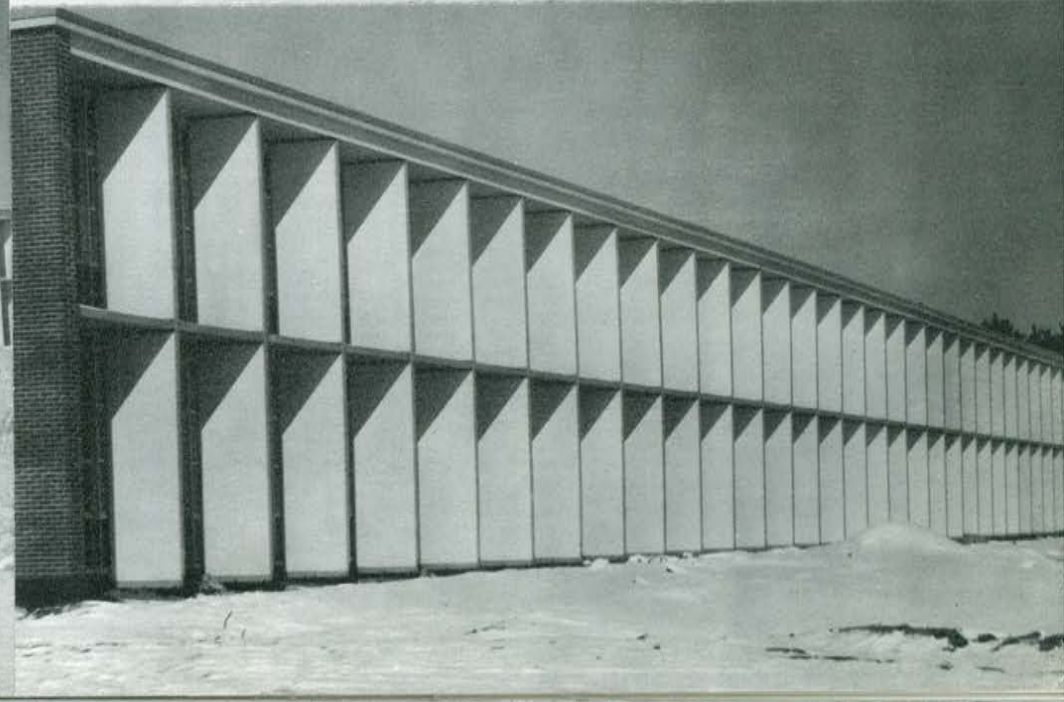
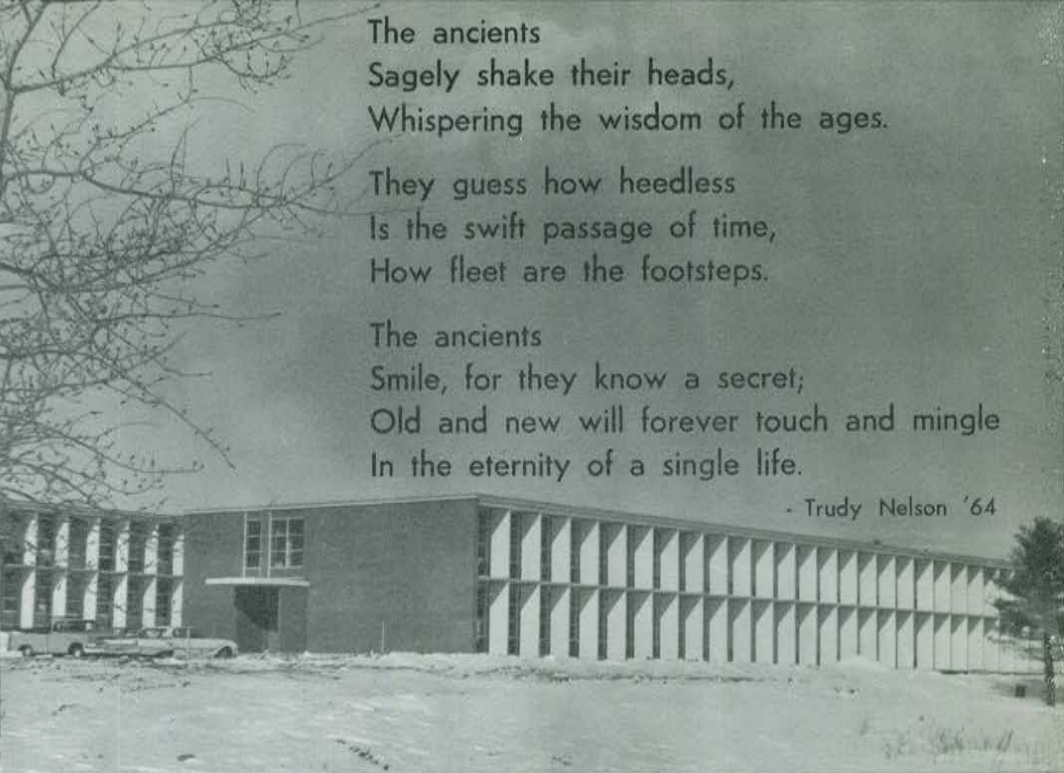

## Maine People Share Grief Of Nation

Since President John F. Kennedy had visited the University of Maine on October 19, 1963, the people of Maine felt closer to him. Bangor High School shared this closeness, for the B.H.S. Band had played at the university on the occasion of his visit. It was as if, by meeting him face to face, Maine citizens had come to consider the President a personal friend. When the news of his assassination reached Maine, the reaction of the state was perhaps more profound because of this feeling.

B.H.S. students demonstrated how much President Kennedy was admired when a group of them produced a booklet in tribute to the late president. President Kennedy captured the interest and attention of young people everywhere during his term of office. His vitality and enthusiasm communicated itself especially to the nation's youth, who felt a kinship between themselves and the President. His death caused a real sense of loss among young Americans.

## Mr. Eaton and Mr. McIntosh Work To Improve School System

To insure the smooth running of the Bangor School System, Mr. Wendell Eaton and Mr. Alvah McIntosh have been especially busy this year. In addition to his regular duties as School Superintendent, Mr. Eaton has been working with the School Board in planning the new high school and in improving Bangor's Department of Education. Mr. McIntosh and the Curriculum Committee, which he heads, have been promoting several new programs, such as the eighth grade oral French classes. An additional task for Mr. McIntosh, is helping the department heads in selecting educational materials.

The new high school will welcome the sophomore, junior, and senior classes when it opens next fall for the school year. The freshman class will be accommodated in the old building at 183 Harlow Street. The Harlow Street building will continue to provide offices for Mr. Eaton, Mr. McIntosh, and their staffs. Working with Mr. Dana M. Simmons, Bangor High School principal, and department heads, Mr. Eaton and Mr. McIntosh have provided a vastly expanded curriculum for the new school. The periods of the school day will vary in length to adapt to the subject being taught. The Bangor School Department has been released from rigid accreditation standards in order to try out this new system of scheduling. In addition, a wealth of new courses have been added as electives for next year's students.

