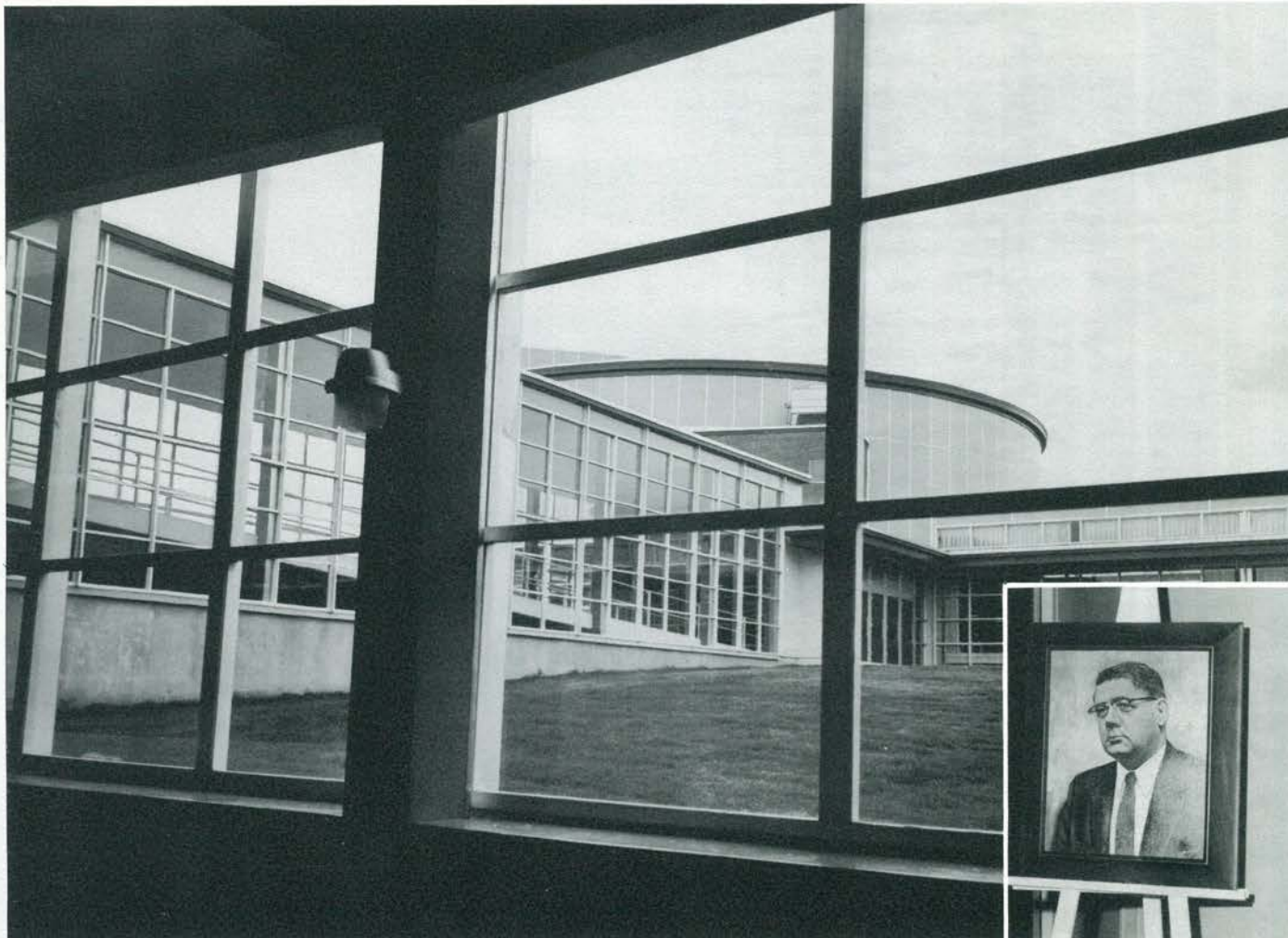
B. H. S. Stetsons raise the Flag over the newly dedicated Bangor High School.

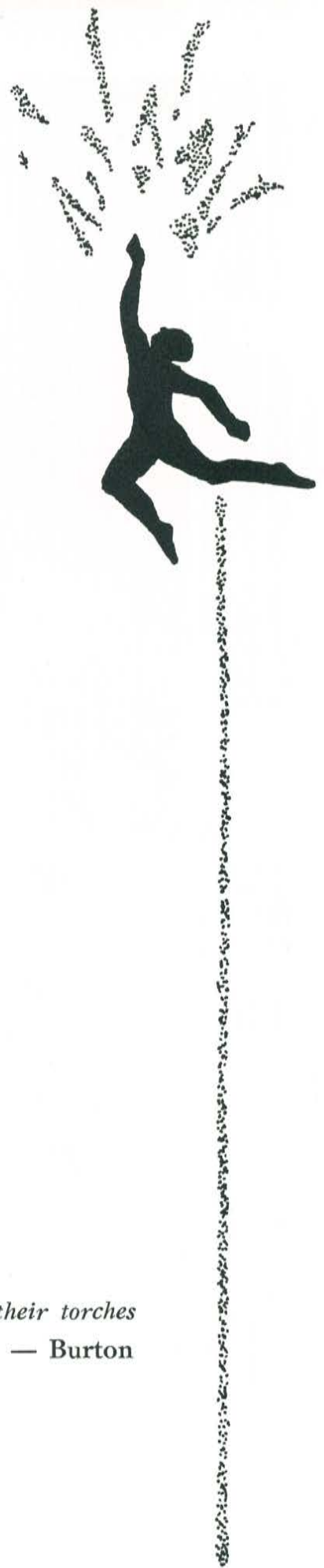

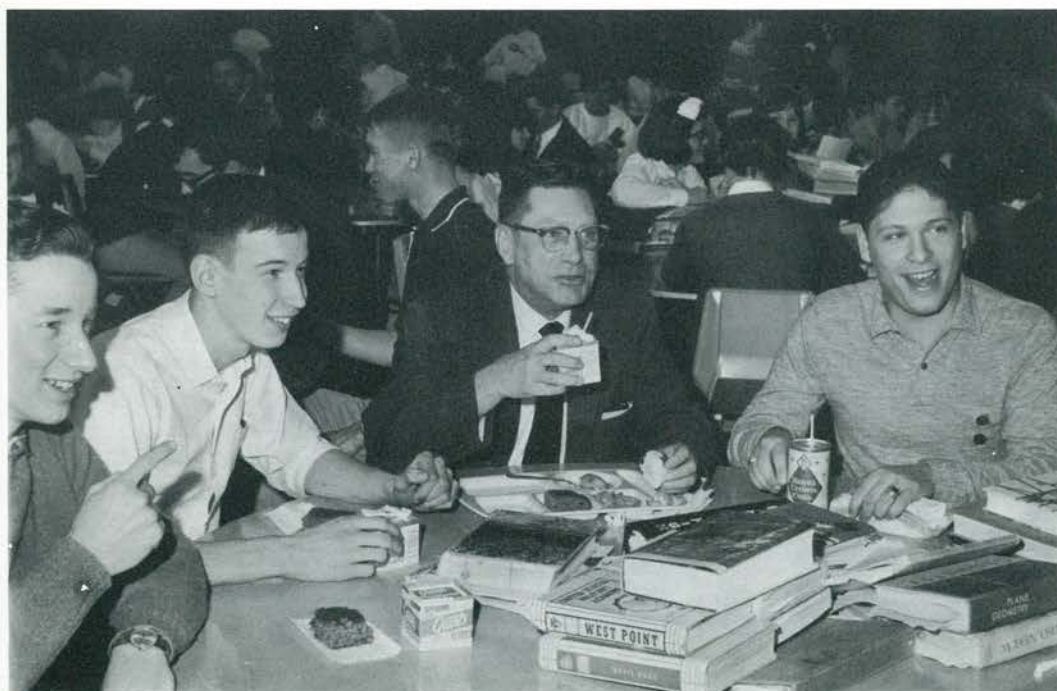

Knowledge Of English Found Essential Today

In the modern world, English is the native tongue of millions of people and the second language of millions more. The language serves as a branch of communication between people of different nations and cultures. It is essential, therefore, that a high school have a strong English department in order to equip its students for the changing world.

Under the direction of Mr. Wallace Woodcock, the Bangor High School English Department offers an extensive program fulfilling the needs of every student. The main purpose of the varied curricula is to implant in the student the means whereby he can read, write, speak and think intelligently in the ever changing society.

Among the methods used to accomplish this purpose is the study of literature. With a good foundation gained in the freshman year, students have an excellent base for American literature, studied in the sophomore year. In the junior year a student is introduced to a detailed course in English literature and then is ready to come in contact with literature from all parts of the world during the senior year.

English usage, spelling, and vocabulary are stressed all four years. Good English usage habits reflect a good education. In writing letters, in reading and following directions, and in everyday communications with others, this knowledge of English is essential.

