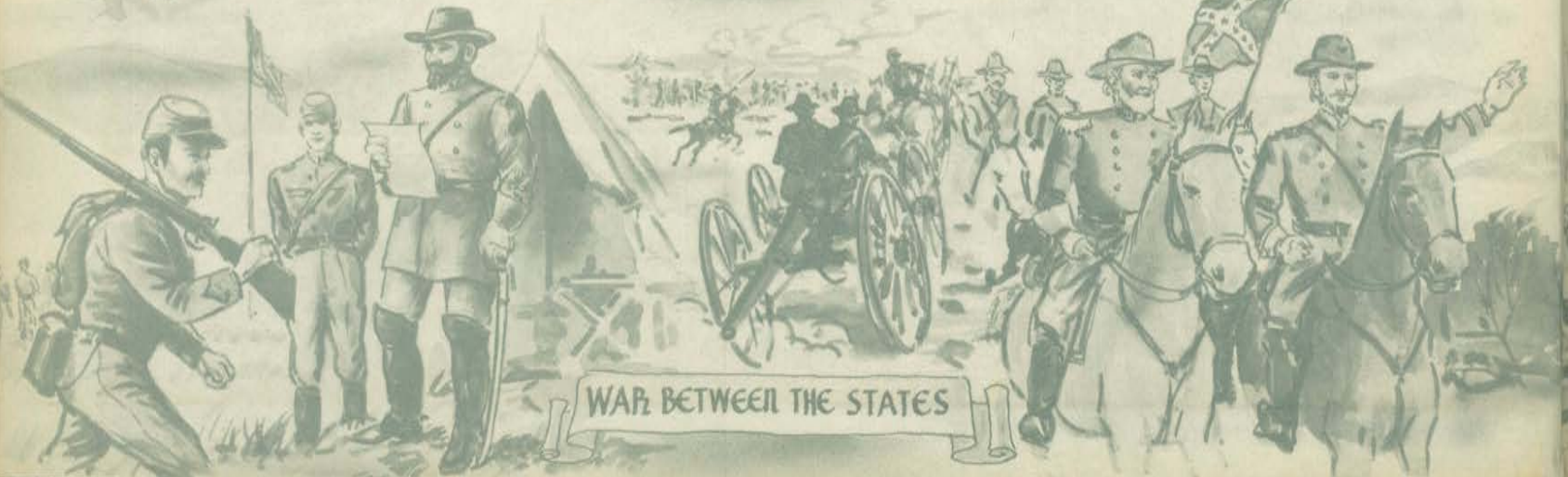

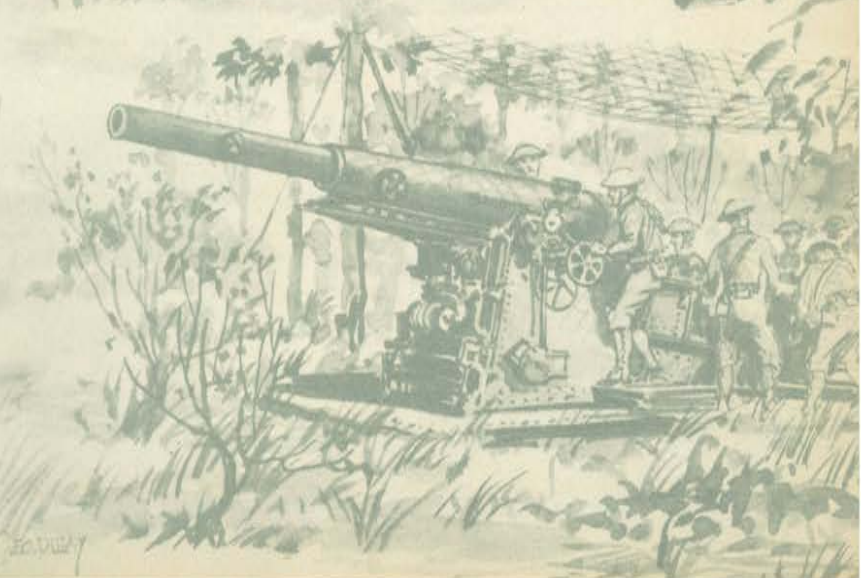
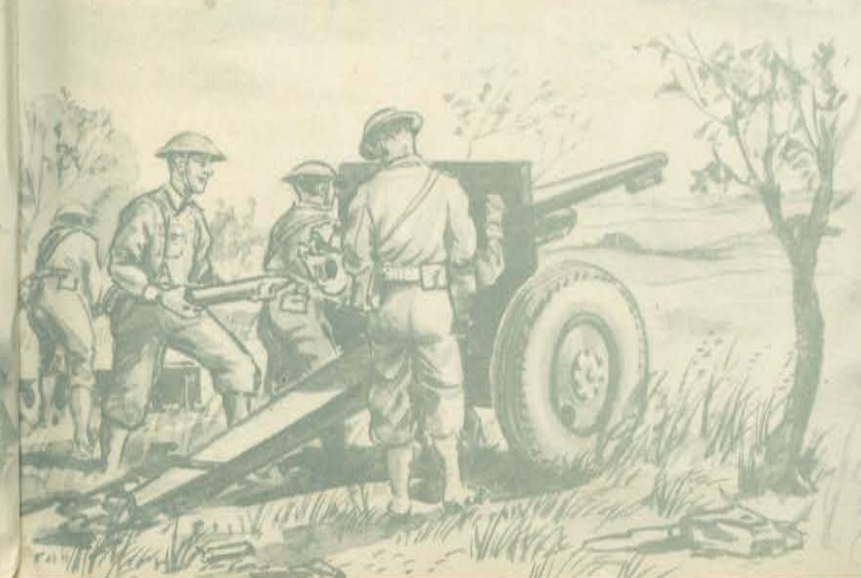