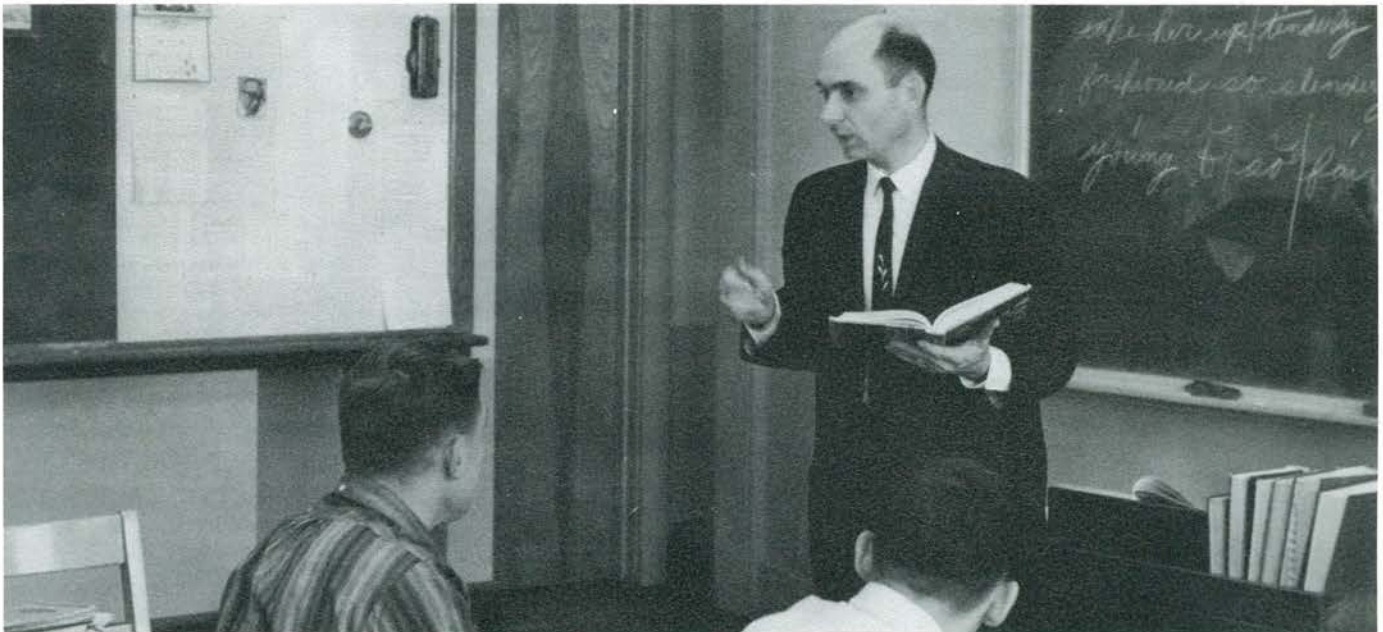

## Voluntary Reading Program Helps Students Help Themselves

Participants in the B.H.S. developmental reading program aim to increase their speed and comprehension. Those taking the reading program are juniors from all tracks; many are college-bound students seeking to improve the fundamental skills. Under a systematic program of instruction, presented by Mrs. Charlotte Haskell, Reading Supervisor, the students work to improve their study habits, note taking, vocabulary, and reading skills.

The reading program is voluntary and does not require homework. The students taking the non-credit course give up two study periods each week.

The Reading Department is well equipped with multi-level materials such as *S. R. A. Laboratories*, the *Literature Sample*, *Tactics in Reading*, and *Book Series*. In addition, individual students using the Reading Accelerator work at their own pace to increase their reading rates.

## Music and Speech Departments Provide Cultural Benefits

Bangor High School's fine arts program offers many opportunities to students in the fields of music and speech.

During the past year, Mr. Atherton has been instructing his Music Appreciation students in the fundamental history and structure of music. Through the use of textbooks and recordings, his students become acquainted with great composers and their works.

With Mr. Atherton's help, many students compile their own Listening Libraries, made up of recordings by composers from Bach and Handel to such contemporary artists as Peter, Paul, and Mary and the Dave Brubeck Quartet.

Mrs. Coffey directs all choral and vocal groups at Bangor High School. During the past year, her choruses have sung for school functions, and her mixed chorus sung for the Penobscot County Teachers' Convention.

Speech students gain poise and skill in speaking before a group through the presentations of speeches and cuttings. Mrs. Browne emphasizes interpretation in public speaking, and her students are afforded many opportunities to express themselves through pantomimes and demonstrations.

# Language Department Combines Work and Pleasure

As communication with other people acquires increased importance, more and more students study foreign languages. To meet the needs of these students, the language department is rapidly expanding; the instructors are including not only oral and written language in their teaching, but are also stressing the histories and cultures of other lands.

Third year French students reaped the reward of long hours spent in study when they attended Moliere's *Les Precieuses Ridicules*, a play performed by the French seminary students from the Oblate Seminary in Bar Harbor. Every other year many second and third year French students spend a week-end in Quebec improving their language skills and enjoying the sights of a French-speaking city.

As Spanish students progress from the fundamentals of reading to advanced Spanish literature, they learn the difference between a *serape*

and a *toca*, a *poncho* and a *sombrero*, and a *fiesta* and a *siesta*. Spanish students this year have been particularly fortunate to be able to work and talk with Jose Aguilar, Bangor High School's foreign exchange student from Lima, Peru.

Latin students are often surprised to learn that they use a form of Latin whenever they speak an English sentence. They learn vocabulary and grammar and discover that Caesar was an author as well as a general. Third and fourth year Latin students learn to appreciate the writings of Cicero and Virgil.

Language students must work diligently to master the principles of speaking, writing, and comprehending a foreign tongue. They increase their understanding of foreign culture and find pleasure in working on Ides of March projects, making Spanish *pinatas* or French posters, singing folk songs, or following in the footsteps of *Emile*.

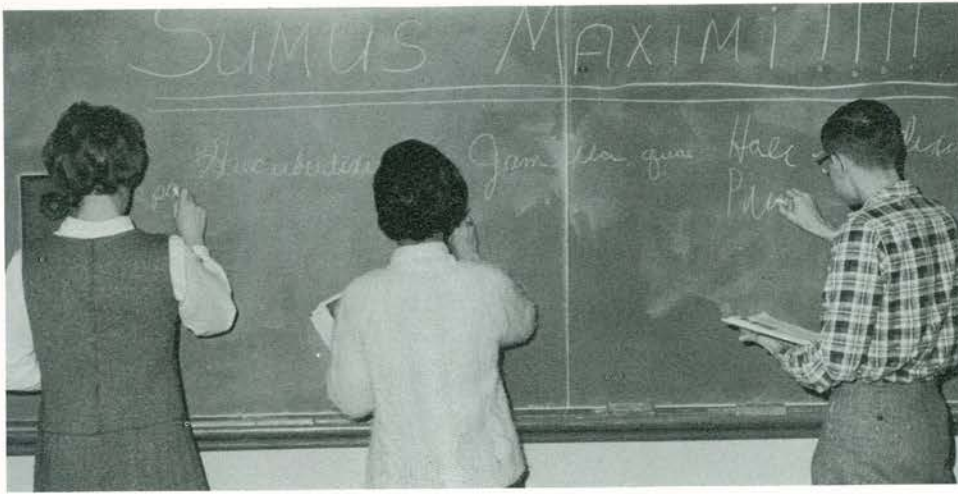

## Social Studies Department Highlights Class Discussion

In the Social Studies Department, students are encouraged by the teachers to express their opinions on world events; the students are also taught how to evaluate current situations in terms of past history. The social studies program at B.H.S. is by no means restricted to any single period of time in history. The world becomes more meaningful to the student who gains essential knowledge provided by the Social Studies Department at Bangor High School.

