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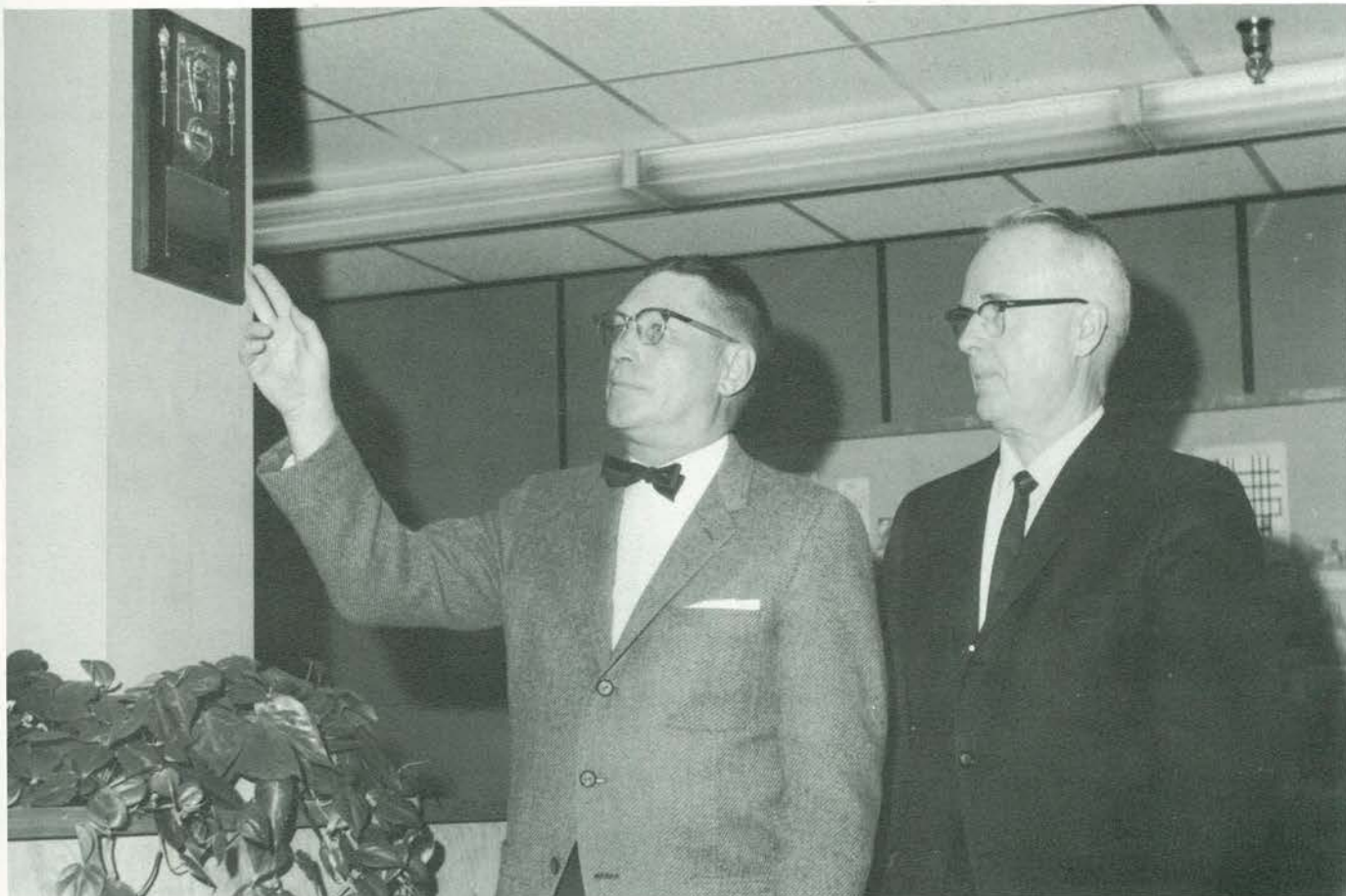

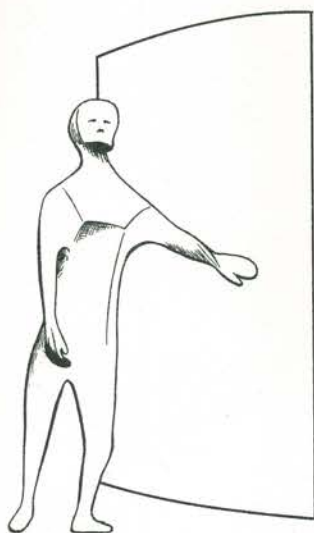

## Monumental Question Of Accreditation Faces Administration

With a successful year in the new Bangor High School completed, the monumental question of whether or not the school and its programs would be rated as accredited remained to face this year's Administration. Under the Administration's supervision, the teachers of Bangor High spent much time compiling a comprehensive evaluation of the new school—its facilities, staff, student body, and the programs and courses offered. The study, covering over 260 pages, was presented to a

committee of twenty-three New England educators to be examined and evaluated.

Mr. Dana Simmons, as principal and head of the Administration, was also faced with many responsibilities in the second year of keeping the new school running smoothly. He was assisted in his work by an able staff, including assistant principal Mr. Rodney Bartlett and secretaries Mrs. Wanda Owen, Mrs. Ruth Snyder, Mrs. Alfreda Stevenson, and Mrs. Irene Downes.

Never completely satisfied with the education offered the students, the Administration is constantly seeking and experimenting with improvements and changes in the curriculum. Already, Mr. Simmons and his staff have many new courses planned for next year's student body.

## School Officials Prepare For Accreditation Committee

School officials this year have been preparing for the coming of the New England evaluation and Maine accreditation committee. Made up of educators who are specialists in specific areas, the committee visited Bangor High School in early May to judge the facilities which would make this school qualified to merit the honor of accreditation. Accreditation, which Bangor High has held since 1931 from the New England committee, is in effect a stamp of excellence which results from outstanding study programs, varied student activities, abundant library facilities, complete guidance and health service, high departmental goals, and staff and administration qualifications, as well as the adequacy of the plant itself. The visitors monitored classes for three days, and reviewed an exhaustive faculty presentation which the staff members compiled over the last school year. Accreditation is highly regarded by colleges, which place a special significance upon the transcripts of students who have graduated from a school bearing this seal.

With the firm belief that the heart of a good guidance program is counseling, the guidance department this year has sought to establish an even more personal rapport with each student at Bangor High. To achieve this aim, each class was divided alphabetically among Mr. Richard Klain, department head, Mrs. Rubena Pressey, Mr. Gerald Ballanger, and Mr. Salvatore Coco, to remain with the same counselor until graduation.

During the student's sophomore year, the guidance program emphasizes getting acquainted through a private interview, discussion of study habits, and graduation requirements. Juniors receive aid in post-high school plans, information on college entrance requirements, and advice on testing procedures. Seniors avidly discuss graduation, specific applications for further schooling or information about future employment.

The voluminous paperwork that is the natural result of such a busy department falls into the able hands of Mrs. Eva Inforati. Aided by volunteer students who give up study halls to work in the guidance office, she efficiently manages the necessary and important information constantly being processed.

Through filmstrips, pamphlets, and interested counseling, the guidance department strives for the achievement of its ultimate goal to help each student recognize his responsibilities, capabilities, and to achieve self-identity and self-understanding which will stay with him all his life.