To the Officers and Men of the 73d Field Artillery Brigade.



These two regiments, although they have a cavalry background, have units within them that fought as artillery in the Spanish American War and World War I.

Today we are united in one Brigade, dedicated to a service which may prove more difficult than any we ever have performed. Yet, even as we have lived and trained together as one family, so shall we, when the time comes, fight with a unity of spirit and purpose which can only bring credit to our Country, Brigade and to ourselves.

**WILLIAM A. MARCH**

**COMMANDING THE 73rd FIELD ARTILLERY BRIGADE**

Brigadier General William A. March was born at Monocacy, Berks County, Pennsylvania, on January 1, 1884. He attended public school and, later, the Hill School at Pottstown, Pennsylvania. In 1908 he was graduated from Princeton University with the degree of Civil Engineer.

General March enlisted in the 2nd Regiment, Infantry, National Guard of Pennsylvania, on March 7, 1913. On July 11, 1913, he was elected 1st Lt., Co. F, of this regiment, and on January 16, 1916, was appointed Captain of Infantry and assigned to command Co. C, 2nd Pennsylvania Infantry.

As company commander General March went to the Mexican border at El Paso, Texas, on June 30, 1916, and while there the 2nd Pennsylvania Infantry was changed to a Field Artillery regiment. The General being a junior Captain at the time, became a 1st Lieutenant of Field Artillery in Battery D of the 2nd Pennsylvania Field Artillery Regiment. Early in December, 1916, he was placed in command of Battery C, 2nd Pennsylvania Field Artillery, and on January 17, 1916, was appointed Captain of Field Artillery.

He was mustered out of Federal service on March 3, 1917, only to be recalled on July 15, 1917. Assigned to attend the famous "zero class" at the School of Fire, Fort Sill, Oklahoma, he was appointed a Major of Field Artillery after graduation and returned to his old Regiment, which then was known as the 108th F. A., of the 23th Division.

He first commanded the new 3rd Battalion of this regiment, but went to France on May 19, 1918, as commander of the 1st Battalion, with which he subsequently fought in four major offenses of the first World War. He returned from France during May, 1919, and was mustered out of the service on May 22, 1919.

On August 10, 1920, he was appointed Colonel of Field Artillery, and he reorganized the 2nd Pennsylvania Field Artillery, which later was redesignated the 108th Field Artillery. General March commanded this regiment for more than twenty years. On December 6, 1940, the 100th anniversary of the 108th Field Artillery, he was appointed Brigadier General and was assigned to command the 73rd Field Artillery Brigade.

With this Brigade he again entered the Federal service on January 13, 1941.

