





Before he started teaching in the Bangor School System he taught at Mattanawcook Academy, 1956-57. In 1957 Mr. Lounsbury was stationed at Fort Hood, Texas. Mr. Lounsbury has taught in Bangor since then, except for one month in 1961 when the army called him back to be stationed at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, during the Cuban Crisis. Other than teaching he has worked for Star Beef as a meet cutter and for S. A. Collins as a carpenter.

At Bangor High Mr. Lounsbury takes an interest in the life of each of his students as well as many others who do not even know him. He gives much attention to those students who participate within the school; be it swimming, football, yearbook, National Honor Society or the Rifle Team. His colleagues look to him as one who is very dependable, with few complaints or question as to why, but one who gets the job done. This is also the attitude he tries to stress in each of his classes.

ACCREDITATION 1986

The 1985-86 school year found Bangor High School staff busily involved in the accreditation process. Ten years have passed since the *New England Association of Schools and Colleges* last visited Bangor High and made the recommendation to renew accreditation status to the then three year high school.

Beginning in the spring of 1985, administrators, teachers, support staff, students, and parents began serving on accreditation committees, doing research and becoming involved in various other activities related to this year-long process. The accumulation of data and the culmination of long hours of meetings and reports was finalized in April 1986 when Bangor High School hosted the accrediting committee whose task it was to review the school self-study and make recommendations for the future of our school.






Your time has come! Soon you will be graduates of Bangor High School and will be seeking new challenges at work stations, in classrooms, in the military or in countless other places.


PEER SUPPORT GROUP




SPEECH TEAM


