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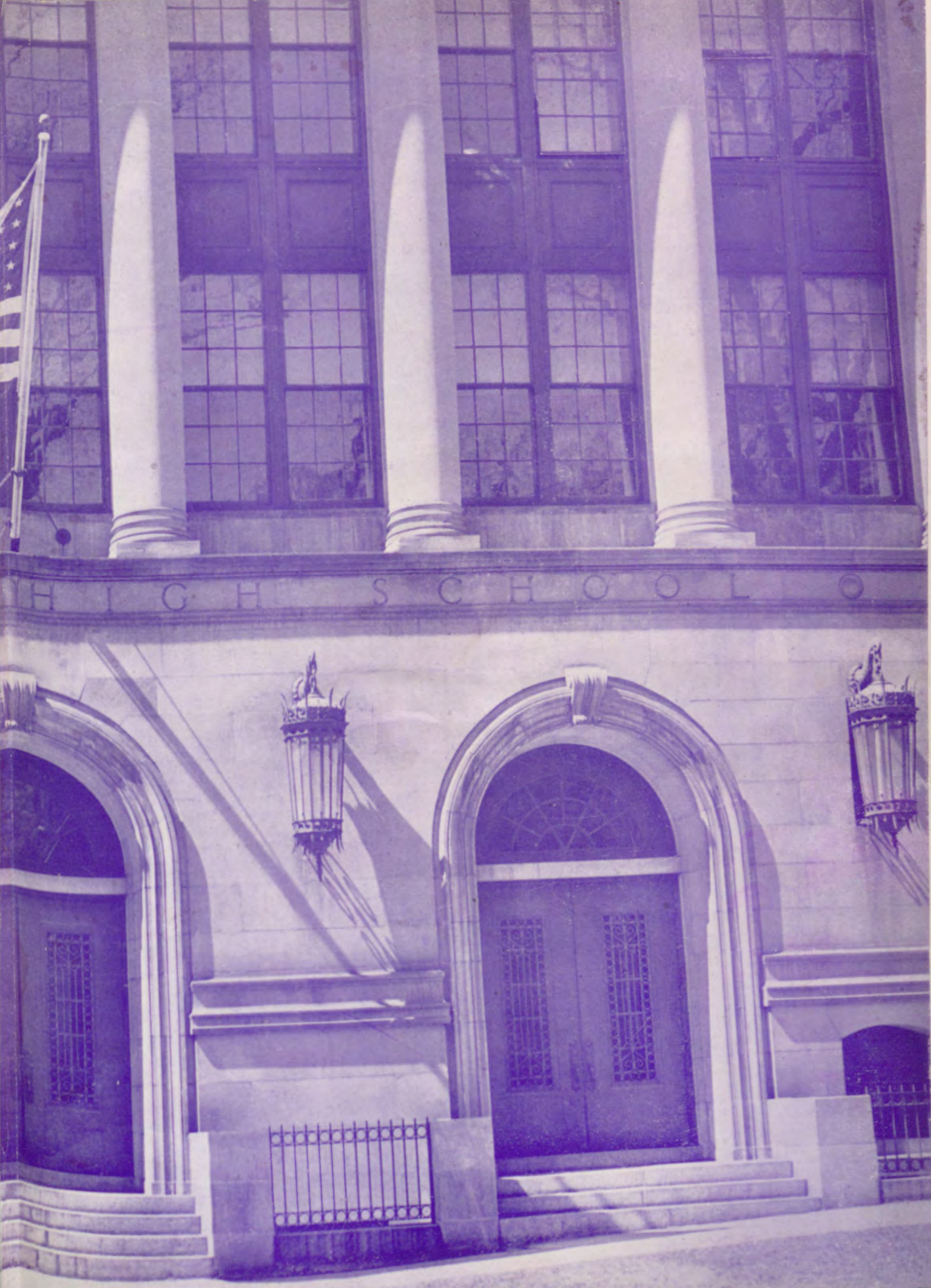

By formal dedication to her, our nation is part of her realm. “From her throne in Heaven she gives us her needed virtues and needed grace. 