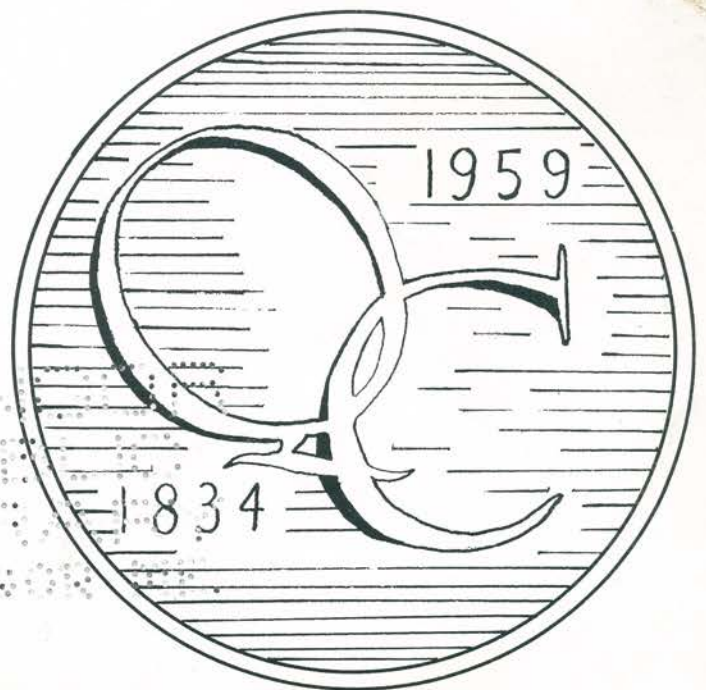

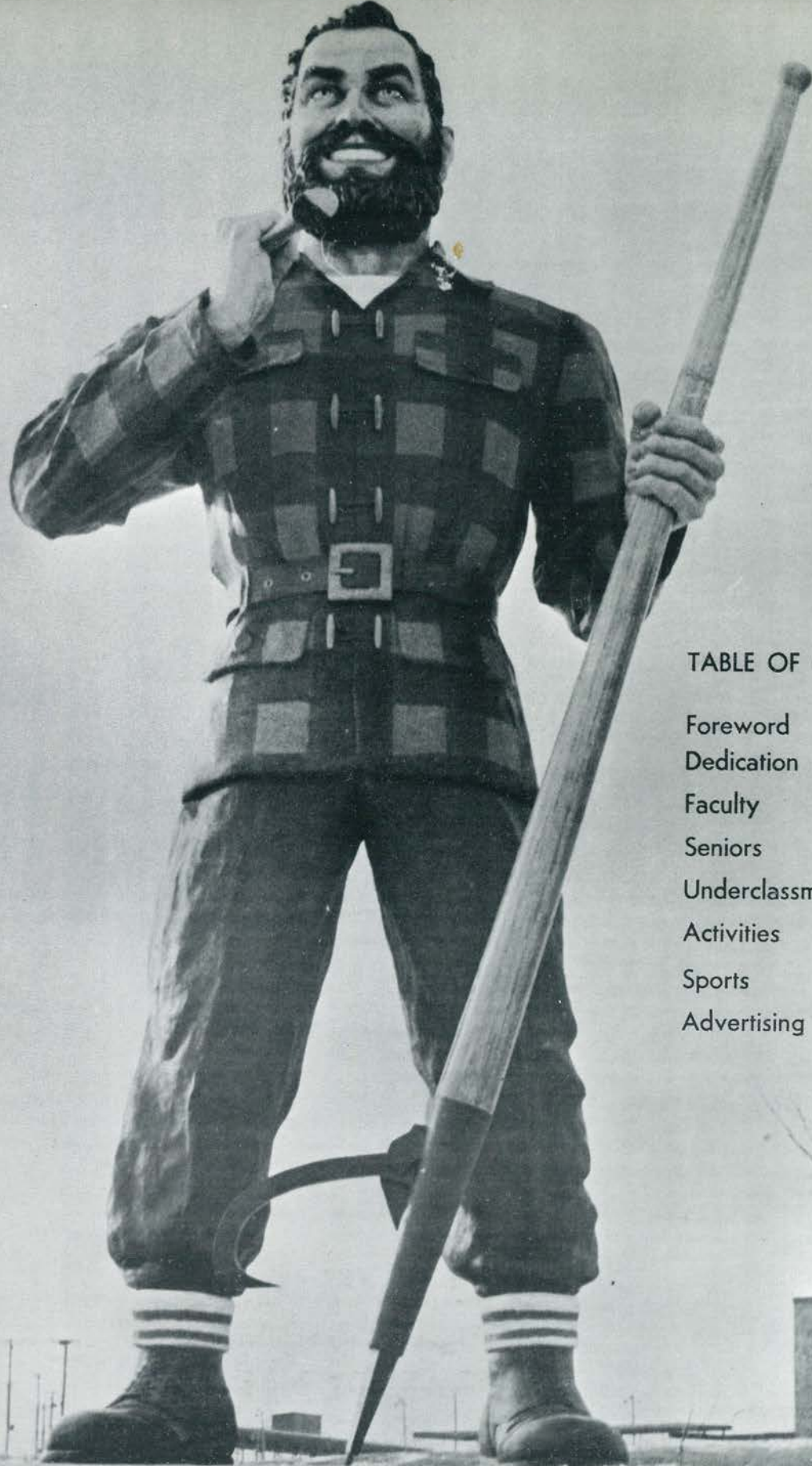

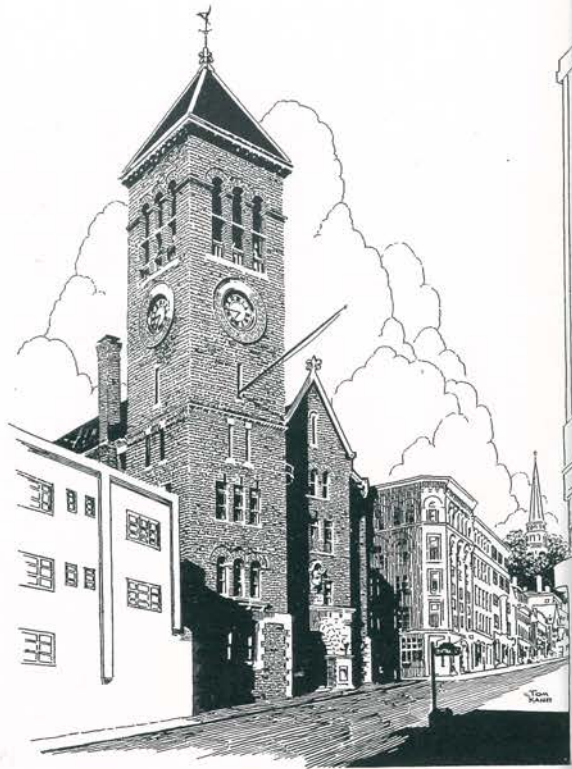
We look upon BHS, indicated by the Ram's head, as a source from which we obtain the initial motivations towards community progress, progress that is this year indicated by the QC sign.

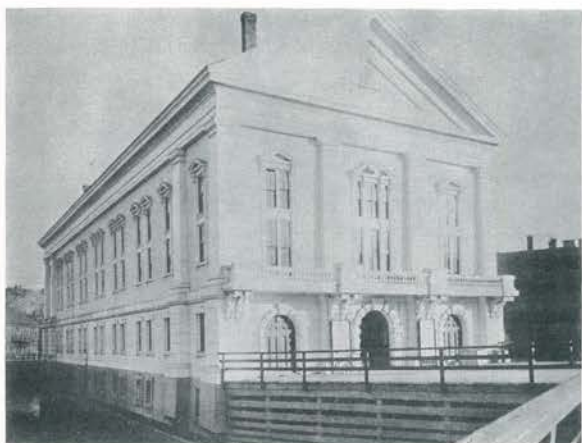

Dedication

We, the Class of 1959, dedicate this edition of the ORACLE to Dr. Joseph B. Chaplin, in appreciation of his outstanding work as principal of Bangor High School for the past twenty-two years. Since he first became principal in 1937, Dr. Chaplin has devoted himself to the best interests of Bangor High School. His attention to details and his deep concern for the welfare of the school and its students have brought him praise and admiration from parents, faculty, and students. Under his guidance, Bangor High School has attained a high peak of achievement both in academic and extra curricula fields.