The department tries to give every student at Bangor High School a program that will prepare him for the keen competition he will meet for good positions in business and industry.

Students Develop "Nose For News"

Under the direction of Miss Jessie L. Fraser, the journalism class has kept pace with the ever-changing curriculum at Bangor High School. Offered for the first time this year, Journalism has given enthusiastic members of the class an opportunity to appreciate the "hows and whys" of newspaper management and production. Alien sounding terms such as leading, bleeding, and galley proofs became quite familiar as typical newspaper jargon.

From their first lesson, students of journalism learned to develop a "nose for news." The realization of this art of finding and reporting the facts quickly, truthfully, and in an interesting manner is one of the primary goals of the course. To demonstrate their progress, the journalism class produced a newspaper called *Ramblings* for school-wide circulation. Since *Ramblings* was so well received, Miss Fraser has expressed hopes that future journalism classes will comprise a staff for the production of other such publications.

Journalism also provided the class with worthwhile, practical insight into yearbook production, as well as with valuable experience on the *Orascope*. As this course becomes more firmly established at Bangor High School, it will undoubtedly afford many students a better understanding of the intriguing field of journalism.

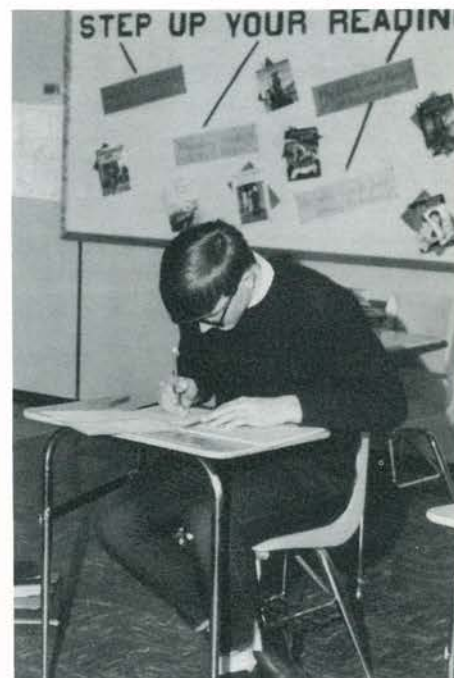

All of the students in the junior class are tested in September for vocabulary, comprehension, and rate. The re-

sults are available to teachers and students.

A diversity of materials are used in order to meet the individual needs of each student so that he may progress at his own rate and achieve success. Listening and study skills are taught as well as advanced reading skills. Next year a course in reading will be offered on an elective basis to all students in grade nine.

Psychology Class

Explores Man's Personality

Why do people behave as they do? Students taking psychology are given the opportunity to explore the complex personality of man and the many reasons for his behavior. Before venturing into the realm of psychology, it is important to realize that the course is integrated into other fields; such as, anthropology, biology, and sociology.

To define the necessary terms is the first step in studying psychology. A vocabulary in this course consists of such words as maturity, normalcy, and personality. Students in Mr. Robert Robles' class elect topics of interest for their discussion groups. The teen-age attitude toward dating, religion, adults, and marriage have been a few of the interests of group discussions. Through outside reading, research papers, surveys, and panels, students better understand mental health, group behavior, and childhood. Many scientific research projects and experiments have been conducted; such as, teaching a group of students Russian under varied conditions and comparing hamsters, one exposed to a warm environment, the other to a cold, secluded one.

This course is recommended for juniors and seniors. After studying psychology, students better understand the many problems of man, his heritage, and his environment.

The Speech Department also helps to bring culture to the students at B.H.S. Foundations of Speech, Dramatic Arts, and Oral Interpretation, all of which are semester courses provide students with the opportunity to become skilled and poised when speaking before an audience. Mrs. Barbara Browne's classes have been responsible for a wide variety of speeches such as persuasive, informative, demonstrative, and after-dinner speeches. Fine Arts Survey Introduced

With the skirl of bagpipes, the beat of the tom-tom, and the resonant wail of Medea, Fine Arts Survey has followed man's creative struggle. At Bangor High School the Fine Arts Survey course brings together in historical perspective literature, art, music, and drama. This material is presented in a variety of ways. Unusual on a secondary level, Bangor High School is one of the few high schools in the New England States to have such a program.

Five members of the faculty lecture in turn concerning their specific field: Mr. J. Palmer Libby, Mrs. Barbara Browne, Mr. C. Robert Jones, Mr. Julius Kostick, and Mr. Wallace Woodcock. Man's development from primitive times to the twentieth century is studied. Some approaches are lectures, discussions, individual student projects, outside speakers from the community, films, and student-prepared lectures. Some of the unusual presentations this year have been a bagpipe recital by Ned Smith, a lecture and violin presentation by Elizabeth Tibbetts, and a pantomime dance by three members of the Order of the Arrow. Mrs. Margo Hamm of Bangor Civic Theatre gave a reading from the Greek play *Medea*.

Language Department Offers Variety

As the world becomes smaller by new methods of communication and travel, knowledge of foreign languages is becoming vitally important. To meet the needs of their students, the foreign language teachers at Bangor High have attempted to introduce into the curricula the histories and cultures of other lands as well as the study of basic grammar and vocabulary.

Every other year, many second and third year French students go to the French-speaking province of Quebec, where they apply their knowledge of the language outside of class.

Spanish-speaking students begin conversing almost immediately in the first year. They gradually progress through simple grammar and vocabulary until they are able to read more difficult stories in Spanish literature.

Spanish and French students alike enjoy the excellent facilities of Bangor High's language laboratory. The students improve their speed of conversation as well as their comprehension through the use of tape recorders, microphones, and earphones in the language laboratory.

In order to obtain a basic foundation of modern languages, Latin students study grammar and vocabulary. First year students obtain a basic foundation readying them for a study of Caesar's campaigns in the second year. Third and fourth year students learn to appreciate the writings of Cicero and Virgil.

Classical civilization, a course new this year, requires no training in any foreign language but emphasizes that the period of classical civilization produced many of the world's greatest works in literature, art, sculpture, and architecture.

This year Russian has been offered on an experimental basis to a limited number of students. Mr. G. Craig Abbott of the English department has been instructor.

Mr. Gonyar found this a very helpful and worthwhile trip.

History was brought to life through frequent use of the opaque projectors, motion pictures, overhead projectors, and various other types of equipment from the audio-visual department. The new methods in presenting history made classes more interesting to students and teachers alike.

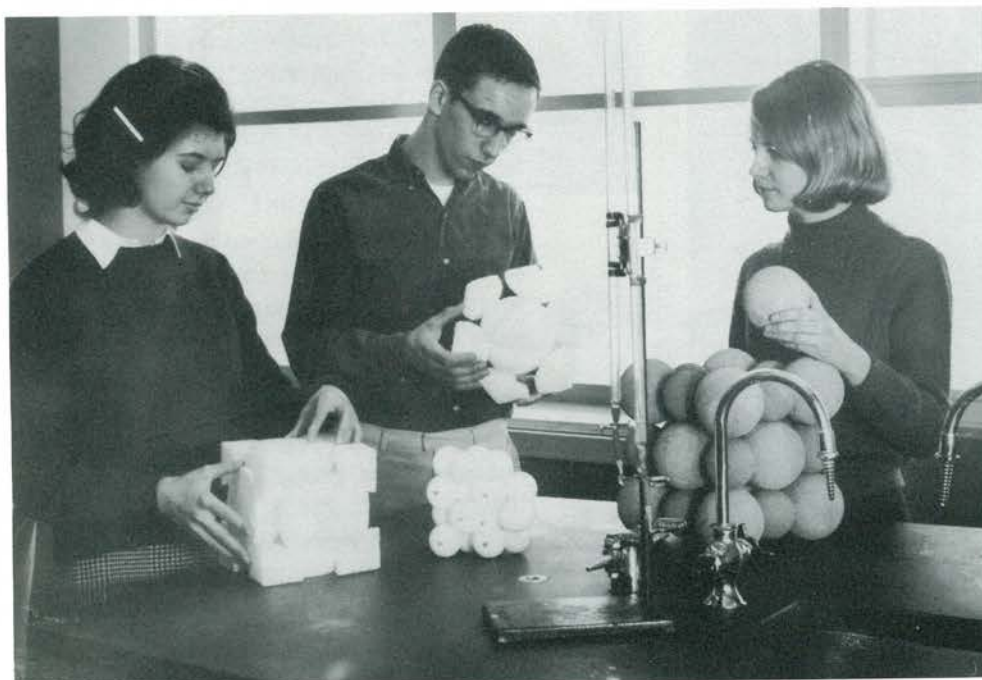

Advances Keynote Science Department

Advancement is the key word to describe the science department at BHS. Three new courses were offered to a limited number of students: BSCS Biology, Advanced Biology, and CBA Chemistry.

BSCS Biology (Biological Science Curriculum Study) was taught to a class of sixteen by Mr. Douglas Stafford. The course is an approach to investigate science and its major concepts.

