, Exeter, New Hampshire, to consider the possibility of introducing a course of this type to Bangor High School's expanding curriculum. This course may be introduced as a separate course or as part of an already existing course.

Distributive Education is a vocational program providing instruction in marketing and merchandising for those engaged in retailing, wholesale, and service businesses. The program is offered for seniors in high school. Under the direction of Mr. Byron Perry, students make use both of the facilities of the school and the marketing and merchandising resources of the community. Co-operating businesses supplement the school instruction by providing supervised work experience. This co-operative plan is a significant method of instruction directed towards the needs of the students as they experience employment and as they plan for their initial full-time employment.

Distributive Education's meaningful and purposeful instruction gives movement to one's further direction. Each student selects an occupation to which his interest and energies are directed. The attitudes of the students may change before they complete the high school program, and this course is a chief aid that helps to determine their goals. Career development, therefore, becomes the goal for terminal students; the instruction will have a greater meaning and importance for the student when he realizes its significance to him after graduation.

With such a practical and diversified program, students are prepared to become active, responsible members of the community.

Today's Homemaking Students Are Tomorrow's Homemakers

Preparing students for the future is the aim of the homemaking department of Bangor High School. The department realizes that its students come from all walks of life and that they need assistance in many different fields. Therefore, courses are offered, not only in the usual cooking and sewing, but also in such fields as personal and family relations, child care and development, housing and home decorating, foods and nutrition, clothing and textiles, and marriage and family life. These fields include the areas of safety, family health, home management, and consumer buying. Students, interested in majoring in Homemaking, are allowed, during a sequence of three years, intensive study in all of these fields. Seniors, who have had no previous instruction in Homemaking, are offered Senior Special, which covers all of the major areas of homemaking. A free discussion period has been added to the curriculum this year. Students discuss any topics they wish, according to their interests and their needs.

In order to allow more students to take advantage of the many courses offered, the curriculum is set up on a semester basis. Thanks to the Homemaking Department, the students of Bangor High will be able to go out into the world, knowing that they are capable of caring for a home and a family when the time comes.

Marriage And Family Life Invites Discussion

Marriage and Family Life, a new course set up last year, is offered to both boys and girls, and is designed to cover all aspects of married life. Physical Education Offers A Well Rounded Program

The department now has the facilities to offer all students a modern, well-rounded program of instruction and practice in team and individual sports. A staff of two men teachers and two women teachers provides instruction for all the students in school. Football Coach Gerald Hodge and his assistant, Arthur Miles, plan and direct the boys' program, while Miss Dorothy Raduege and Miss Elisabeth Arnold plan and direct the girls' program.

The intramural sports program has probably been the most popular phase. The boys may participate in intramural volleyball, basketball, gymnastics, badminton, weight training, and wrestling. The girls may participate in field hockey, intramural volleyball, basketball, gymnastics, tumbling, badminton, softball, and track.

Varsity sports present a challenge to the athletic mind at Bangor High. Basketball, football, baseball, swimming, track and cross country were offered this year and in the near future varsity sports such as soccer, archery, and tennis may be offered.

The gym, which features horizontal bars, parallel bars, bucks, still rings, balance beam, uneven parallel bars, wall parallels, climbing ropes, traveling rings, a horizontal ladder, and wall pulley rings, has been designated as an official fitness demonstration center for this part of the state.

