Ten seniors out of a class 233 were declared Bangor High Scholars for maintaining a rank of 85 in every major subject each semester for five semesters. Principal Joseph B. Chaplin presented Scholarship Recognition Certificates to Bette Bailey, Barbara Head, Patricia Wilson, Mary Jean Chapman, Margaret Howatt, M. Jean Wyman, Patricia Hyson, Judy Phillips, Paul Brontas, and Ronald Gray.

Tentative lists of juniors and sophomores who so far in their courses have maintained a rank of 85 or better were read.

Alumni Honors

Since 1943, when the student council presented the first Scholarship Recognition Certificate, seventy-seven seniors have been so honored. This number represents less than five per cent of the 1658 students that have been graduated since that time. This fact well illustrates the high value placed on these certificates.

Bangor High School has always maintained a tradition of high scholastic achievement as is witnessed by the records of its alumni. In an attempt to present a standard or goal for the Bangor High School scholars of the future, the Oracle has investigated the records of the sixty-seven Scholars who are alumni. We must remember that these Scholars left Bangor High less than eight years ago and so we should not expect to find any millionaires or college presidents yet. Most of the Scholars who attended college were graduated from their institutions less than four years ago, but their records in college and achievements afterward have been worthy of admiration. Eighty-eight per cent of the Bangor High Scholars have attended college. Of those who attended college, twenty-five per cent received prematriculation scholarships. The group of scholars has representatives in over 19 different colleges and universities throughout the country. They have representatives in such institutions as University of Maine, University of Connecticut, Brown University, Boston University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Bowdoin, Bates, Radcliffe, Smith, Wellesley, Rosemont, Simmons, Tufts, Harvard, Yale, Maine Maritime Academy, and the United States Military Academy.

Few students will be able to equal the record of John Ballou. While in Bangor High, John was president of the student council, amember of the National Honor Society, and received a straight A average. He received a scholarship to the University of Maine, and, while there, maintained his high school scholastic average of A rank. John was graduated from the University and is now enrolled at Yale Law School.

Malcolm Stevenson of the class of 1946 has written a very admirable record for himself both in high school and in college. On looking over Malcolm's achievements in high school, we were able to make an interesting comparison. We found that his record has been completely paralleled by a member of the class of 1950. In high school both Malcolm Stevenson and Paul Broutas were French Medalists, members of the student council, members of the Debate, Dramatic, Public Affairs, Latin, and Science Clubs, members of the National Honor Society, both were speakers at Junior Exhibition, both were winners in the American Legion Oratorical Contest, both were editors of the Oracle, and both received scholarships to Bowdoin College. Malcolm has gone on in college to win the James Bowdoin scholarship, to become president of his fraternity, to be named a Rhodes Scholarship candidate, and to have amassed the longest list of student activities and achievements of any member of his class, which is the largest ever to be graduated from Bowdoin.

Former Scholars have received many scholarships since leaving Bangor High. Dorothy Averill won the Anne Stodder Scholarship at the U. of M. Patricia Palmer won a State Scholarship at Maine also, not to mention the one awarded Richard Searles this year.

Not all of the Bangor High Scholars had to go to college to make a record for themselves. Eleanor Prusaitis and Florence Gunn received positions at the City Hall. Miss Prusaitis is no longer a "Miss," for she was married early in 1950.

The girls demonstrated their prowess during the halves of the basketball and football games and at several parades.

