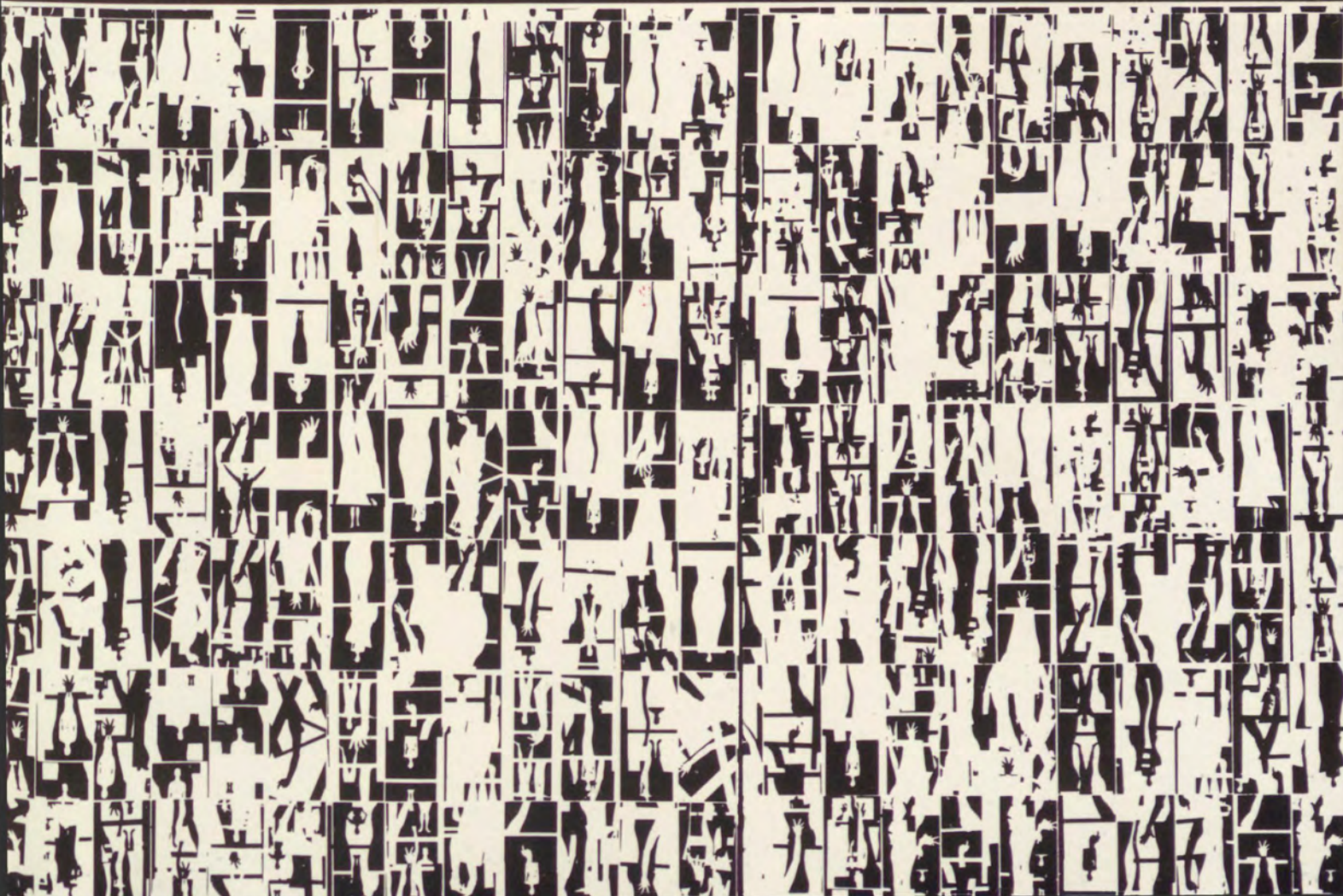

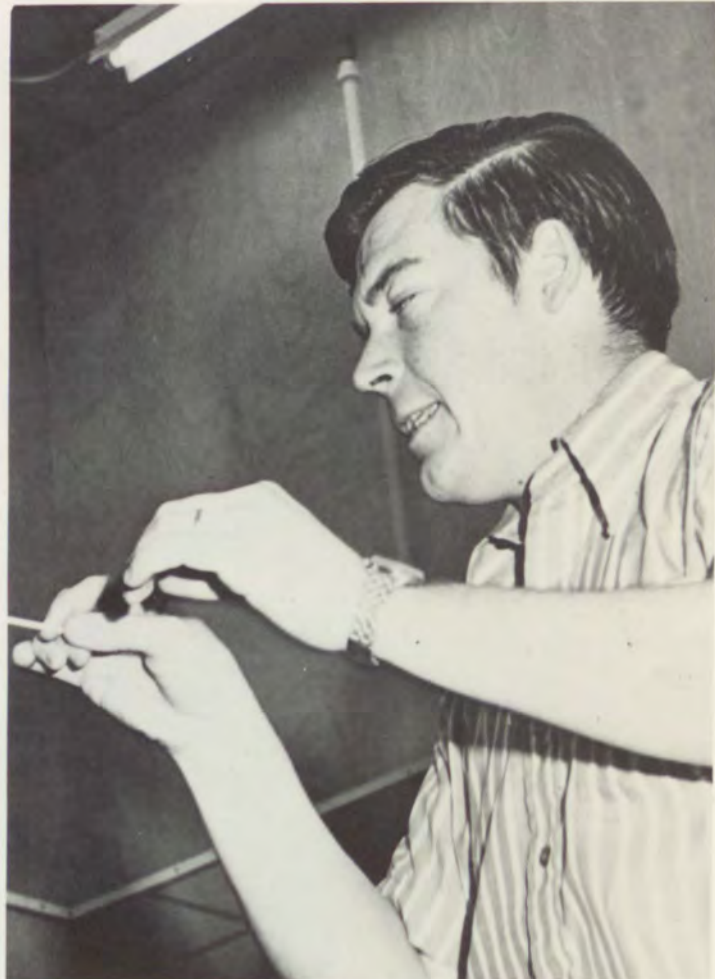


Ram Band

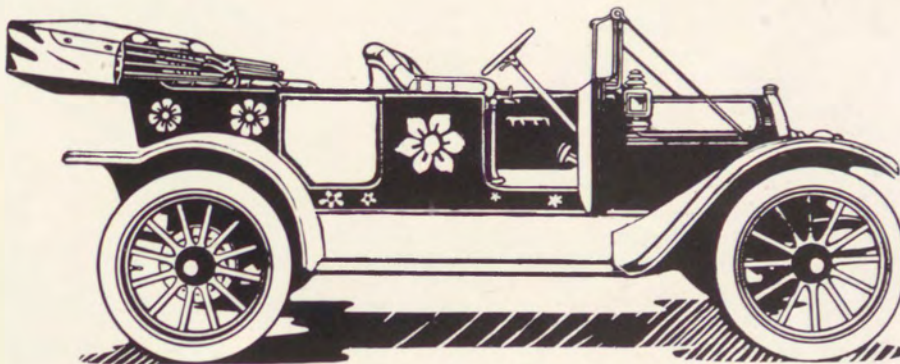

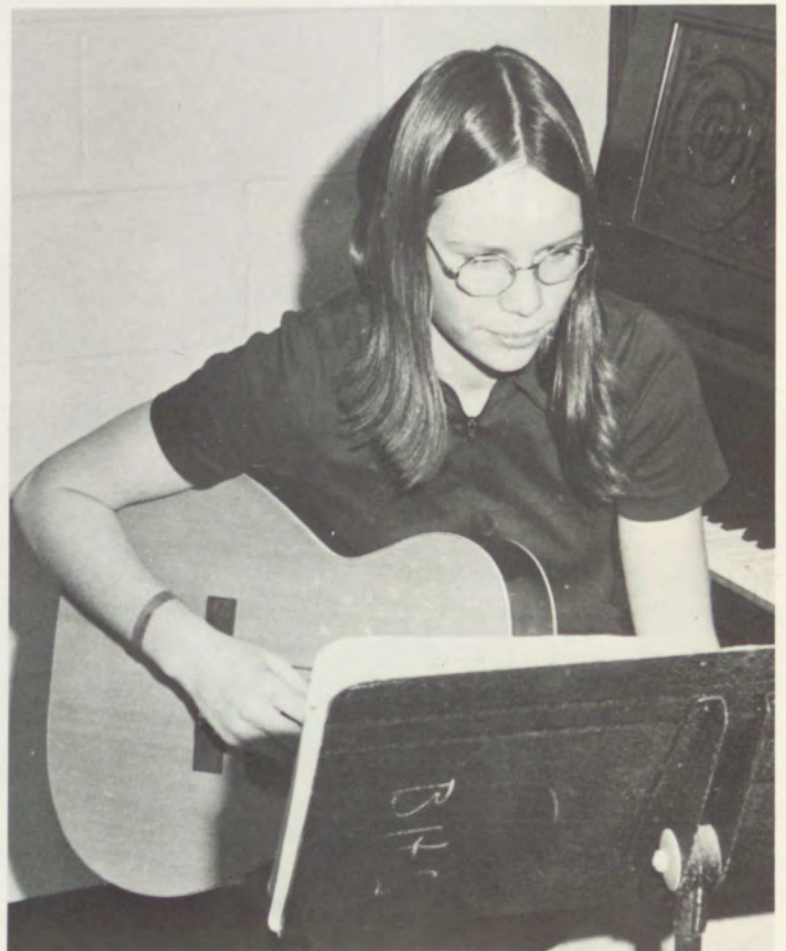

R.O.T.C.

Success has marked the first year of a completely voluntary JROTC program. Enthusiasm is the trademark of all of the brigade activities, both in and out of class.

The Stetson Rifles are continuing their growth, both in numbers and skill. Their drill is a fine example of what concentration and work can do.

The work of the Stetsonettes is also progressing, with fine participation and a high degree of precision.

Special activities, such as campouts, are being stepped up, with trips more frequent and a greater number of cadets participating.

The Honor Guard is continuing in their fine tradition of performance at military funerals in the area. This group is the only active military funeral escort in the state of Maine.

For the first time in its long history at Bangor High School, girls are now permitted to enroll in JROTC and many have taken this opportunity. Most have shown a genuine interest in the program and have proven to be a worthy asset. A smart uniform for girls will be available in school year 1973-1974.

The Army Junior ROTC curriculum has been developed in response to changing educational philosophies and concepts. The curriculum is designed to support the JROTC objectives which are to develop in each student: Good citizenship, self-reliance, leadership, responsiveness to constituted authority, a knowledge of basic military skills, an appreciation of the role of the U.S. Army in support of national objectives, and the ability to communicate effectively both orally and in writing. The JROTC program is an excellent vehicle for demonstrating practical applications of leadership and citizenship.

The Science Department has undergone some interesting changes, notably in Chemistry and Biology II. Under a Title III "mini-grant" much work has been done with 35mm slides and audio tapes to supplement our non-technical Chemistry program. We meet our students in one Large and one Small Group each week and have introduced a Chemistry II course.

Biology II students spend the fall and spring quarters working in Marine Biology. Six field trips are scheduled each year to explore different marine environments. We have worked with Mr. Ervin, Environment Specialist, in setting up a program to study the insect life of the Kenduskeag. Since our enrollment is increasing, we must be doing something right.