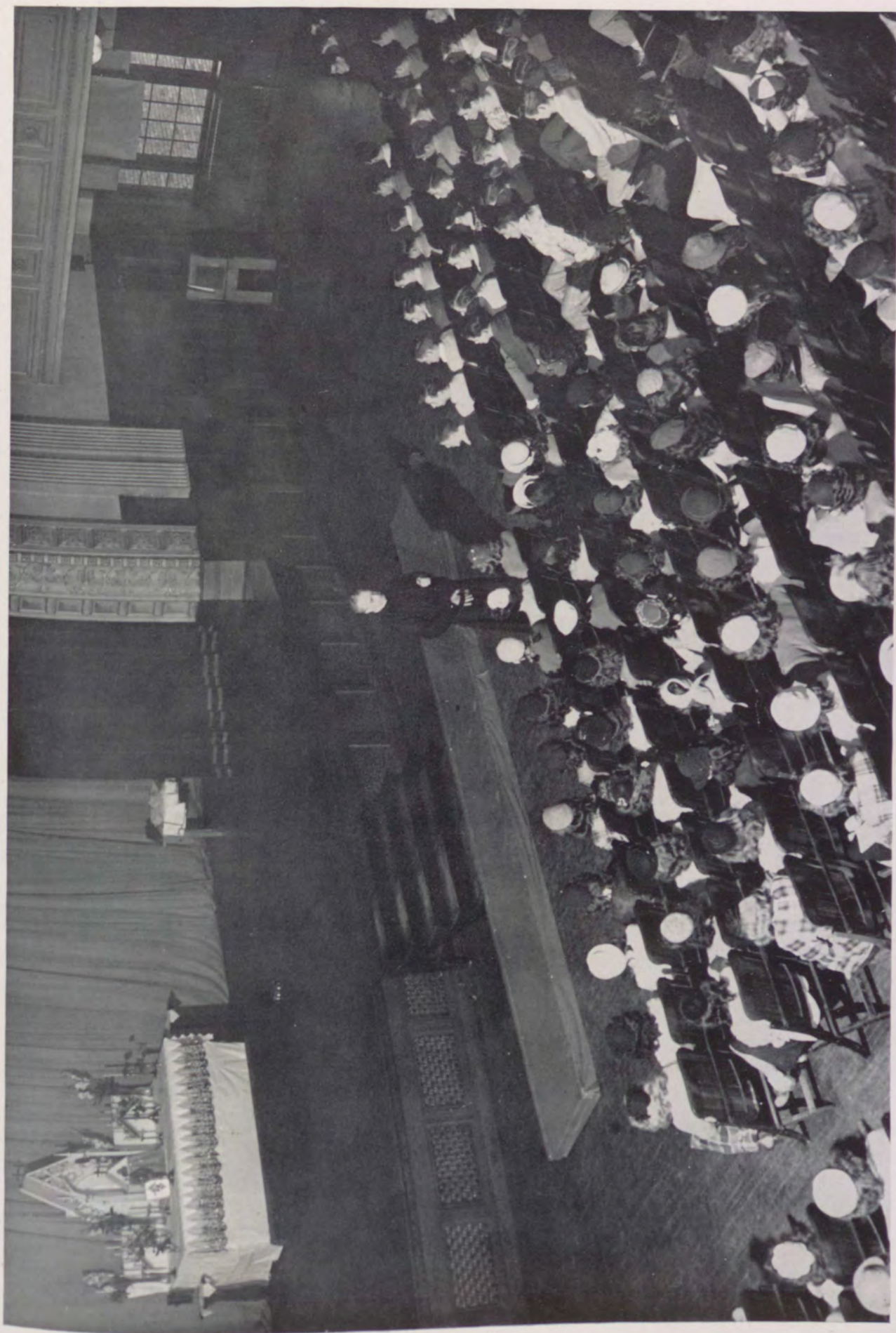

Sodality of the Immaculate Conception

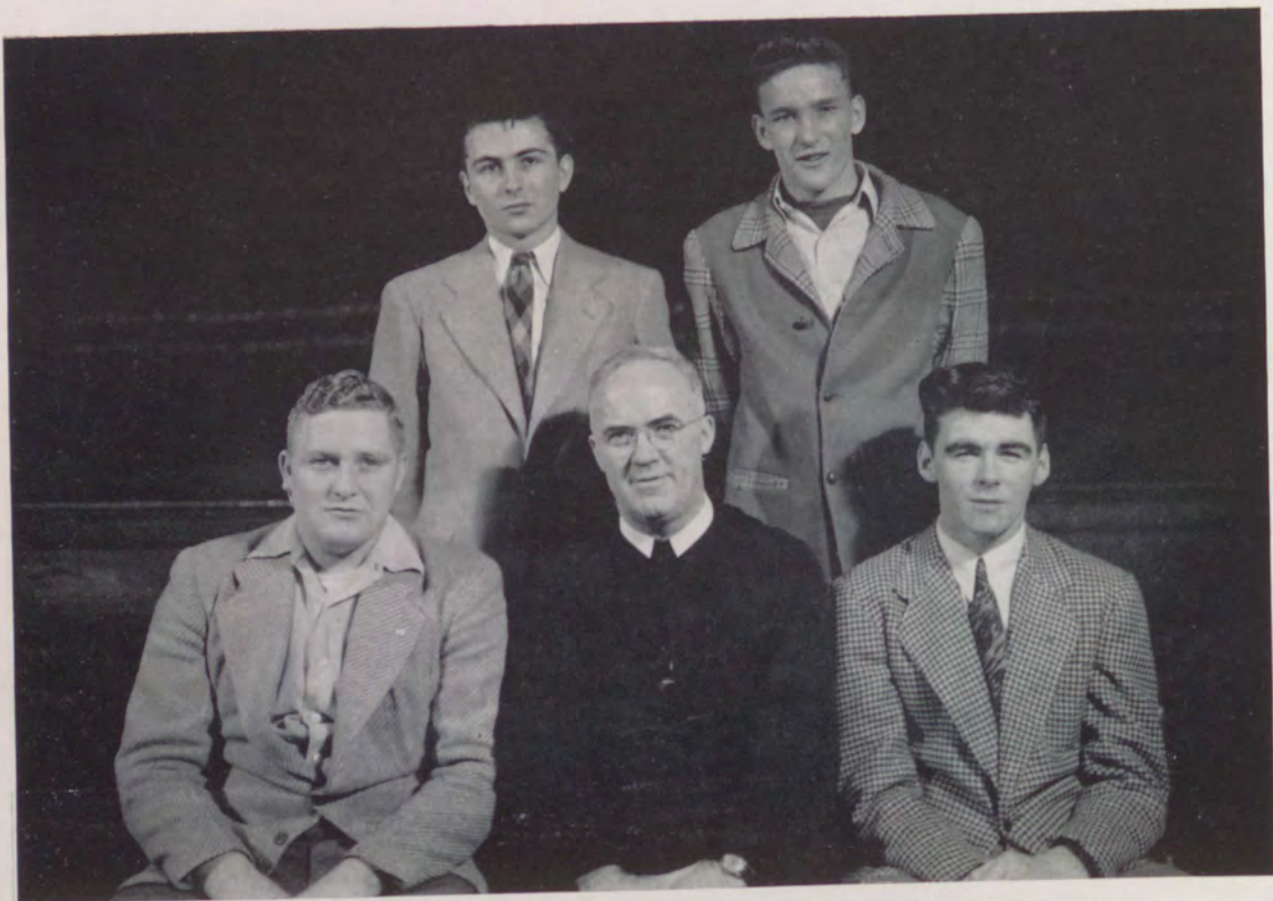

In answer to a call made by our principal, about eighty girls met to organize a spiritual council. We