## B. H. S. Teaches Modern Science

Keeping pace with developments and discoveries in the world of the scientific, Bangor High offers students a selection of courses in science: biology, chemistry, physics, earth science, and general science. Experiments in the laboratories, conducted as part of certain courses, enable the student to prove scientific concepts for himself and enrich his understanding.

The annual Science Fair, in which each science student is required to enter a project, took place in March. Fourteen participants were selected to represent Bangor High School at the regional contest which was held in Millinocket. The following students received honors at the regionals and attended the State Science Fair at Bates College, Lewiston: Joy Bergquist, Kendall Carlisle, Eric Flack, Linda Hedrick, Richard LaRhette, and Ardis Mayo.

In the new high school, present courses will be supplemented by a course in physical science, a basic study of the physical world, and by advanced biology, a course in which specialized areas of the subject can be considered in depth. Besides these courses offered at Bangor High School, qualified students may pursue science courses at the University of Maine.

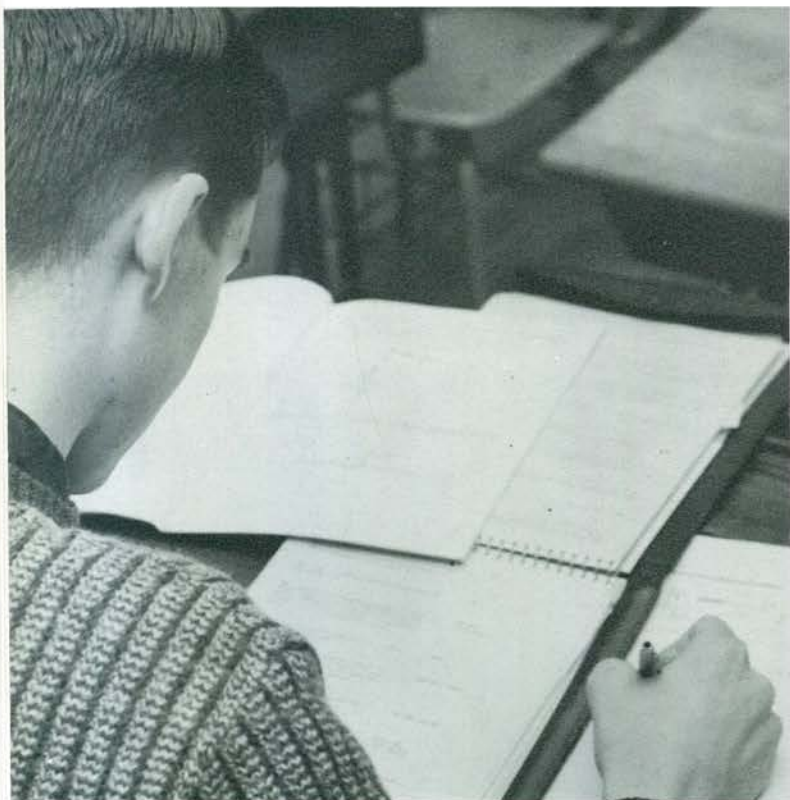

## Importance Of Math Stressed At B. H. S.

The Age of Technology stresses the importance of mathematics in scientific fields, in the business world, and in all aspects of daily life. At Bangor High School the math department is preparing its students to meet these challenges.

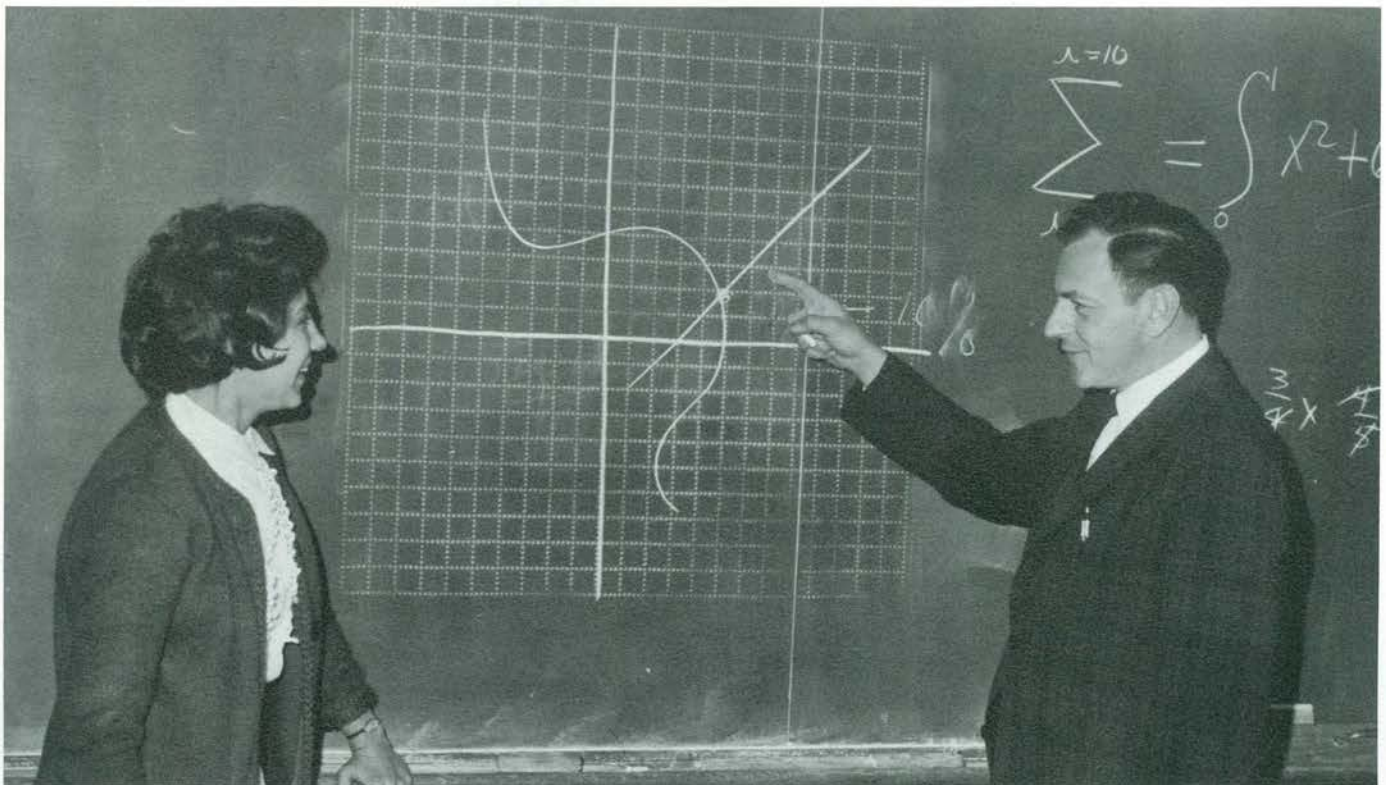
Students in non-college preparatory programs take courses in Consumer, Business, and General Mathematics. Algebra and geometry are required subjects for students who plan to go on to higher education; many college-bound students take advantage of the programs offered in advanced math and calculus.

Last year, an experimental method of self-teaching was introduced for the first time, and was found to be very successful. The TEMAC system is now in its second year at B.H.S., and both the calculus and afternoon algebra class have benefited from the new concept of instruction.