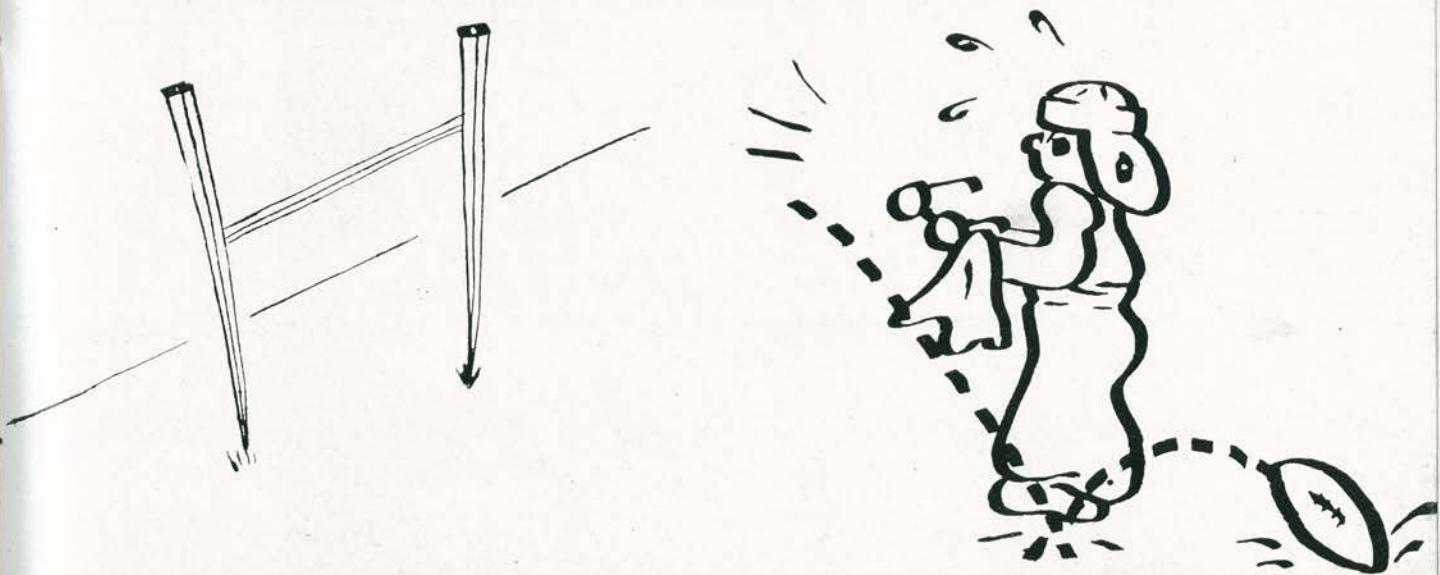

After splitting their first six games, Coach "Red" Barry's boys racked up an eight and two record to finish the season with an 11 and 5 slate, good enough to send them into the tourney. Quite erratic all through the season, the Rams made the outlook seem pretty dismal during the first

half of the season; they just didn't have it. Then a brilliant lineup change by Coach Barry started things popping. Presque Isle's Wildcats came down from Aroostook expecting victory No. 2 over the host club. The contingent from spudland wasn't even in the running; it was just the Crimson's night. They couldn't be stopped, racking up a 73-40 decision. Kern Feeney set the pace by bucketing 19 points, closely followed by Gary Burke, with 17.

Waterville, Houlton, and Winslow soon found out that the Crimson had too much for them, but it took a rejuvenated Crusader club from Bapst to become the third team in as many years to take the measure of the Rams at the Bangor Auditorium. The top scoring jaunt by a B. H. S. player, 21 points by Kern Feeney, just wasn't enough. For thrills, it was the best thus far in the season, running through an overtime; but it taught a costly lesson: Never, never take anything for granted.

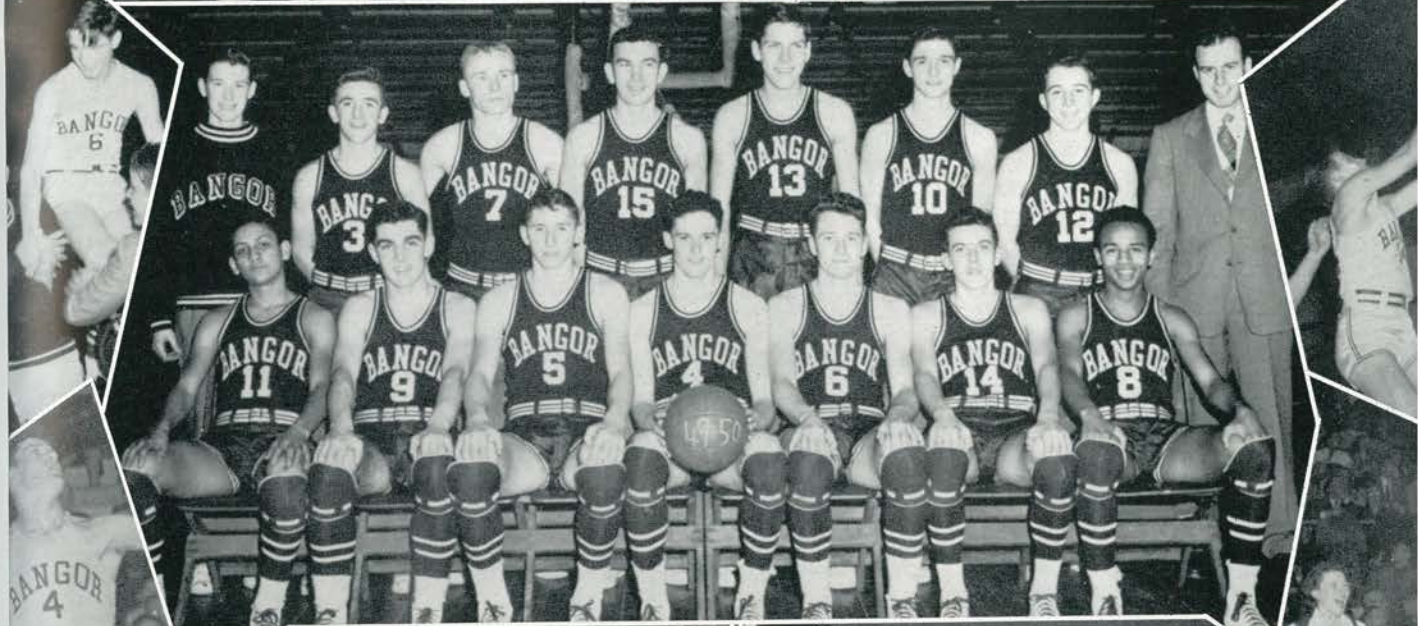
All season long, the arrival of the schoolboy wonders, Somerville High, was anticipated. The defending New England Champs were undefeated and Ronnie Perry, sought by no less than 48 colleges, was hitting for an amazing 50% of his shots. Win or lose, local fans were looking forward to seeing a great game, and they got it, as the inter-state rivals battled all the way in a torrid hoopfest. Barry's boys were great, forcing the visitors to a one point edge in an overtime. Once again Kern Feeney split the strings for 19.