Dr. Chaplin has received honorary degrees from Bowdoin College and his alma mater, the University of Maine. Prominent in state and national educational circles, he brought signal recognition to Bangor in 1951 when he was elected president of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

His interest in us, not just as students, but as individuals, has given Dr. Chaplin a special place in the memory of our high school days.

We, the class of 1959, join with the entire staff of Bangor High School in wishing Dr. and Mrs. Chaplin every success and happiness in the future.

SCHOOL HISTORY

Bangor High School is one of the oldest functioning institutions in the "Queen City." The school has played an important part in the life of the community since 1835. The first school, for boys only, was established at State and Pine Streets in 1835. Soon a new school for both boys and a few girls was built on Prospect Street. In 1857 the girls moved to a separate building in Abbott Square, while the boys remained on Prospect Street. In 1864 the first co-educational high school was established when the boys moved to the Abbott Square School.

A partial description of the Abbott Square school is obtained from a letter written by Miss Mary C. Robinson, the first faculty adviser of the Oracle, who served in that capacity for thirty-seven years. A quotation from the letter is as follows: "In 1877 the 'big room' in which the three upper classes sat had 144 desks, 12 by 12. The fourth class, called 'Scrubbs' by their elders, sat in two recitation rooms at the rear, but studied in the big room while classes were reciting in their home rooms."

The Abbott Square school was destroyed in the great Bangor fire of 1911. Classes were carried on temporarily in the Abraham Lincoln (Palm Street) School until the present building on Harlow Street was opened in 1913. The school was on double sessions in 1937 when Dr. Joseph Chaplin became principal.

Since that time the school has expanded both in its curriculum and teaching staff. Bangor High School alumni have successfully competed with graduates of other high schools, both public and private, in colleges, universities, and other fields of endeavor.

In the field of athletics, B.H.S. has consistently had some of the top teams in the state. During Dr. Chaplin's tenure as principal at B.H.S., basketball teams have captured nine Eastern Maine Championships, the largest number ever won by any eastern Maine school. The team has won three state titles and this year placed second in the New England Tournament. In football Bangor has captured one state championship and several runner-up trophies. The B.H.S. track team has won three State Titles and has consistently placed high in the state meet. The Cross Country team has won five second places in state meets and once won third honors in the New England meet. B.H.S. baseball teams won several successive championships in the Penobscot Valley Conference. Bangor was eventually eliminated from the conference because of the successive championships.

Not to be outdone by the sports teams, the Speech-Drama Department has consistently done outstanding work in regional and state competition. Debating teams have recently placed high in state competition. Now in its ninety-seventh year, the ROTC department at Bangor is the oldest in the nation. The rifle team sponsored by the military department has won state honors for the past few years, while the Stetson Rifles and the Stetsonettes have brought praise and admiration for their drill repertoires. Music groups at B.H.S. have been acclaimed for their fine work throughout the years. A school newspaper, the *Orascope*, was founded in 1945. The *Oracle* has maintained its continuous publication since 1892.

This past year has been an outstandingly successful one for both the class of 1959 and Bangor High School. The basketball Rams placed second in the New England Tournament, the highest position won by a Maine team since 1944, placing one player on the All-New England Tournament Team. Bangor's one-act play *Lady Precious Stream* won top honors in New England competition. Three B.H.S. students were voted All New England actors. The senior play drew the largest crowd in many years. Turning to local honors, both the football and baseball teams won inter-city crowns by defeating arch rivals John Bapst and Brewer. The football team placed four men on the All-Eastern Maine team. Both the girls' and boys' rifle teams again won State Championship Honors, while the boys' second team placed second in state competition. Six Debate Club members received certificates for their efforts in Bates League competition. One debating team placed second in a group of thirty schools from Maine, Massachusetts, and New Hampshire.