For the first time next year Bangor High students who plan to major in mathematics or who are interested in math may qualify to take mathematics courses at the University of Maine.

## Business Education Prepares Students for the Future

The business course at Bangor High School is divided into two different areas. There is the secretarial course, which is based on shorthand and transcription, and the clerical course, which stresses salesmanship and management. Both of these courses include typing, general office practice, bookkeeping, filing, and the operation of business machines.

Learning proper etiquette is especially important for students who plan to enter a business career; therefore, students participating in the business course are taught how to dress, act, and use the telephone properly.

In order to obtain first-hand experience so they will be better prepared to enter the business world, many students have jobs at different business establishments in Bangor, and some have jobs in the various offices of Bangor High School.

## Industrial Arts Develops Skills

Constructing useful or decorative articles requires a skill which the student in the industrial arts program develops through the use of machines and various hand tools. The carpenter, electrician, draftsman, and metal worker have become vital links in the modern world of industry. Through the industrial arts program at Bangor High School, the student is prepared for any one of these fields by competent and experienced teachers who devote themselves to instructing him in the basic and the advanced industrial skills.

The woodworking and metal shop classes provide the student with the experience of working with machinery to produce various products. He soon gains a knowledge of the functions of each machine he operates.

Obtaining a skill through the use of drawing instruments is the goal of the student of mechanical drawing. One soon realizes the importance of this branch of industrial arts when one observes the mechanics of this field in architecture and engineering.

The purpose of electronics lab is to give the student essential knowledge in electrical applications. Here the student begins with the simple series circuit, and works up to the complicated systems of television and radio.

At Bangor High School the industrial arts program continues to be a valuable one. This is a key part of the student's training which will be most beneficial to him in future years.

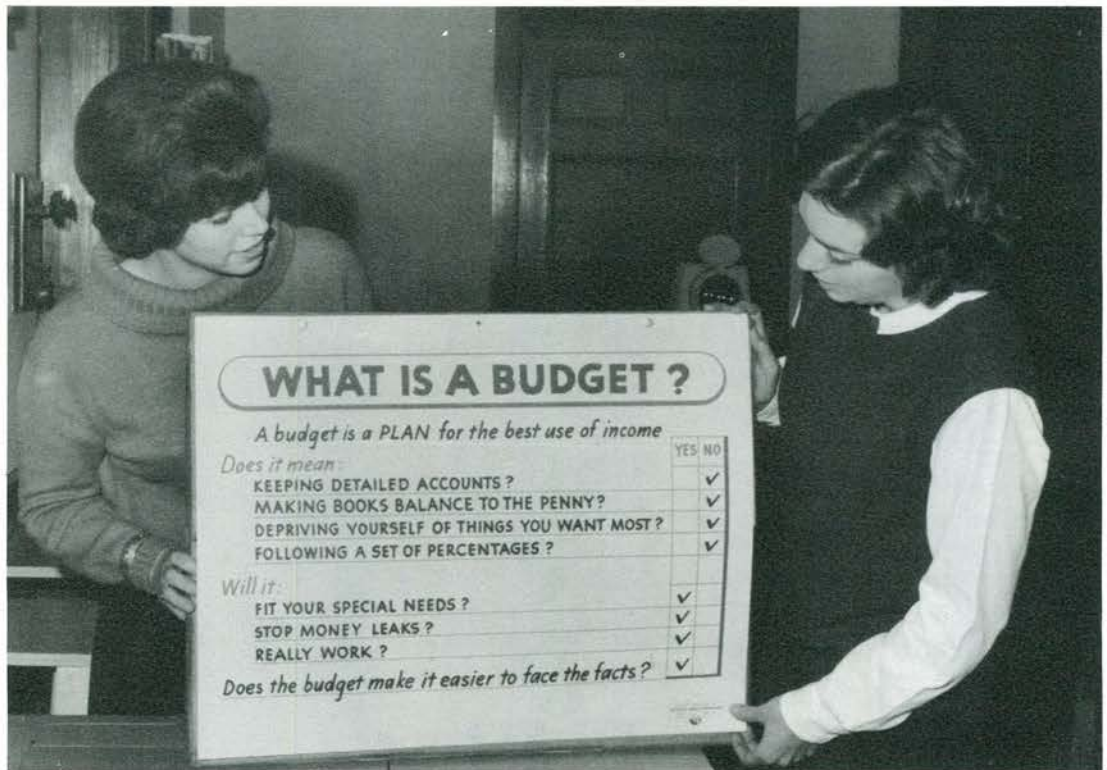

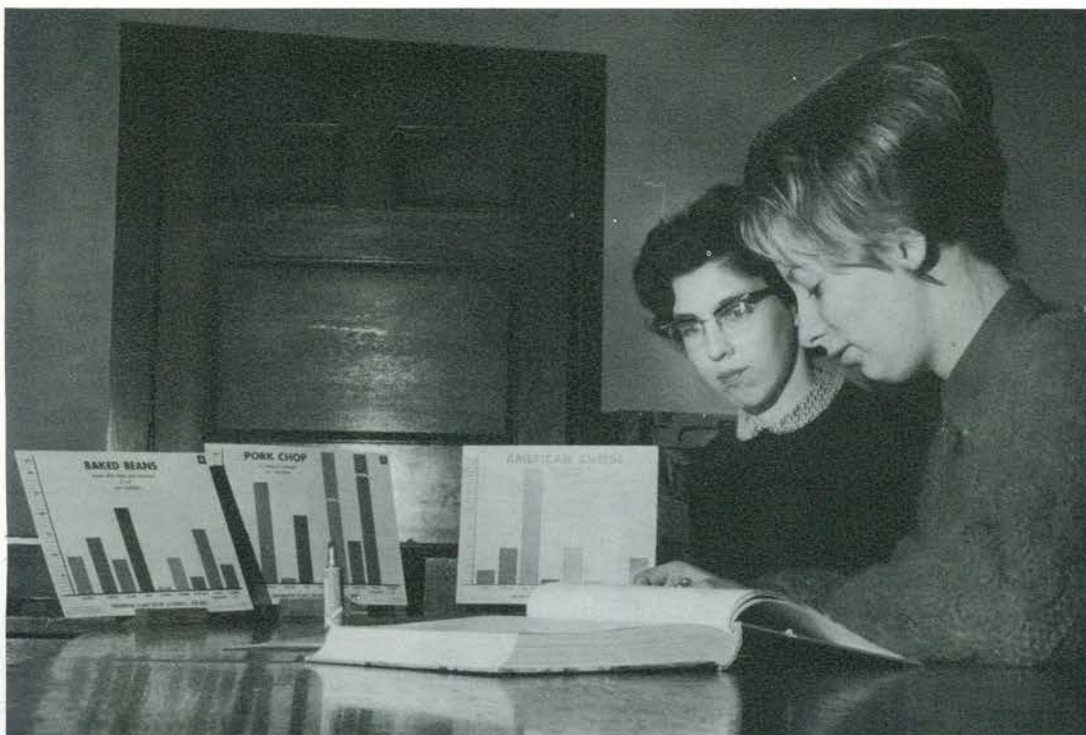

## "Earn While You Learn" Stressed by Distributive Education

The Distributive Education course helps students earn while they learn the fundamentals of the selling of goods and the services of retailing, wholesaling, and service organization.