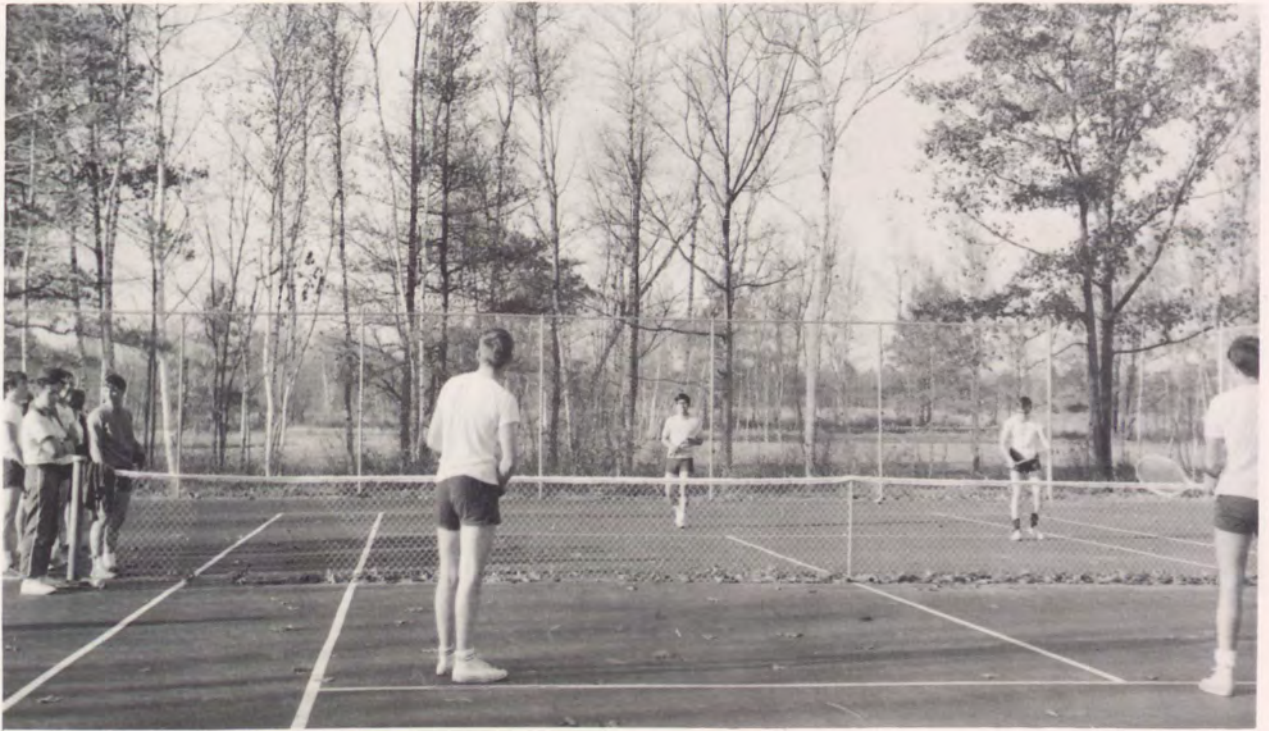

Industrial Arts Program Offers Varied Course Of Study

Knowing the importance of the role industry plays in America, the Industrial Arts Department strives to develop in each student skill in performance and a knowledge of the related principles and theories. In the Industrial Arts Department the courses are many and varied. These courses are presented on a semester basis. This allows for more students to take advantage of this program. At the present time this department offers approximately twenty-five courses.

Each shop is equipped with the most modern machinery and facilities available. No effort has been spared in selecting and setting up each shop area.

Students learn to read blueprints and to use drafting equipment correctly.

Students in the Electricity course, which is offered on four levels, study basic electricity and electronics, residential wiring and small appliances. They also gain valuable experience in electronic construction and repair.

The students in the Graphic Arts program learn about the printing industry, and in the process produce much printed matter for the various school organizations and departments, as well as doing printing for their own personal needs. Study in offset printing and developing of pictures is also part of the curriculum.

With the addition of much new equipment, the Woodworking courses include, not only work in wood but also in plastics. An understanding of related materials develops in each student good workmanship and design.

There are four main courses offered in the area of Transportation. Power Mechanics is a course in which the students work on small engines. Auto Mechanics is a course designed to meet the need of automobile drivers. Another course is Auto Electricity. The final course is that of Aerospace. With a strong background in high school, many of these students will eventually attend a vocational school.

Metal Working courses now offer experience in welding, forging, art and sheet metal, and foundry. Advanced students are able to work in electric and gas welding.

Through these various shops, students explore their individual talents and acquire a knowledge of industry's place in the modern world.

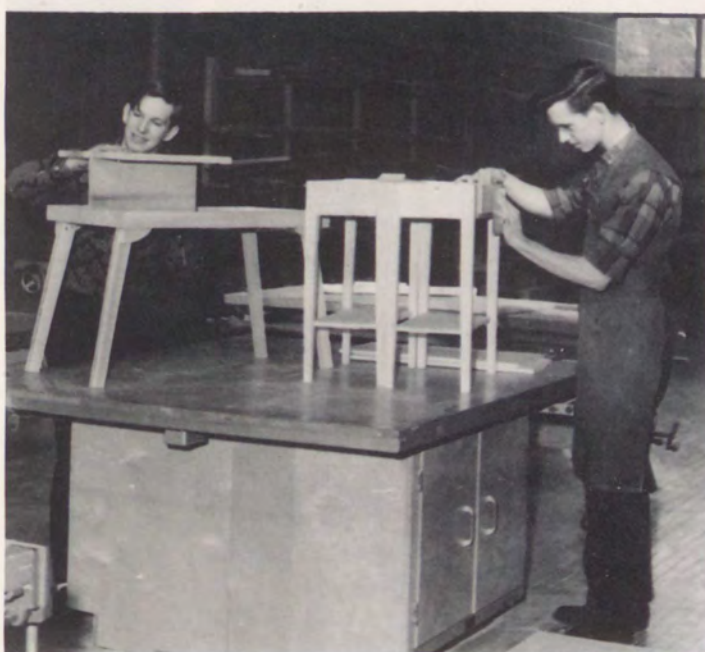

Safety Is The Key Word In Driving

Safety is the key word in the world of drivers today, and this is what is mainly stressed in Bangor High's driving course. The job of teaching students good driving habits belongs to Mr. Lloyd Rhodes and Mr. Walter Perry. The course is open to students of all three classes and provides them with the basic skills of driving; such as, backing, turning, parking and learning the necessary rules of the road.

When the new school opened in 1964, the addition of driv-o-trainers made Bangor High School Driver's Education Department one of the most modern in New England as well as being the first school in Maine to use driv-o-trainers. Since then many other schools are adopting the idea.

The main purpose of the department is to acquaint the student with driving, through classroom experience as well as actual on-the-road experience. In the classroom, filmstrips are used along with the driv-o-trainer during which the student experiences actual situations in traffic. Through the use of these experiences, on the road and off, the instructors hope to make alert and defensive future drivers.

Military Department Prepares Students For The Future

ROTC (Reserve Officer Training Corps) is a program to develop student leadership, teach citizenship ideals, develop an understanding of the opportunities existing in the military services of the U. S. and assist the institution in the development of mature, self-disciplined, responsible citizens.