Advanced Biology was introduced and taught by Mr. Stafford. This program was offered to a certain number of students with the prerequisite being regular lab biology courses.

CBA Chemistry, derived from the Chemical Bond Approach Project, was taught to one class by Mr. Bradley Peters. This study of chemistry introduced new concepts along with a regular lab program.

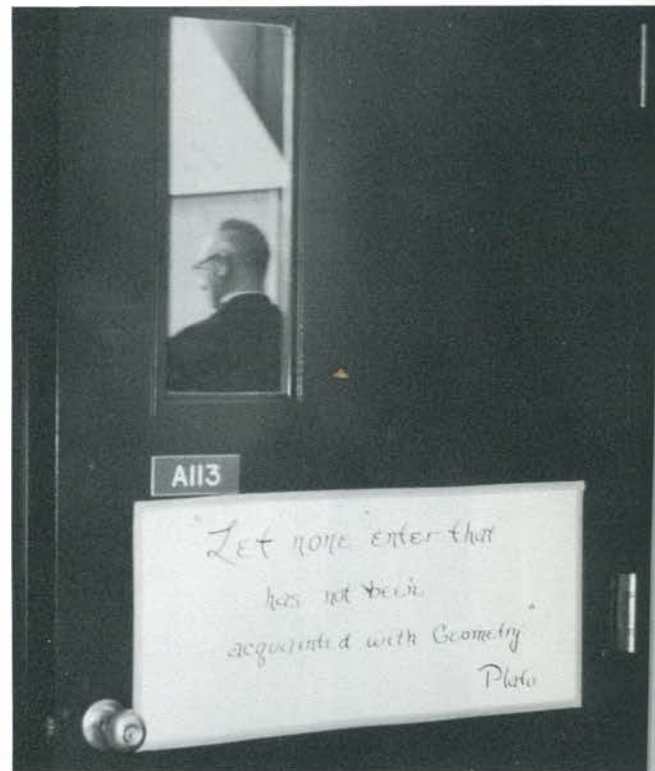

Math Department Prepares Students For Tomorrow's World

Bangor High School's curriculum provides a wide variety of mathematics courses to satisfy the needs of both the college and non-college students.

Geometry and algebra are still under the heading of required subjects for all college-bound students. The TEMAC system proves to be a successful system of instruction for the calculus classes. For the first time, a B.H.S. student who plans to major in mathematics has been taking a mathematics course at the University of Maine. The math department is quite pleased to have a student taking this course at the University of Maine.

Plans have been made to separate the general mathematics course into three divisions, General Math I, II, and III. Those students receiving a satisfactory rank in their general math course will be eligible to advance to General Math II and III.

Students taking the non-college preparatory programs have the opportunity to take courses in Consumer Business, as well as General Mathematics.

The math department at B.H.S. has set up a curriculum to prepare its students to meet the challenges of higher education and the business world.

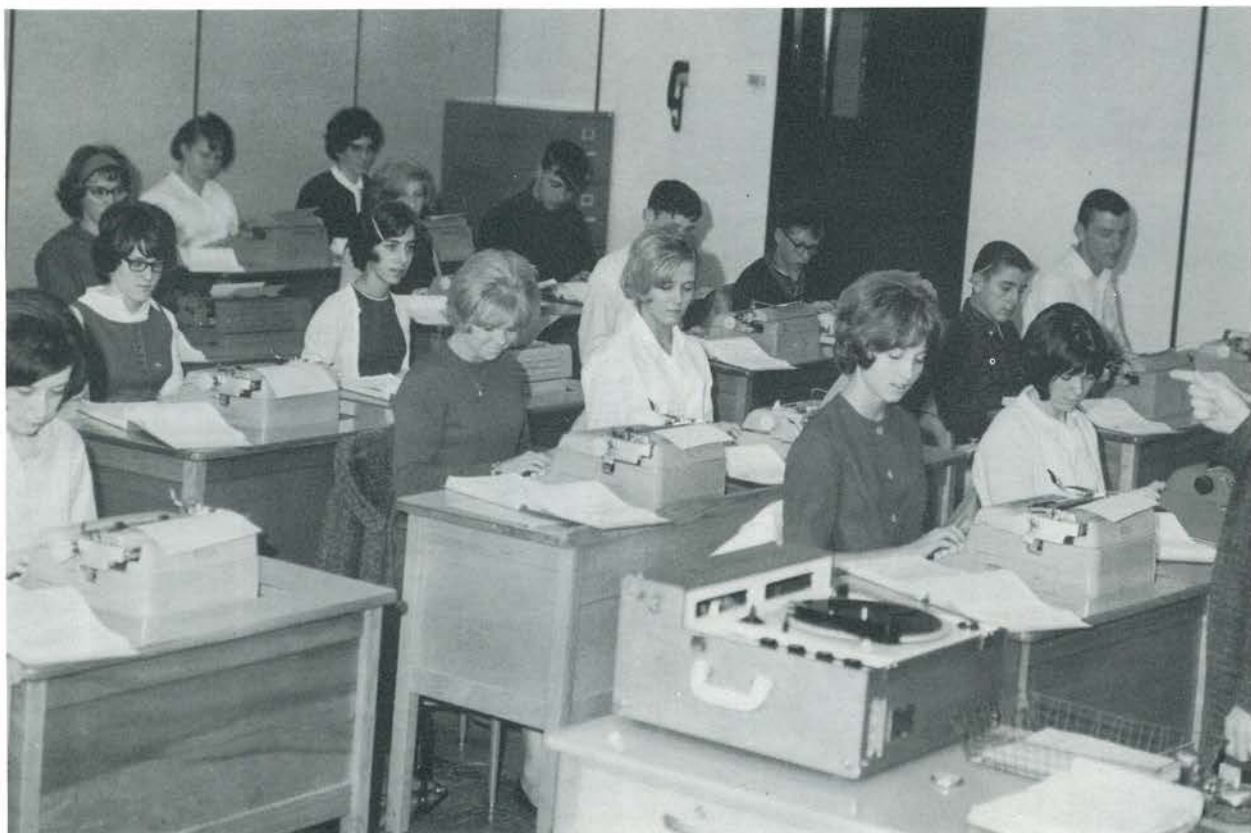

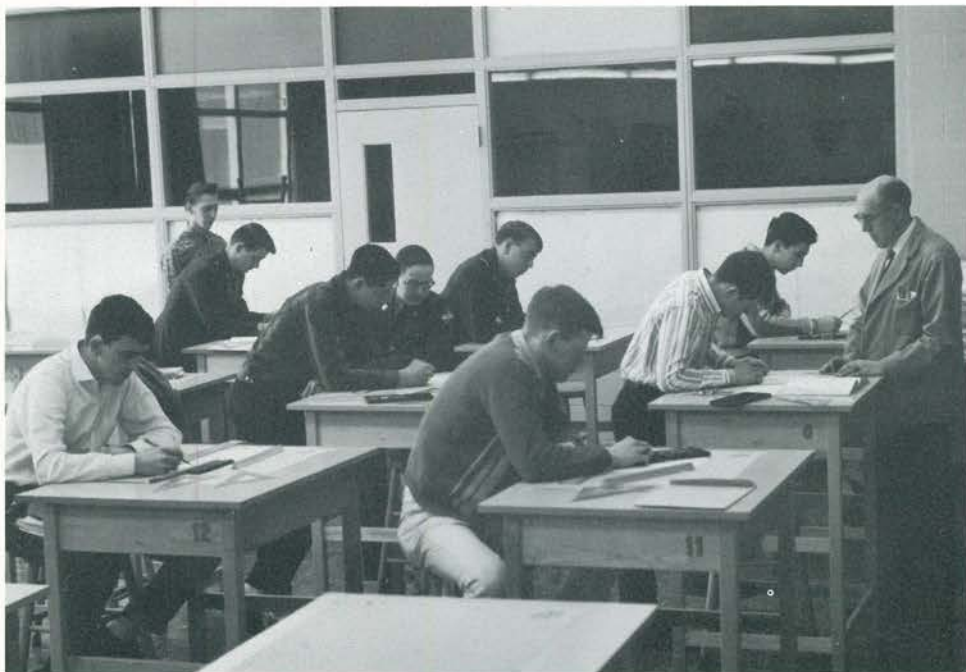

Two New Shops Are Added In Industrial Arts Department

When Bangor High School moved to its Broadway building, the Industrial Arts Department gained modern, well-equipped shop areas. The added Graphic Arts and Transportation programs have given a well-rounded course that offers something for everyone. Each spacious shop is thoroughly equipped with the most modern machinery and facilities available allowing a progressive program. Every effort has been made in the selecting and setting-up of the furnishings to attain this end.

The response of the students has been fine, both in enrollment and quality of work. During the fall semester 240 boys enrolled in the industrial arts classes. The college preparatory students have been particularly welcome. The pre-engineering experience with machinery, electricity, and drafting will help in college work. Those enrolled in transportation learn how to care for and make repairs on their own automobiles. The

printing industry is studied by the graphic arts groups which have printed much material for the high school as well as private printing of their own.