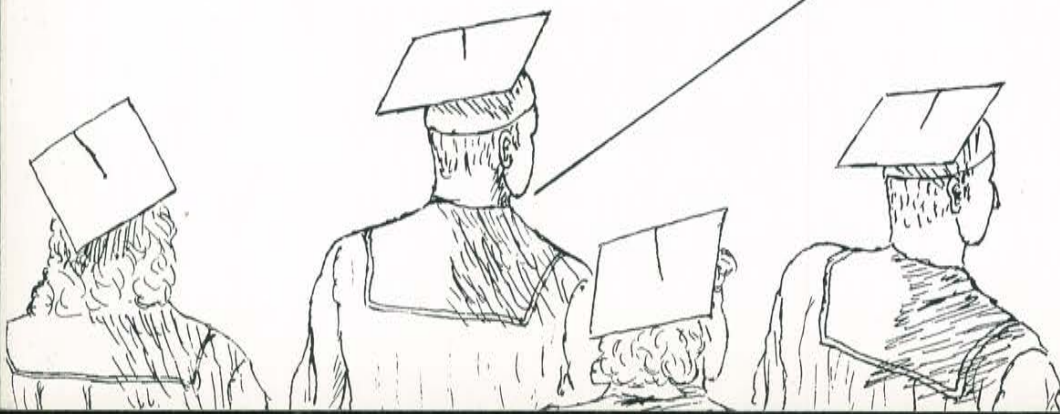

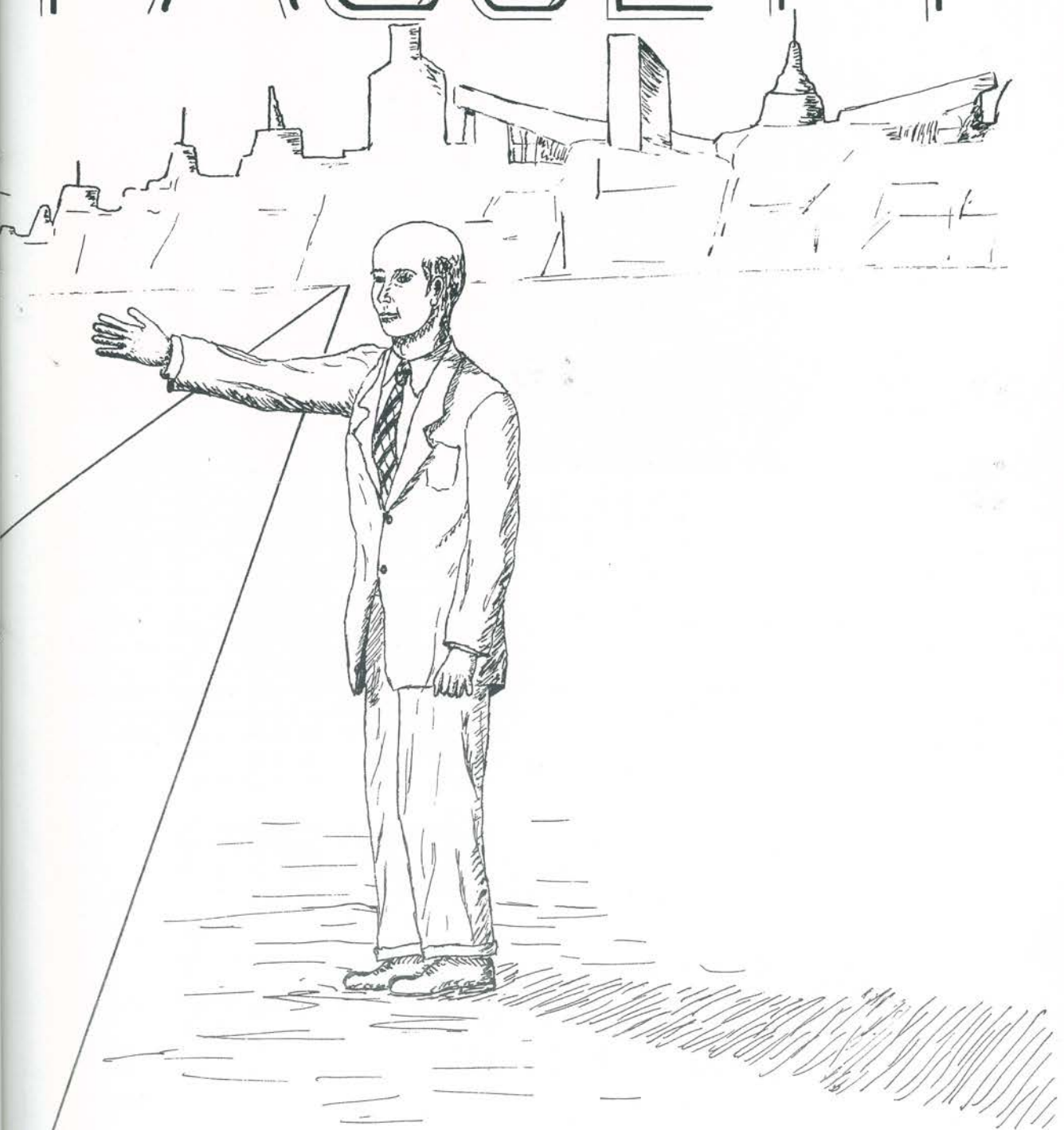

Robinson, teacher of English and Latin, and Fred Clifford, a sophomore. The first *Oracles* were paper back magazines of a literary nature, which included such items as poems written by students in the school. In 1945, with the commencement of publication of the *Orascope*, the *Oracle* was converted from a literary publication to a yearbook as it is now.

In memory of Mary C. Robinson, who for thirty-seven years acted as faculty adviser for the yearbook, the staff of the *Oracle* offers annually two prizes given in Miss Robinson's name to students who, in the opinion of the faculty, have given the most outstanding service to the school. The prizes of twenty-five dollars are given one each to a student in the college preparatory group and to a student in the non-college group.

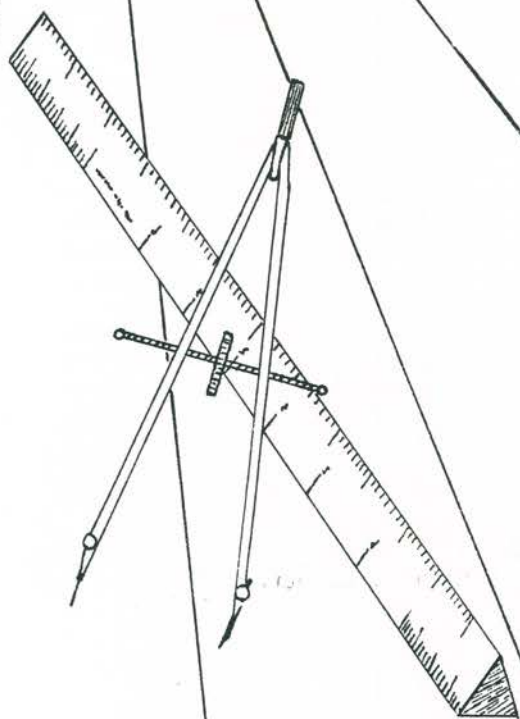

Receiving ski team letters in this, the first year of the Rams Varsity Ski Team, were Peter Haney and Gerald Schwartz.

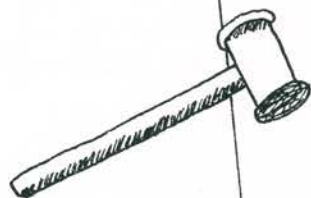

1957—Band gets new uniforms with assistance of music parents association.

1958—Newton exchange concert.

Host to both the All-State Festival and the Eastern Maine Audition Festival, a participant in an exchange program which took it to Newton, Mass., and the only school band in Maine with the opportunity of playing at the New England Finals since 1944, the band has had one of the most colorful seasons in its long, event-filled history. Few members will forget the three-day trip to Newton which certainly did not end in a blaze of glory nor the tourney week in Boston, which ended a terrific season for both the team and the band. Much of the success of this year's band can be attributed, in all due recognition of his interest, ability and service, to Mr. Atherton, while the Music Parents' Association actively supported all activities sponsored by the Music Department.

ROTC HISTORY

First organized in 1862, the B.H.S. ROTC unit is the oldest active high school military training unit in the country.

From 1862 to 1898, the unit was known as the Voluntary Drill Company. The boys furnished their own uniforms, which were of the gray military type.

At the outbreak of the Spanish-American War, a larger unit, the Bangor High School Cadet Corps, was organized. Cadets were uniformed in the then blue army uniform. During the First World War, many officers and non-commissioned officers came from the Bangor unit.

After the war, Congress authorized the present ROTC program. Bangor High School, in 1919, received one of the first junior ROTC units.

In 1933, at the federal inspection the unit received the honor rating, which was held until during World War II. The unit regained the honor rating in 1955 and has held it to the present time.

