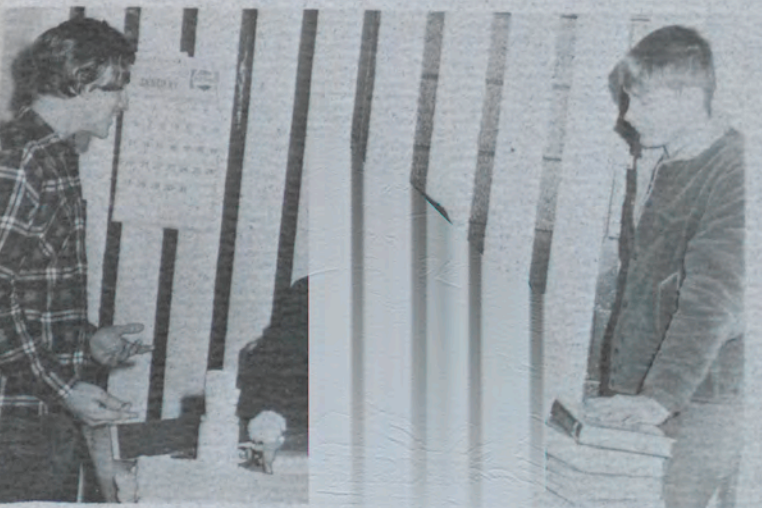
Apples aid digestion, and contain health-giving food elements.