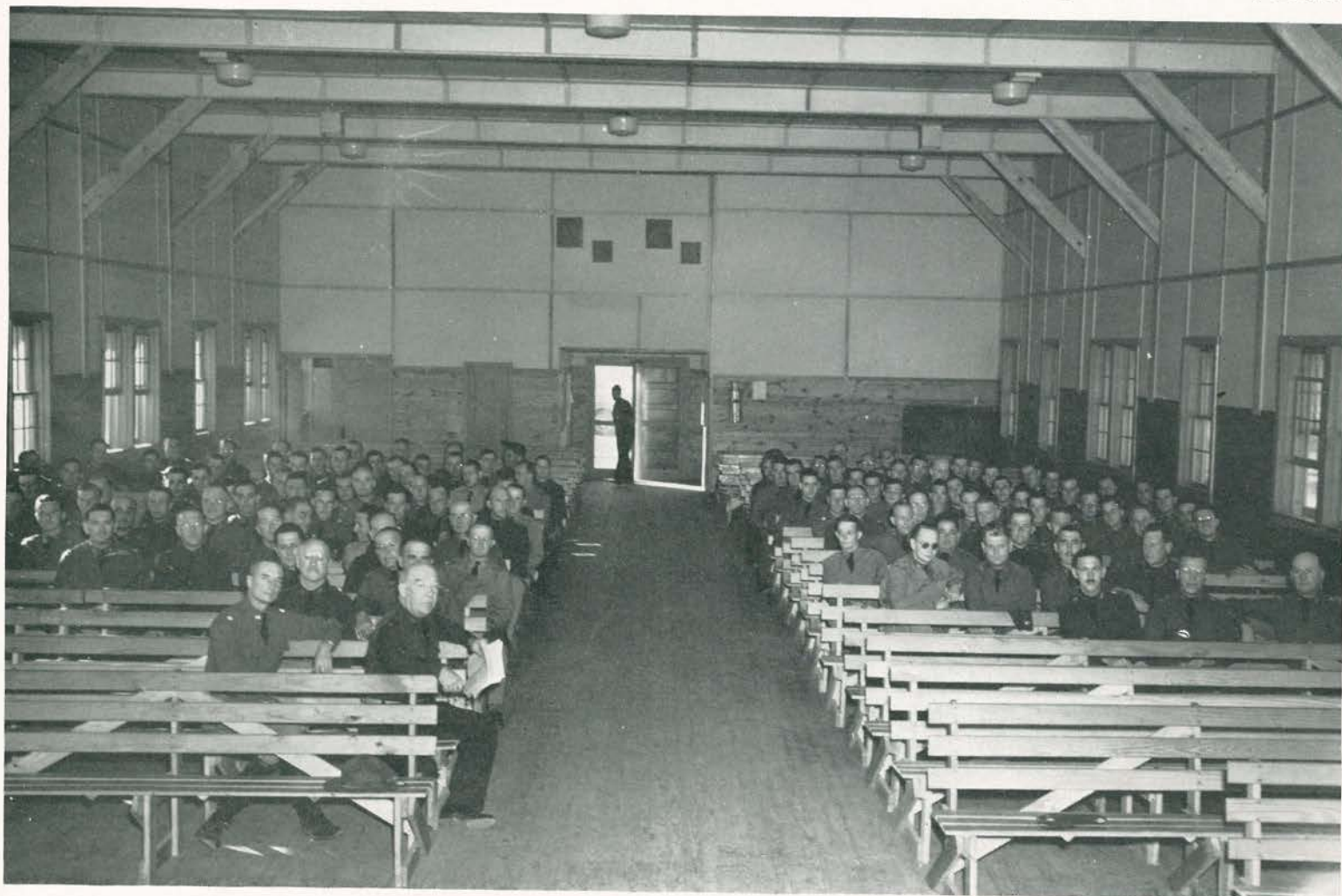

# HISTORY OF THE SEVENTY-THIRD FIELD ARTILLERY BRIGADE

This Brigade was organized September 23, 1940. The Commanding General is Brigadier General William A. March. It is composed of the Headquarters Battery, 73rd Field Artillery Brigade (Corps) from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the 141st Field Artillery (the Washington Artillery) from New Orleans, and the 166th Field Artillery drawn mainly from in and around Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and from what is known as up-state Pennsylvania. The 155mm gun, tractor drawn regiment, the 190th Field Artillery, was formerly the 103rd Cavalry and is composed of units from the central and western part of the state of Pennsylvania. The Brigade Headquarters, when formed, was converted from the Headquarters 22nd Cavalry Division, Headquarters 52nd Cavalry Brigade and Headquarters 122nd Medical Squadron which had a history dating back to 1921, having been so organized when the National Guard of the United States was reorganized under the National Defense Act.