had long felt the need of a bond of unity among the girls of so many parishes to strengthen the spiritual life of the school. From this large group, we voted for two girls from each homeroom who would make up the Spiritual Council. 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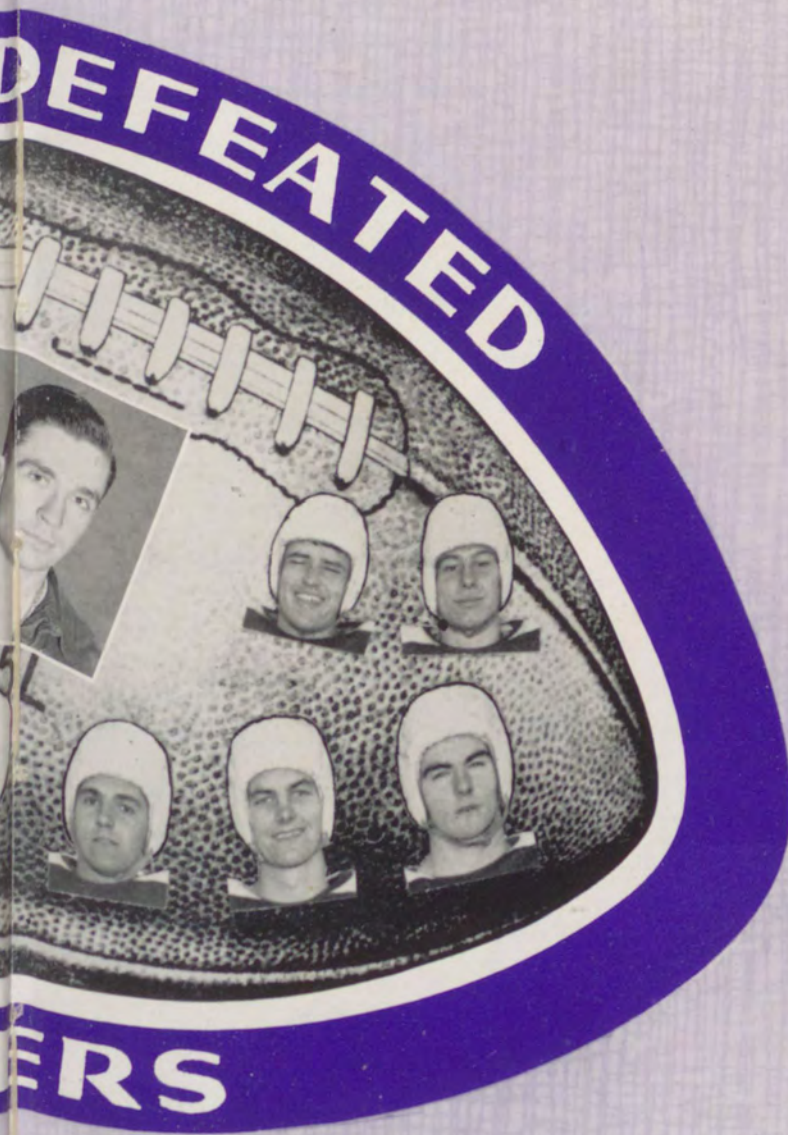
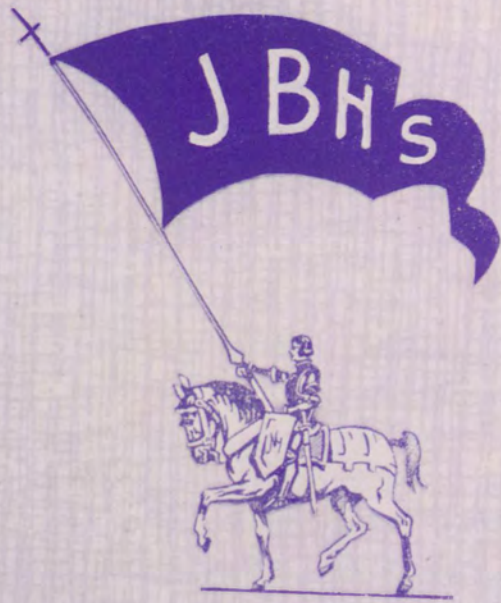
COACH NAT CROWLEY

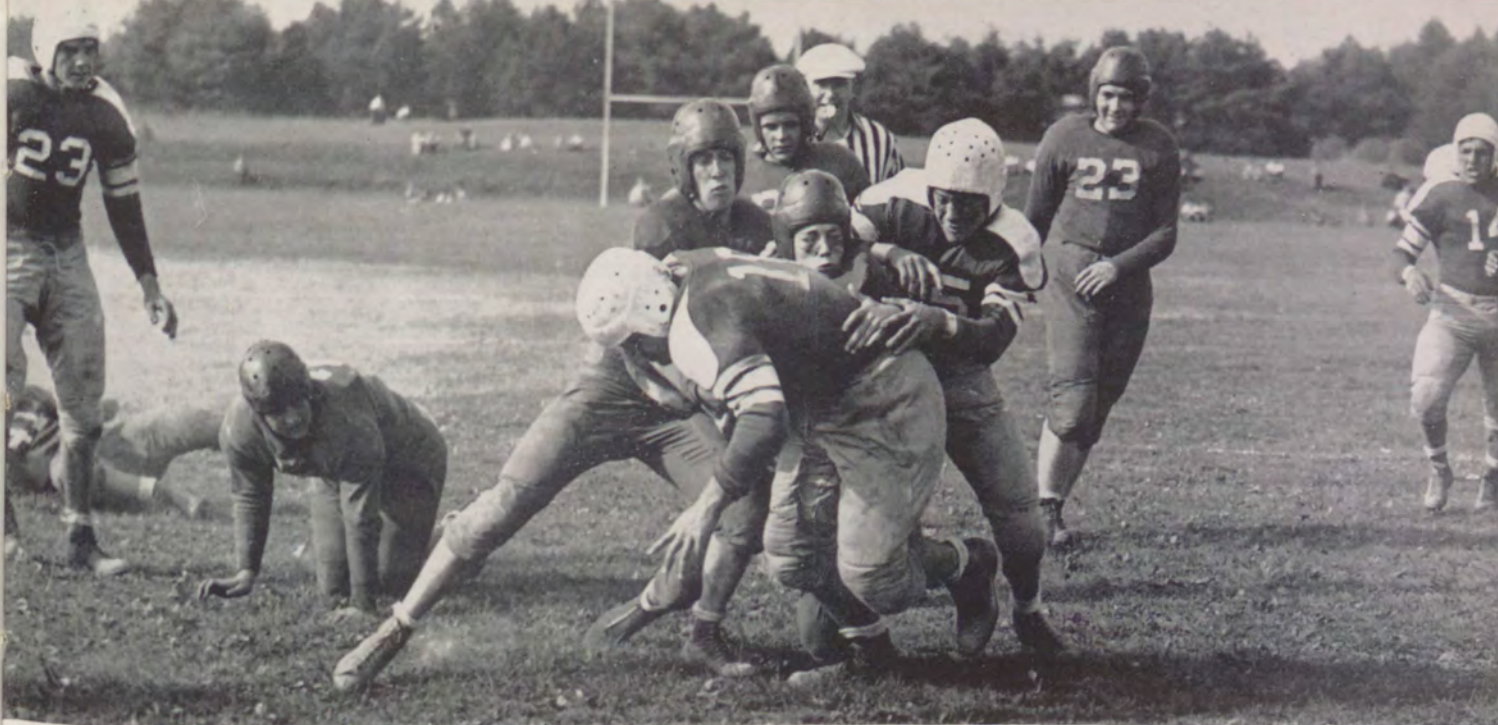

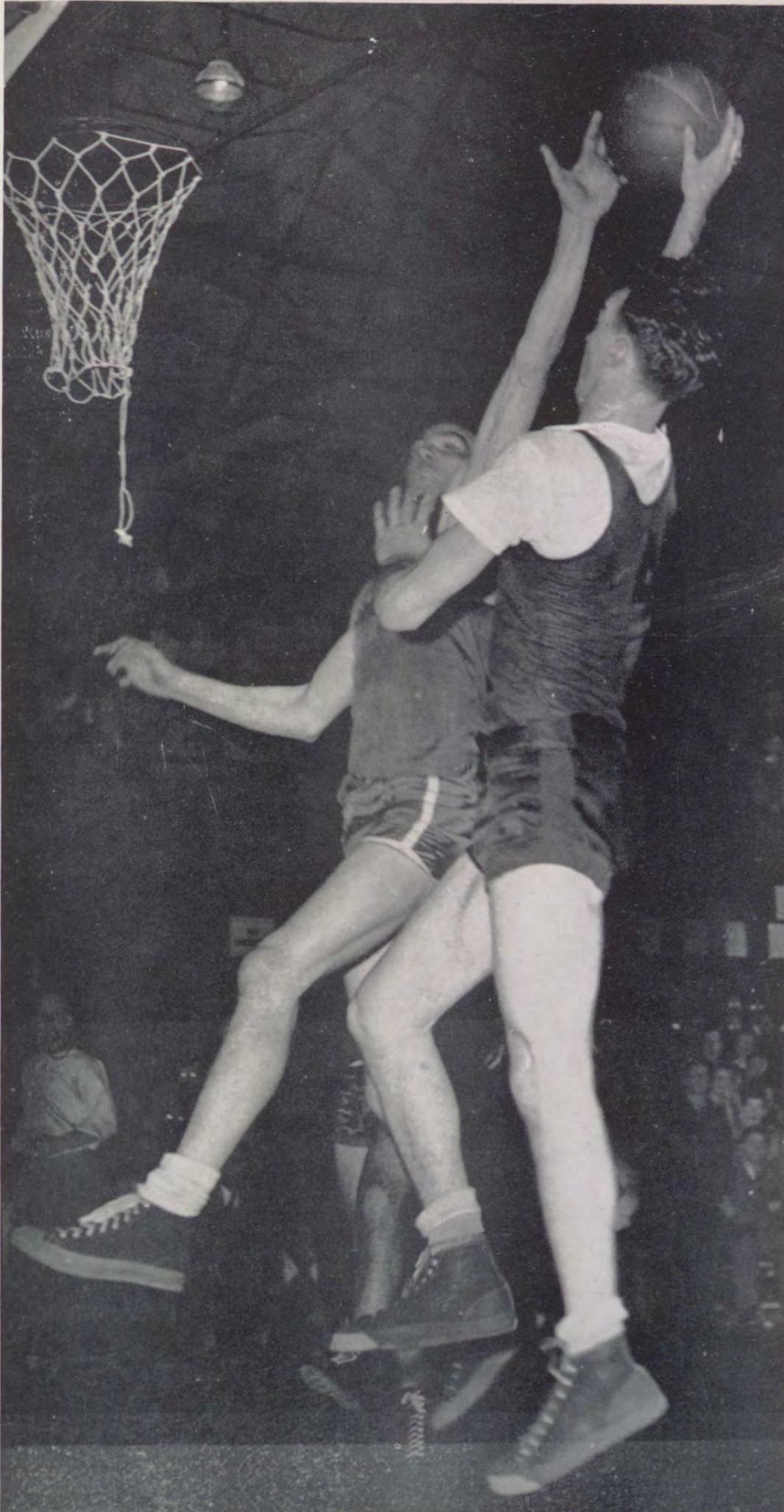