The program emphasis is on leadership training. For the student in ROTC to become a leader, he must know the academic subjects taught in the two hours of classroom instruction each week and have an opportunity to practice effective leadership. The "Drill Day" on which all cadets wear their uniforms and participate in co-ordinative military drills gives each cadet leader an opportunity to exercise and demonstrate his sound judgment, the traits of a leader, and proficiency in his ROTC subjects.

The curriculum is one prescribed by the Department of the Army for the more than 400 high schools in the nation that have the ROTC program. The first year includes the basic subjects of courtesies and customs of conduct, hygiene and first aid, ROTC organization and procedures, leadership, drills, weapons and marksmanship training. The second year and the third year of the program build upon the student's basic knowledge by teaching map reading, methods of instruction, small units, tactics, military history, and practical work in leadership and exercise of command responsibilities.

Speech And Drama Students Learn To Communicate

It is obvious that the ability to communicate with one's fellow man is of prime importance. And because speaking is more common than all other forms of communication, it is important to speak well. Students taking courses in the speech arts learn to speak in both informal and formal situations.

The Foundations of Speech course gives the student the opportunity to converse to organize, and deliver his own talks and provides an introduction to the areas of oral interpretation, group discussion, interviewing, and pantomime. As a result of group discussion, guest speakers from the community were invited to share ideas with the students.

Oral Interpretation offers individual and group training in re-creative speech whereby the student learns to communicate to an audience the ideas and feelings expressed in the various fields of literature. Audio-visual aids including guitars, bass drums, slides, recorded music, and lighting effects gave impact to the programs.

The Dramatic Arts course helps the student to develop an appreciation of past and present dramatic productions by providing him with practical experience in the art of play production. This year the class met two days a week in the Peakes Auditorium and learned a respect for and a working knowledge of the theatre. Student directors and actors created scenes from a variety of plays.

Members of the department have participated in many competitive activities. Ilene Wittner won a hundred-dollar bond as the winner of the local Voice of Democracy Contest.

PRA Paves The Way

The PRA program was originated to give the student a chance for academic as well as on-the-job training. Much of the success of this program goes to its coordinator, Mrs. Charlene Popham and her assistant, Miss Sheila Dowd.

In his sophomore year, the student is required to take part in a full daily program which usually consists of six subjects. In his junior year the student attends four classes daily and for the remaining three periods he works somewhere in the school. Finally, in his senior year the student participates in only three classes and with more than a half a day ahead of him, goes out to work at whatever job best suits him in the community.

Boys and girls in the PRA program are offered the widest possible range of studies; including Foods (offered to both boys and girls), Wood Shop, Power Mechanics, Sheet Metal, and Sewing. Adding to these courses the required English, Social Studies, and a special lab-oriented Biology class for juniors, the Practical Arts student gains a well-rounded education.

Thus, the sophomore year is a building year where the student is concerned mostly with his academic program. The junior year is a stepping stone to the senior year which paves the way to excellent work experience that will be of value to the student in the near future.