The Eastern Maine Tourney is now history. Probably the most appreciated shot of the entire season was Walt Luro's memorable swisher which iced the opening Houlton game, 41-40. When things looked darkest, it was Billy Thibodeau who stole the show; his four timely points made the difference.

Those with weak hearts had best stay away from all games like the next-to-last and last-one. Battling for 32 minutes as if life itself depended on it, the Rams just weren't on enough. Residents of this city from six to sixty know now what that double overtime spelled. Burke, Feeney, and Luro each dropped in 11 points, but it was Chuck Mooney's all-round tournament play that really kept the Rams in the running.

SPRING SPORTS

In spite of all possible complications from the elements (rain, snow, cold, hail, sleet, earthquakes, monsoons and what have you), spring athletics began with the arrival of the proverbial robin and were in full swing as we went to press early in May. The baseball and track teams had begun to tackle their schedules as per usual, but there was also a newcomer invading the ranks—tennis, and the tennis club had also begun to pave the way for that sport's official inauguration at Bangor High.

BASEBALL

A couple of natty four-hitters by Bentley Herbert and Ronnie Staples, backed up by some formidable slugging, particularly on the part of Captain Lloyd Baker, caused local diamond partisans to sit up and take notice early in the season.

Barry's Bombers scalped Old Town's Injuns with a fine exhibition of horsehide warfare in their season's opener by a 10-1 tally. Bentley Herbert drew the opening day flinging assignment and allowed only

four safeties while whiffing 14 would-be hitters. Big Ben was really the master of the situation and was never really in hot water. The Crimson keystone combination of Arsenault and Baker supplied the batting punch as Johnny Arsenault's two hits gave him a perfect day and second baseman Lloyd Baker banged the long ball for a single, a double, and a triple. Catcher Don Hamilton and outfielder Billy Downs smacked the other two safeties for the Rams. Dick Merriman pulled his club's fielding gem of the day when he raced in from center field to nab an Old Town fly off his shoestrings.

Four-hitters seemed to have come in with the short hairdos, for Ron Staples handcuffed the Tigers of Fort Fairfield with a like amount of bingles in the Rams' next outing and insured his team's victory by clouting a pair himself; the final score was 8-0. Staples' brilliant speed bewildered the losers, who really got into the game only for a brief moment in the eighth, when a Tiger single moved a base runner to second. Quick thinking by Don

Hamilton nabbed the runner at third, however, as the Ram catcher rifled to third baseman Gary Burke for the out. Arsenault, Burke, Simpson, and Hamilton hit safely once each for the Crimson, and Staples and clean-up batter Lloyd Baker

A young infield composed of Bobby Simpson at first, Lloyd Baker at second, Johnny Arsenault at short, and Gary Burke at third should provide a lot of trouble for opposing batters. Dick Hardy, Phil Pearson, and Carl Green, all veteran outfielders, will be doing most of the pasture work for Coach Barry, together with Gary Downs and Dick Merriman. Downs and Luro will be assigned the tasks of coaching first and third bases respectively.