Eighteen class subjects are available because each major field is subdivided into three sections. A basic course is recommended as a prerequisite, with specialized study following. It is possible for a student to gain experience in all six major fields, or to concentrate his study in one or two areas.

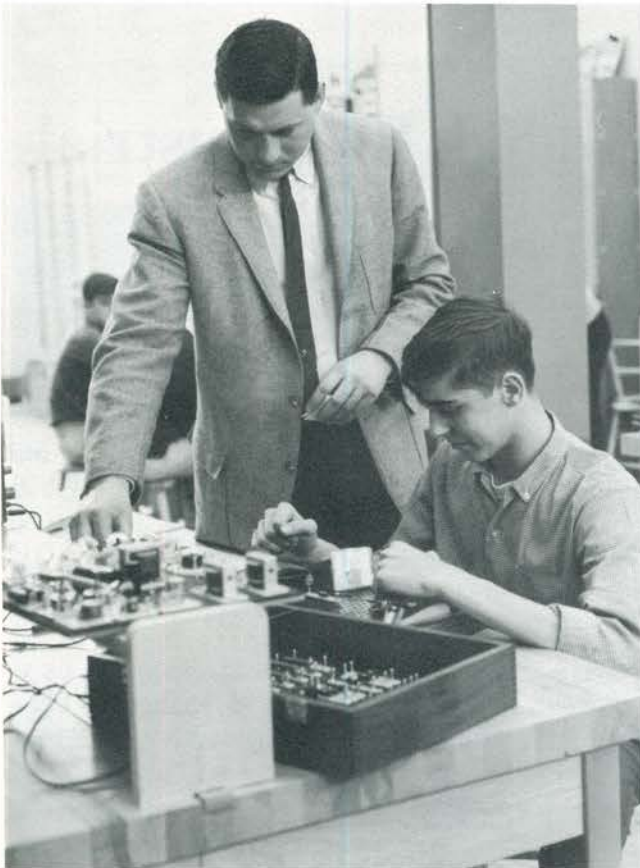

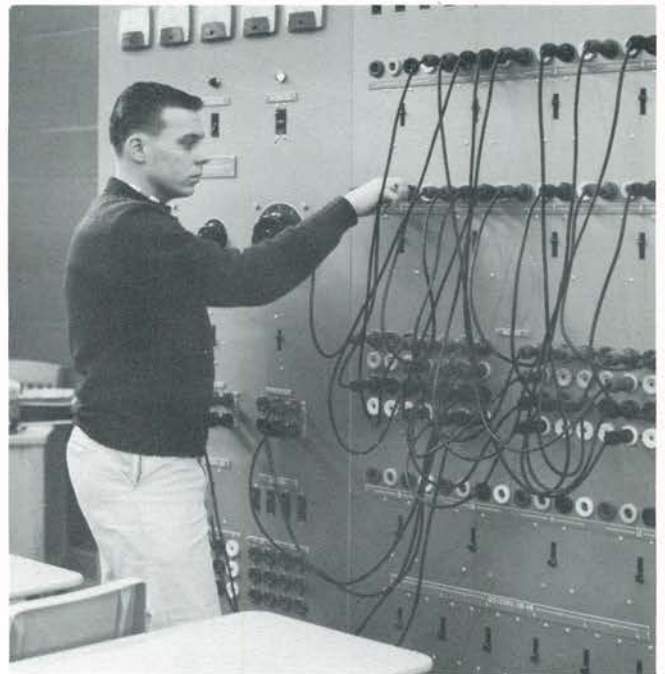

Home Economics Stresses Home And Family Living

Home Economics Stresses Home and Family Living. . . On the opening day of school the Bangor High School administration, faculty, and students moved into its Broadway home. What could be more of a challenge to the Home Economics Department than completely different laboratories and surroundings? When the furniture and equipment arrived, the students had first-hand consumer experience as they arranged the kitchens. Each of the four kitchens in the foods laboratory was equipped for a different economic level. The expanded facilities in all areas offered a greater variety of learning for all the girls.

The basis of the Home Economics Department is improvement of home and family living. The program is divided into seven distinct units: personal and family relations, child care and development, housing and home decorating, home management and consumer buying, foods and nutrition, clothing and textiles, and family health and safety. The program offers a three year sequence to all girls majoring in Home Economics.

Senior Special is a comprehensive survey course covering all areas. It is intended for business and college-bound senior girls with no previous study of high school home economics.

This will allow more girls to take advantage of the program, enabling them to choose areas of specific interest. Plans are also being made for a nursery school to be held at the school in connection with the Marriage and Family, and Child Development units. These changes will make the Home Economics Department even more beneficial to the students of Bangor High School.

Distributive Education Students Learn Fundamentals Of Business

Students in the Distributive Education course met at Bangor High School in the morning for classes in English, math, retailing, displaying, and typing. In the afternoons they worked part-time at places of business in the city. Most of the students continue their jobs of selling and servicing after graduation. Some worked at Grant's and Freese's. At Lyford-Woodard, Ray Moran's work consisted of servicing, cleaning, and storing furs. Jerry Whitehouse finished photos at Janel's Studio. To enroll, qualified students must have completed their junior year satisfactorily, be at least sixteen years old, and show definite interest in the program. The twenty students of this year's course are under the direction of Mr. Raymond Thibodeau.

R O T C Develops Leadership

The Reserve Officers' Training Corps is a program to develop student leadership, teach citizenship ideals, develop an understanding of the opportunities existing in the military services of the United States, and assist the institution in the development of mature, self-disciplined, responsible citizens.

The High School R.O.T.C. program is a complement to the college level R.O.T.C. program, leading to the commissioning of a male college graduate as an officer in the Armed Forces of the United States. The R.O.T.C. department is commanded by Lt. Col. Walter C. Franzen, who has recently served in Viet Nam.

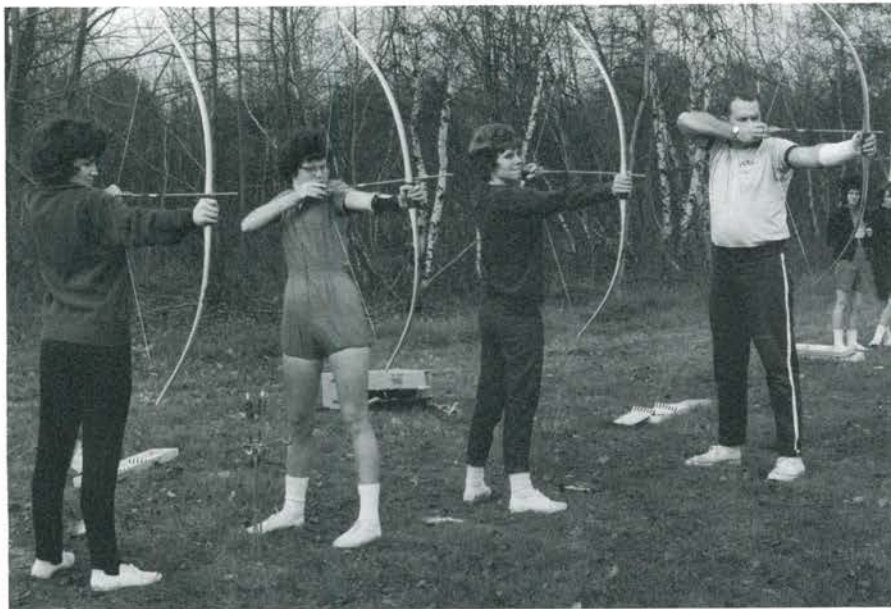
The curriculum is one prescribed by the Department of Army for the more than 400 high schools in the nation that have an R.O.T.C. program. Courses of instruction include military customs and organization, weapons instruction, first aid, map reading, tactics, and methods of instruction.

The program gives any interested cadet the opportunity to learn valuable information and to attain rank. The cadet may exercise authority that he never thought would be possible. A high school student can mature rapidly in this course.

In addition to the regular classroom program, the R.O.T.C. faculty members sponsor and train three extra-curricular student activities. The Stetson Rifles is an all-R.O.T.C. drill unit that represents BHS in an annual drill competition held at Fort Devons, Massachusetts, and performs for parades and school activities. The Stetsonettes is an all-girl drill unit that performs during the BHS basketball season and at parades held in Bangor. The R.O.T.C. Rifle Teams represent BHS in small bore (.22 calibre) rifle matches in the State of Maine and the U. S. Army marksmanship program.

Physical Education Provides Complete Program Of Physical Fitness

A shiny gymnasium, complete with every imaginable piece of modern equipment, sparked enthusiasm from the students in the physical education classes. The boys' and girls' gym classes participated in programs designed to teach such fundamental skills and games as basketball, badminton, volleyball, and gymnastics. Physical fitness tests were administered to the gym classes three times during the year in order to measure the improvement of each individual.

Among the most popular activities of the physical education curriculum were gymnastics, archery, weightlifting, and square dancing. The square dancing program continued approximately three weeks, during which time the B.H.S. gym was a lively spot of activity.