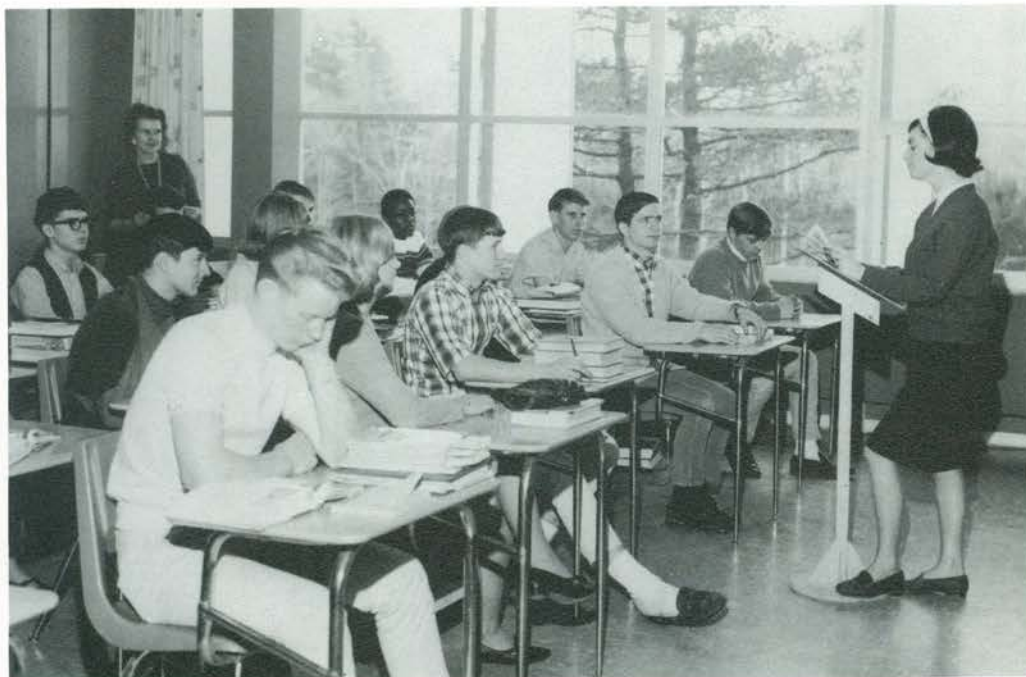

## Study of English Promotes Human Understanding

Functioning as the heart of the school curriculum, the Bangor High School English Department continues to instill in its students a solid and varied background in the English language. Besides striving for a strong foundation in mechanics achieved through intensive work in vocabulary, spelling, and grammar, the department stresses the cumulative study of American, English, and World literatures. It is the aim of the department to develop students who, when exposed to the world outside, have the ability to think logically, to read with understanding, to write clearly, to speak effectively, and to listen intelligently. The purpose of such a study is to inculcate in the student an understanding of, and a love for, the high ideals which preserve the essential dignity of the human race.

One innovation in the curriculum approved for this year is a type of team teaching. For four weeks in the spring Mr. Wallace Woodcock and Mr. Craig Abbott exchanged two senior literature divisions. Mr. Woodcock taught a unit on modern poetry, and Mr. Abbott taught Russian literature.

Realizing that it is their task to instruct each student in all facets of the English language, the teachers of the department endeavor to produce well-rounded, sensitive young men and women, prepared to enter the adult world with success in their eyes.

## Reading Proves Vital In All Subject Areas

Under a systematic program of instruction presented by Mrs. Charlotte Haskell, head of the Reading Department, grades 7-12, the students strive to improve the fundamental skills of reading. Also emphasized is work in reading for enjoyment, content-area reading, and study skills.

Each student is analyzed daily in these three areas: skills, what each student is doing in reading; reaction, what reading is doing to the student; integration, what reading is doing for the student.

All lessons are designed to provide a variety of reading experiences. Flexible plans allow each student to progress at his own rate, and his record is kept in order so that he may follow his progress. The breadth and depth of word-knowledge are stressed, providing rewarding improvement for each student.

The reading room is well-equipped and supplied with multi-level materials, a controlled reader, several reading accelerators, tapes and a Tach-X.

The attitude of the Reading Department is that the learning of reading efficiency never ends; nobody can be overtrained in reading, for it is the most subtle of all subjects. It touches all other subjects and is concerned with virtually all learning. The knowledge contained in textbooks is useless to students if they cannot read.

## Psychology Explores Human Behavior

Continuing its work of teaching the basics of psychology to juniors and seniors, the Psychology Department, with Mrs. Helen Gillespie as instructor, explored the complexities of human personality and the factors contributing to human behavior. The purpose of the course is to acquaint the student with the necessary terms used in psychology and to make him more conscious of the causes for human behavior.

Through extensive use of experiments and research, the student is encouraged to participate in psychological experiences. Outside reading and discussion groups on interesting subjects also aid the student to understand the complexities of man.

Besides acquainting the students with the principles of psychology, the course also provides background in the fields of anthropology, biology, and sociology, all factors in man's behavior.

# Music and Fine Arts Survey Students Acquire Cultural Background

Offered this year for the second time, the Fine Arts Survey course has permanently established itself as one of the most exciting and interesting parts of a Bangor High School education. Man's cultural development is simultaneously traced from prehistorical times to the present in four areas—art, literature, drama, and music. The course is taught through a team-teaching effort, with Mrs. Lesa Comeau as instructor in the field of drama, C. Robert Jones in historical background, J. Palmer Libby in art, Aime Simoneau in music, and Wallace Woodcock in literature. Through their studies, the students acquire a comprehensive understanding of man through the centuries, a skeletal panorama of human development to which all the specific facts they later learn will be related.

Student interest in music was stimulated and developed in the classes of Mr. Aime Simoneau, music instructor at Bangor High School. In addition to being provided with an understanding of the basic fundamentals of music, students in his Music Theory Class were exposed to a thorough study of the history of music from the time of the ancient Greeks up to the modern day. With Mr. Simoneau's guidance, the students gained an understanding of the basic musical forms in each historical period and also tried their luck at singing a few of the ancient chants. In the Choral Lab classes, students who were interested in singing were given the opportunity to perform many types of choral music, both individually and in ensembles. They also spent a part of their class time studying the lives and works of several noted composers.

# Arts Prove Popular

BHS students who are interested in the fine arts are fortunate in being able to take advantage of a wide selection of courses offered within the Art and Speech-Drama Departments.

Under the direction of Mrs. Barbara M. Browne, speech-drama students this year have brought to successful conclusions many varied and exciting projects. The Oral Interpretation class performed a readers' theatre adaptation of the current best-selling novel *Up The Down Staircase*, while the Dramatic-Arts class acted out scenes from *The Rainmaker*, *Auntie Mame*, *Anastasia* and *Arsenic and Old Lace*. The Foundations of Speech classes ran the gamut from informative speeches to pantomimes.

The Speech-Drama Department took many honors in competitive activities. Judith Files won the state finals of the Spear Speaking Contest and James Emery was named alternate to the finals. Bangor High School won more superior and excellent ratings at the Maine Speech Festival than any other participating school. Elizabeth Plumer, Elizabeth Kellogg, and Judith Files received gold medals and superior ratings at the Festival, while Horace Priest and Joshua Cutler were given excellent ratings. In the American Legion Oratorical Contest, Peter McEvoy won second place in the state finals. Tracy Bronson was third place winner in the state finals of the Voice of Democracy Contest.

Encouraging the student to be creative is the duty of Mr. J. Palmer Libby as the instructor of the Art program. The purpose of the department is to develop in each student an esthetic awareness and a realization of an artist's approach to his work.

With approximately 225 students attending daily, art is one of the most popular electives at Bangor High School. Each student works at his own rate, for creativity, not competition, is encouraged. Students learn the fundamentals of art, which allow them to better portray what they see in the world around them.

## Foreign Languages Offer Vital Intellectual Experience

As anyone who has gained complete mastery of a foreign language will testify, the knowledge of a language other than one's own will serve as a useful tool throughout life. Even more rewarding, however, is the vital intellectual experience the student gains in the actual learning of the language. The study of a foreign people and their culture through the learning of their language leads the way to increased understanding of the many diverse but ultimately basic similarities which unite men everywhere. Moreover, a heightened awareness and understanding of life is achieved by the student who recognizes his own thoughts and feelings through a language other than his own.

Bangor High School's well-staffed and well-equipped language department, with its modern, pleasant language laboratory, offers the student every opportunity to take advantage of the experience of learning a foreign language. French and Spanish are each offered on a three-year basis. The important role both France and Spain have played in the cultural heritage of our country, as well as the influence these countries exert on our present day political and economic life, clearly indicates why the study of these languages is included in the curriculum. Three years of Latin plus a course in Classical Civilization are offered. The fact that Latin serves as a basis for the language spoken today, in addition to the contributions of the Roman Empire to the present American way of life, prove the value of the study of Latin. To achieve the full potential of these languages, BHS teachers place equal emphasis on both the spoken and written word.

The language department at Bangor High School is very fortunate in having the contributions of the Franco-American Cultural Services and Educational Aids Company of New York. The interesting and edu-

cational films which the company sends once a month, plus a colorful poster exhibit sent quarterly, greatly enhance the benefits and enjoyment of everyday class-work.

With an eye to interesting more students in taking languages, the language department hopes to introduce into the curriculum next fall the study of German and Russian. In promoting interest in these new areas of study as well as improving the teaching of French, Spanish, and Latin, language teachers at Bangor High School are constantly striving to keep pace with the increased proximity to foreign peoples caused by improved methods of communication in the modern world.

# Progress Is Password For Science Department

Tuned to the recent changes and newly-created needs of the science world, Bangor High School's Science Department has maintained a progressive outlook, as shown by its expansion in many areas. In addition to having many new opportunities within the curriculum offered, Bangor High School science students were fortunate in having even more modern equipment for their use than they had last year.