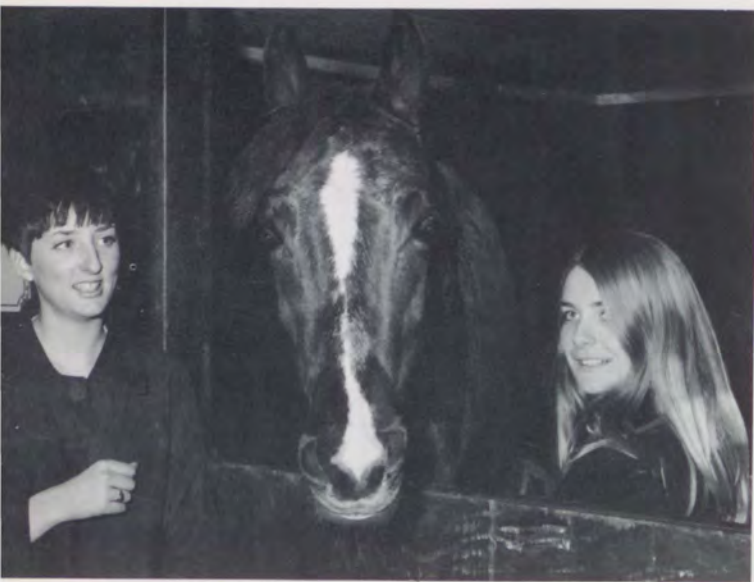

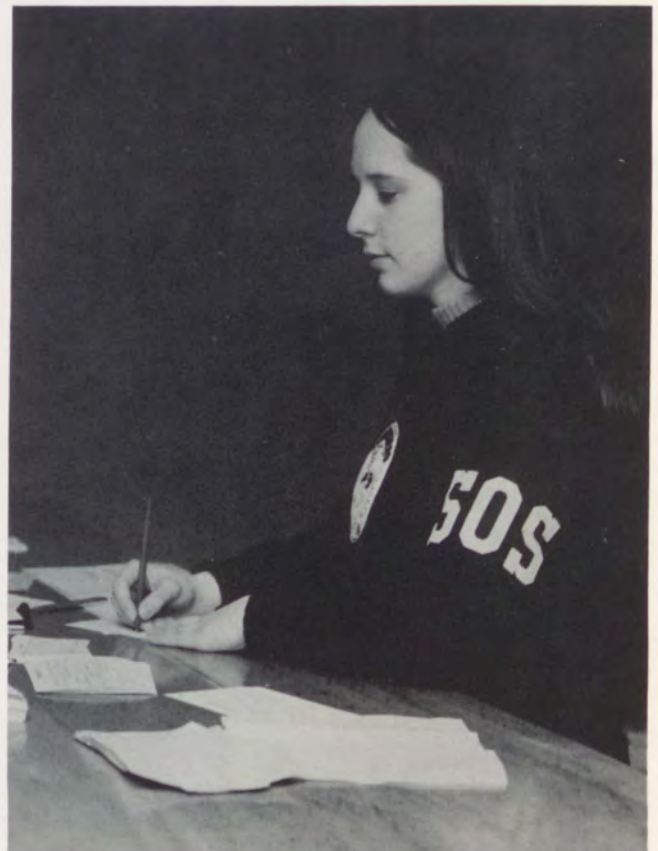

Directly after school on Wednesdays and Fridays, the members of the Boys' Rifle Club can be found on the practice firing range under "A" ramp. The club is divided into four teams; team A-1, captained by Steve Bateman, is for the more advanced shooters; team A-2, led by Bruce Gray, is also for the experienced shooters; teams B-1 and B-2, captained by Brian Smith, are for the less experienced shooters.

While most sports last only two to three months, the Boys' Rifle Team is unique, in that the boys start practice in early September and carry on competition through the end of April.

This year the boys practiced twice a week from September through January. In February they started competition by shooting in the Pine Tree League, an eight-week session carried on through the mail. Girls Compete Through The Mail

Captained by Sharon Slep, and under the supervision of S.F.C. Daniel F. Kuck, the Girls' Rifle Team completed its second successful year of instruction and competition since revision of the team in the fall of 1966. The group, which is open to all Stetsonettes, spent the first semester taking classroom instruction on how to care for and use a rifle properly. During the second semester the team participated in postal competition.

In postal competition the team normally receives a letter from another girls' or boys' team in the area challenging them to a formal match. If they choose to accept, and they generally do, each girl who is to fire is given a number and directions on positions to shoot from and the number of targets to shoot. When the members complete their firing, they compile their scores and send them to the opposition. The victor is then determined by a comparison of scores.

Rams Roll To Undefeated Record

Rolling over nine straight opponents, Bangor High's football team finished the regular season with its first undefeated team since 1947. The Rams' perfect record of nine wins and no losses gave them possession of State Class A, Division One Champions and earned them the right to meet the Division Two Champs, Biddeford, for the state title.

In the opening game of the season, the Rams dumped Edward Little at Auburn by the score of 26-6. The next game was also played away, at Thornton of Saco. In what turned out to be the closest game of the season, Bangor pulled out a hard fought verdict of 12-7. The action then came to Bangor for the first home game against St. Louis of Biddeford. Although this game was rated as a toss-up, Bangor won 26-13. Waterville's Purple Panthers were the next victims as the Rams opened up their bomb sights and blasted them 41-0. After their easy win over Waterville, the Ram gridders were faced by another unbeaten team, Portland. However, Bangor had too much and proved it by sending Portland down to its first defeat 27-6. Staying at home to play its second straight home game, B.H.S. scored 21 points in the second half on a cold and windy day to defeat the Blue Devils of Lewiston with a solid 21-6 win.

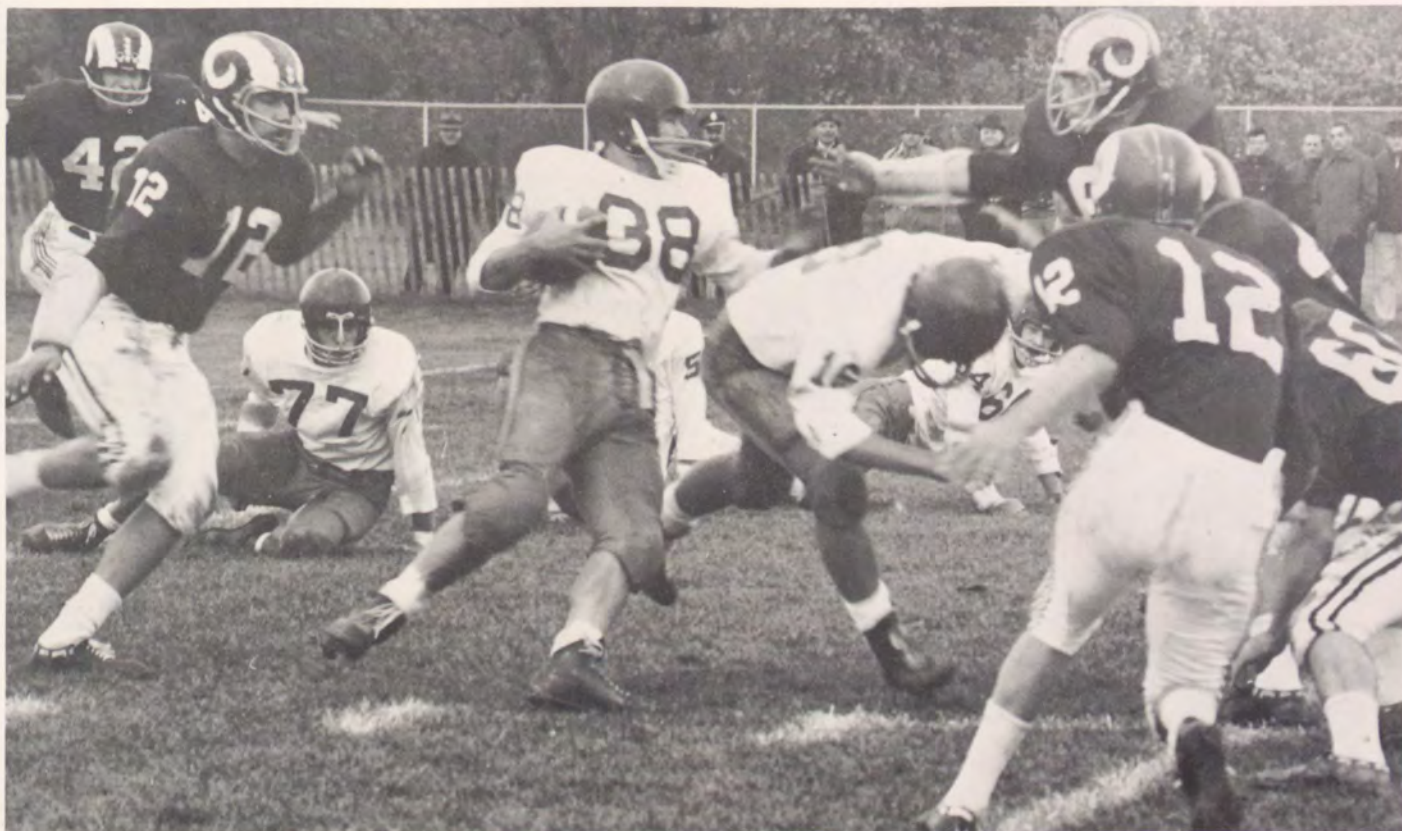
Once again it was traveling time as Bangor's Rams met the Deering Rams at Deering. For the second time of the season Bangor hit the 40 point mark as they stomped Deering 40-16. The final two games of their campaign were played at home. South Portland was stopped as Bangor passed for three TD's for a 21-7 win. Finally, in the game that the players had waited for all year, the Rams avenged their last year's loss to Brewer