This year the physical education department has been able to sponsor a larger number of intramural sports than ever before. Boys intramural touch football under the direction of Mr. Granville MacMillan was an active program during the fall. Field hockey was conducted last fall for the girls. During the long indoor season an enthusiastic number of boys and girls participated in the volleyball and basketball intramurals. Skiing was a favorite sport at B.H.S. Mr. Ralph Baxter conducted classes in skiing to help the beginners become skilled enough to manage a moderate slope. Mr. MacMillan and Mr. Baxter served in the physical education department in addition to their regular academic duties.

The goal of the physical education staff has been to acquaint the students with basic skills and to encourage physical fitness.

Driver Education Keeps Up With The Times

Bangor High School has the most modern equipment available in the Driver Education Department. It is the only high school in the state of Maine to have simulators (machines used in the classroom to simulate driving).

A student must spend thirty hours in the classroom. There he learns about motor vehicle laws and about the mechanics of a car. He is put in an "on the spot" situation by means of the movie screen and simulators that resemble cars. These give the feeling that the student is really driving and gives him added experience in learning correct driving habits. Twelve hours must be spent working on these machines. Three hours of actual driving experience are achieved by means of two Plymouth cars donated by the Dorr Chrysler-Plymouth Company.

Since the automobile is today the most common method of transportation, it is most important to have safe, qualified drivers. At B.H.S. through the driver education course, taught by Mr. Lloyd Rhodes and Mr. David Rand, the student is instructed in the importance of good driving.

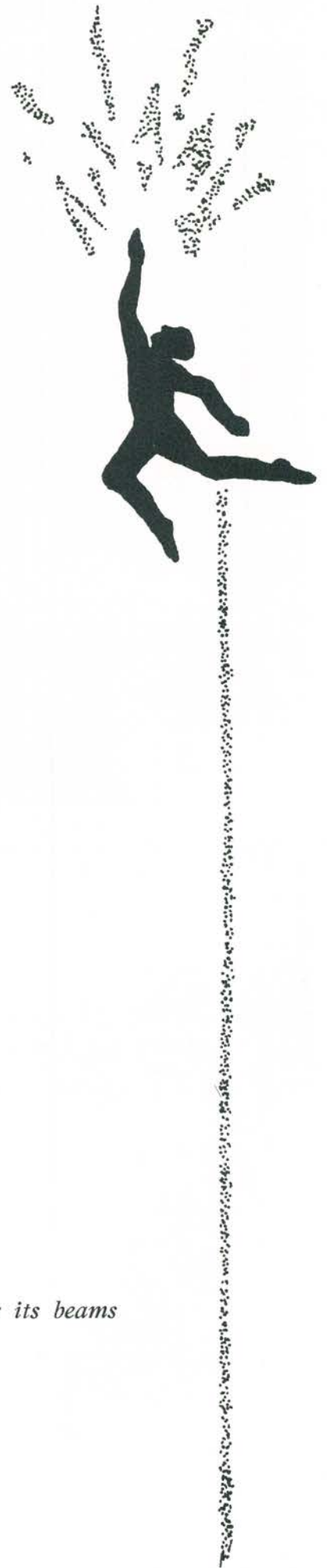

Girls' State and Boys' State are practical applications of Americanism and good citizenship. They are non-partisan, non-political attempts to teach and inculcate in the youth of America a love of God and country. The purpose is to afford girls and boys a chance to participate as self-governing citizens of an imaginary state. The state of Dirigo is run the same way as the state of Maine; delegates are divided into political parties, and live in mythical towns. Any delegate may run for an office in the local, county, or state level, by obtaining the required number of signatures on a petition. Just before the election, a rally is held for each party with the candidates giving impressive campaign speeches. After the election, the newly-elected officials serve in their offices for a day, attending committee meetings and voting on legislation.

A total of 151 students arrived in Bangor, along with several New England Council members, judges, and guests from various drama associations; also on hand to work were about seventy-five Bangor High School students and faculty members. The two-day affair was the result of much preliminary planning and work. Special credit should be given to Mrs. Barbara Browne and Mr. Herbert Billett, General Co-Chairmen and Hosts, for the outstanding job they did in planning and carrying out the Festival.

Each New England state was represented by two plays, chosen from the state finals after various preliminary contests. The program consisted entirely of either one-act dramas or cuttings, ranging from light humor to intense drama.

The culmination of the entire contest was the presentation of awards and ratings. Each play was judged separately with a possible rating of "excellent," "very good," or "good." At this time also, the coveted awards of All New England Actors and Actresses were announced; this honor was bestowed on fifteen outstanding young thespians.

Judging the plays were three critics recognized as experts in the field of drama: Mr. Stephen D. Gilbert, Professor Frederick C. Pacord, Jr., and Miss Marion Sawyer.



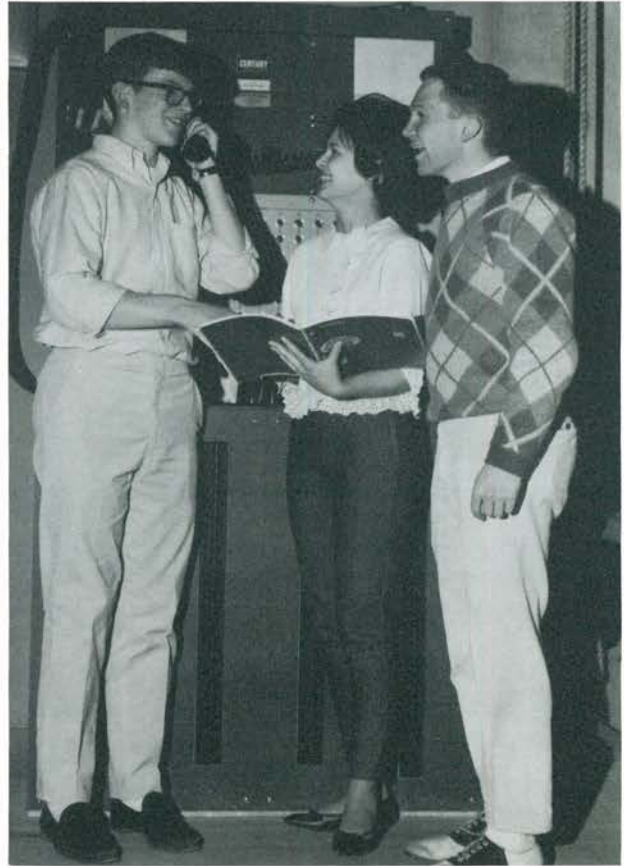

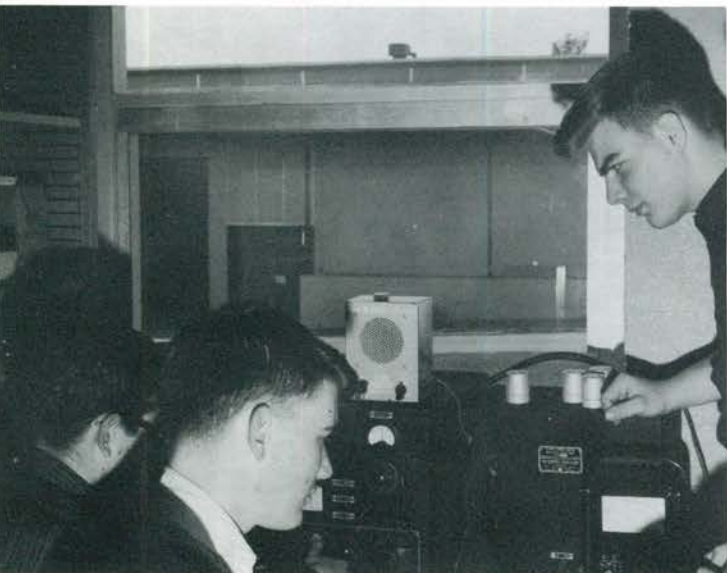

R. O. T. C. Offers Varied Program

The Reserve Officers' Training Corps at Bangor High School is the oldest in the nation. It has always established a precedent of quality instruction and wide curriculum. The interested cadet will study military organization and customs, first aid, modern weapons, small unit tactics, map and aerial photograph reading, methods of instruction, and many other areas of practical value. The rifle teams, drill teams, and familiarization programs offer further experiences to the cadet.

The program emphasis is on leadership training. Each cadet leader has an opportunity to exercise and demonstrate his sound judgment, traits of a leader, and proficiency in his R.O.T.C. subjects. As each student achieves greater capabilities, he is promoted to a higher cadet rank in recognition of his knowledge and skills. Young men in business executive training must wait years to exercise this type of authority.