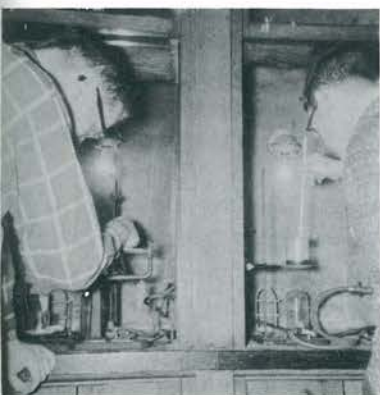

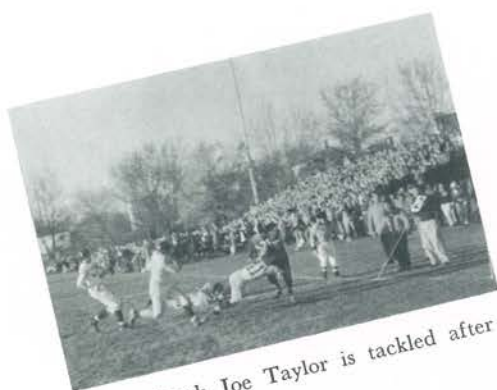
Under stiff competition in the Regional and State meets, the Rams had to be content with fourth and seventh places respectively.

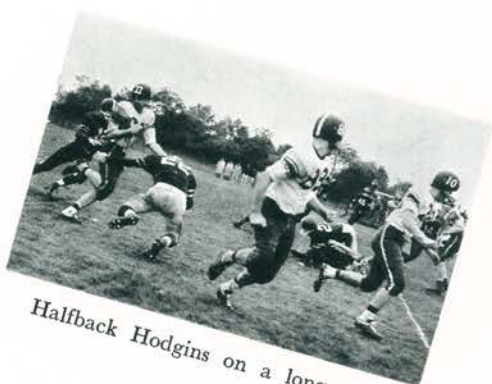

TOURNAMENT HIGHLIGHTS

It was in tournament play that the Rams came into their own and showed what results can be accomplished by teamwork. Headed by Archie Tracy, who provided the scoring punch, and Capt. Joe Taylor, the Rams swept through the Eastern Maine Tournament, terminating with a 70-61 upset victory over arch-rival John Bapst, with whom the Rams had split during the season. Next came a thrilling one-point win over Lewiston, and on to Boston. In the first game of the New Englands the Rams made it three upsets in a row with a 72-58 decision over favored Holyoke. The Rams put on what was possibly their best performance of the year as they completely outplayed their opponents. The second game, played against Nashua, N. H., was almost a repeat performance of the first. In both games the Rams hit on over 50% of their shots from the floor and outclassed their opponents by a wide margin. Thus Bangor became the first Maine team to reach the New England finals in 15 years. However, the Rams had an off night against Hillhouse and had to be content with second place.

Bangor dropped two hard-fought contests in the late innings to Dover-Foxcroft, 9-8, and to Ellsworth, 7-5.

