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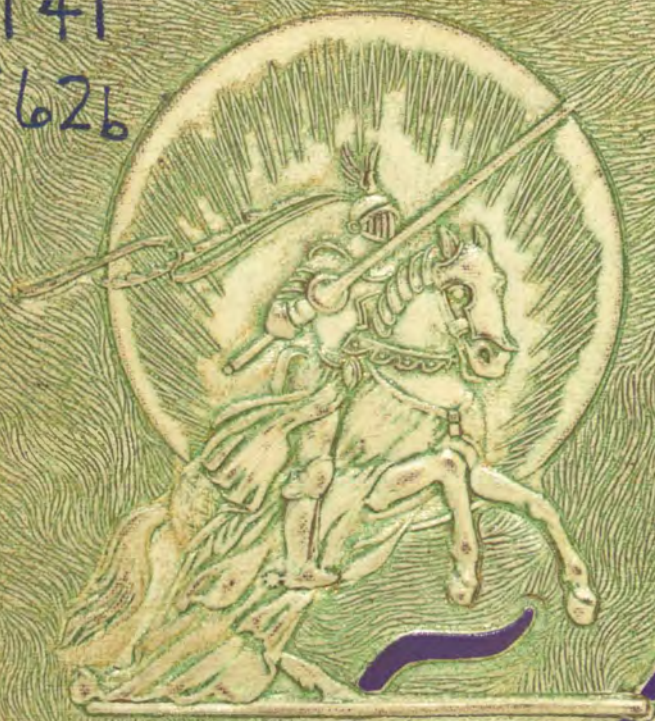

# To the Reader

THERE IS AN OLD AND VENERABLE CUSTOM, MUCH LESS OBSERVED NOW THAN IN FORMER YEARS, THAT THE

author of a book write a few lines to his "dear reader" in which he rambled about on some point or other, sometimes justified his work, occasionally presented his *apologia*. We eagerly availed ourselves of this privilege in order to elaborate on some points that we would like to have evident.

Caught up as we are in a "New World," we decided to "face lift" our Annual. This is no reflection on the past. The name BAPSTONIAN, which identified our Annual for years, is an old and highly revered one. The substitution of THE CRUSADER will undoubtedly cause some pain (and comment) from alumnae and alumni. We offer no apology, however—though the Girls' Department may not look kindly upon what looks like a "steal" of the name of the school paper—for over the years the name *The Crusaders* has become synonymous with school activities to such an extent that it seemed logical to us to replace the name of our Annual. Strong agitation on this point in recent years crystallized us in this decision.

In keeping with the idea of change, we also completely revised the face of the cover. A great deal of consideration went into the new arrangement. We hope that you will receive the design approvingly. As originally projected, the arrangement and coloring seemed both handsome and symbolic. Naturally we retained the crusader impression and our highly respected school colors of purple and white. Even the gold overtone

has a significance. We used it in the sentiment of our title: "Golden Days, in the happy sunshine of our youth . . ." During our years at JOHN BAPST we have risen with the crest of a wave of high spirit and morale evident in the students. We hope THE CRUSADER exhales some of this spirit in cover and pages.

We could hardly take leave of the "old" without reference to it. We quote the commentary from the last BAPSTONIAN. It's borrowed, and though the thought is ancient it is ever new:

## Football Report

Inspired by the success of last year's team, the 1957 edition of the Crusaders was ready for action when the season opened. With hard, rough blocking and tackling, we made breaks come our way and posted a fine 5-3-1 record for the season.

In our opener, we stopped Crosby of Belfast in a wide open, but Crusader dominated, game. A bitter, hard fought battle was lost the next week to Old Town, 13-6. This game, which could have gone either way, was not decided until the last minutes. We went on to Millinocket where the surprisingly strong Minutemen, despite the rushing of powerful left-half Tom Willett, who accounted for 210 yards, held us to a tie at 14 all.