by rolling over the Brewer Witches 27-7. In the state title game played at Brunswick, the Bangor Rams put up a valiant but losing fight as they were defeated by Biddeford 20-0.

Led by the tri-captains, Steve Crane, Tom Newman, and Bob Reynolds, Bangor was called one of the most completely balanced ball clubs that have played in the state of Maine for sometime. Its offensive team, which was one of the top in the state, rolled across 33 touchdowns for 231 points or a 25 points per game average. The defense team played equally as well by allowing a mere 10 touchdowns during the regular season for only 68 points, best in the Class A league. The offensive line was well played by ends Don Snyder and Tom Newman, tackles Gene Rowe and John Bradford, guards Ken Kissinger and Bob Reynolds, and center Steve Crane. The backfield was placed in the hands of quarterback Joe Higgins, halfback Dave Snyder and Steve Crane, and fullback Steve Glencross. Allowing for the Rams to have a good amount of offensive depth were running backs Dave Cheever, Mike Magee, Jim "Red" Bassford, and Jim Blood; quarterback Joe Stuka; and linemen John Sprague, Spider Goggins, Dick Maidlow, and Steve Collenburg.

Meanwhile, while the offensive unit was chalking up points, the Ram defense was preventing their opponents from scoring. Some of the stalwart members of this unit were Jim Bassford, Steve Crane, Steve Curran, Boyce Gillette, Spider Goggins, Steve Glencross, Ken Kissinger, Mike Magee, Tom Newman, Bob Reynolds, and Don Snyder. A fine job of punting was done by Steve Glencross who was backed up by sophomore Steve Vanidestine. The extra points and kick-offs were placed at the capable feet of Gene Rowe.

When it came time to pick members for the All-State Team, Bangor had no trouble placing four men on the