The regular courses offered in the areas of biology, chemistry, and physics encompassed a large number of students in their instruction, while other science-oriented pupils took advantage of the classes more recently included in the science program. CBA Chemistry, BSCS Biology, and Advanced Biology—all introduced last year—were continued in the science curriculum, although they were expanded to offer instruction on a wider scale. CBA Chemistry was taught to two classes, and BSCS Biology was expanded to include both the green and yellow versions. The Bangor High School Science Department can also boast a Special Material Biology class, the first of its kind in the state. This course required a special orientation program for Mr. Frederick Cushman.

Through such advances as these, the science instructors at Bangor High School continually strive to stimulate in every student an even greater interest in the world of science. The Science Department has proved the immediate value of its training to the many students who have won science awards or have placed in the Regional or State Science Fairs. The long-enduring excellence of this department, however, will be realized even more by those students who will, in the future, take up a career in science, well-prepared and inspired by their high school experience.

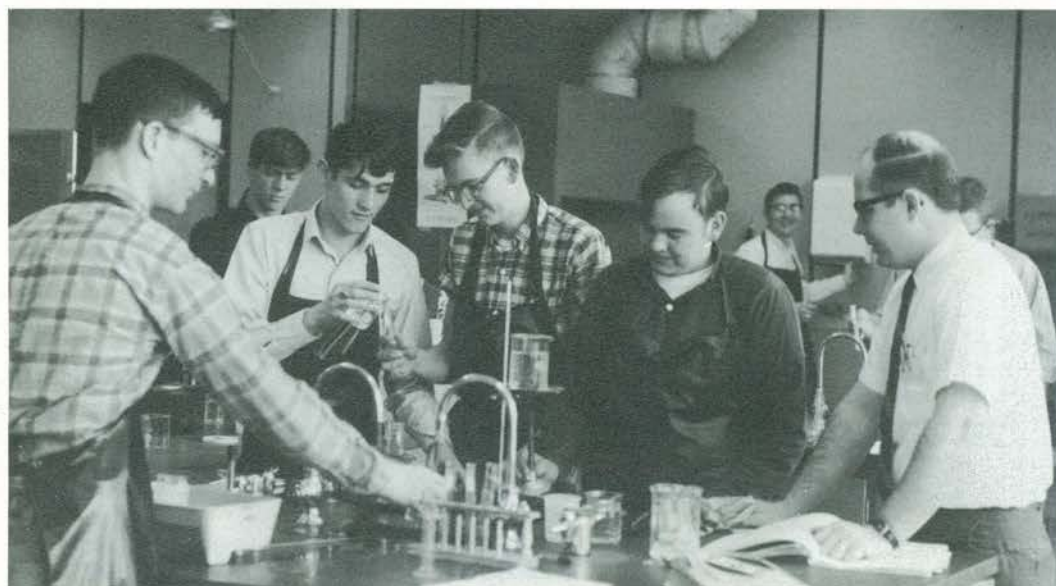

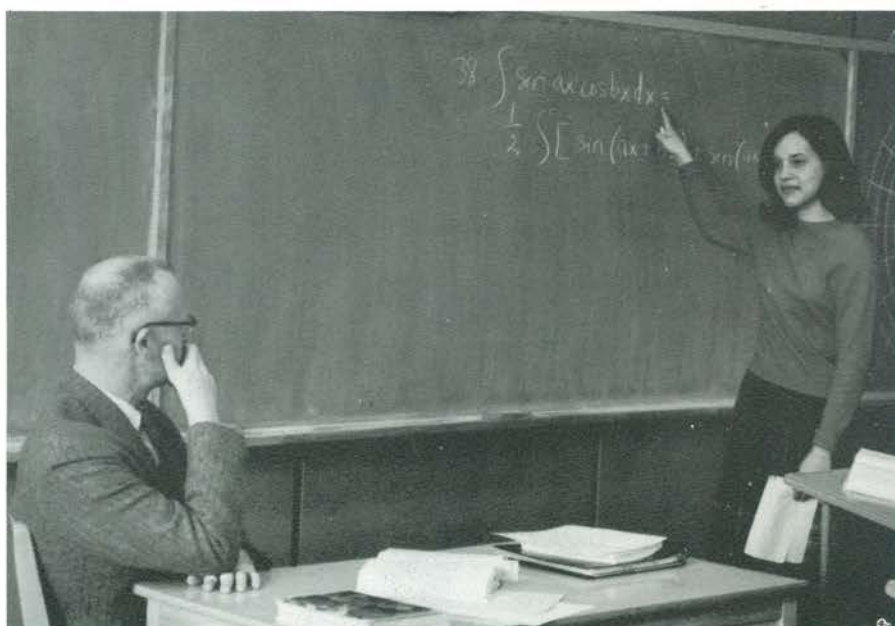

## New Math Compels Students To Think For Themselves

This modern age which stresses the importance of science must necessarily emphasize the field of study which is the fundamental for all the sciences-mathematics. The future holds unlimited opportunities for the person who is sincerely interested in the study of math. In addition to the increasing importance of mathematics in the Space Age, the fundamental role which math plays in all aspects of daily life serves as a constant challenge to the Math Department at BHS to keep in step with the times.

With the introduction and application of the "new math" concepts, BHS math students are being compelled to think for themselves. Only then, math teachers maintain, can students proceed to conquer the problems and theories placed before them.

The Math Department offers a variety of courses, ranging from general mathematics for non-college preparatory students to geometry, algebra, and advanced pre-college math for those who are college bound.

To aid in college math, seniors may take advantage of the program offered in calculus. The experimental TEMAC method of self-teaching was discontinued after two years of use at BHS. This year's calculus class was instructed by Gordon Smith. With Mr. Smith's guidance, the students still proceeded at the rate at which they could comfortably comprehend the advanced concepts.

Again this year, a Bangor High School senior who is especially interested in math may enroll in a math course at the University of Maine.

# Business Department Prepares Students For Commercial World

Designed to develop responsible students with an appreciation of the world of business, the Business Education courses at Bangor High School offer valuable training in business skills and work habits. Stressing responsibility, cooperation, and awareness, teachers help students to acquire a healthy attitude towards business life and the many opportunities it offers. Information on occupational choices is made available, and attention is drawn to career possibilities in local and state business establishments. In-service training is also made possible for junior and senior students, who provide volunteer service for the faculty and administration.

Business Education classes cover a wide and varied field, developing a general understanding of the business world as well as the skills necessary for commercial employment. Proficiency and accuracy are emphasized in shorthand and typing, and the principles of good bookkeeping are taught. General Business helps the student to understand business organization and the characteristics of the American economic system, while

Business Law acquaints students with the place of law in one's personal, as well as business, life.

There is a rapidly changing atmosphere in the Business Department these days. Aware of the developments that are taking place in new fields, teachers are alerting students to the changes in the modern office. It has been said that "The office today is not what it once was and will not be that again." This necessitates new information pertaining to business operations. Through their teachers, students are being made aware of these new challenges as well as being trained to meet the needs of business in today's world.

Automation is growing rapidly in the Business Department, and machine skills are needed more and more. Distributive Education, in addition to affording a basic academic training, is designed to provide senior students with an opportunity for on-the-job training in either retail or wholesale distribution. Offering a variety of work experience in an occupational area that is of interest to the student, the program enables the student to develop by graduation a sufficient skill in this area.