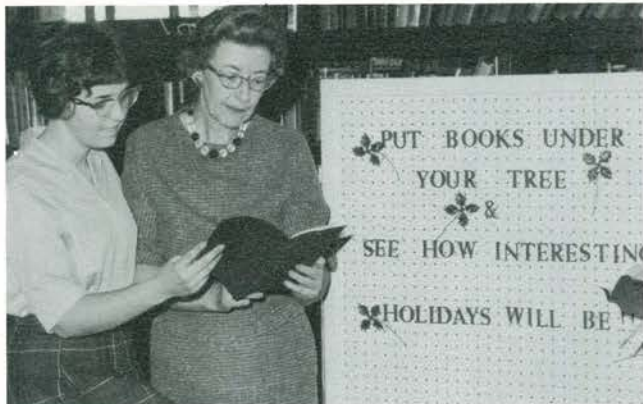

## R. O. T. C. Department Develops Student Leadership

In December, 1963, the Reserve Officer Training Corps celebrated the 102nd anniversary of military instruction for male students at Bangor High School. The objectives of the present-day three-year program of instruction are to prepare the young citizen for possible future military service by the presentation of basic military science. The department intends to develop the traits of leadership and self-discipline in the cadet through practical exercises in leadership and drill training.

Each cadet participates in three hours of training a week with the Army Instructor's goal being to develop and identify leadership potential. ## Physical Education Leads Students To Improved Well-Being

The Physical Education Department of Bangor High School has been carrying on an extensive program of physical training this year. The department believes that all students should be sound of body as well as of mind. To further this ideal, the physical education program is designed to help each student explore his own physical resources and to improve his general health. Physical training and good health in high school will be valuable assets during the years to come.

The boys in physical education classes are given two physical fitness tests each year, one in the fall and one in the spring. These tests are designed to measure the improvement of each individual over the course of the year. Weight training has been an integral part of the curriculum, also. The girls are also given physical fitness tests and spend quite a bit of time on gymnastics. Girls' sports include basketball, field hockey, volleyball, track, soft ball, and tennis.

The Physical Education Department is also concerned with teaching basic physical skills to the students. Therefore an effort is made to teach each student the basics of the more popular sports, such as football (for boys), basketball, volleyball, and track. Both boys and girls participate in square dancing, which is an important part of the course, for it helps the student improve his co-ordination and quick thinking.

