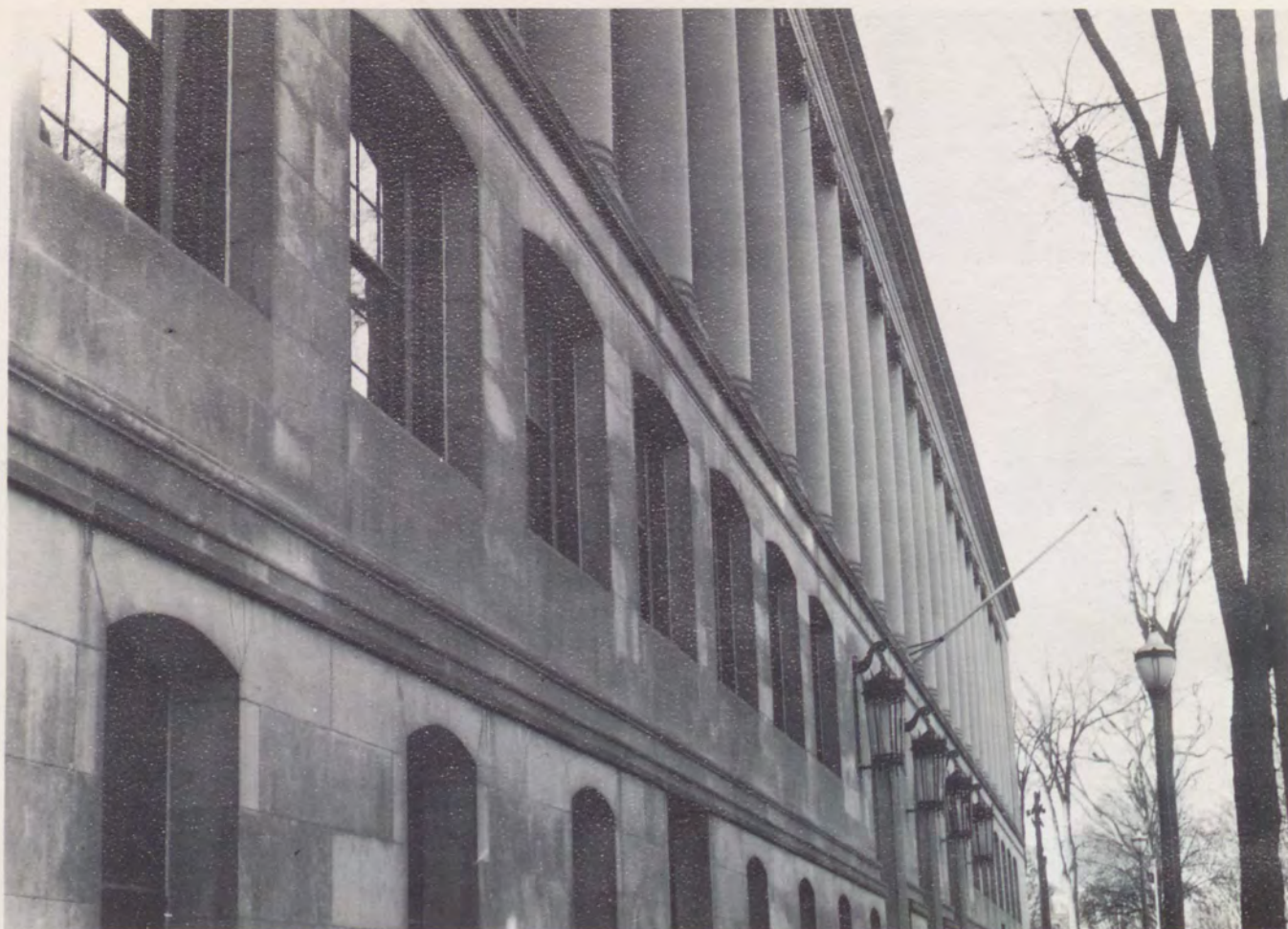

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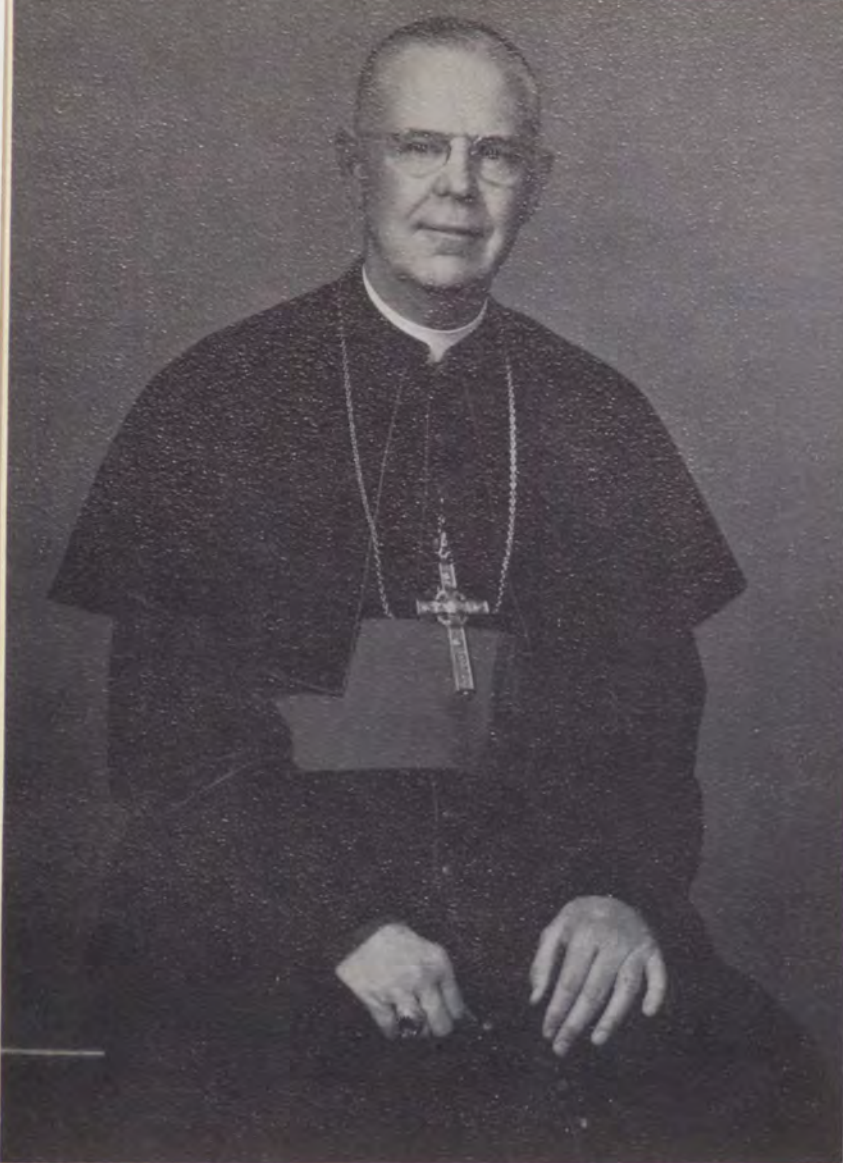