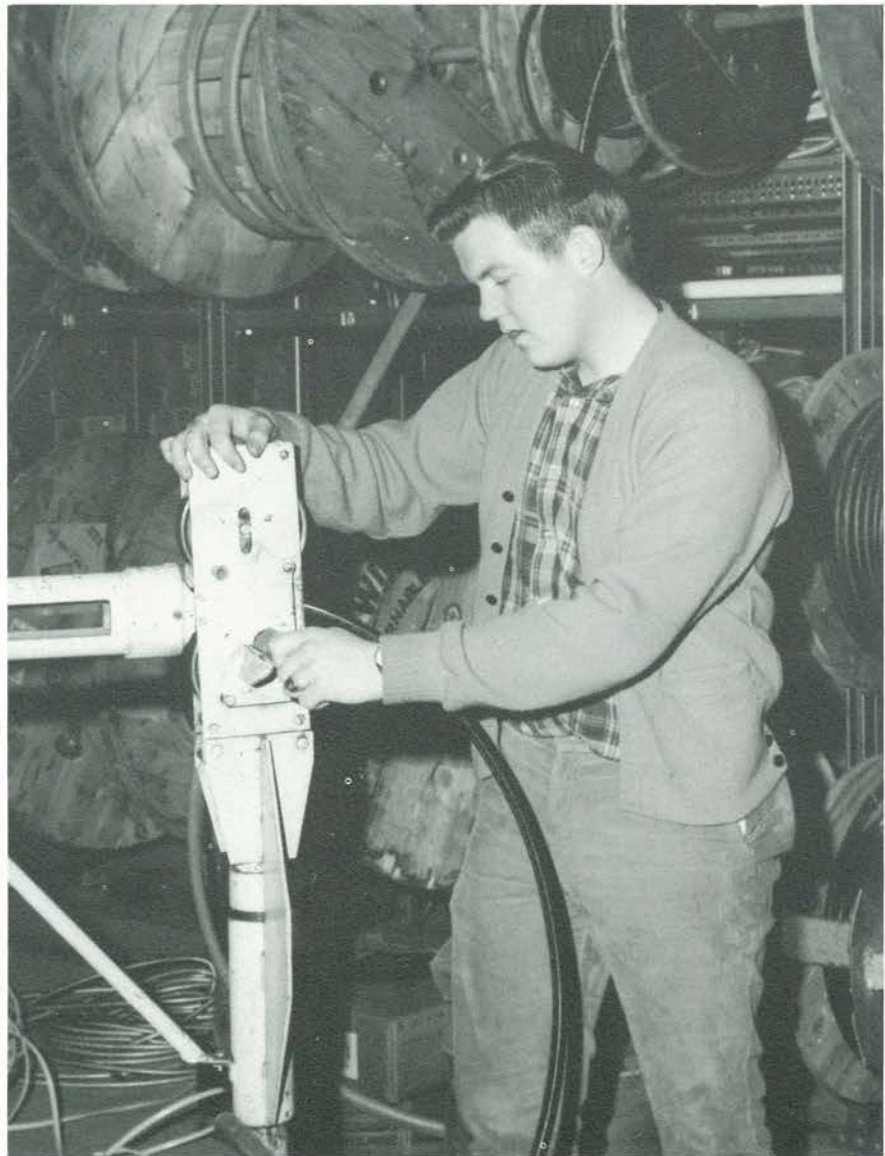
Students participating in the Distributive Education program are given access to excellent work experiences as the result of a thorough investigation of any oppor-

tunities within the community. The available jobs are carefully examined and selected according to which fulfills to the greatest degree the occupational objectives of the student. Supervision of members at their jobs determines the proficiency of their work and the variety of the experience they are gaining. Individual and group guidance also serves to direct the student in planning his future course.

The work experience system provided for by the Distributive Education course has proved its value both to the students and to their employers, since mutual benefits are certainly enjoyed. For while the work training program is teaching students the necessary skills, it is also preparing for the community a class of experienced and proficient graduates.

## Homemaking Courses Aim For Better Future Homemakers

Improvement of home and family living is the basis of the Homemaking Department. The program is divided into five distinct units: personal and family relations, child care and development, housing and home decorating, foods and nutrition, and clothing and textiles. Areas of management and consumer buying, and family health and safety are integral parts of these units. The program offers a three year sequence to all girls majoring in Homemaking. Senior Special, a comprehensive survey course covering all areas, is intended for business and college bound students with no previous study of high school Homemaking.

Karen Rich, Bangor High School senior, was the winner of the Rural Electrification Quiz Contest. In state competition Karen was a second place winner. Elinor West was Bangor High's winner of the Betty Crocker Homemaker's Award. She also competed at state level.

The department has undergone many changes this year. The curriculum is set up so that the five major units are offered on a semester basis. This allows more girls to take advantage of the program, and enables them to choose areas of specific interest. Plans are underway for a nursery school to be held at the school in connection with the marriage and family, and child development units.

The possibility of adding two more semester courses concerning family relations and consumer buying, is being considered for another year. These units would be opened to both boys and girls in their senior years; they will make the Homemaking Department even more beneficial to students at Bangor High.

## Industrial Arts Students Explore Personal Abilities

Knowing the important role that industry plays in the American economy, the Industrial Arts Department at Bangor High School strives to develop in each student a skill in performance and a knowledge of the related principles and theories. Through the study of the materials, careers, and processes associated with this technological age, students gain an understanding of industry in modern society.

Since each student has his own individual abilities, the Industrial Arts program also takes as its responsibility the discovering and exploring of these talents and the development of a mature mental attitude in each student.

Emphasizing a problem-solving approach to the industrial arts, teachers give students the chance to employ creative thinking and to apply industrial techniques and mathematical computations in the solution of problems. This mental maturity is augmented by the knowledge of the safe use of tools and machines. It is through planned activities that students are able to acquire these valuable technical skills.

The wide range of courses offered demonstrates the desire of the Industrial Arts Department to stimulate the potential of every student. Six modern shops allow students of all classes to work with new equipment, machines, and materials under the finest conditions and in the industrial area most inviting to each individual.

Drafting, or Mechanical Drawing, presented on three levels, investigates many areas of drafting, emphasizing the size, shape, and description of inanimate objects. Students learn to read blueprints and to use correctly the drafting equipment.

Students in the Electricity course, which is also offered on several levels, are exposed to the laws and principles of electronics through lectures, films, and demonstrations. In addition, they gain valuable practical experience in electronic construction and repair.

The Graphic Arts program has become well-established at Bangor High School due to the services this class has performed for many school organizations. The students in this course, which covers the fundamentals of printing, have produced many well-designed programs, tickets, and other printed matter for school groups. In addition to a general graphics arts course, offset lithography is also taught.

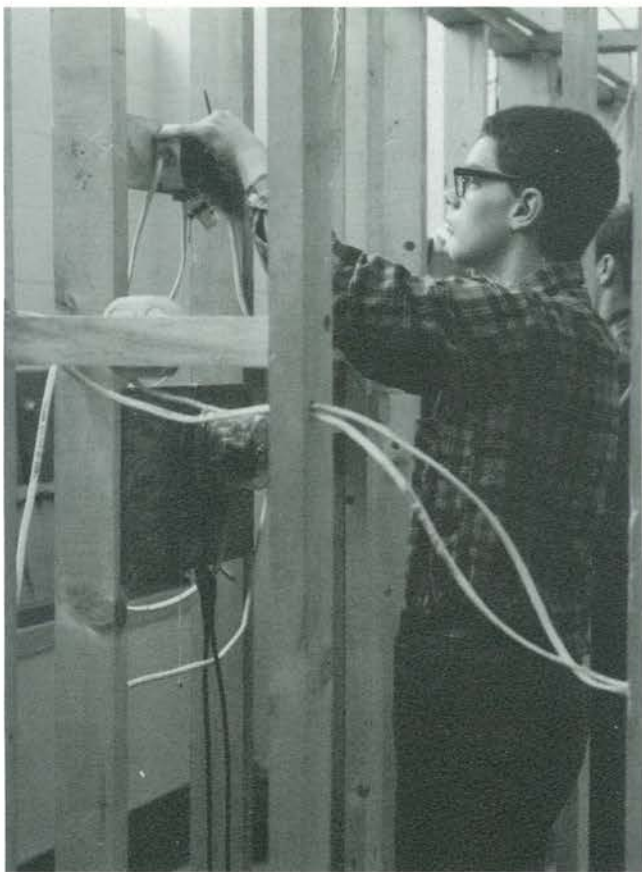
Under an expanded program, the Metalworking courses now bring welding, forging, art and sheet metal, foundry, and new machine tool operations to the shop. Students develop an understanding of the metalworking industry, as well as safe work habits when using tools and materials. Advanced students also explore such fields as electric and gas welding and strengthen their knowledge by applying the theoretical principles they have learned.

Through studies in Power Mechanics and Auto Mechanics, the Transportation course attempts to develop in each student a knowledge of the technical operations and skills in the power-transportation industries. Power Mechanics acquaints the student with energy sources, while Auto Mechanics provides a basic understanding of the design, operation, and services of automobiles. Experimentation and practical work supplement classroom learning.

With the help of new equipment and techniques, students in the Woodworking courses find work in wood and plastics very interesting. An understanding of, and skill in, the use of related materials develops in each student an appreciation of good workmanship and design.

Through these various shops, students explore their individual talents and acquire a comprehension of industry's place in today's world.

By creating an environment in which each student is encouraged to explore his individual interests and abilities, the Practical Arts Department attempts to provide an educational program suited to the needs of all the boys and girls involved. Each student learns, with the help of able guidance, to develop and channel his special aptitudes, which in turn causes him to experience a feeling of successful achievement. Students also analyze their individual problems and accordingly decide on an acceptable course to follow.