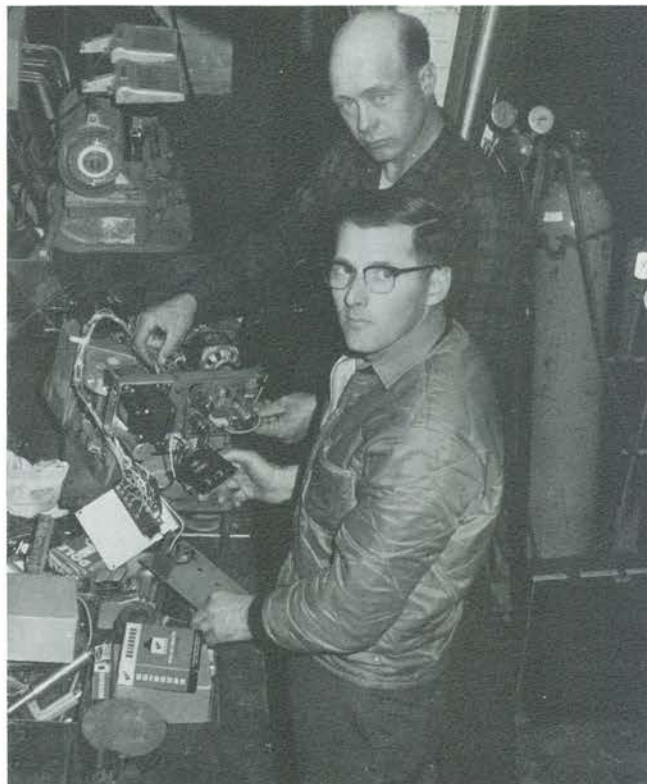

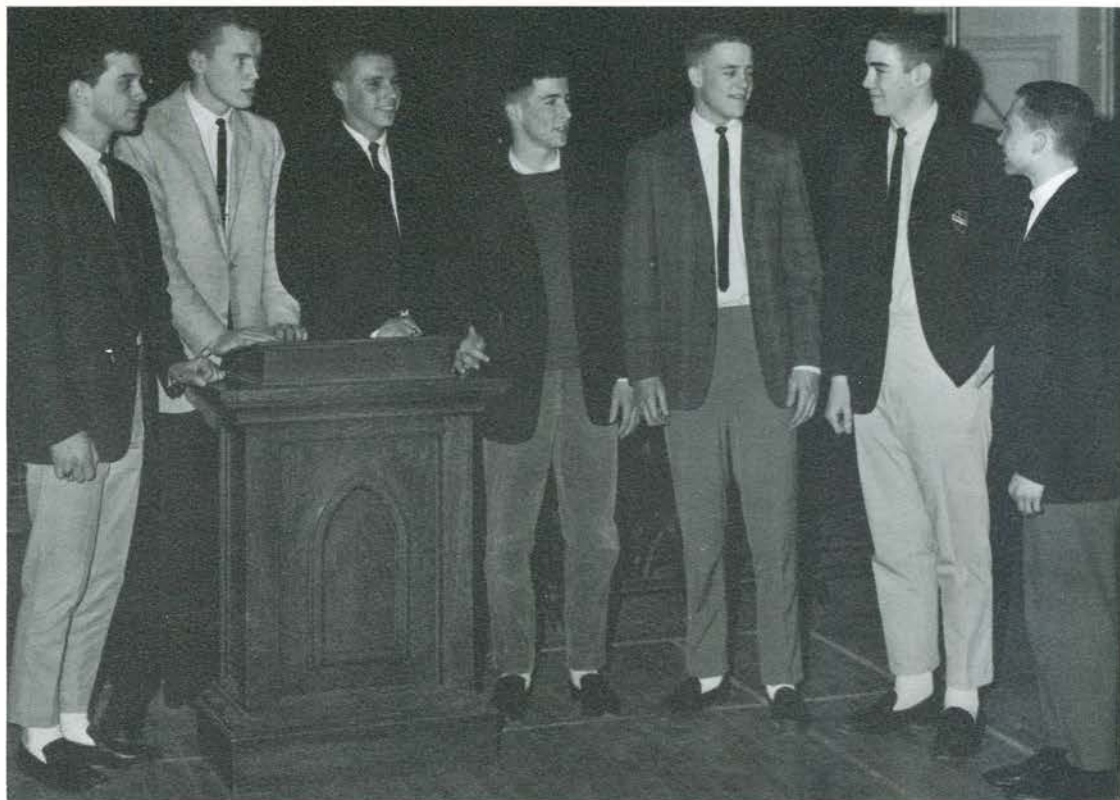

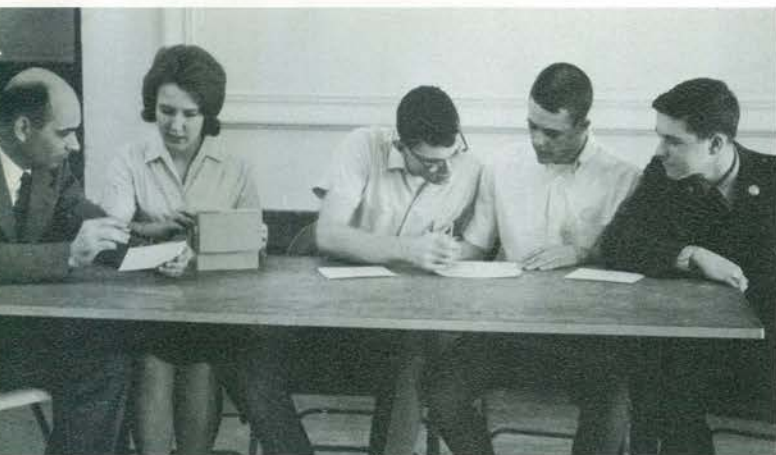

## R. O. T. C. Offers Varied Activities to Interested Cadets

Bangor High School is one of the selected few high schools in the United States to sponsor a Reserve Officers' Training Corps. To the student who takes advantage of this training, many doors are opened. The interested cadet will study military organization and customs, first aid, modern weapons, small unit tactics, map and aerial photograph reading, methods of instruction, and many other areas of practical value. The rifle teams, drill teams, and familiarization programs offer further experiences to the cadet.

The ROTC cadet also has the satisfaction of assuming responsibility early in his training. He learns basic military procedures during the first years of study, then takes the responsibility of leadership, and teaches during succeeding years. He plans and directs unit training, makes decisions on matters relating to personnel and discipline, and assumes command responsibilities. Young men in business executive training must wait years to exercise this type of authority. It is this combination of a competent teaching staff, enthusiastic and experienced cadet officers, and an interested Cadet Corps which makes the Bangor High School Reserve Officers' Training program a source of pride for the high school and the community.

This year's officers were Susan Strang, president; Dawn Alexander, vice-president; and Terry Tyler, secretary-treasurer.