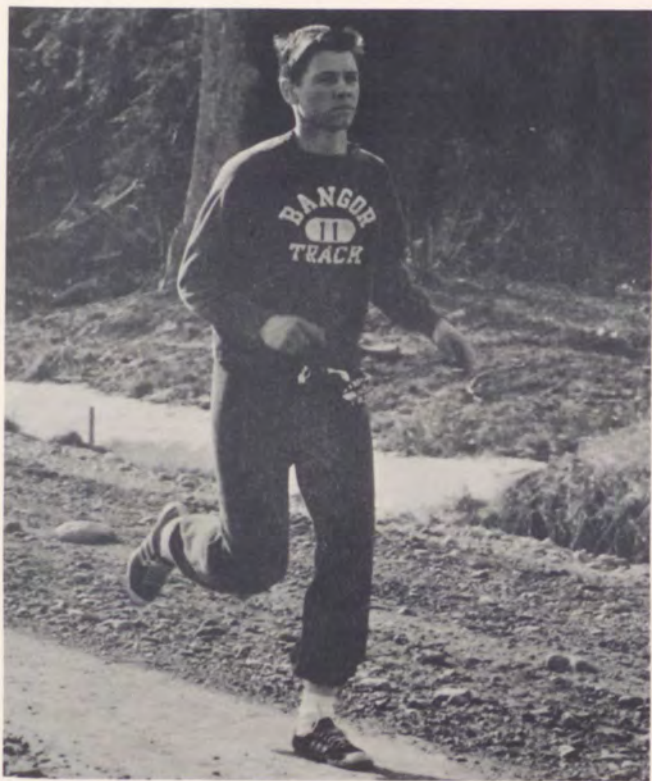

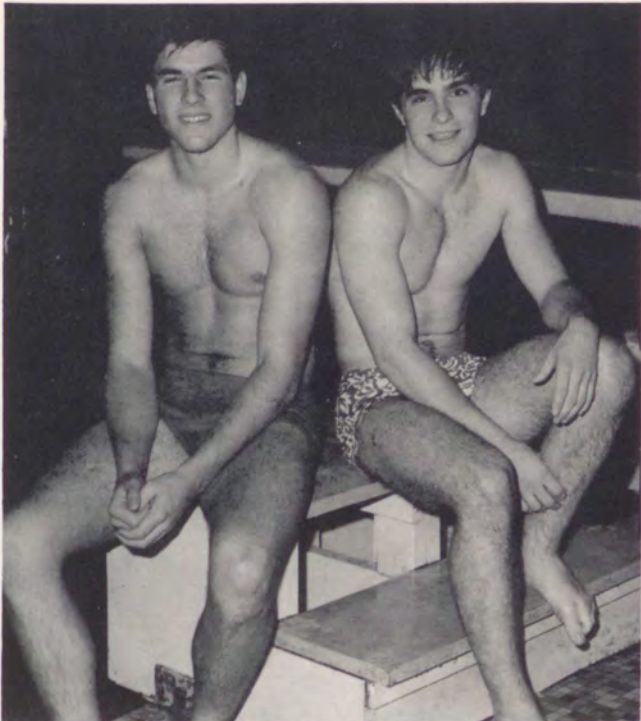
As well as having experienced seniors on the team, there were also many juniors and sophomores who showed promise and ability. These factors gave the team good balance.