## *His Holiness Pope Paul VI*

LIFE Magazine comments: "Pope Paul's hugely successful visit to New York, following his earlier pilgrimages to Jerusalem and Bombay, suggest that the world of the spirit may have something it has lacked a long time, an earthly spokesman of nearly universal authority. This authority was first focused in the Papacy for our age by the obvious saintliness of Paul's immediate predecessor, but it is also focused there because of the Catholic Church's titanic effort, begun by John but continuing under Paul, to make ancient certainties more relevant to the anxieties of the modern world, anxieties

both ancient and modern...To make this connection has always been the central problem of Christendom. It is the problem of relating God's impossible commandments to his flawed and negligent world, and of making man's impossible behavior worthy of a better one. "How similar this is to the statement that the Church is ever ancient, ever new!" We at John Bapst are part of that Church. We are conscious of our human dignity and we seek to teach all men the truth that "shall make them free."

## *To The Faithful:*

By the grace of God, the year 1965 marks the 100th year of service of the Sisters of Mercy to the people of the State of Maine. I rejoice with these religious on the occasion of their jubilee, and consider it my duty to join them in prayers of gratitude to God. At the same time I cordially invite you all, clergy, Religious and faithful, to add your thanksgiving to ours.

It is difficult to measure in words what the true accomplishments of these Sisters have been. They came to Maine at a time when most eyes in America were tuned to the fruitful lands in the West. The small band of Sisters who traveled with their superior, the intrepid Mother M. Xavier Warde, fixed their gaze on the souls of the neglected Abnaki and Penobscot Indians in the Bangor area. From the small beginning there is hardly a people or an area in the vast span of our state, that has not been touched in some way by these Sisters. Often they have sown and others have reaped. But God, Who has brought them to this jubilee, has in His Own Eternal Now permitted a great harvest to come. Faithful to their vowed service to the poor, the sick, and the ignorant, they have labored in orphanages, homes for the aged, and hospitals, as well as schools on the elementary, high school, and college levels.

But it is not in institutions that their greatest contribution lies. Rather, it is in the innumerable souls they have reached through their dedicated service to God. In the final analysis it is the glory of God that should motivate all who are baptized in Christ so that they, dying, may share His Resurrection.

I am but one of the seven Bishops under whom the Sisters of Mercy have worked and one soul of the thousands these Religious have touched. In my administration I have witnessed their loyal performance of duty and, because of it, have felt strengthened in my burdensome tasks. Therefore, I happily intone my own TE DEUM and again invite you all to add your hymn of thanksgiving, at the same time beseeching God to continue His blessings on His devoted children to Christ Jesus.

# *His Mercy Is From Generation To Generation*

The Mother-Foundress of this Congregation, Catherine McAuley, received the impetus for her life's work from the sight of the extreme conditions suffered by the poor, the sick, and the uneducated of Dublin, Ireland, during the early part of the 19th century. Armed with a love for God, love for his poor, and personal experience, she resolved upon "going about doing good."

It was not until 1822, however, that she was able to accomplish things "on a large scale." With the erection of a House of Mercy on Baggott Street in Dublin, it soon became evident that the harvest "was great, but the laborers few." Volunteers came, however, who endeavored to assist Catherine in keeping pace with the multiplicity of her affairs.

After weathering various crises that beset all infant congregations of religious, the group was no longer on uncertain ground and flourished greatly. The ultimate objective of these devoted women was to win souls for the greater honor and glory of God, but Mother McAuley believed, "It will be well to relieve their distress first, since we are ever more disposed to receive admonition and instruction from those who evince compassion toward us."

In her long missionary life, Mother Francis Xavier Warde, an early follower of Mother McAuley, endeavored to imitate her patron saint, covering more territory, it is said, than even the great St. Paul himself. The same love of God and neighbor burned in her heart as in his, enabling her to overcome every difficulty that beset her path.

On December 10, 1843, Mother Warde and a small band of seven companions reached New York, from which they traveled to Philadelphia and thence to Pittsburgh. After establishing several foundations in the country, Mother Warde, in 1865, accompanied the first band of missionaries to Bangor, Maine, and on subsequent journeys visited the Indian reservations. They called her their "Great White Mother" and she reciprocated their affection. Mother Xavier Warde brought with her to the New World seven chosen souls and at her death, left thousands in 58 dioceses of the United States. Her faith and confidence in God were unlimited and he never betrayed her trust!



# Achieving

School time gives us time to think about ourselves too. Where are we going?



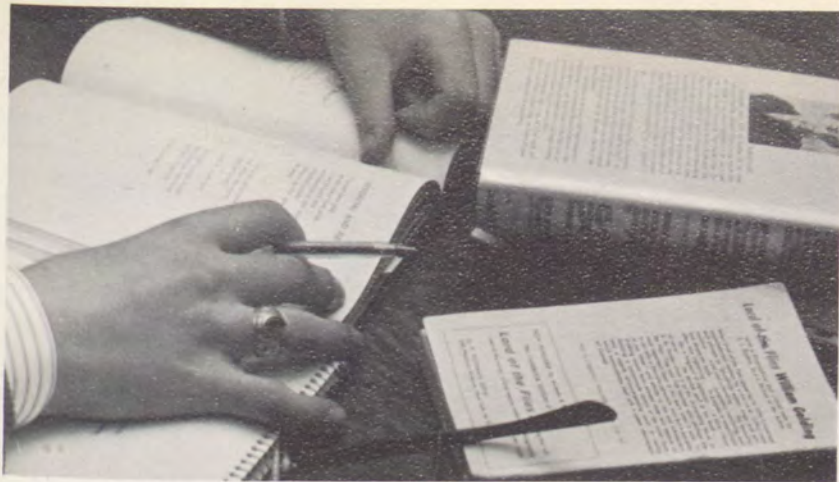

# *Loyal To Our School Forever In Defeat Or Victory*



Ron Soucie has been one of the finest athletes ever to wear the purple and white of John Bapst High School. The 5'11", 170 pounder, shattered all scoring and passing records in football, averaged 24 points a game in basketball for the past few seasons and completely rewrote the pitching record book in baseball.

In football, Soucie was named all Eastern Maine and All Conference. He holds 16 records, chief among which are:

- 22 TD passes in a career
- 51 pass completions in one season
- 134 pass completions in a career
- 204 yds passing in one game
- 849 yds passing in one season
- 2107 yds passing in a career
- 10 touchdowns scored in one season
- 21 touchdowns scored in a career
- 69 points scored in one season
- 144 points scored in a career

He was a key in leading the Crusaders to two straight State Championships.