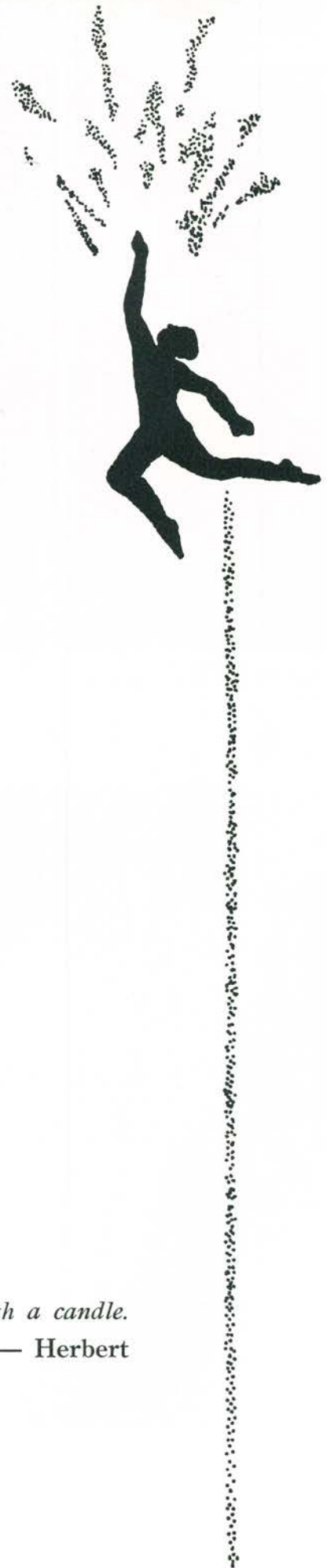

Bangor Captures State Football Co-championship

With spirit, determination, and hard work, the 1964 fighting Rams captured the co-championship of the Maine Class A Conference. A final record of nine wins and one loss proved to be one of the best grid records in the last twenty years. Coaches Gerry Hodge, Art Miles, and Norris Nickerson deserve a great deal of credit for their tireless efforts. Led by tri-captains Rob Newman, Jim Nelson, and Dick Downes, the team started the season with a 34-12 win over Rumford. Waterville fell as the next battered victim in a 12-7 contest. 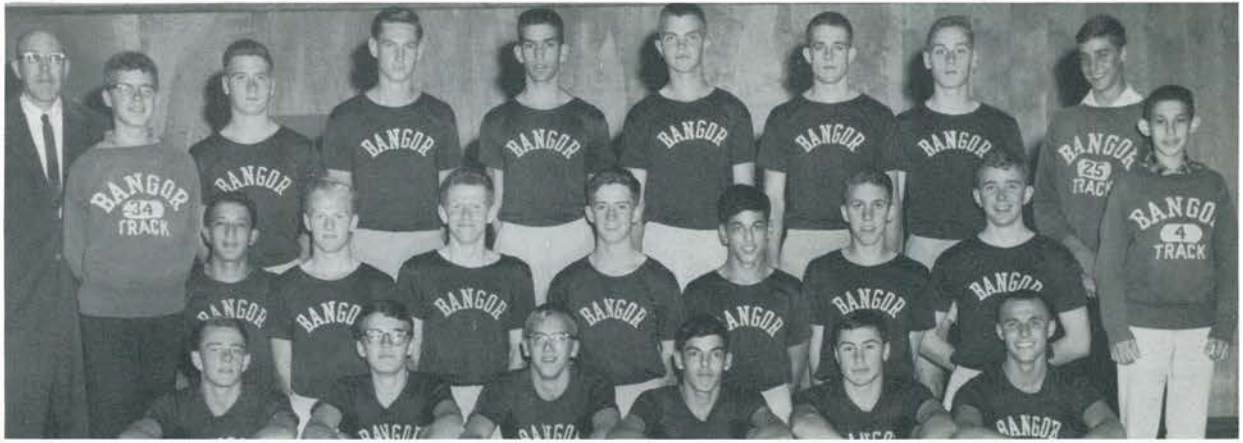

Cross Country Number Two In State Competition

Bangor High School's Cross Country team under the able leadership of their captain, Michael Bassi, manager Robert Bartlett, and Coach G. V. Cuozzo, defeated fourteen area teams during their regular season of two four-way, two triangular, and four dual meets.

After successfully trouncing five worthy opponents in two dual meets and one big four-way contest, Bangor slid past last year's Class L state champions, the Indians of Old Town, by a score of 27 to 28 while the Jayvee team took their second of three perfect scores for the season. A perfect score is fifteen points, which is the minimum of points possible. The lowest score determines the winner. Bangor rolled over five more opponents before encountering Brewer, the Ram's traditional rival. The Bangor boys were determined to prove themselves against the seven highly rated Brewer harriers. In that gruelling tri-team meet at

Rockland, the Rams posted thirty-three points to Brewer's thirty-four and Rockland's sixty-five. Another varsity victory helped the junior dalers wind up their season with a 7-0 record.

In the annual regional competition at the University of Maine, Bangor maintained its record of continuous leadership by placing second among the six teams entered in the fiercely fought contest. Bangor then went on to qualify for the state championship by beating Old Town and Crosby High of Belfast.

Only one team in the entire state was able to hold off Bangor's Rams at the state meet. Deering High of Portland posted ninety-seven points compared to Bangor's one hundred eleven, as the Rams of Deering and the Rams of Bangor led the way around the two and one half mile course at Orono.

Swim Team Takes Second In State

In their fourth year of competition, the Bangor mermen posted an 8-1 season record and went on to score a second place victory in the state championship meet. Under the leadership of Coach William McCalmon, the Rams kicked off the season with co-captains Fred McAlary and Joe Constantine showing the way to a 55-40 win over Brunswick High School. The mighty mermen seemed well on their way to their second state crown as they chalked up eight consecutive dual meet wins, losing only to Hebron Academy in their final contest of the scheduled season. The state meet saw the Rams narrowly edged by Brunswick in a contest which was not decided until the final minutes. In New England competition the Rams turned on a fine performance defeating twenty teams to stand eighth on the six state region.

Three Bangor individuals qualified for the all New England Meet—Steve Dorsky and Joe Constantine in

the backstroke, and Barry Goldsmith in the breaststroke. The team of Joe Constantine, Robby Speirs, Dick Klain, and Barry Goldsmith also qualified in the 200-yard medley relay. This same relay team set a new Maine Interscholastic record in the 200-yard event as they bettered the school record they had set earlier in the season. Other record breakers for the aquamen were Joe Constantine in the backstroke; Barry Goldsmith, breaststroke; and Fred McAlary in the 100-yard freestyle. Diver Steve Abbott brought honor to the school by becoming the number one diver in the state.