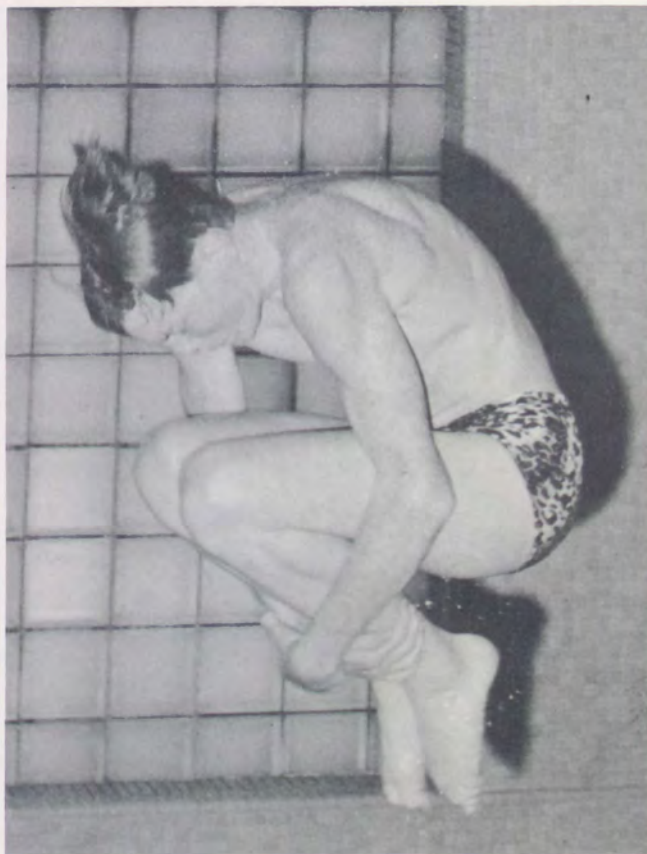

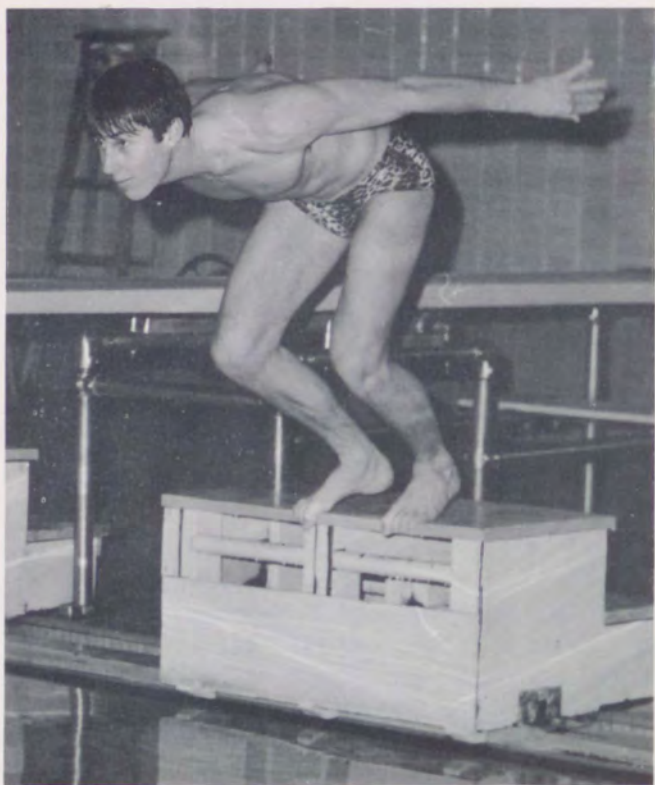

Track Team Is Well Balanced

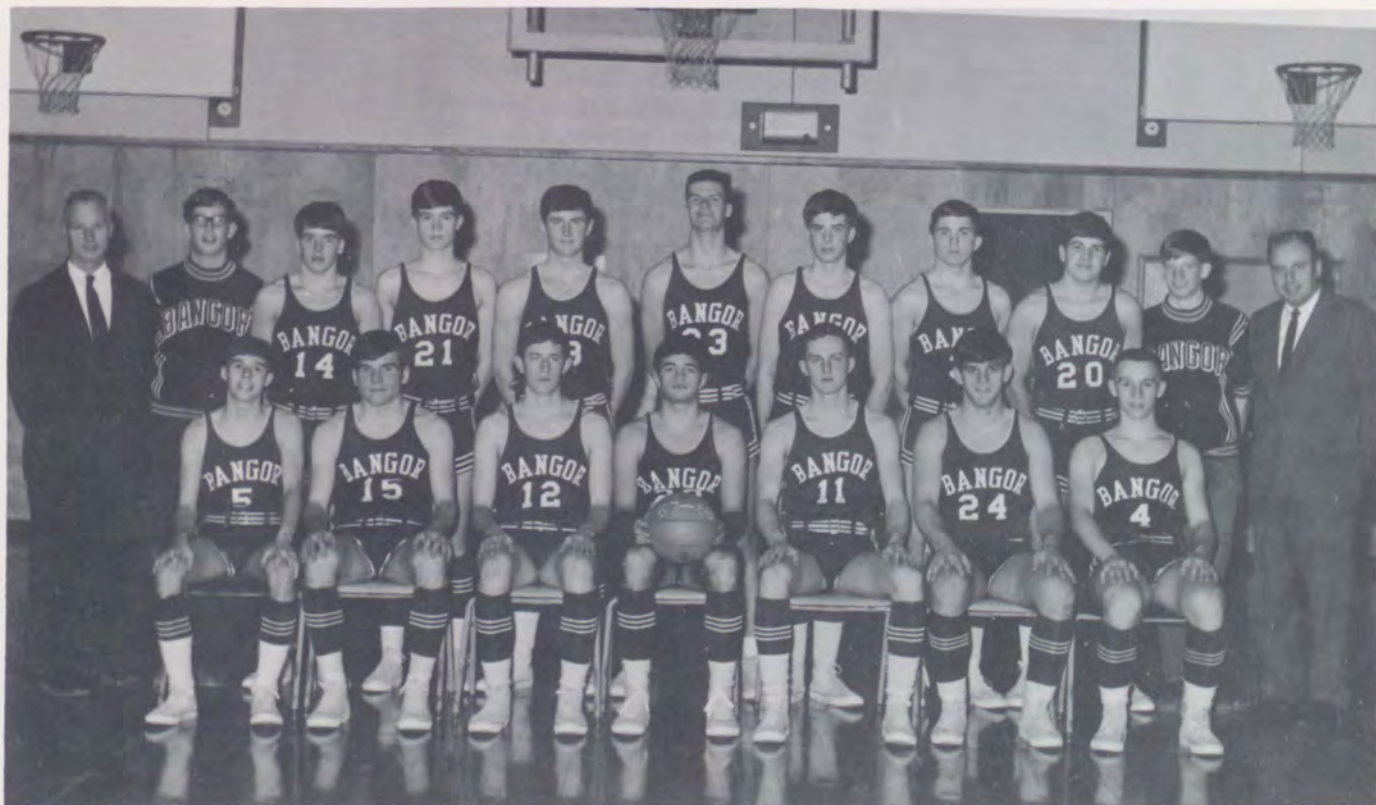

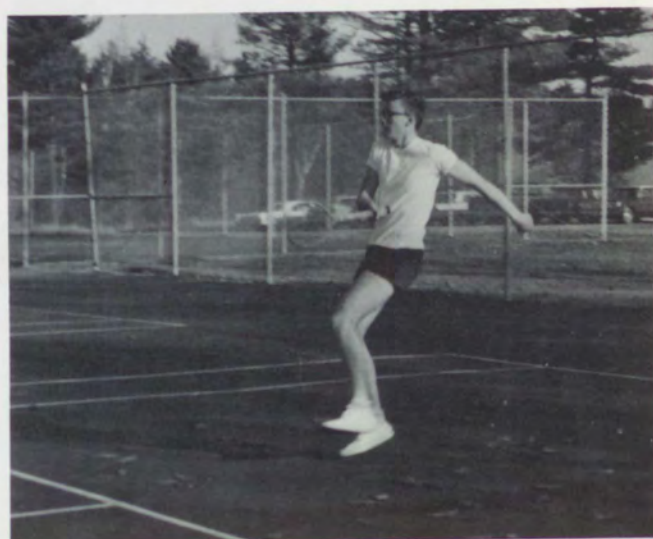