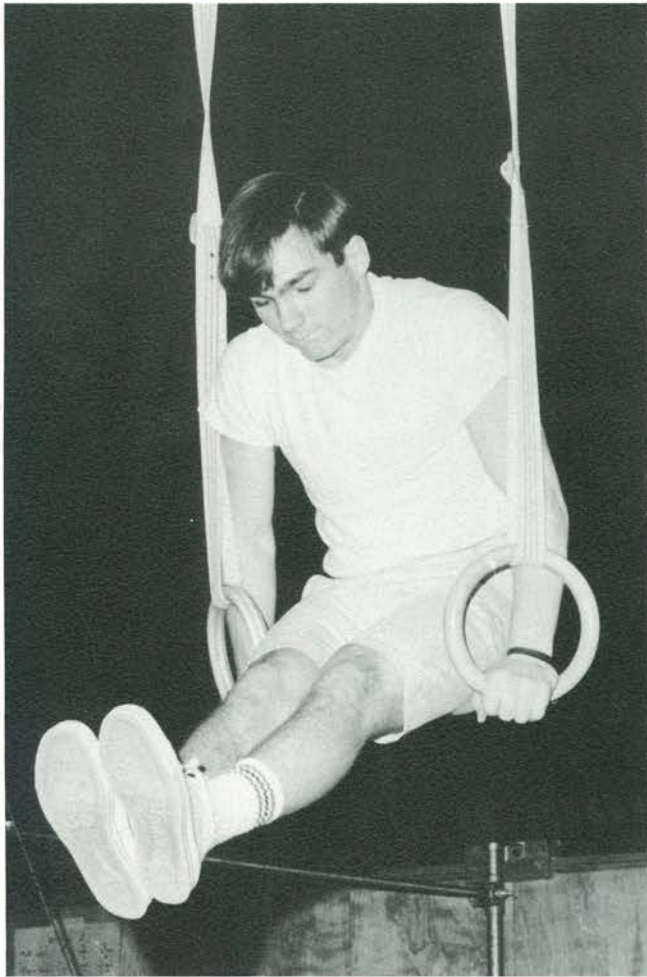

# R.O.T.C. Stresses High Goals

Bangor High School has retained an "Honor School" standing in the Junior ROTC Program of the United States Army again this year.

The program of education stresses the development of each student's leadership potential, his oral and written expression of ideas, citizenship responsibility, knowledge of multiple military subjects, and opportunities for community and national service.

Some of the subjects a cadet studies include military organization and customs, first aid, weapons, small unit tactics, map reading, rifle marksmanship, and methods of instruction. Advanced students in their second and third year instruct the Sophomore Cadets in drill, manual of arms, and rifle marksmanship with all cadets firing the 22 calibre rifle as part of their annual proficiency requirement.

The Senior Cadets are given objectives of proficiency for their units to attain and they in turn plan and supervise the accomplishment of the task. Periodically the Professor of Military Science and the Non-Commis-

sioned Officer instructors perform formal inspections of 100 percent of the cadets, judge their skill in dismounted drills and each company competitively. In the spring the professor of military science designates as "Honor Company" the company that achieves the best overall results.

Outstanding Sophomore and Junior Cadets compete for the selection as "Cadet of the Month" and eligibility for several of thirty-two annual awards is predicated on a cadet's achieving this distinction.

With the initiation of the Army ROTC Scholarship Program, many of Bangor's High School Cadets are able to groom themselves for one of the 400 annual college scholarships as well as the military academy appointments.

As a complementary portion of the ROTC Program of Instruction, interested students can become members of the ROTC sponsored rifle team, cadet drill team, or the girl drill team. Annually the ROTC Department sponsors a formal Military Ball and the Annual Parade and Review.

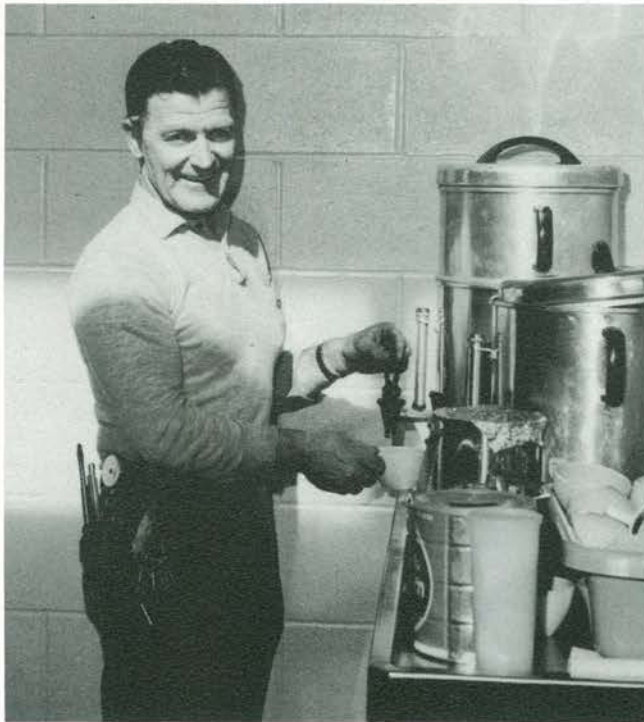

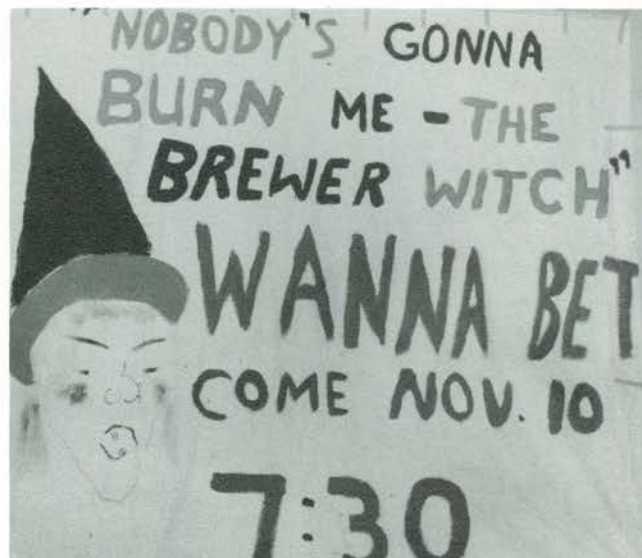
# Student Council Charts A Successful Course