In basketball, Soucie has been the heart of the team for the past three years during which he hit in the middle 30's in points in over a dozen times.



In baseball, for the past three years Soucie has struck out over 200 batters a season, posted 8 no-hitters, and won over 40 ball games, while leading the Crusaders to one of the finest high school records, not only in the state of Maine, but in the country as well.

Though it is ordinarily not the task of a high school annual to single out a particular student in this manner, we, the coaches at John Bapst, feel such recognition is well earned and would hope that such devotion and enthusiasm as Ron has shown will be emulated by all present and future Crusaders.

# We Did It Again

JOHN BAPST BLANKS BREWER, 7-0; SHARES TITLE  
UNBEATEN, UNTIED AGAIN

The John Bapst Crusaders won a share of the State Class B. Football championship for the second straight year and posted their second straight undefeated, untied season Friday night, November 5, by taking a 7-0 decision from Brewer before over 5,000 fans at Doyle field.

Ken Perrone's Crusaders scored in the opening quarter and held off several serious Brewer threats in the second half to run their consecutive games won to 18. The last Bapst loss was in the final game of 1963 to Brewer.

A powerful Crusader defense stopped Brewer's ground game and, although the Witches moved well via the air route in the last two periods, Bapst held inside the ten twice, posting their 7th shutout in nine games this fall.

## THIRD ANNUAL P.T.C. TEAM

John Bapst placed five players on the third annual All Pine Tree Conference Football team. League champion John Bapst placed Ron Soucie, Gus Ciano, and John Heuer on the offensive team, and Marsh Soldati and Ed Thorne on the defensive team.

SOUKIE, according to coach Ken Perrone: "Is one of the most outstanding athletes in the history of John Bapst. He averaged 24 points a game in basketball, pitched 6 no-hitters and set 11 school records in football."

CIANO, 175-pound halfback, was the leading ground gainer for John Bapst, and scored 8 touchdowns in 7 league games. He was a record-breaking pass receiver, "and he was the boy the ball went to when the going got rough," says Perrone.

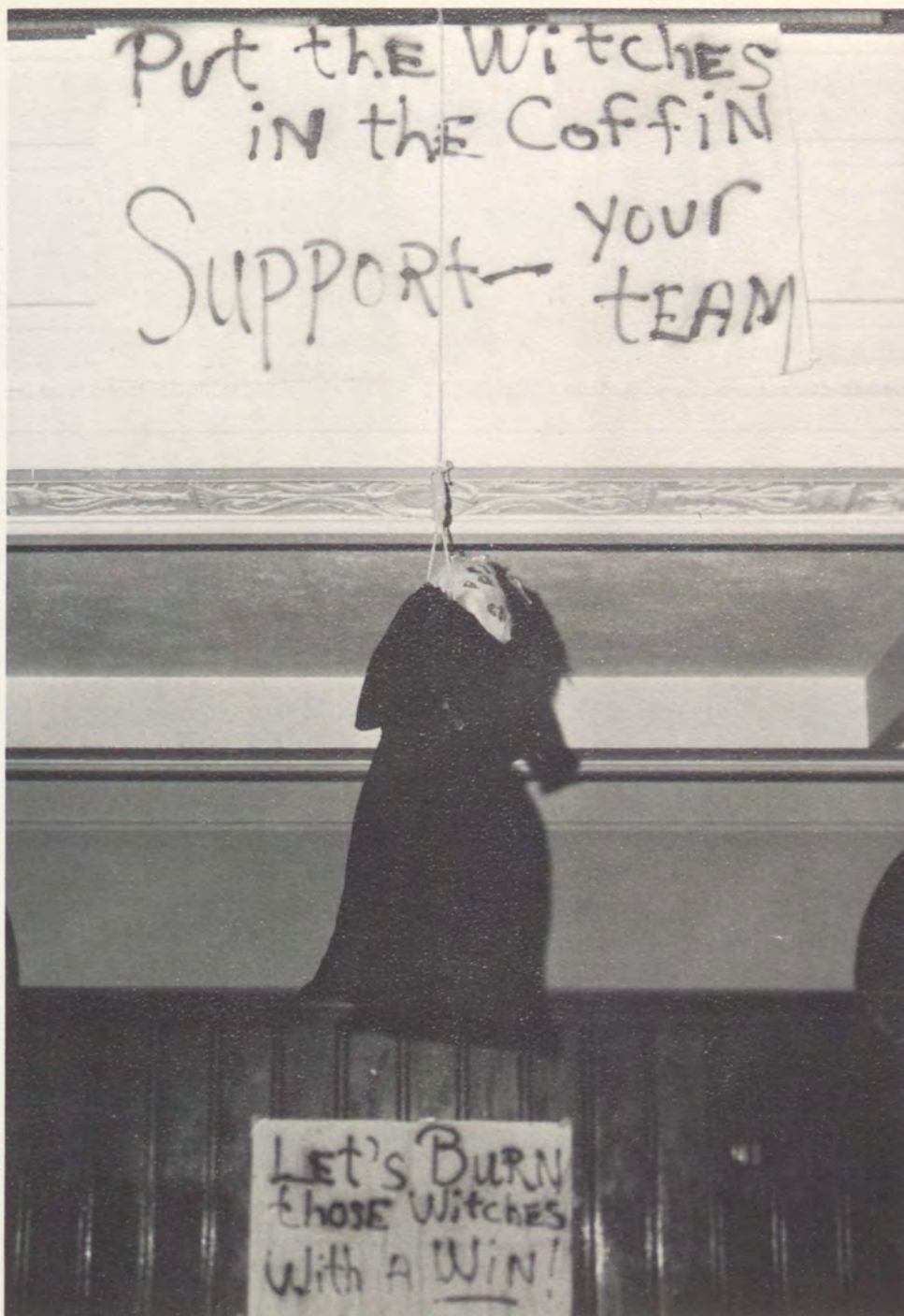

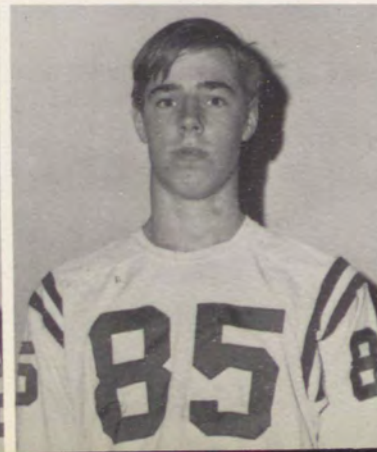

# The Sweet Taste Of Victory After Victory

## HIGHLIGHTS

In 1964 Bapst became the only team in the history of the state to win 20 or more games. In 1965 Bapst repeated this with a 21-6 record, while winning their second outright Penobscot Valley Conference title with a 9-1 record. It was also a year that saw Bapst defeat rivals Bangor, Brewer, Orono, and Old Town twice each. Ron Soucie was awarded the Most Valuable Player trophy as he completely re-wrote the John Bapst record book with 4 no-hitters and over 200 strikeouts. Mike Thomas received the Most Improved Player award after taking the batting

title and leading the Crusaders in 6 batting departments.