Madison and Rockland presented no problem as we easily submerged them in the next two games. With fullback Ed Paschal scoring two, one on an interception and the other on a bruising run, we nipped Fairfield, 12-7.

Two weeks later we bombed Bangor, 13-0 for our most cherished win of the year. Tireless charging line play, and brilliant running by Tom Willett and Jerry McGuire, spelled out the victory for us. We were the first Bapst team to top Bangor since the undefeated season of 1948.

Possessed with confidence, we journeyed to Skowhegan where we were crushed by a huge line and fast backfield, receiving our worst drubbing of the season. Our last game, postponed from an earlier date as a result of "flu" casualties, was another hard fought contest against Brewer, broken open in the fourth quarter by the Witches.

Our defensive work, which normally doesn't receive much credit, rates special mention. Fairfield, except for one pass which resulted in a long run for a touchdown, never penetrated beyond our 35 yard line. Bangor on one series of plays squeezed up to our three inch line and was



stopped cold. Ed Pooler must have set some sort of record with eight blocked punts for the season. Brewer's fine running attack was almost completely shackled by Lousier on one end and Pooler on the other. Shorette and Robinson were outstanding in every game.

Congratulations are extended to Co-captains Tom Willett and Ed Paschal; to George Shorette, Ed Pooler, Mike Muldoon, John Kelley, Bruce Bromby, Ernie Blaisdell, George Pooler, and Bill Robinson for their clean, but hard, sportsman-like play. Bapst received special honors as hard-running left-halfback Tommy Willett, our leading scorer and ground gainer, and 200 lb. tackle George Shorette were placed on the All-Eastern-Maine first eleven.

With McGuire, Vreeland, Dowd, Hayden, Shanley, Curtis, Lousier, and Verow for a nucleus, and the self-confidence engendered by achievement, prospects "look great for '58" too.