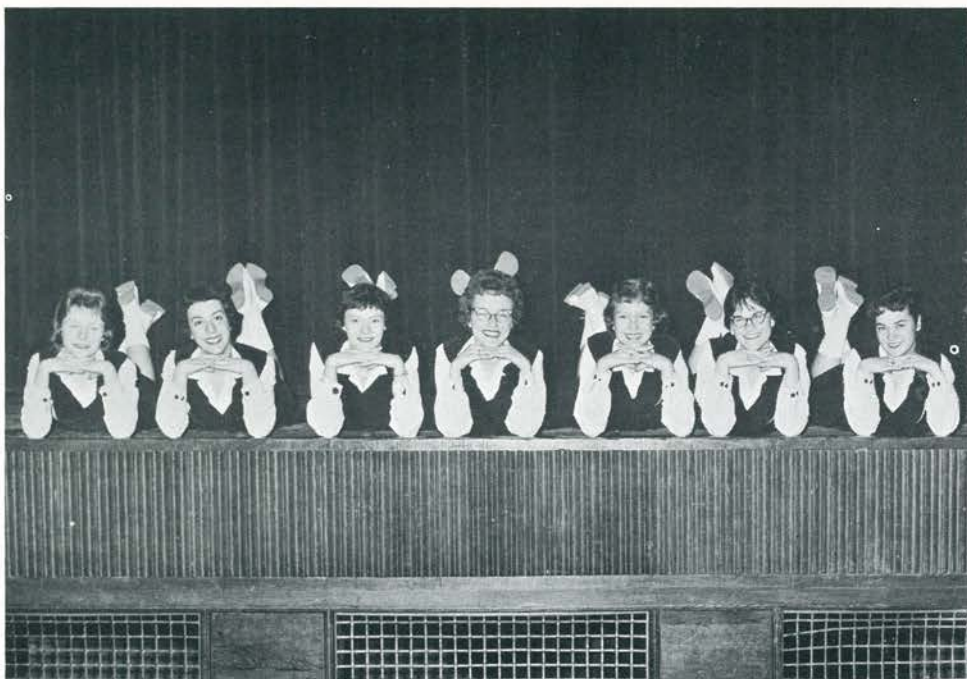

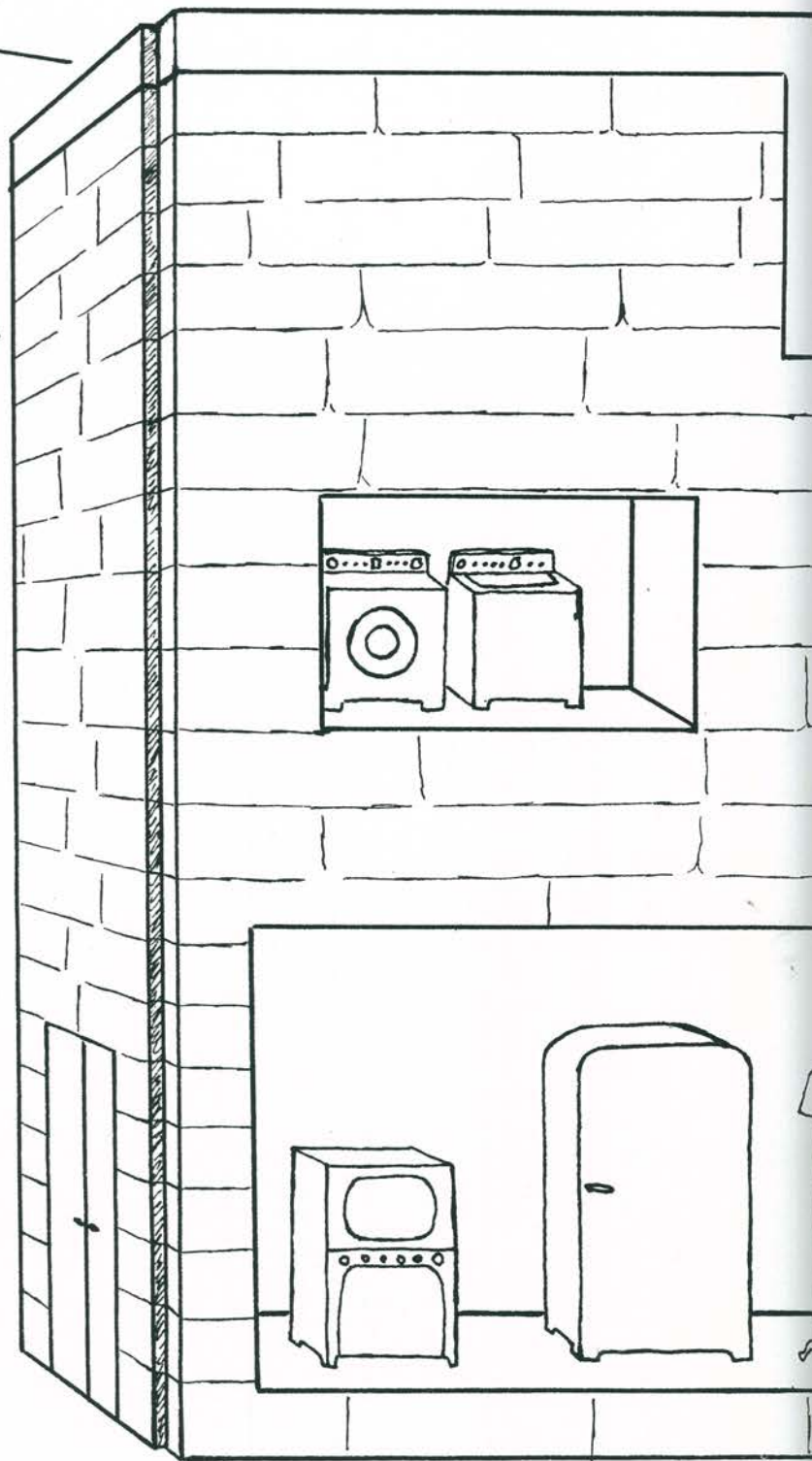

The Junior Blue team finished in second place. Coached by Sharon Parker and Sharon Nason and captained by Janice Jordan, this team showed great promise for next year.