Coach Ken Perrone received the Most Outstanding Coaching Award of Eastern Maine. Judges were Owen Osborne of the Bangor Daily News, George Hale, sports announcer of WABI, and Ted Curtis, athletic director of the University of Maine.

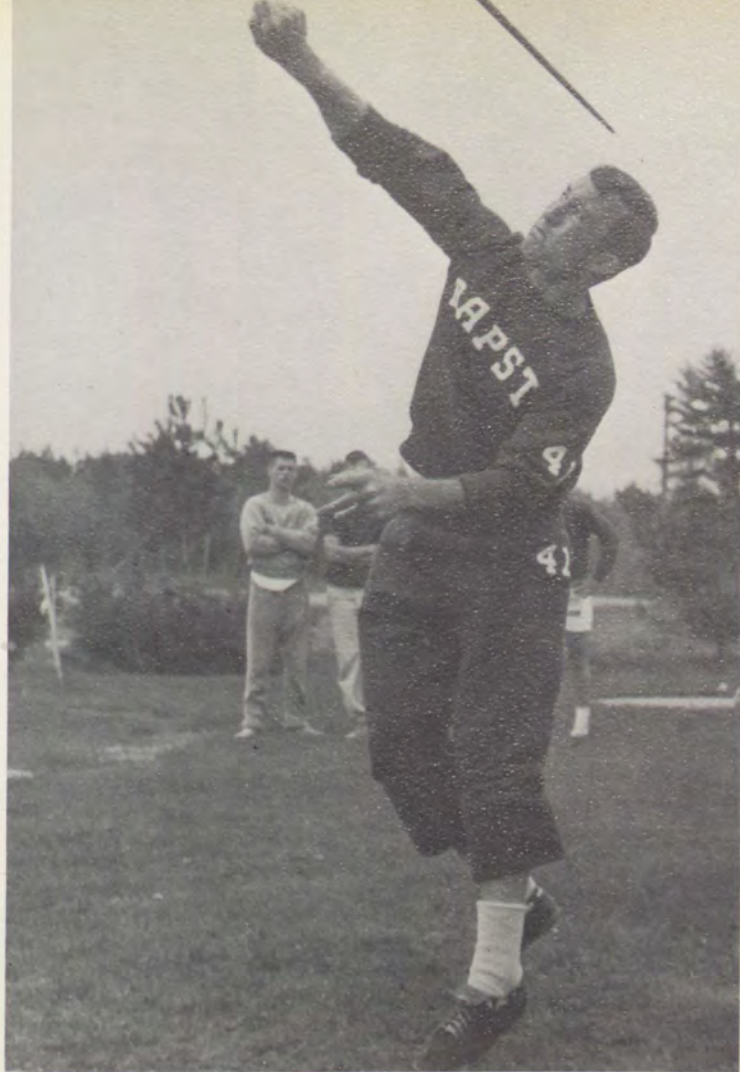

"Well, Dad, it's this way," says coach Ron Geagan to his proud parent. Or, as Bob Kelleter of the Bangor Daily News put it: It just had to happen sometime, but would you believe. . .? John Bapst High School slipping in the back door virtually unnoticed and then pushing stunned Stearns High School out the front door in view of everyone. Undefeated Stearns--the Eastern Maine Class LL Champion for the past three seasons, state champs for the last two--erased from the picture in a shocking upset. Unheralded John Bapst--seeded last with a mediocre 8-12 record--with brilliant Ron Soucie at the controls--knocked Stearns right out of the Double-L tourney with a 72-64 jaw buster.

Team reaction is high as eighth-seeded John Bapst took to the hometown floor with what most basketball observers figured was only a prayer, but once Soucie took charge in the fourth quarter, it was the Minutemen who were on their knees... Soucie netted 17 of his 29 points in the final period... It was a three-man show in the score book, but that certainly wasn't true under the backboards. Both Ed Thorne and John Heuer took--and gave--their share of bruises and Thorne hauled down 19 rebounds...

Geagan's knockout artists, crawling into the eastern tournament on a scratchy 8-12 mark, arrived there after toppling Stearns and Lawrence, the No. 1 and 4 rankers in the final eastern lineup...