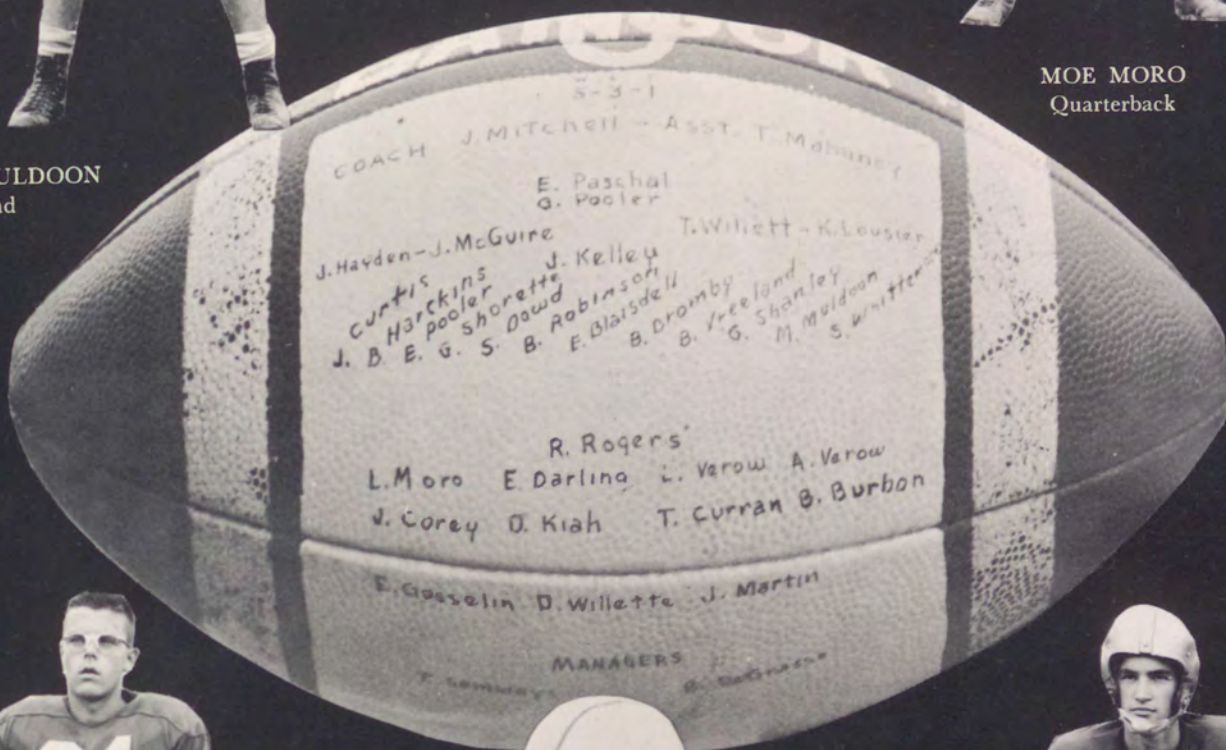

## BAPST HAS ARRIVED

Taking their cue from the football team, the Crusaders entered a winning season. With many a beautiful eye-catching play, we closed the record book with a 14-6 entry, as against the 9-9 entry last year. Like last year, we were called "Hot and Cold Bapst"; but, unlike last year, we had the honor of having one of our players called "Little Bob Cousy" by the sports writers. This, of course, is Bob McAllister, one of the finest players in anyone's book. His total score for the season was 387 points, and he averaged 18.4 a game. In addition, Mac was high scorer in the P.V.C. and second highest in the state.

Bob Reynolds played the other guard position excellently. An able shot he accounted for many a point, a good deal of the time when the scores were close. When rebounds were needed, you could be sure "Big Bob" DeGrass would be there to get them, and if he weren't, Tom Jordan or Andy Akins would be. Not that either of them got only rebounds, because Tom and Andy are fighters, to whom control of the ball is a fetish. Both are also able shots. In addition, Tom is a master at defensive play. He retrieves the ball when it is wild, steals it when he wants it, and just plain grabs for it when he doesn't have it.

The seniors on our team gave us a few thrills this season. Ed McCarthy sank a 55 foot shot during the Cheverus game. Bob Cormier was the one who made 90 for us at Old Town, after receiving a beautiful pass from George Pooler.

We began the season with a youthful and relatively inexperienced team. We had not one senior on the starting five. The five starters were three juniors and two sophomores. Mac was the only veteran; the others saw some action as subs last year. In spite of this, they went into action and turned in an excellent record. At the finish of the season, they had tied Brewer for the P.V.C. crown, which is no minor feat.

To crown a beautiful season, the Crusaders made the Eastern Maine Class L Tournament, for the first time in the past few seasons. Sure, we remained there for only one game, but this one game was the shining beacon, announcing that John Bapst had arrived. Nothing could have done it better. The game was an exciting one that had the spectators on their feet most of the time. Stearns won, but in order to do so, they had to fight as if they were fighting for their very lives.

Among other accomplishments which may be credited to the Crusaders are these: During the first Bangor game, we played before a crowd of approximately 5,000 people, the largest attendance of an in-season, high school game in the history of schoolboy basketball in Maine; and we were one of the few teams to reach 90 points on Old Town's floor.

Our only losses of the season—two each to Bangor, Stearns, and Brewer—were as close as could be and were not decided until the final seconds of the game. The team played as best they could, and they fought hard. The spectators could not say that we had played a bad game, because, even though we lost, they were courageous, action-packed contests.

With the exception of Bob Reynolds, we will have our entire starting team back next year. The future holds only the brightest prospects for the Purple and White. Next year is the year for Bapst to go all the way, straight down the line, right to Boston.