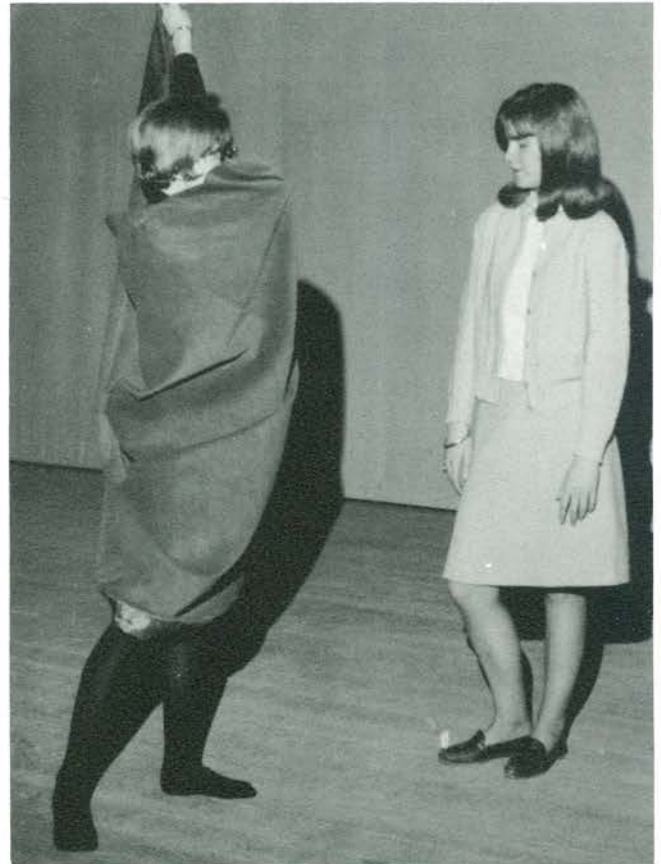

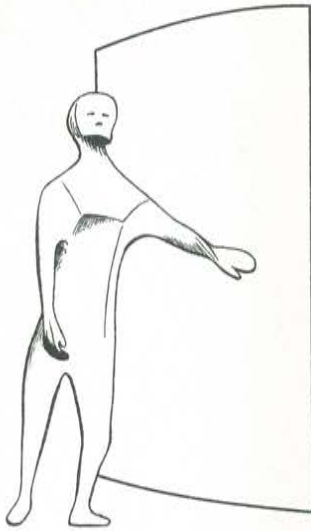

## R.O.T.C. Trains Leaders

The primary mission of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps program at Bangor High School is to give the cadet a broad military education necessary for his continued development throughout a career in the United States Army. 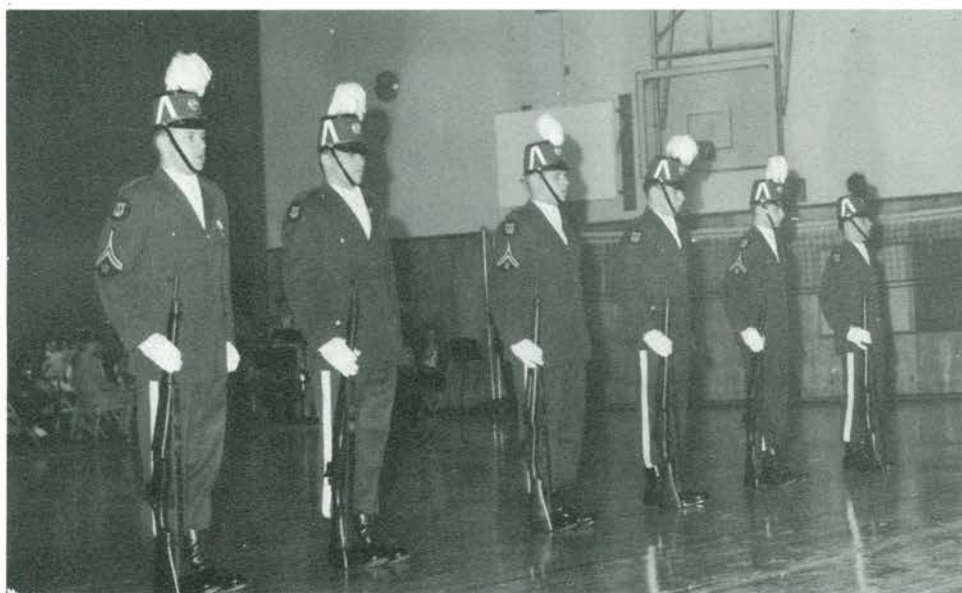