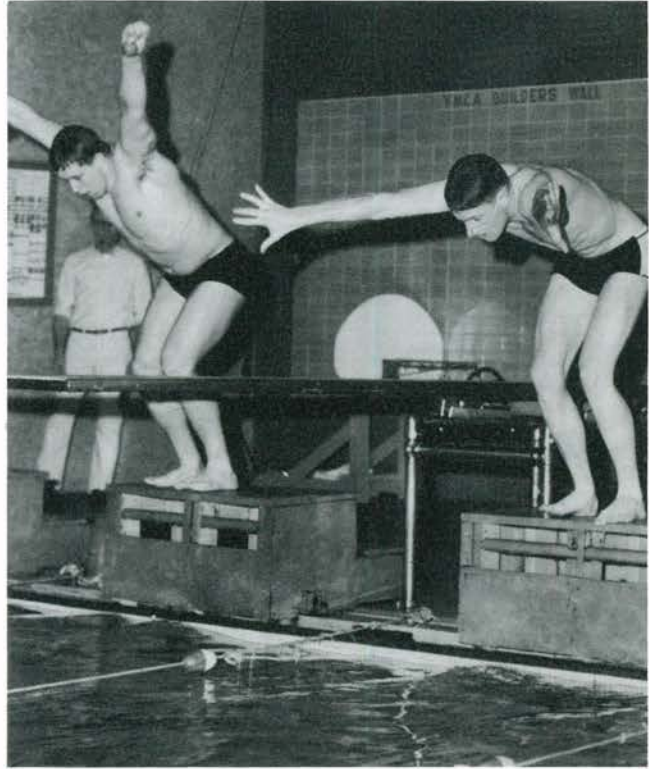

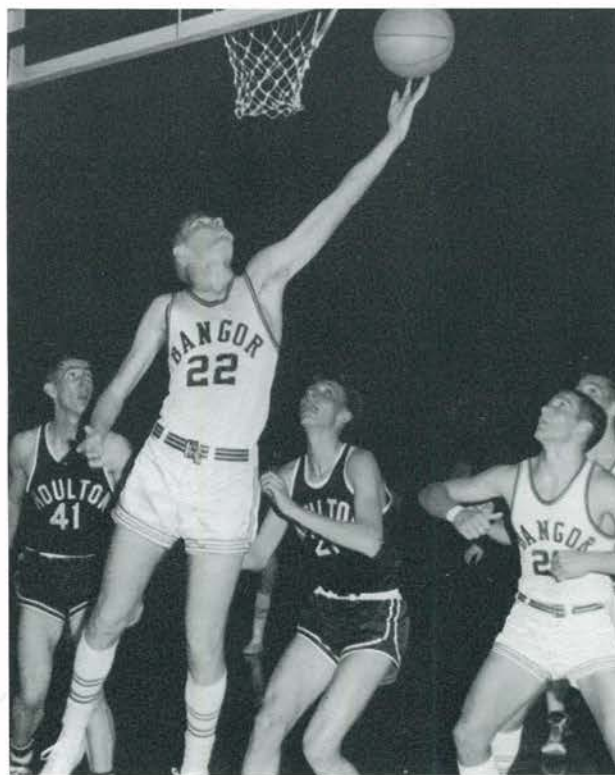

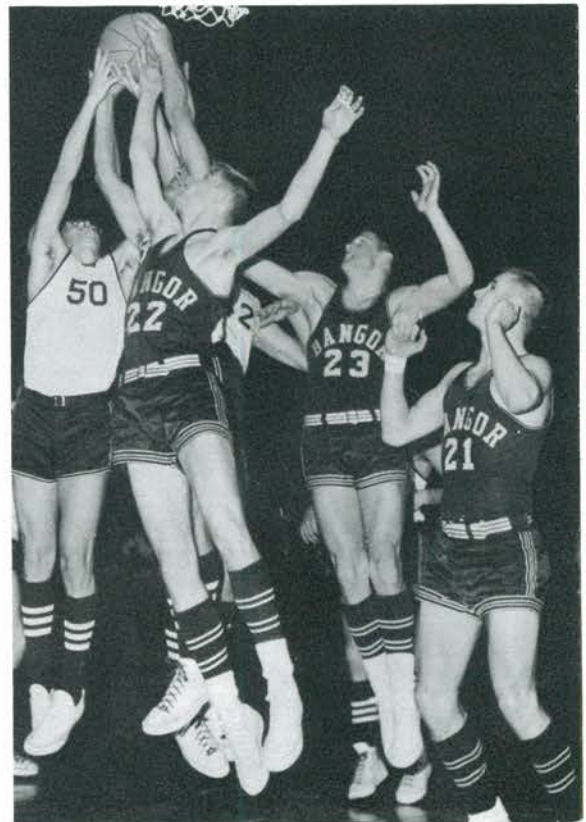

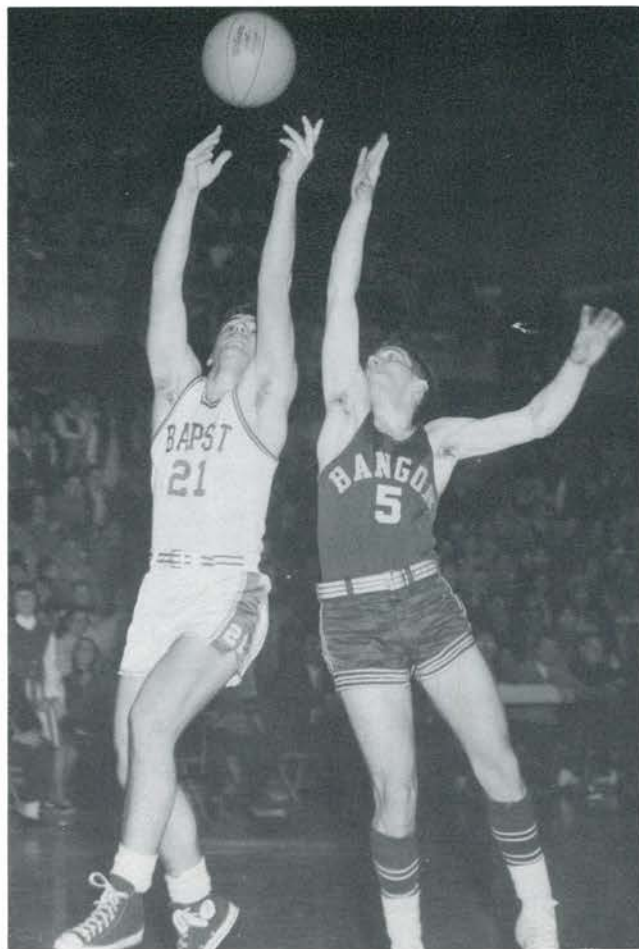

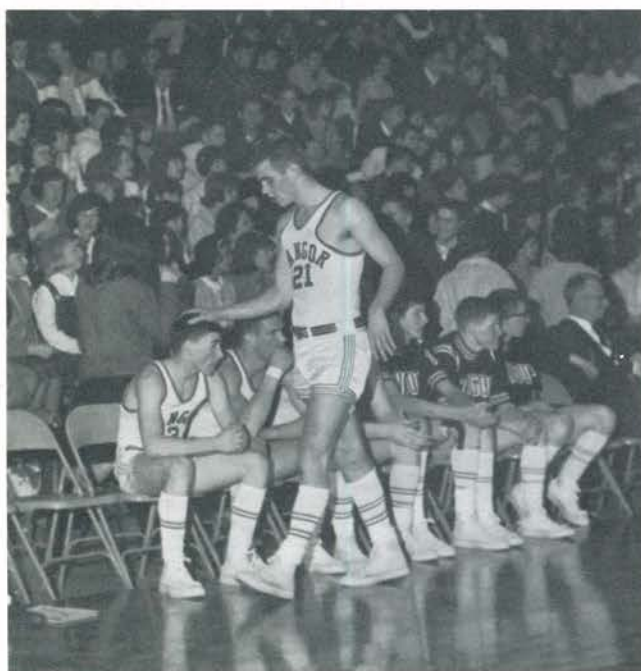
Ram rebounders battle for a hand on the ball.