TRACK

Undefeated in high school competition at this writing, "Cy" Perkins' B. H. S. cinder crew is preparing for dual meets with Waterville and M. C. I., and then, the long awaited state meet. For two straight years the Queen City sent the track power of the state to the championship meet at Colby and both years Lady Luck chose to look the other way as the South Portland Capers sneaked by the Rams by a margin of victory too infinitesimal to mention without shuddering just a wee bit. This year, however, it doesn't look as if the Crimson have the right label, lacking the power of previous seasons, but could very well pull a dark horse act.

On April 27, the Harlow Street spikers opened their current season by meeting the powerful Colby Frosh at Waterville, inaugurating the new Mayflower Hill track. The frosh, boasting two na-

tional champions and the conditioning of a full indoor season, had too much for the locals and topped them, 66-50. Bangor, however, displayed unexpected potency in the field events, garnering 33 points out of the possible 54. Mike Collins, definitely a threat to state record holder Mel Totman of Houlton, heaved the discus 138 feet, five inches, and Keith Connors nabbed the javelin throw with a 143 foot toss. Joe Bernard, who racked up 14 points, topped Colby's Jim Bernard in the high jump.

Alma mater placed a solid second in a four-way meet at Orono the next week, but the Maine yearlings walked off with the scoring honors. John Bapst and Old Town were well behind the Rams, however. Joltin' Joe Bernard stole the show by shattering his own Bangor High record in the high jump by hurling himself 5' 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ ", while compiling 14 points for the second straight outing. Joe annexed a first in the high hurdles, second in the lows, and third in the broad jump. Mike Collins was the second top Ram with 8 points, fashioned from a winning discus toss and a second in the shot, and Myles Striar followed with 5, collected in the sprints. John Wibby turned in an outstanding performance while finishing third in the 880.

Quite fed up with their two defeats, the Crimson evened things up against Skowhegan by whipping the Indians, 70-47. Mike Collins, Joe Bernard, and Ed MacDonald set the pace with double victories, but Collins' 140 foot discus toss was the outstanding performance of the day. Bernard rolled up 16 points, bringing his season's total to 42 in three meets. The

top thrill of the afternoon came when Vern Holyoke's last minute kick enabled him to finish a winner in the mile. Other firsts were turned in by Dave Deering, Bob Weatherbee, Jake Webb, and Myles Striar.

TENNIS

Outstanding for its absence at B. H. S. has been the game of tennis, which is steadily gaining in popularity throughout the country. Deering, Kents Hill, Portland, Lewiston, Edward Little, M. C. I., Cony, Milo, Houlton, Presque Isle, and other Maine institutions now field a court crew each spring, and Bangor is on the way to joining them.

Functioning for its second straight year, the tennis club, although working on a club basis, will seek competition with other schools in the future if it is at all possible. In fact, as we went to press, Bangor was planning entries in the coming tournament at the University of Maine.

Bob LePage, a junior at Maine and co-holder of the intra-mural doubles crown, is the adviser for the tennis club, assisted by Captain Arthur Wade and Sgt. Edward Sheinfeld. Captain Wade, incidentally, played No. 2 at West Point.

Practice sessions for the club are now mainly devoted to form in serving and return. Outstanding prospects include Mark Lieberman, who is the club's president, Gail Wicks, John Barrows, Maurice Beane, and Pauline Hamilton.

BASKETBALL

Topping the scorers with a 12.3 average for the regular season, "Cannonball" Kern Feeney ran up a total of 210 points for the season. Kern, who played jayvee ball last season, was the surprise of the 49-50 hoopsters. His rifling pivot shots with both teams moved the lights of the Auditorium scoreboard like a pinball machine.

Sending 140 points through the nets, Captain Bentley Herbert added those buckets from the side with deadly accuracy. A steady scorer, Bent tossed them in when needed.

Probably seeing more action than any other Bangor player, Gary Burke combined a brilliant floor game with 131 points worth of leather.

Next was the man who lives to play basketball, Chuck Mooney. His 115 points included a couple of sensational "buzzer shots" and the points that sent the Stearns tourney game and Somerville game into overtimes. Captain-elect, Charlie will be a man to watch in State of Maine circles.

Our two fiery, smooth ball handlers, Walt Luro and Alan Wise copped 61 points apiece. Those tricky passes from Luro should set up a lot of tallies next season.

Hard-driving Donnie Hamilton found the hoop for 42 points, to round out most of the scoring.