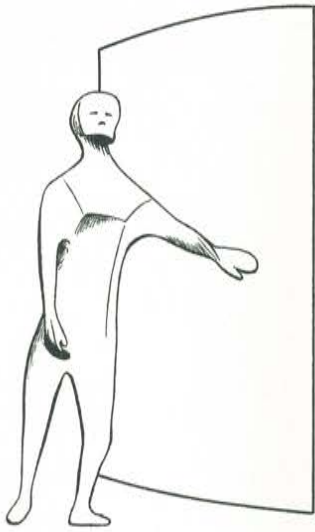

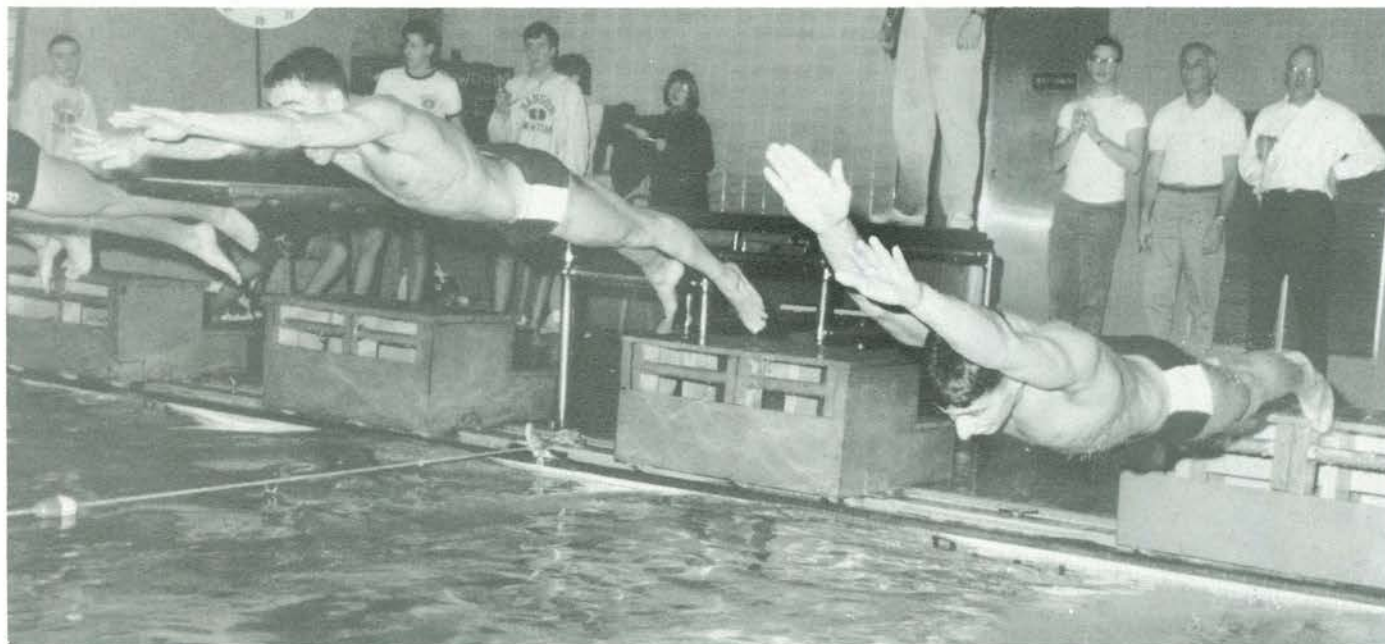

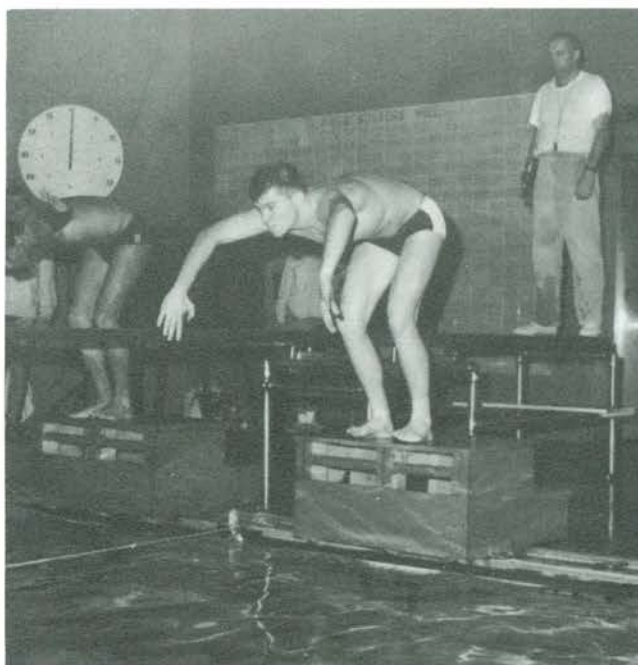

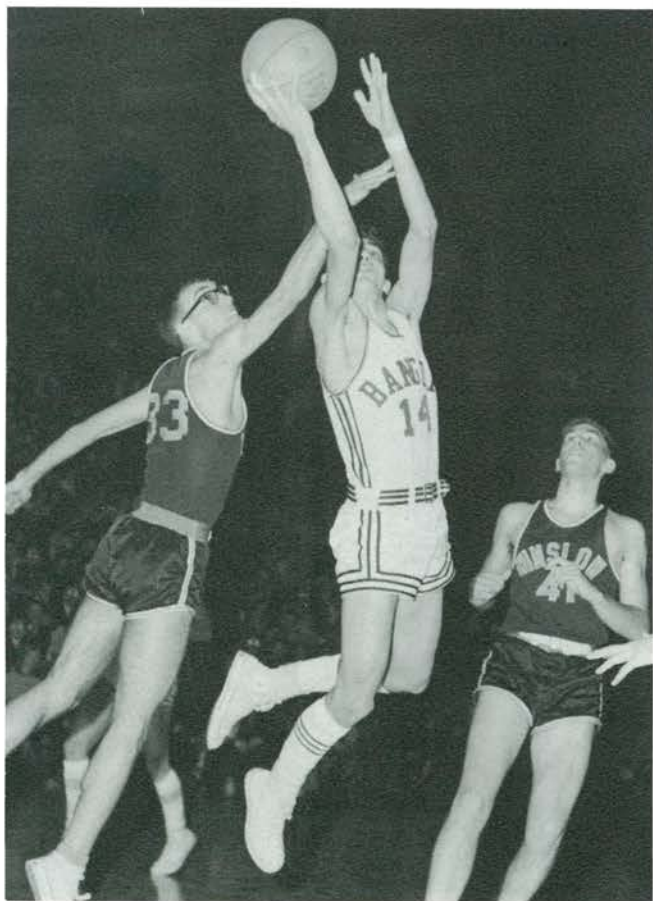

## The Ram Five Soars

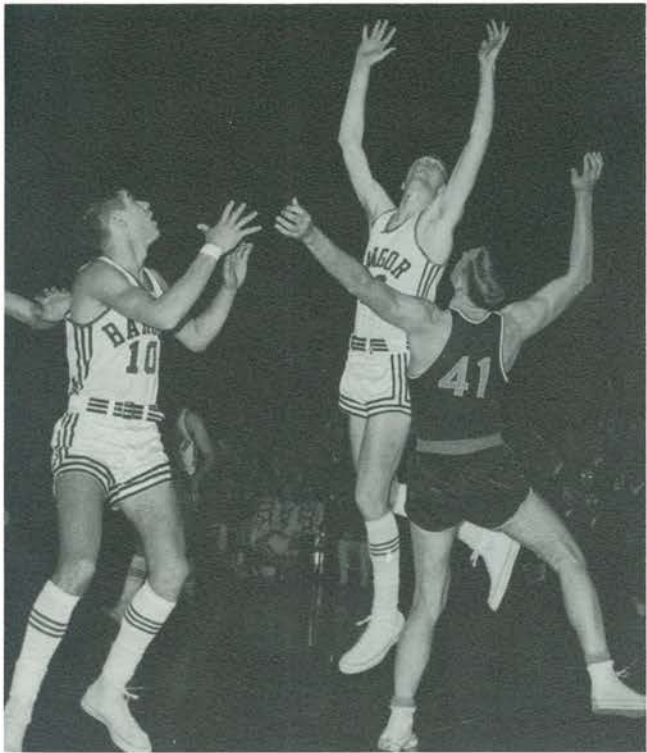

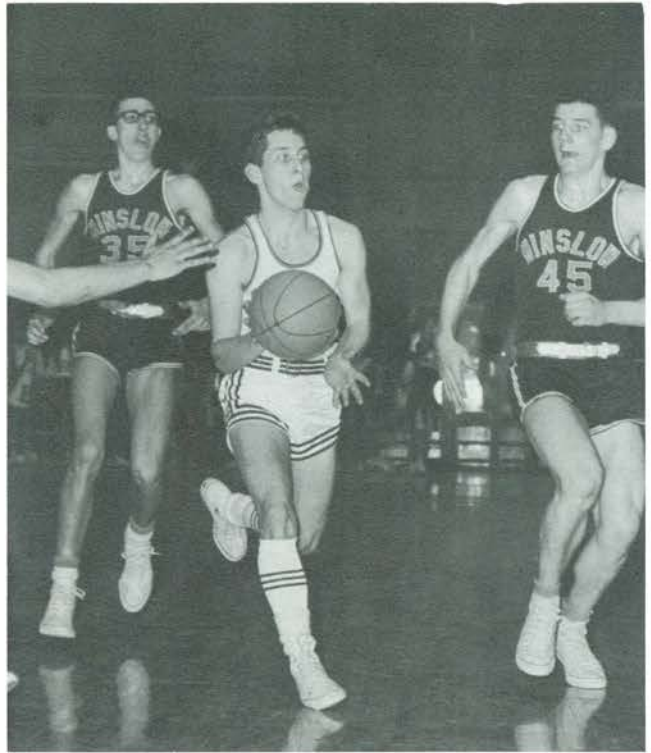

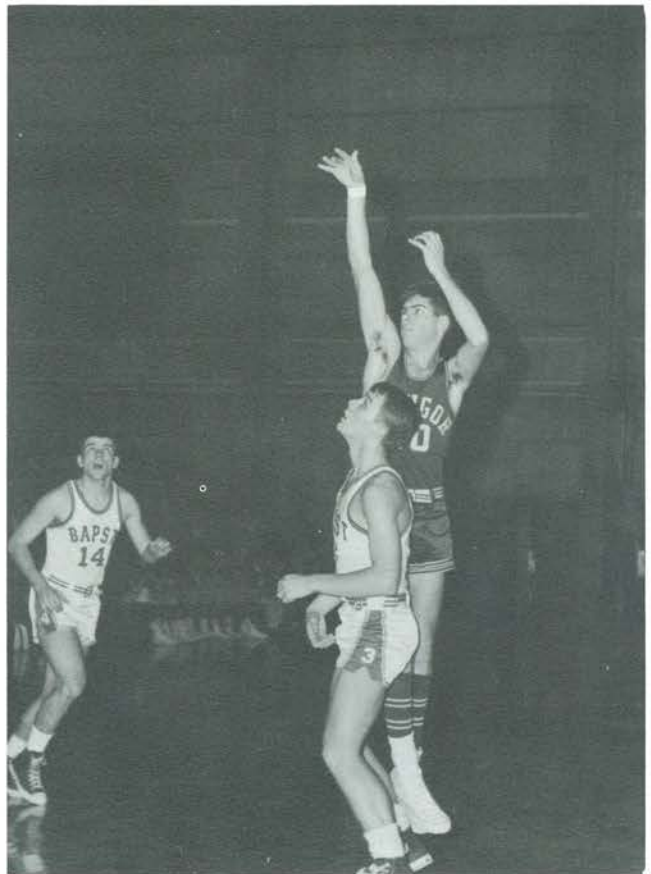

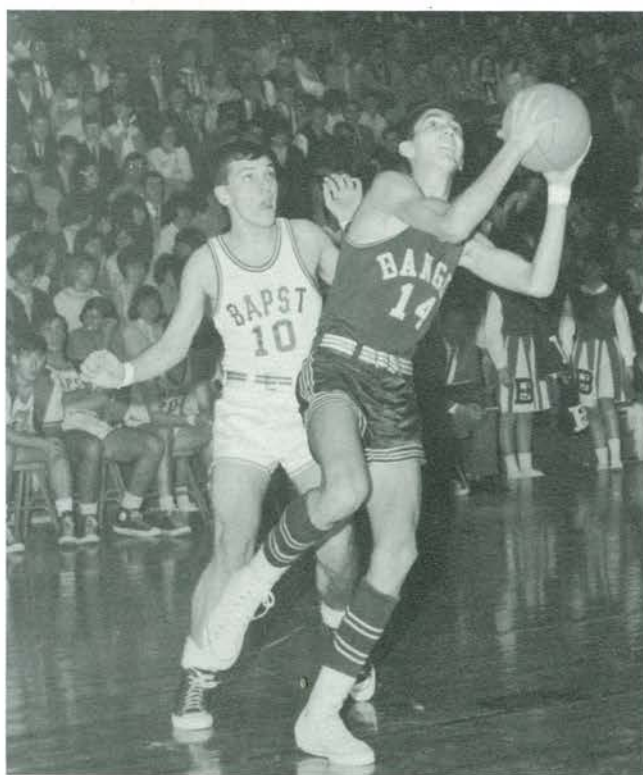