Of course, to have any kind of team at all, you need a coach. We at Bapst have one of the best in the business, Coach Mitchell, who took an inexperienced, almost green team, and made

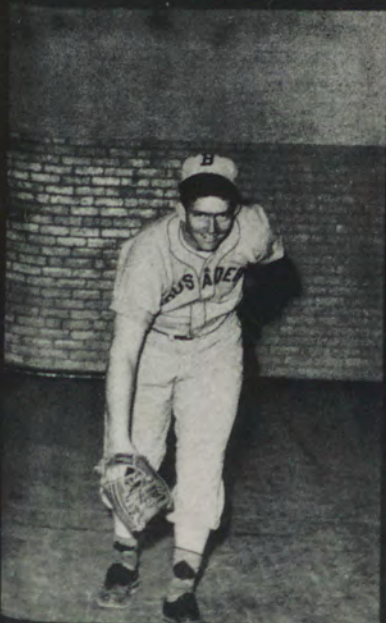

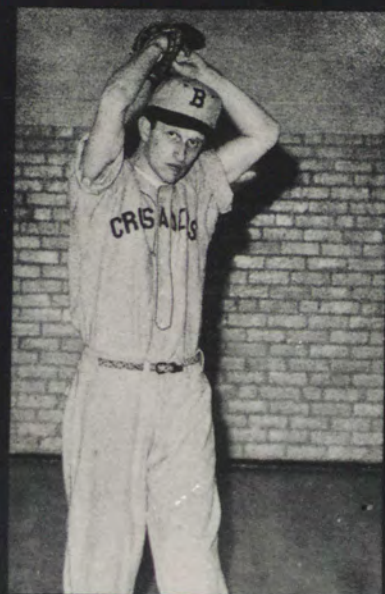

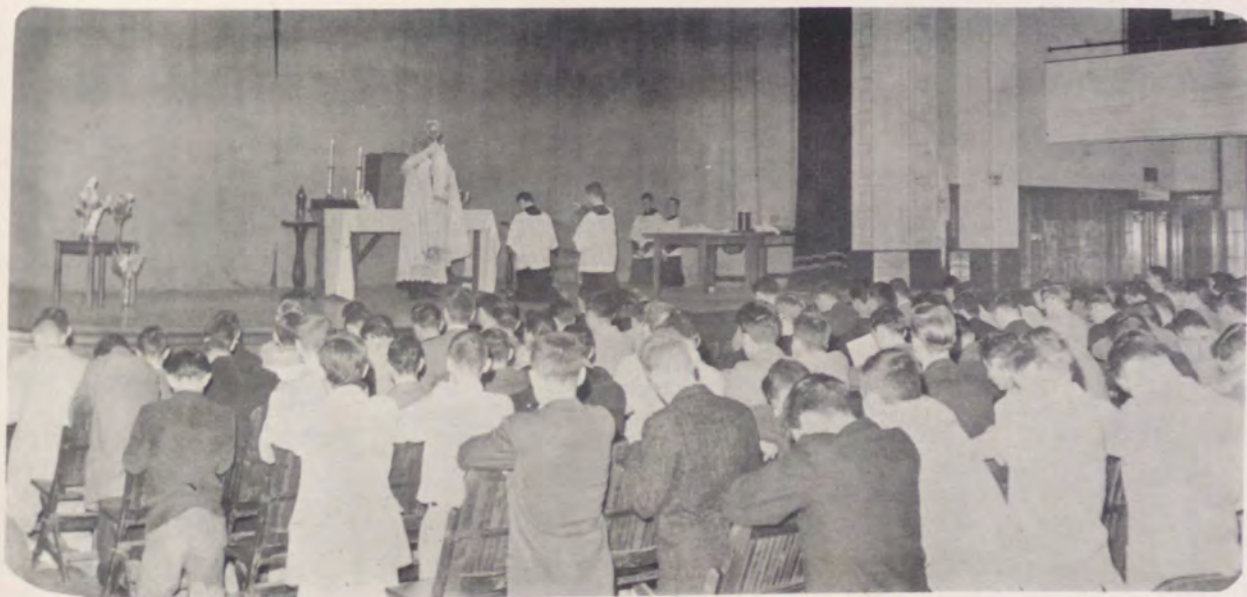