Boys' Intramurals Have Strong Turnout

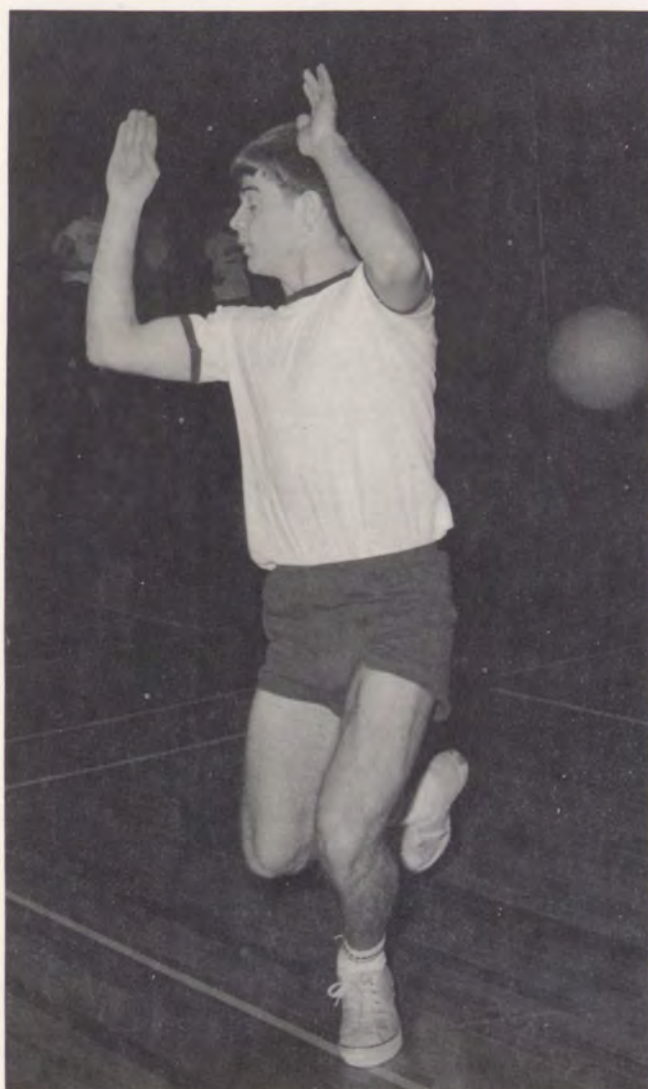

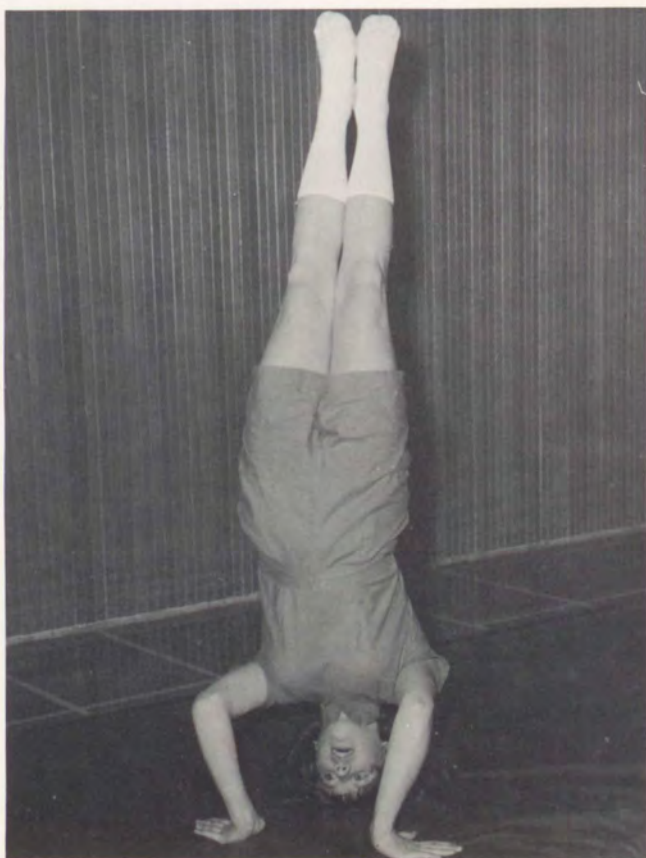
A jump ball signifies the start of the girls' basketball game.

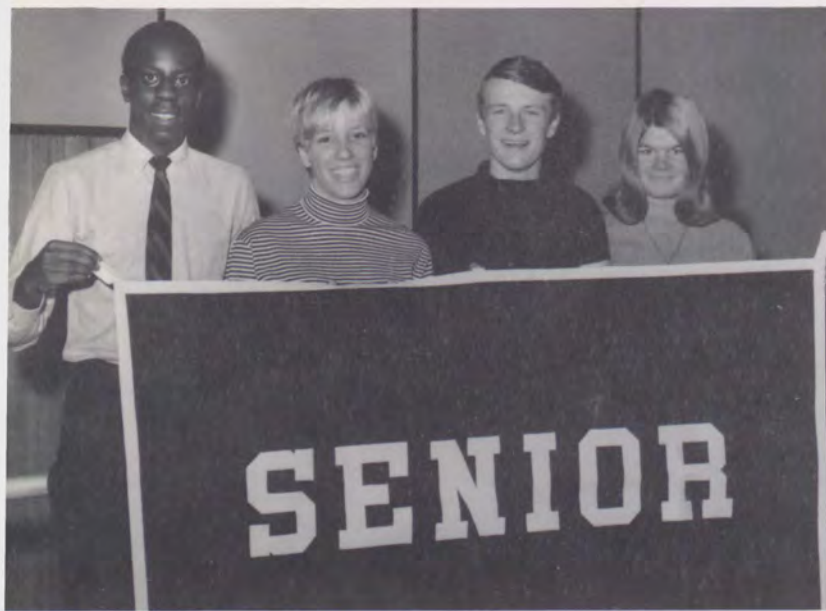