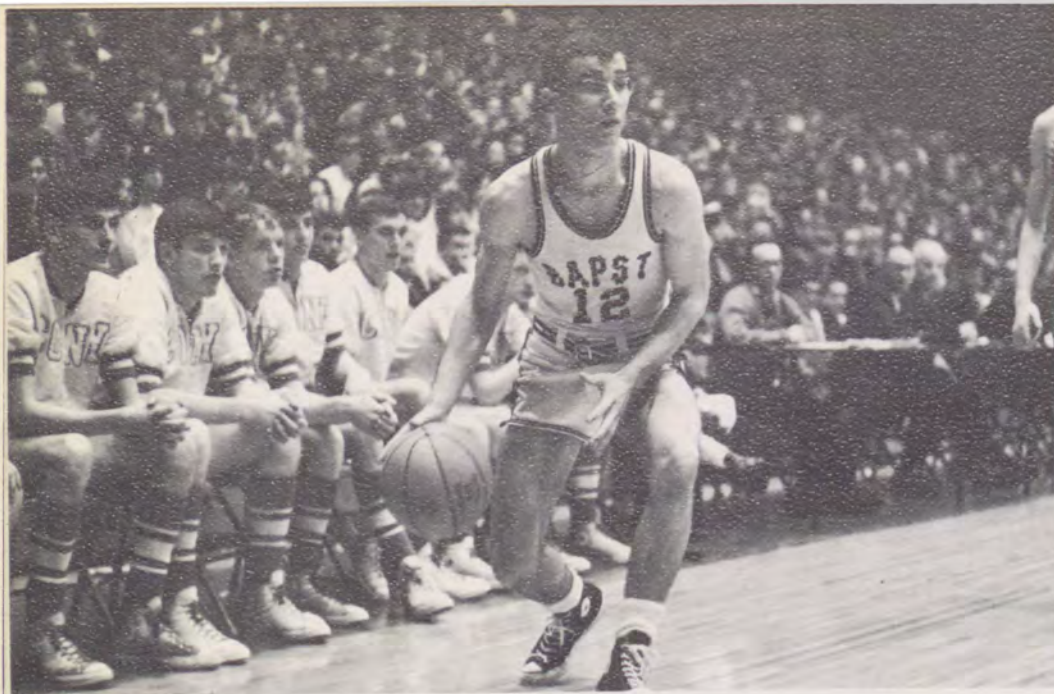

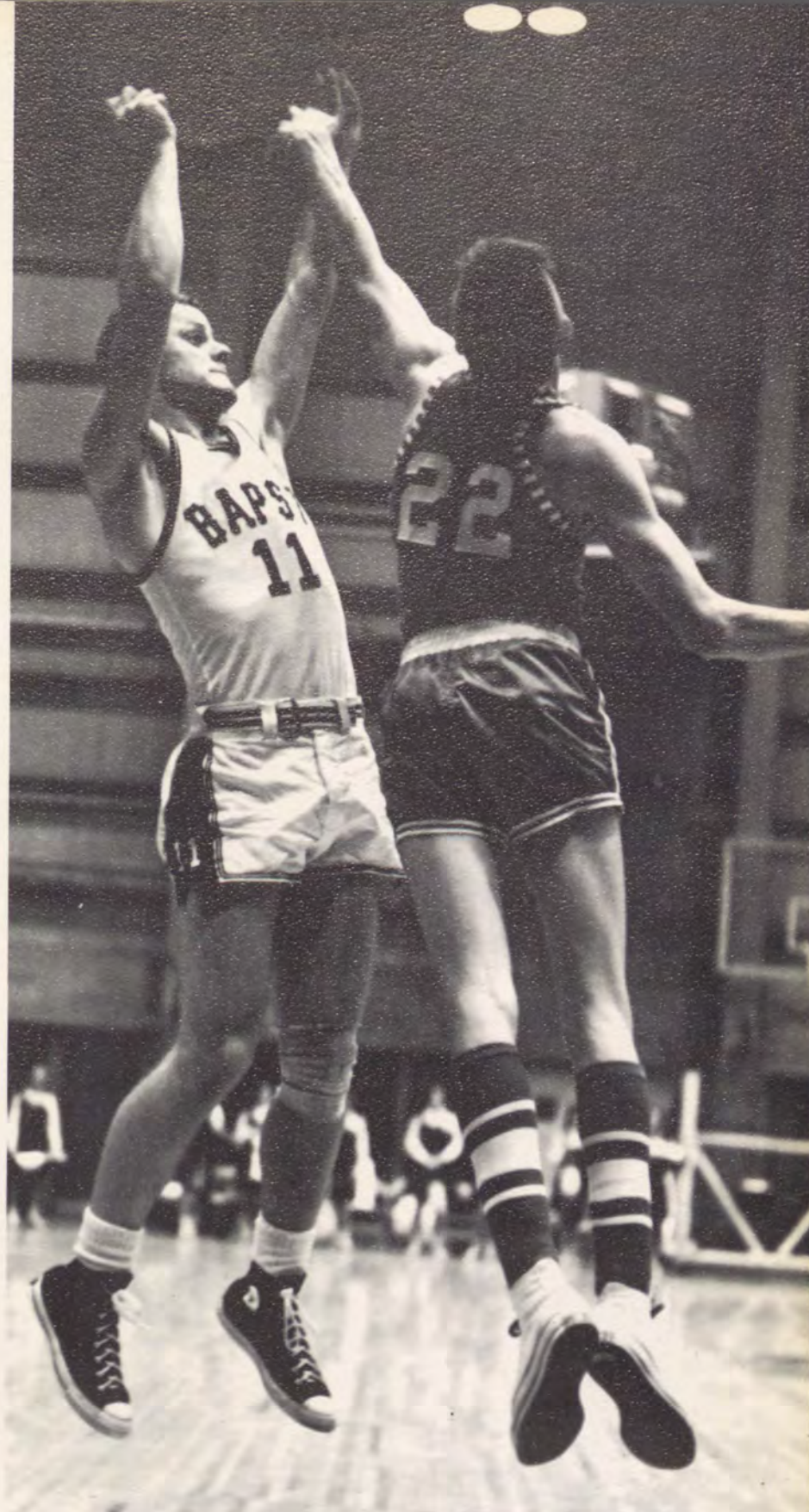
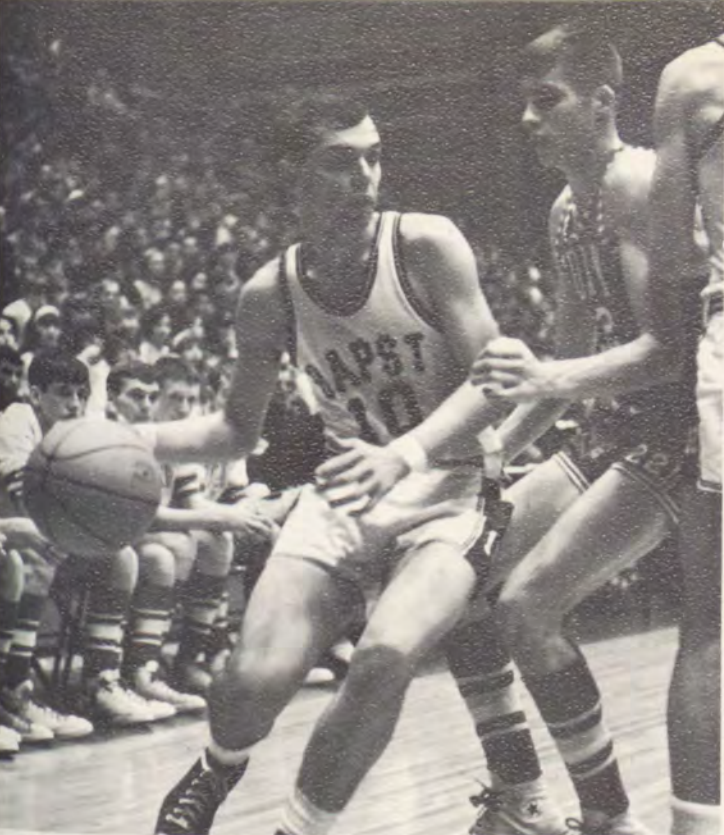
He hesitated very little in replying, "Yes, I guess you'd have to say it releases a lot of pressure." This was the reaction of Stearns' Coach George Wentworth as he stood at courtside watching John Bapst fans mob their players and coach. Many times in the past four years he had had the same thing happen to him--swarms of fans happy over a Stearns victory, so he knew well the elation that goes with victory. "Those John Bapst boys played a fine game and deserved to win," he added. "I knew it would happen sometime but not just when."