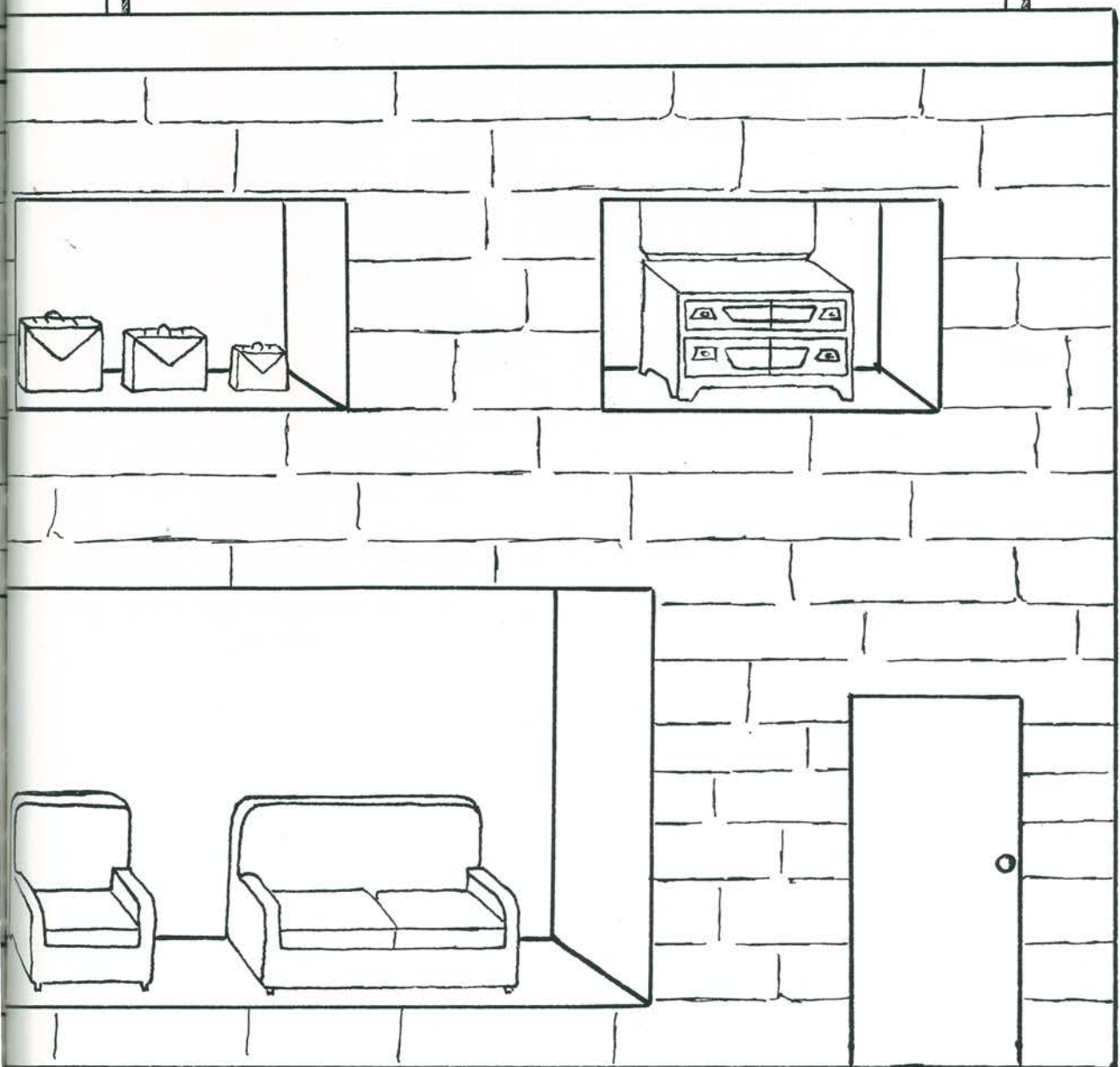