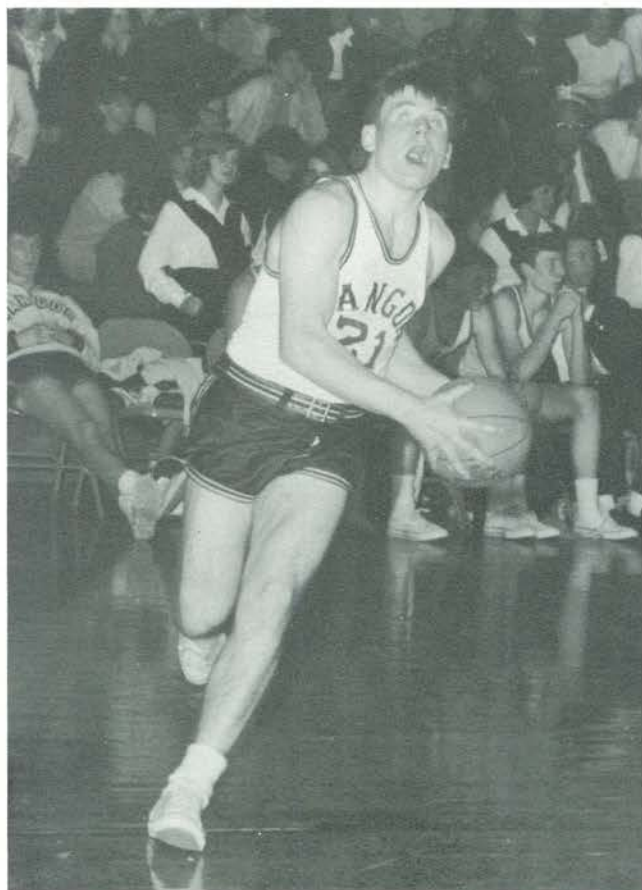
## Jayvee's Complete Winning Season

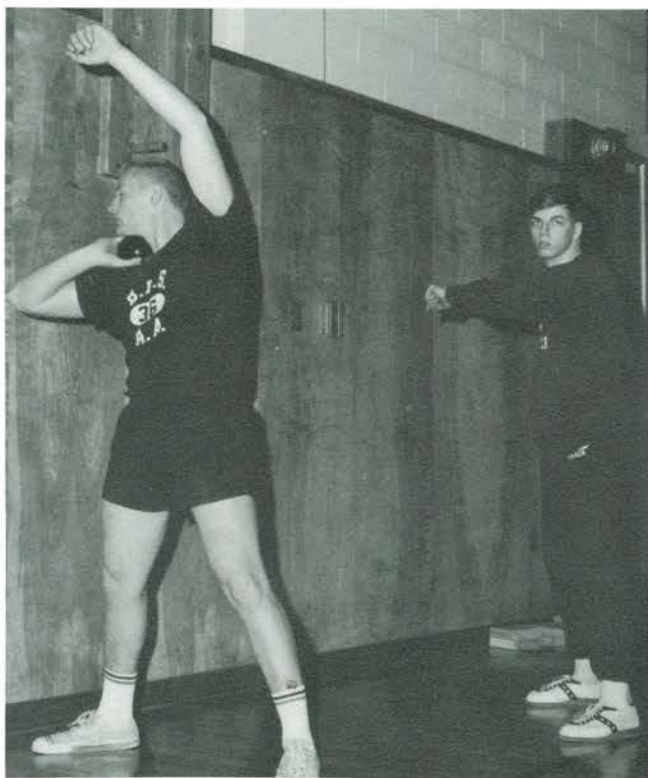

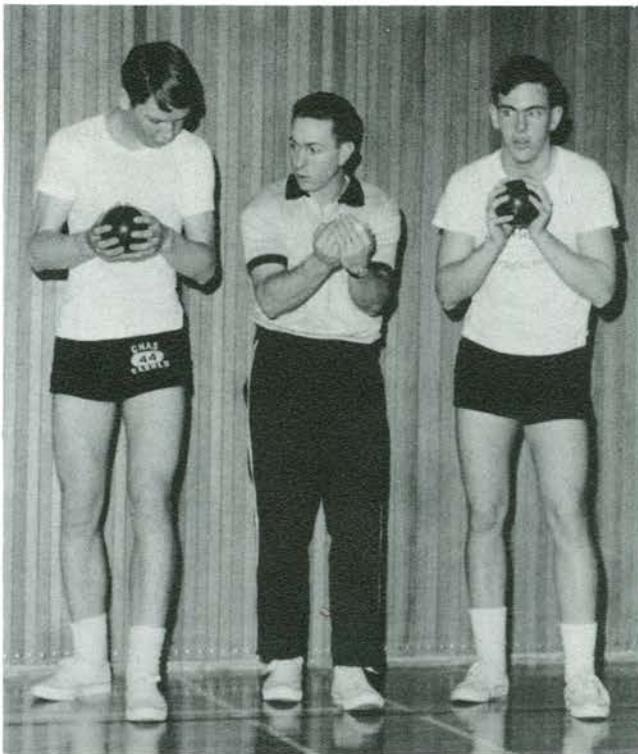

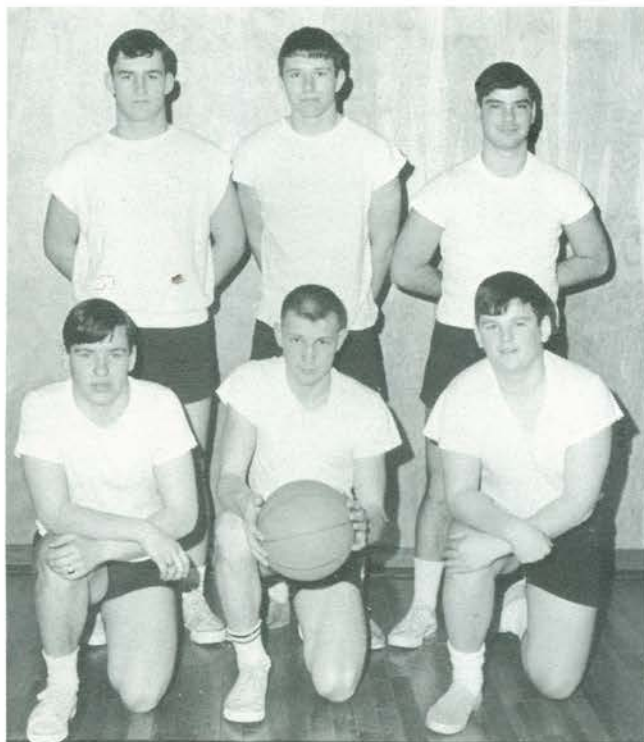
## Intramurals Have New Look

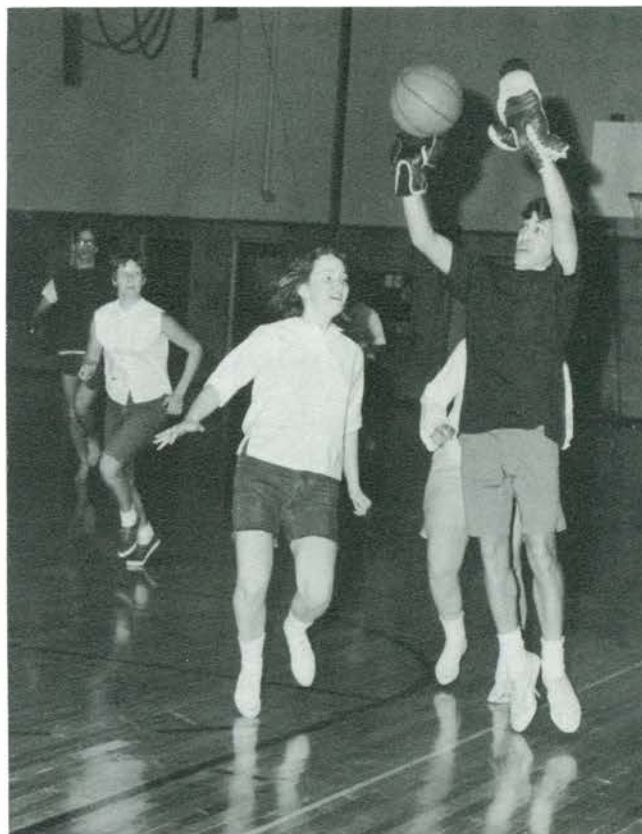
## G. A. H. C. Develops Leader Corps

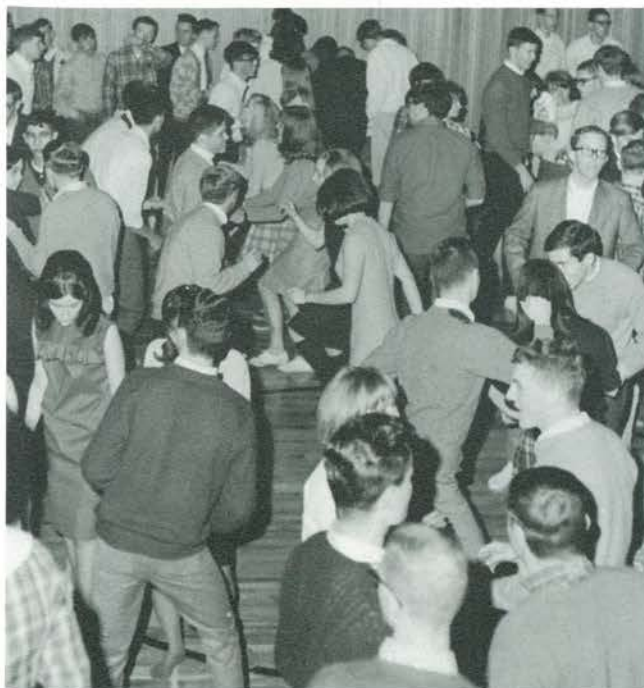