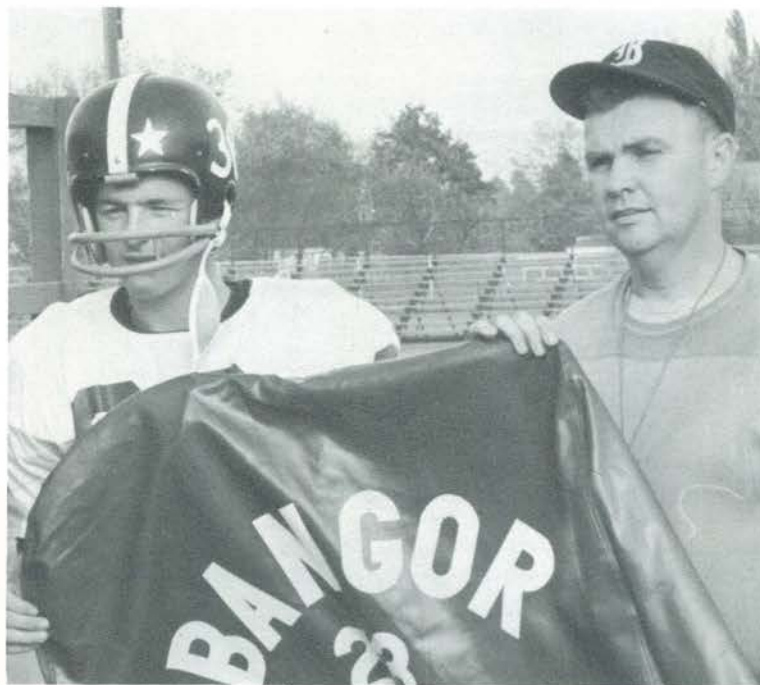

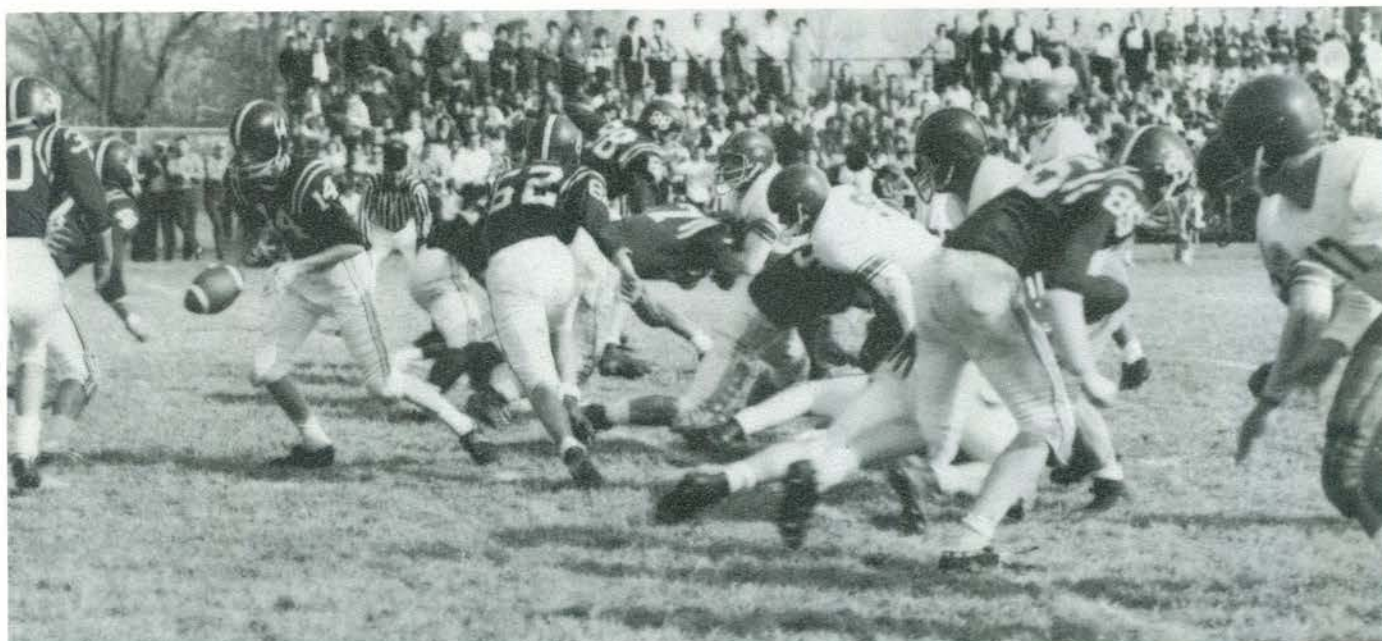

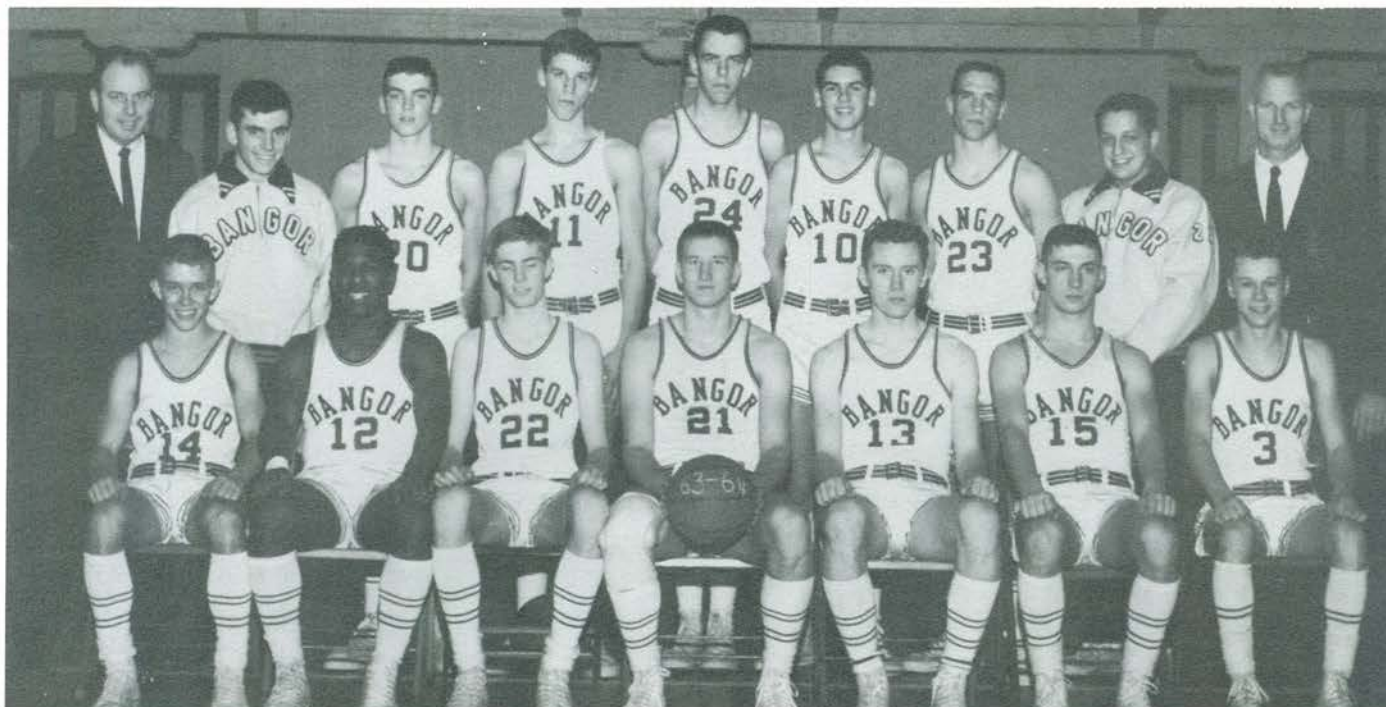

## Barrymen Finish The Season With A Rush

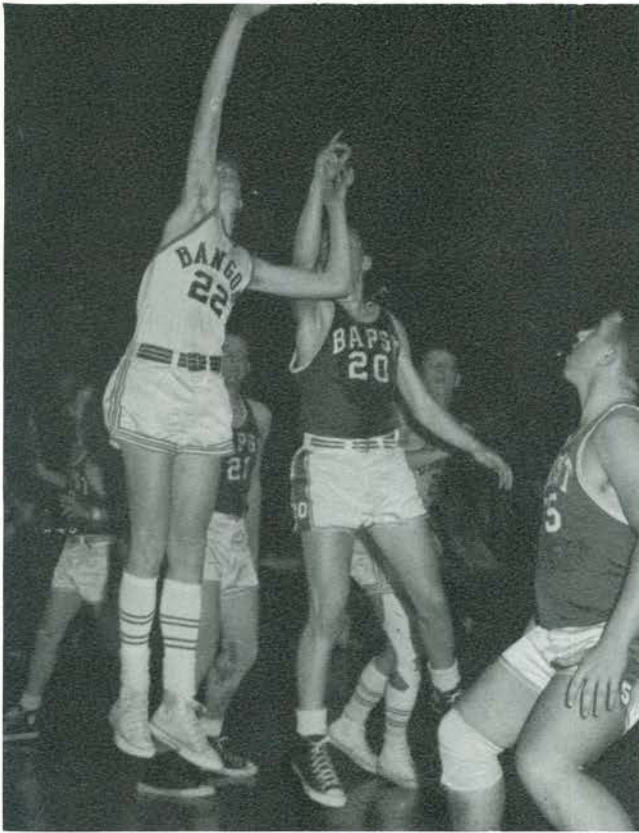

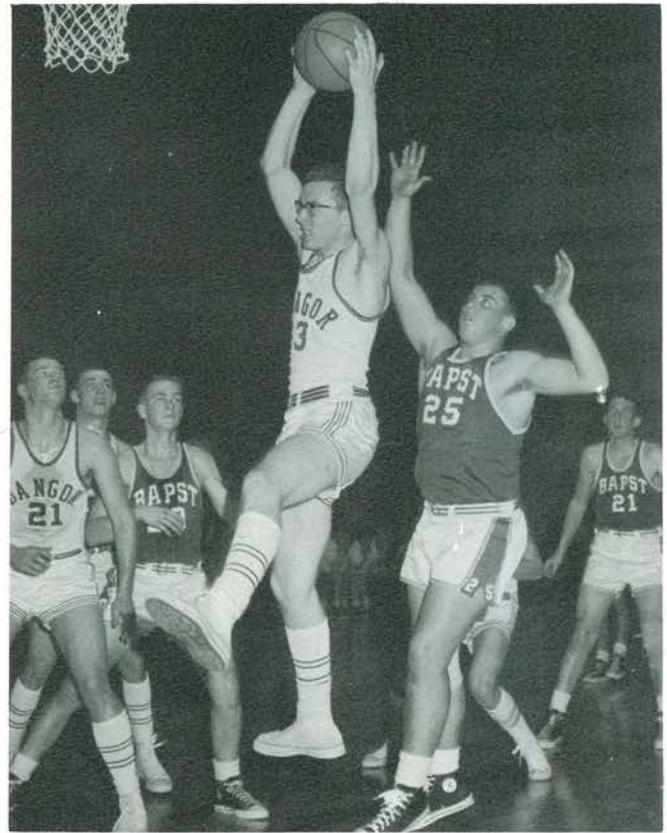
Coach Barry's boys made the season nearly perfect with twin killings over Brewer and John Bapst. The most tense game for the boys was the four-overtime win over Bapst.