After losing to Stearns twice the upset was ripe and ready for picking by John Bapst but was the

personnel there that was needed to turn the trick? Ron Geagan thought so, believed he had found gaps in the Blue defense that could do it. The next thing was to convince his players it could be done. That he did is now history; the major upset in a decade of Maine basketball. For the Stearns Minutemen it was a fabulous record they could offer, one that possibly will never be equalled, and fans have a right to be proud of Coach Wentworth as well as his players over the years.

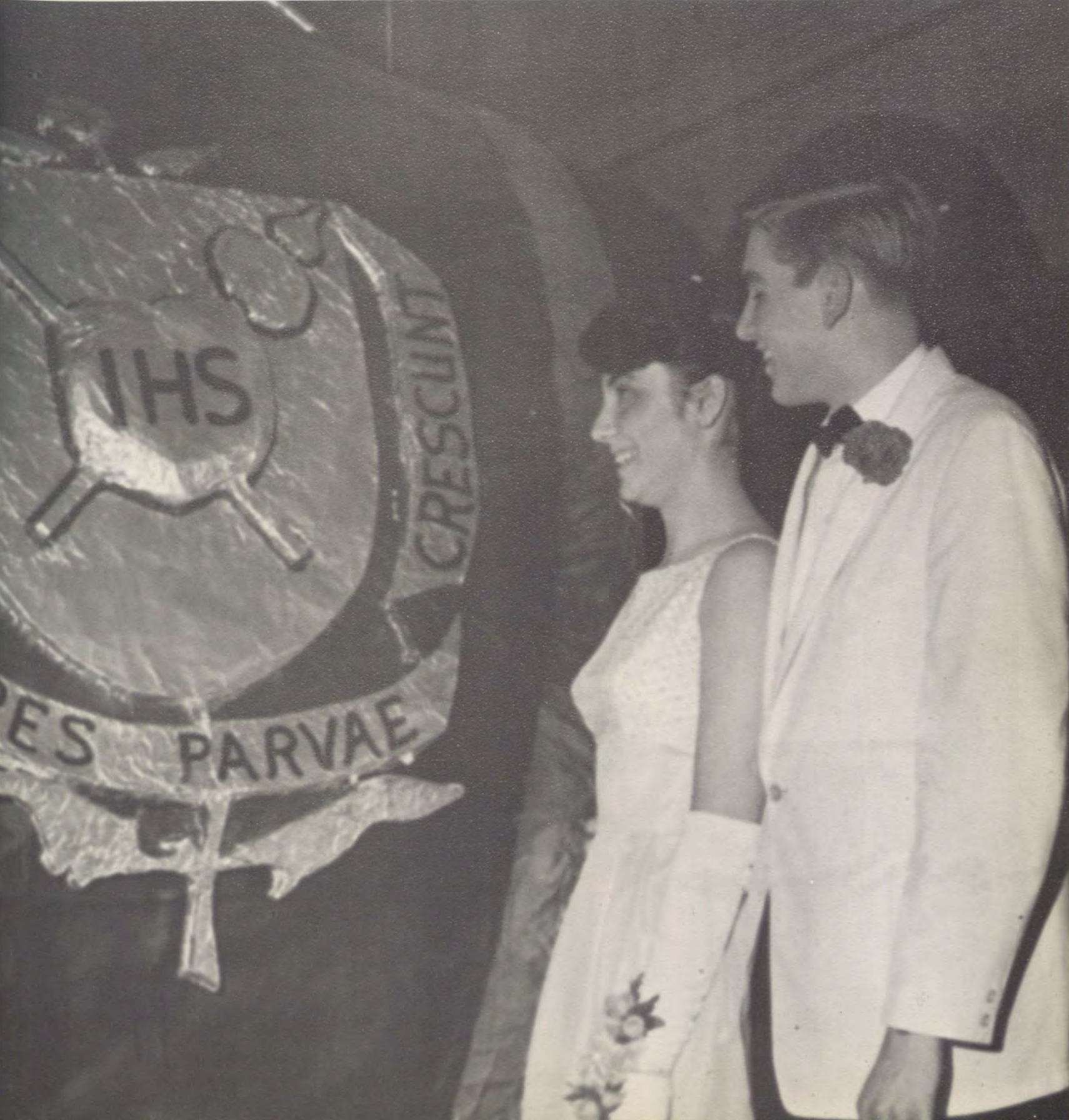

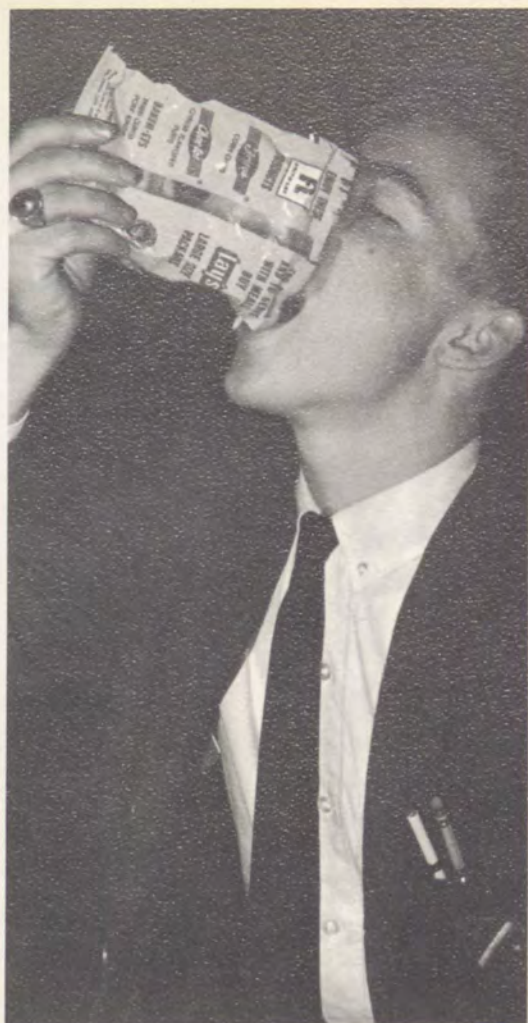

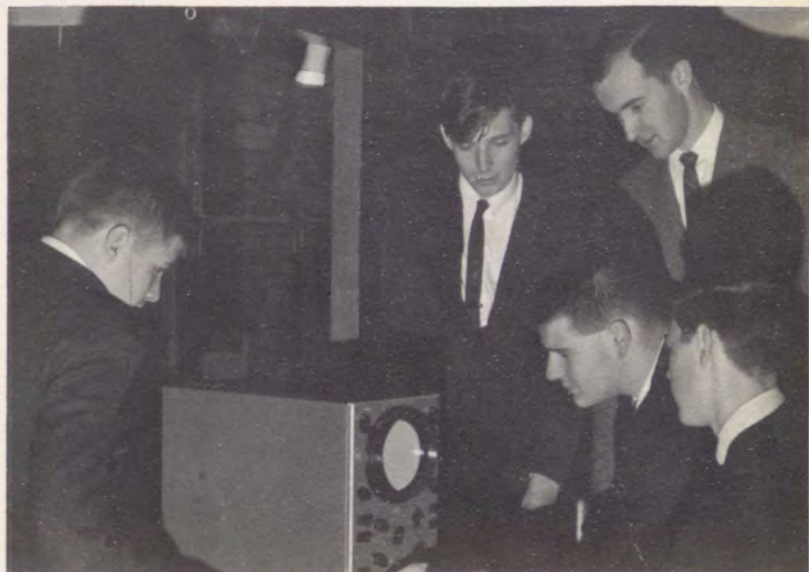

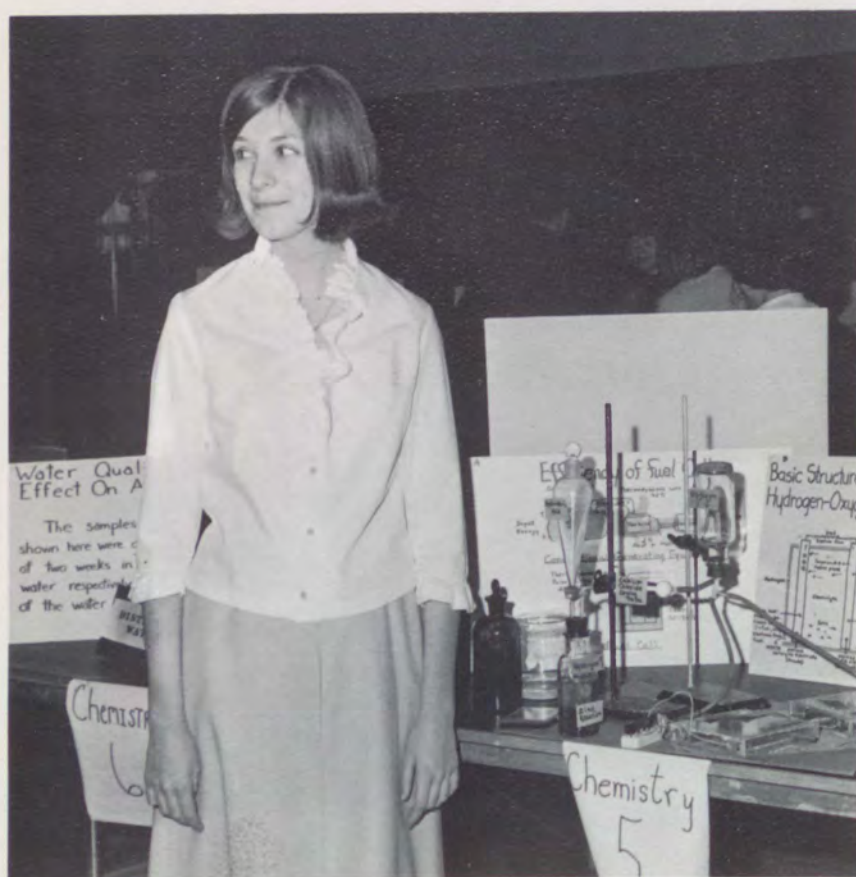
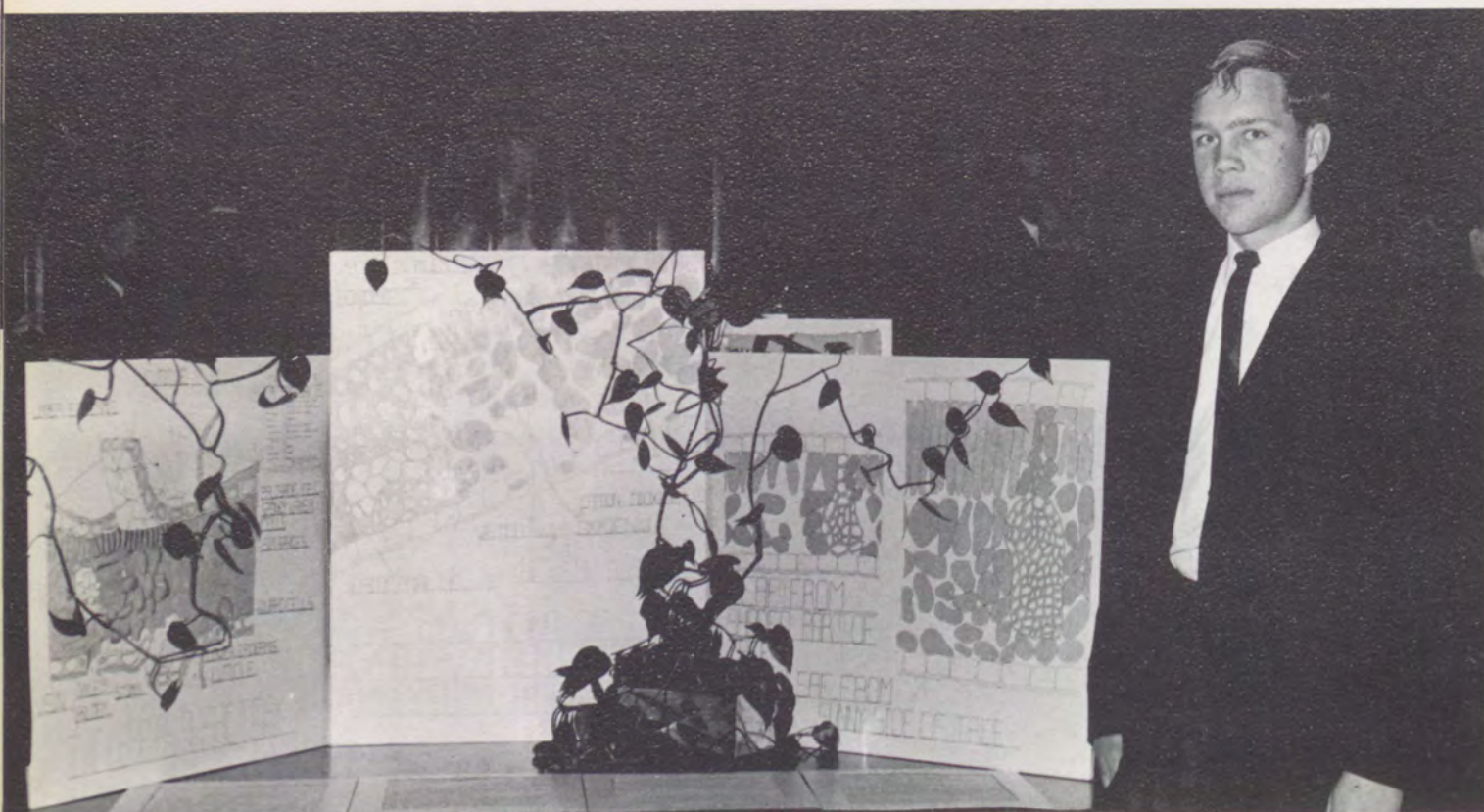




# Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious

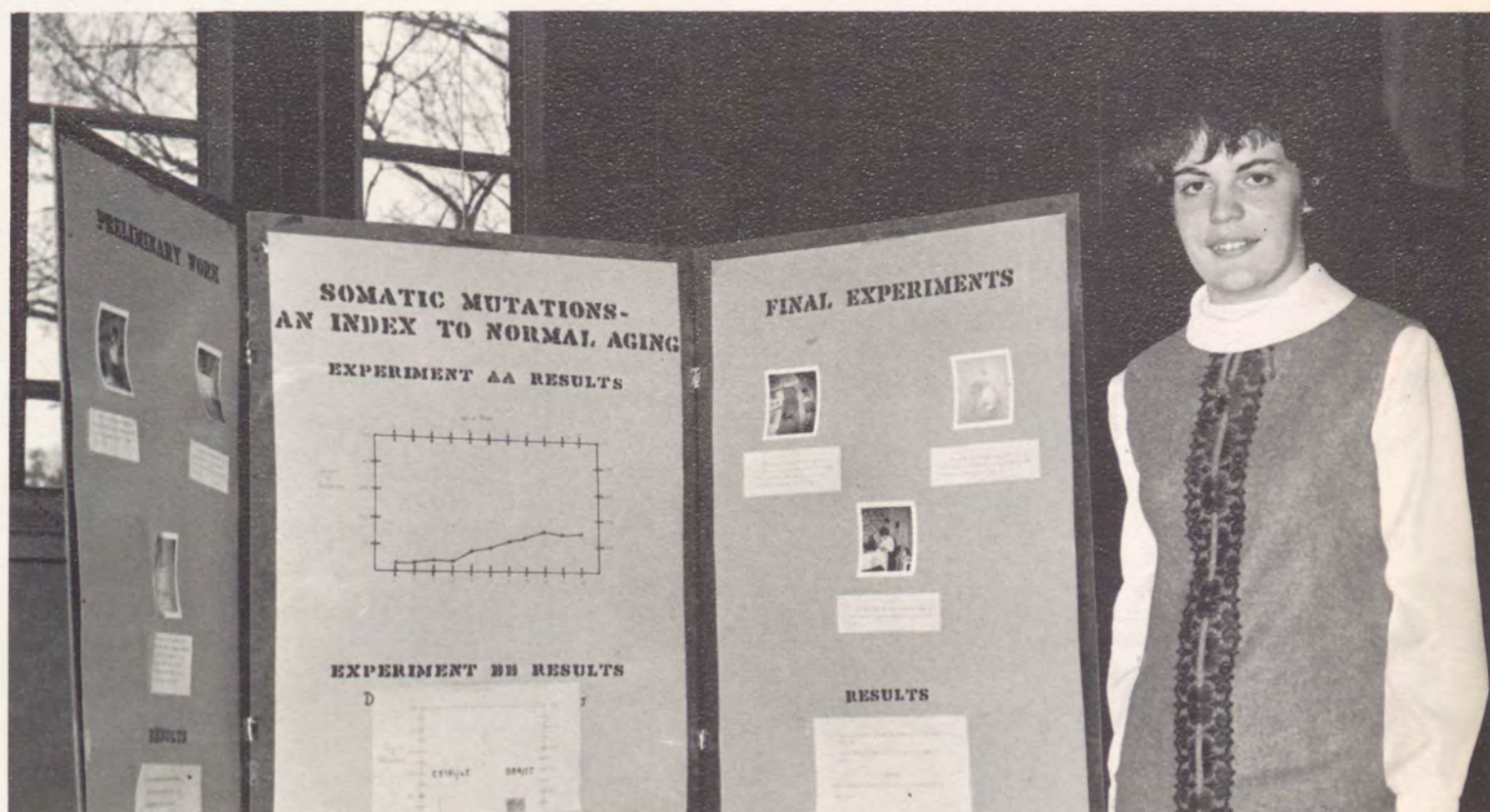

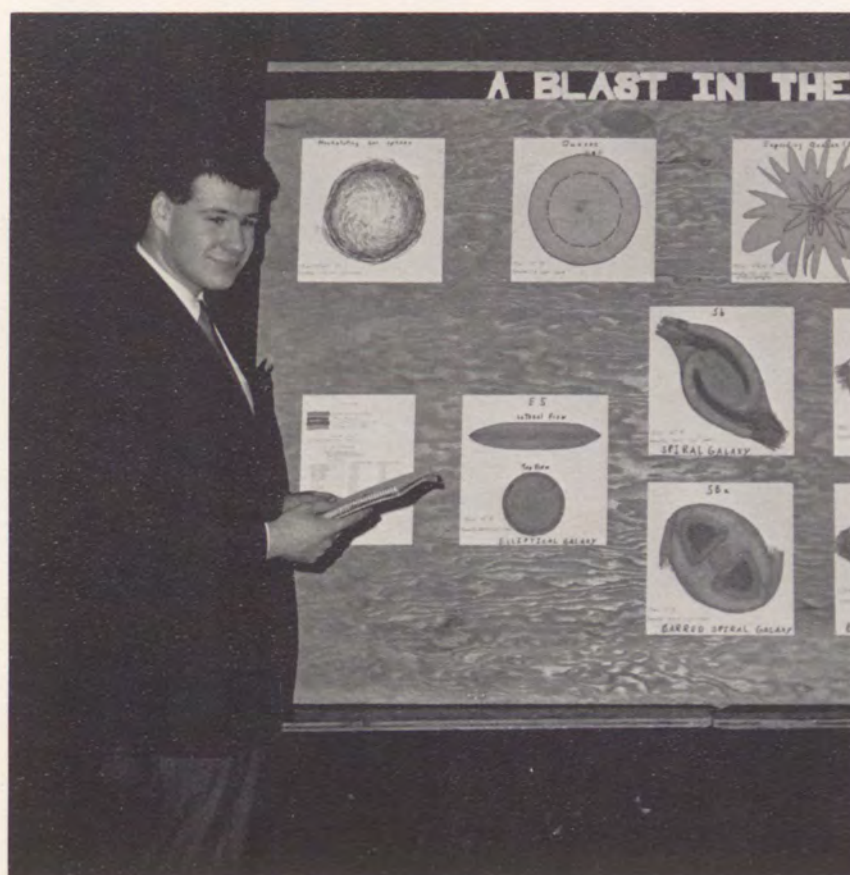
# The Scientific Approach