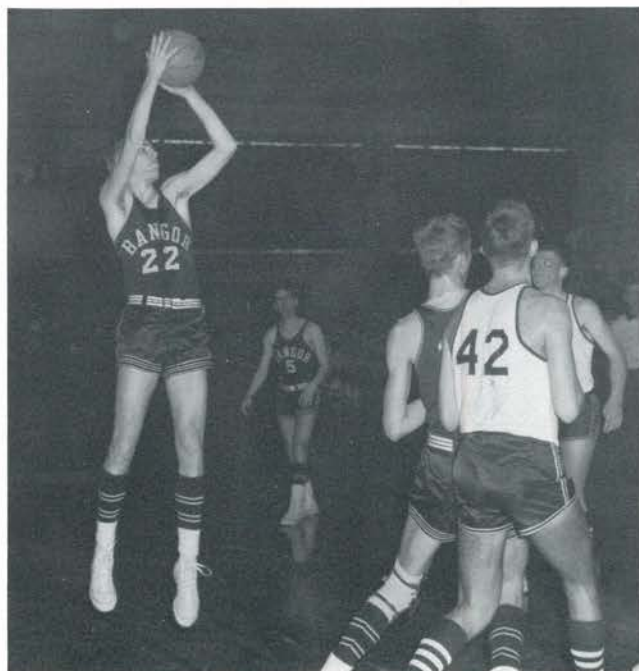

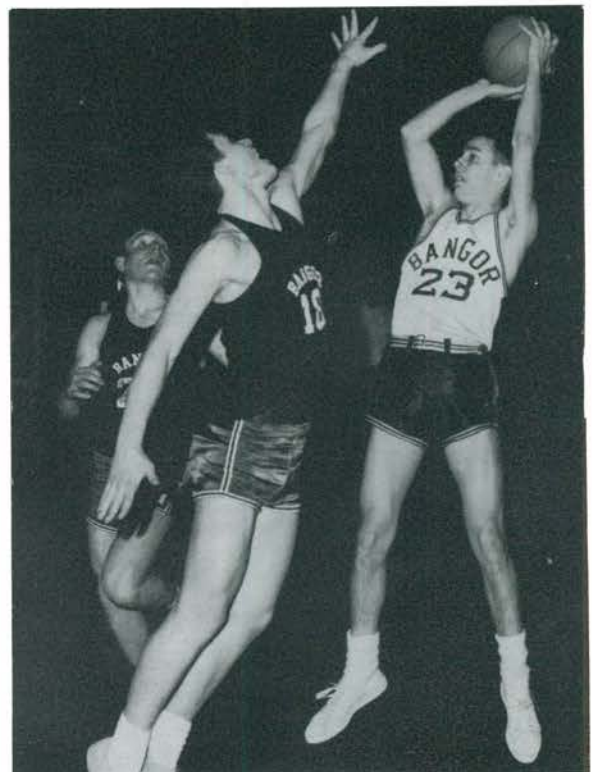

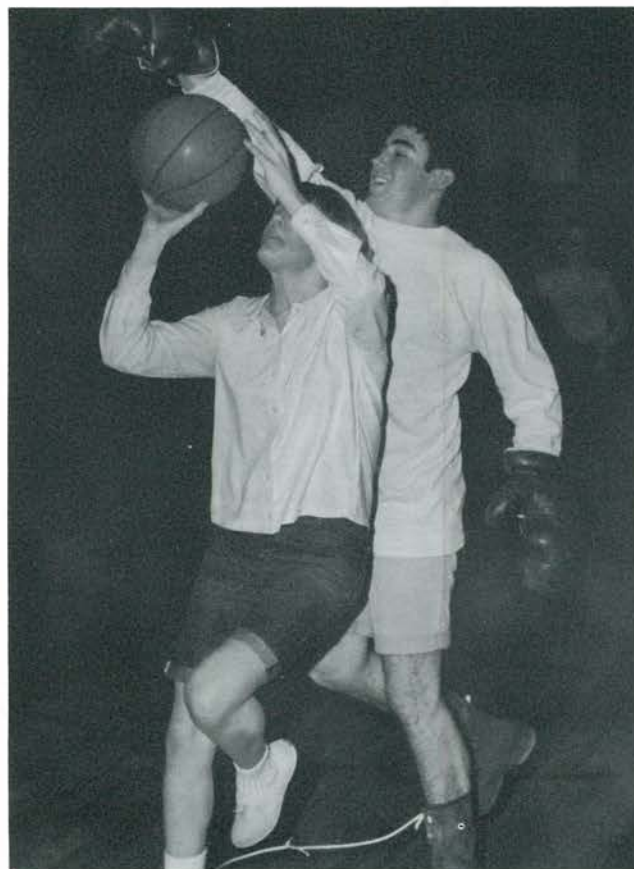

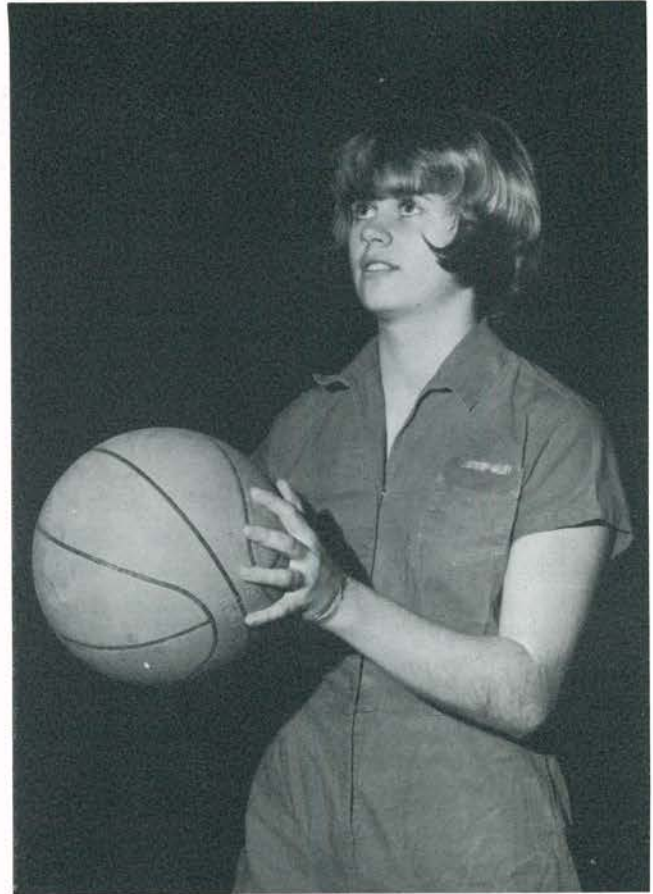
G. A. H. C. Promotes Interest In Girls' Athletics

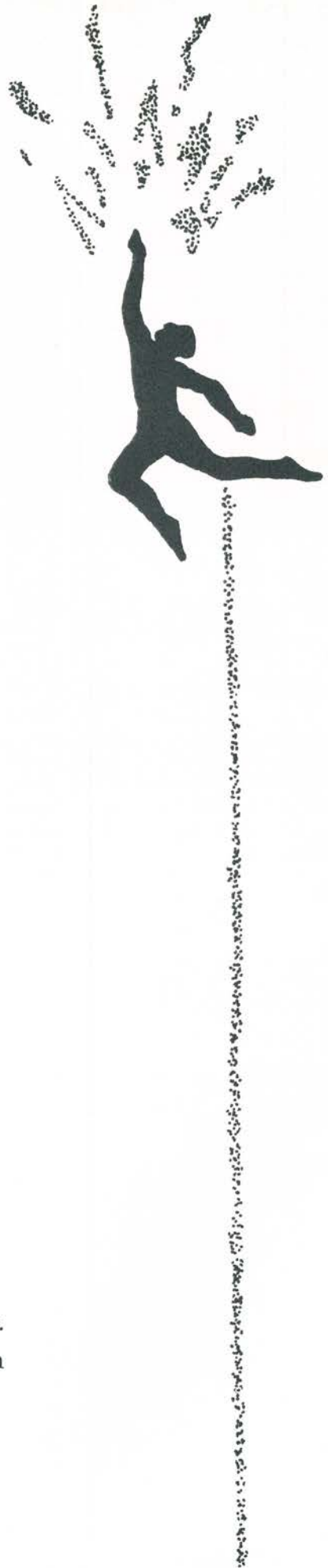

Speirs and Evelyn Merrick were chosen king and queen of Bangor High School's first Winter Carnival.

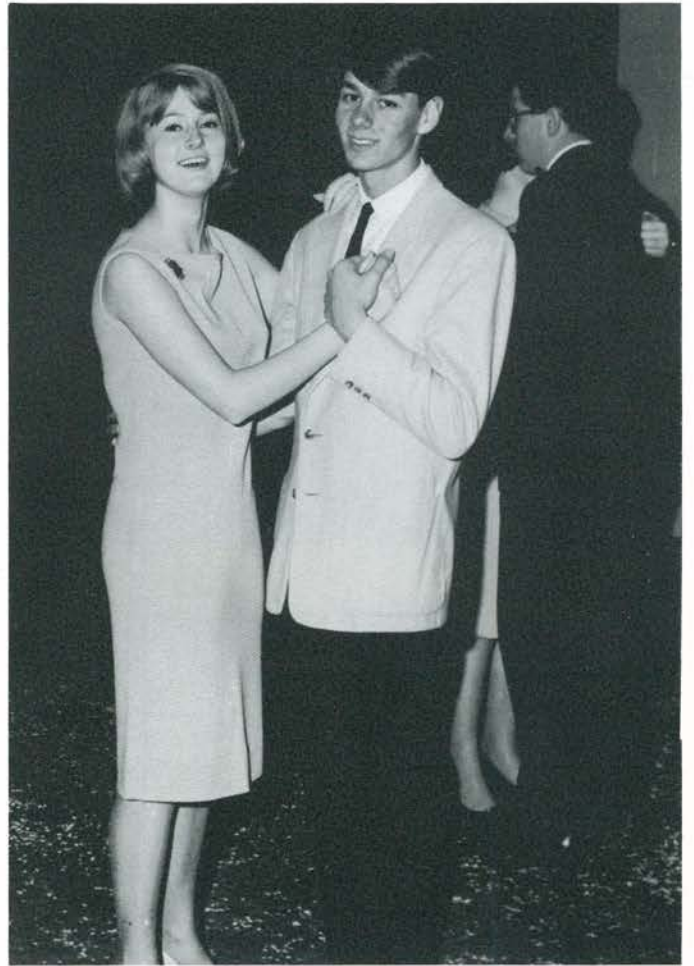

The last selection was a cutting from Robert Benchley's lecture, "A Talk to Young Men" presented by Peter B. McEvoy.

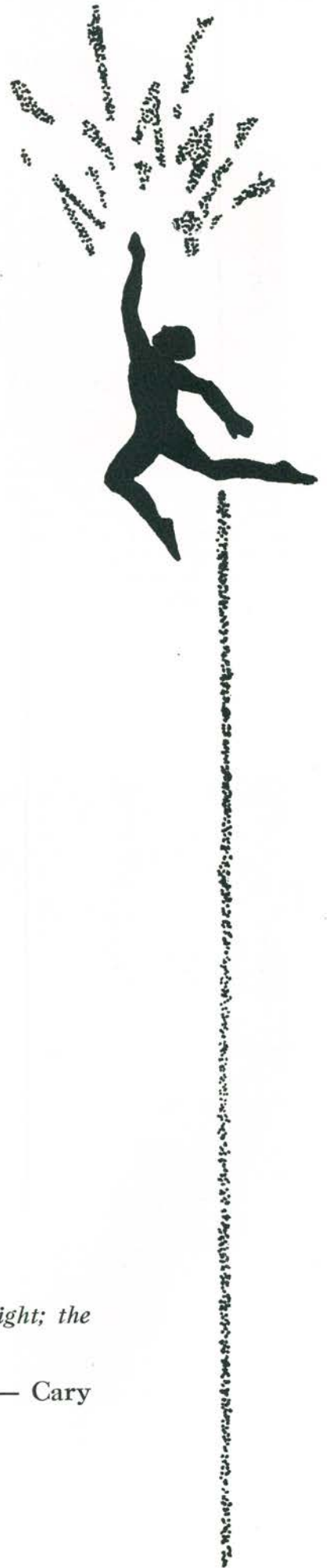