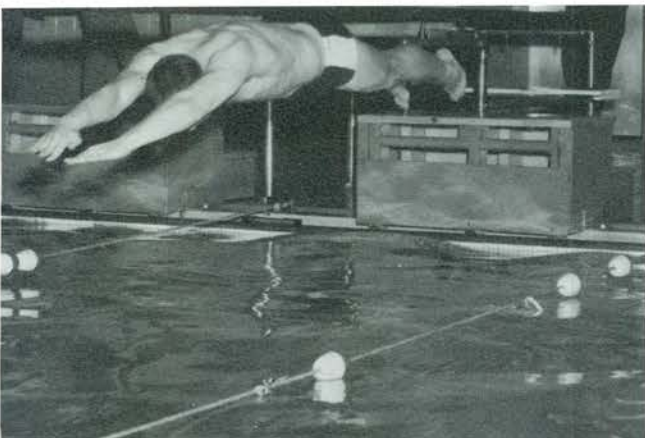

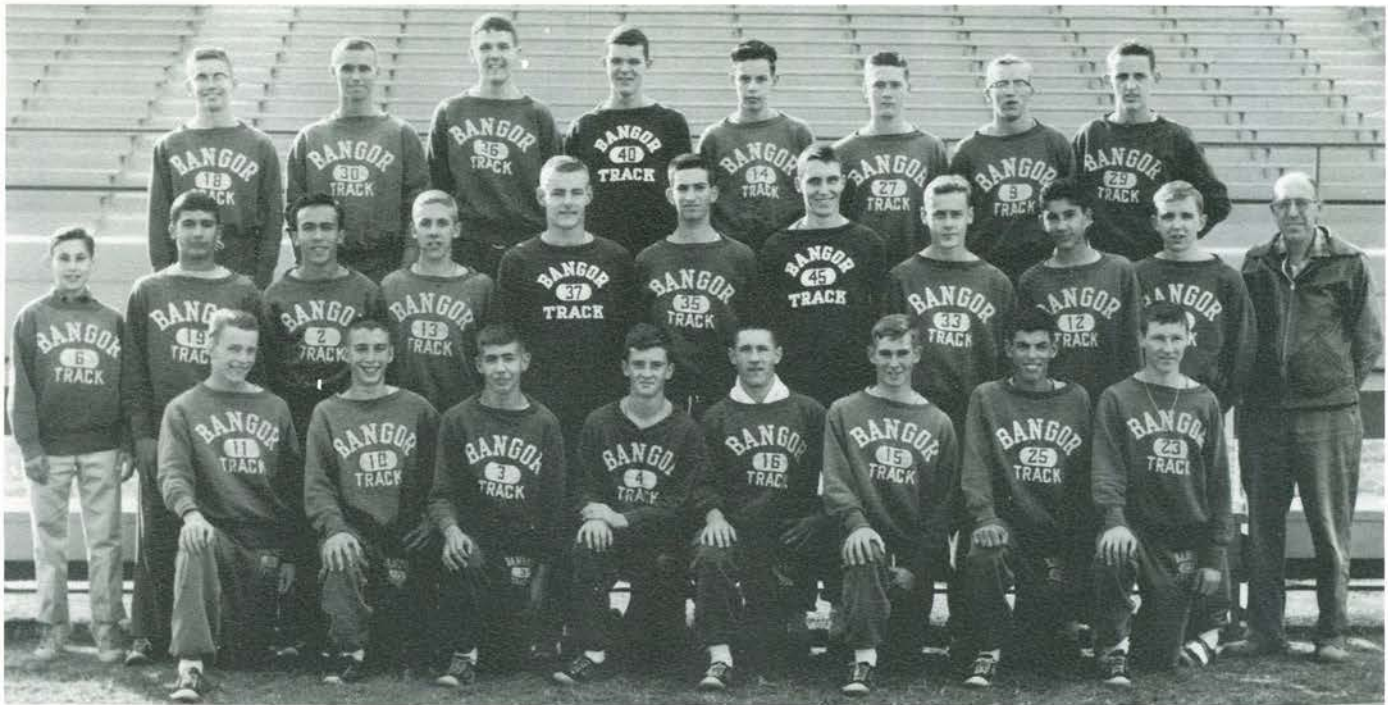

To earn money for their awards and the megaphone necklaces, the Jayvees joined the Varsity cheerleaders in supporting the school dances following the basketball games.

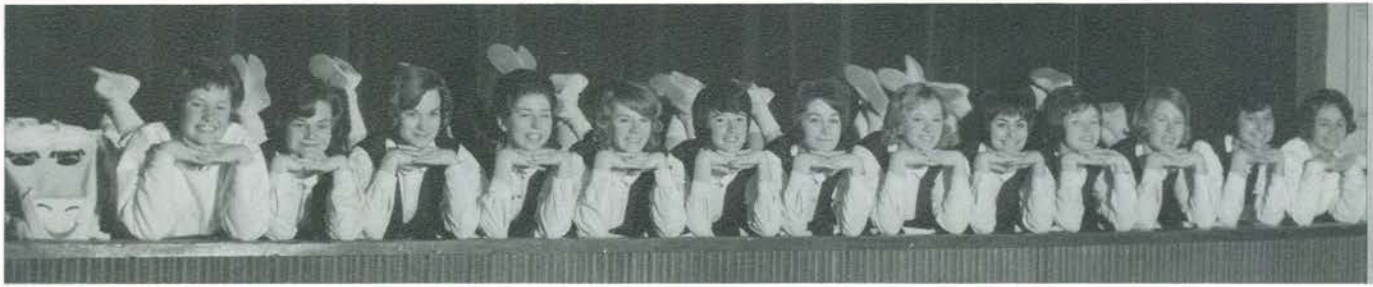

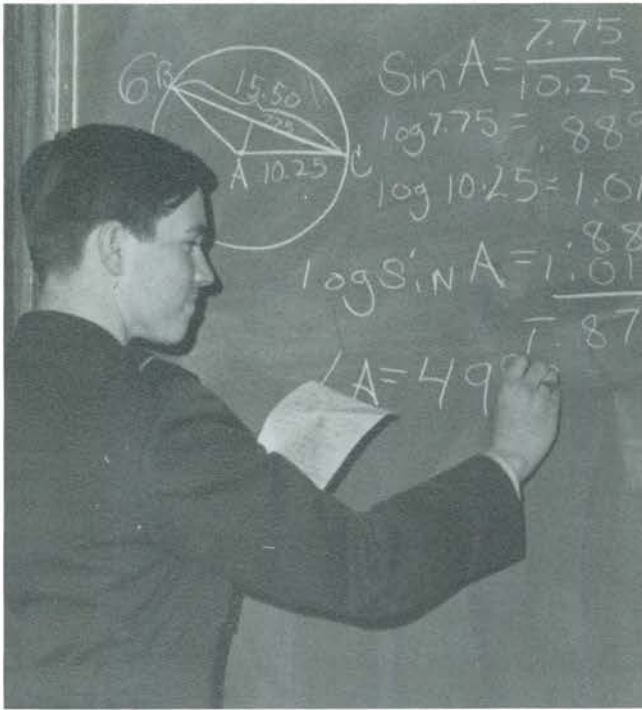

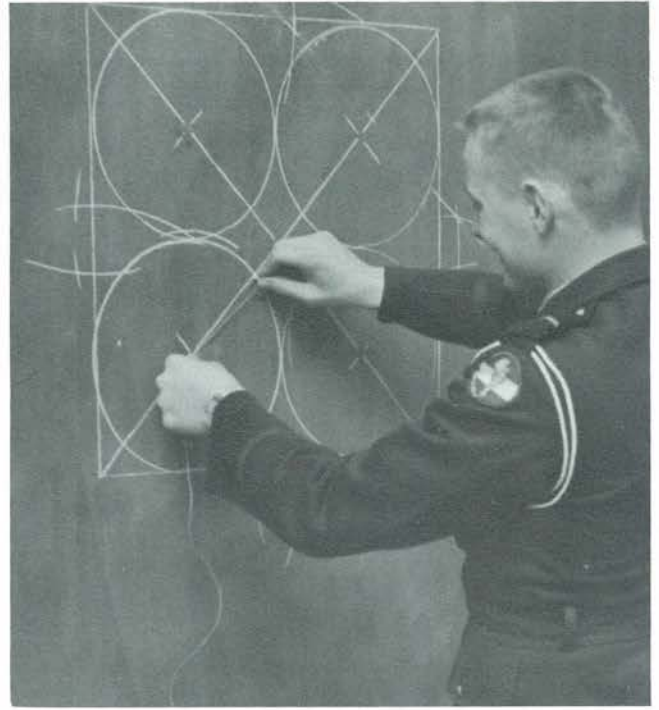