Never play any game of chance; avoid the temptation through fear that may not withstand it. Earn your money before you spend it, and never run in debt unless you can see a way to get out of it.

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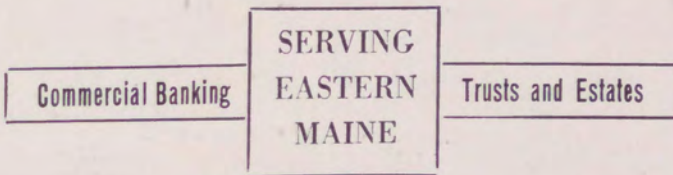
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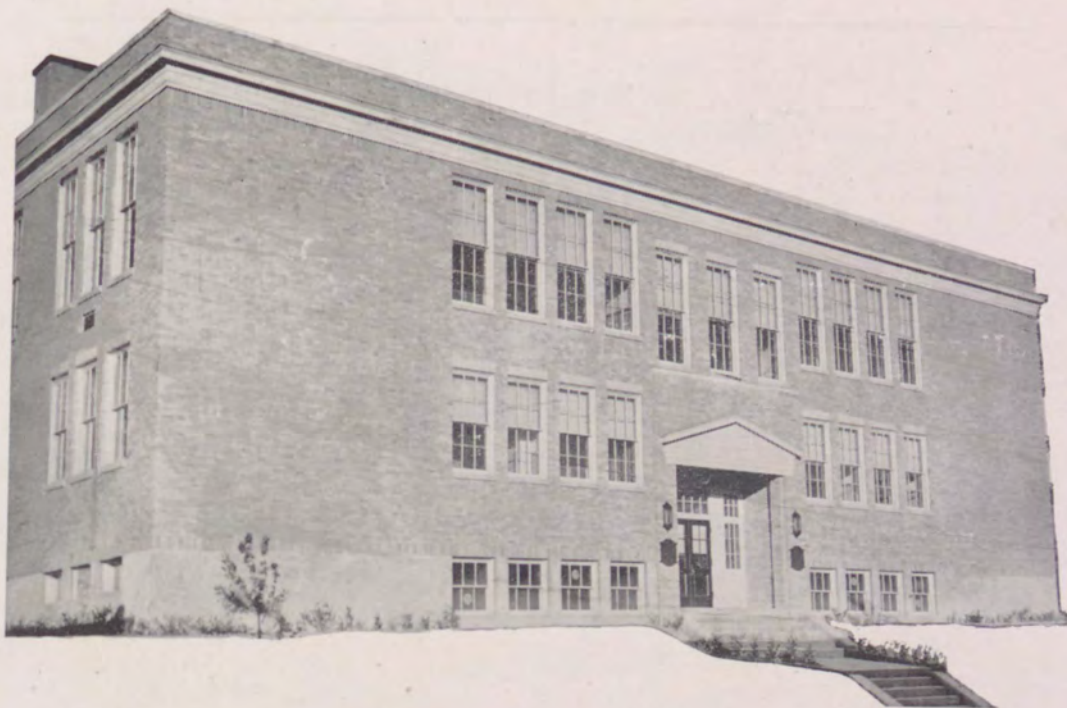
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