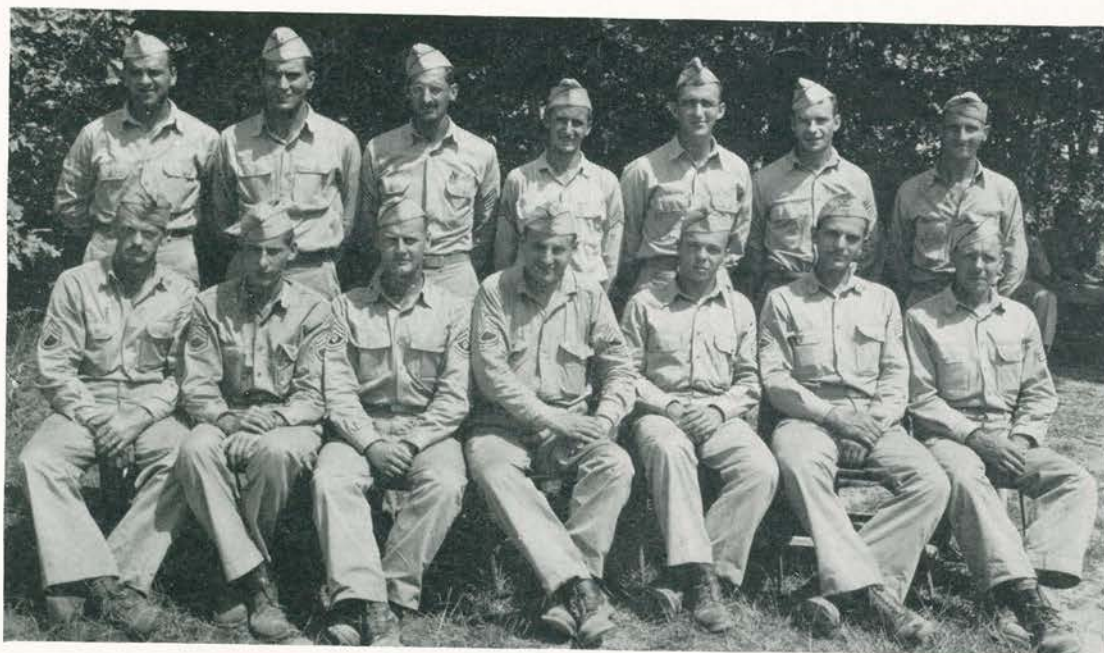

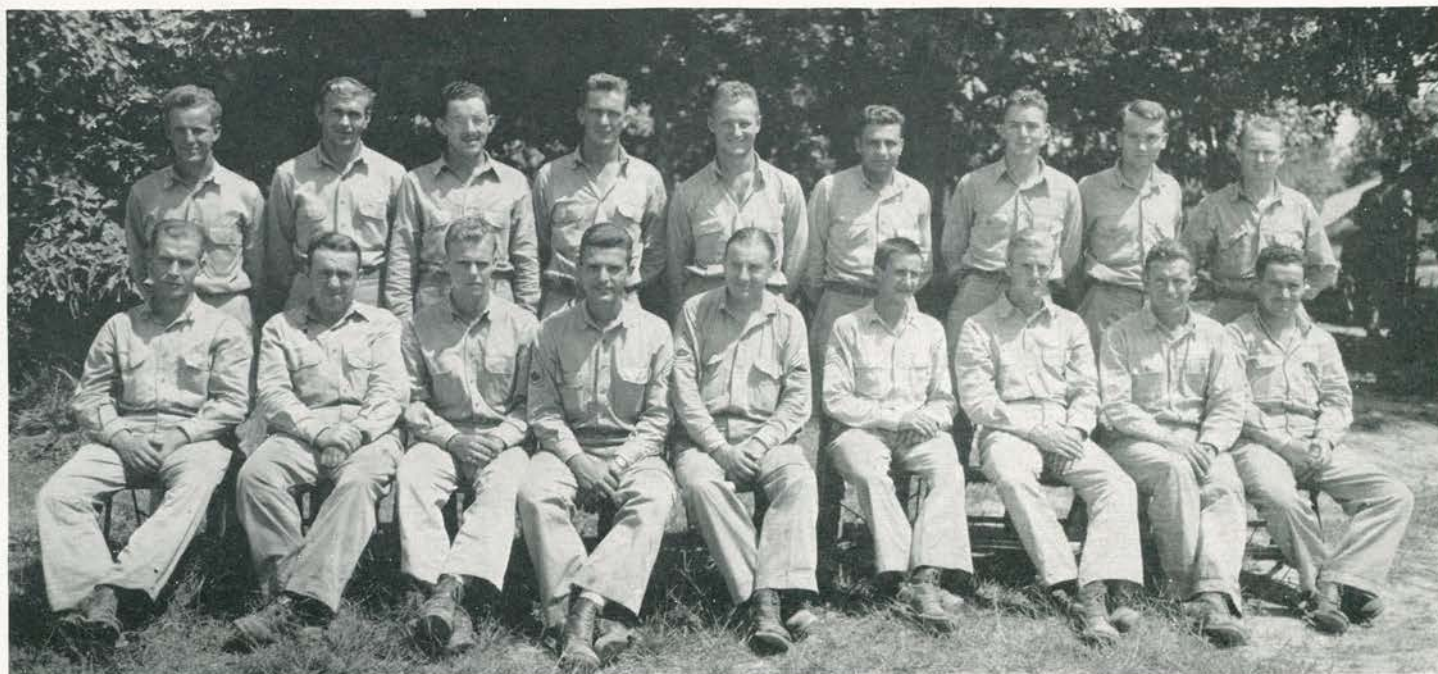

## History

Headquarters Battery, 73rd Field Artillery Brigade (Corps), came into existence on October 17, 1940. This organization was formed from amongst the units of the Pennsylvania Cavalry stationed on the Mexican border in 1916 to operate as a Headquarters Troop. Upon the return to Philadelphia, Pa., the organization passed out of existence until July 15, 1917, when it was organized and federally recognized as Headquarters Troop, 1st Cavalry.

It served in federal service in the World War and when the cavalry was transferred to other branches of the service the unit was reassigned, some to the 103rd Engineers and some to the Veterinary Corps, 28th Division. As such it participated in two major battles during the World War and silver bands were authorized to go with its guidon for the following:

Champaigne-Marne, Aisne-Marne.

At the conclusion of its service and after the signing of the Armistice this organization was mustered out of federal service on May 19, 1919.

Upon the reorganization of the Pennsylvania National Guard under the National Defense Act this Headquarters Troop, 103rd Cavalry, was reassigned and federally recognized June 13, 1921. In April, 1939, the 103rd Cavalry was reorganized and Service Troop and Headquarters Detachment, 1st Squadron, of the 103rd Cavalry were combined with

Headquarters Troop of the 103rd Cavalry. This organization continued as such until June 16, 1939, when the 22nd Cavalry Division, consisting of units from Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Kentucky came into existence and Headquarters Troop, 103rd Cavalry, became the 22nd Signal Troop and was cited by the First Army Commander at the maneuvers in New York State in the summer of 1940 for its work at such maneuvers.

The 22nd Cavalry Division passed out of existence on September 23, 1940, at which time this organization became Headquarters Battery, 2nd Battalion, 166th Field Artillery, and upon the conversion of Headquarters, 22nd Cavalry Division, Headquarters, 122nd Medical Squadron, and Headquarters, 122nd Quartermaster Squadron, into Headquarters, 73rd Field Artillery Brigade (Corps), this organization was redesignated as Headquarters Battery 73rd Field Artillery Brigade (Corps).

During the maneuvers 1941, General Headquarters, War Department, saw fit to experiment with antitank defense and designated this unit as Headquarters Company of the 2nd Provisional Antitank Group during the period of August 16 to September 30, 1941, at the end of which time it reverted to its original designation, Headquarters Battery, 73rd Field Artillery Brigade (Corps).

# HISTORY OF THE 141st FIELD ARTILLERY



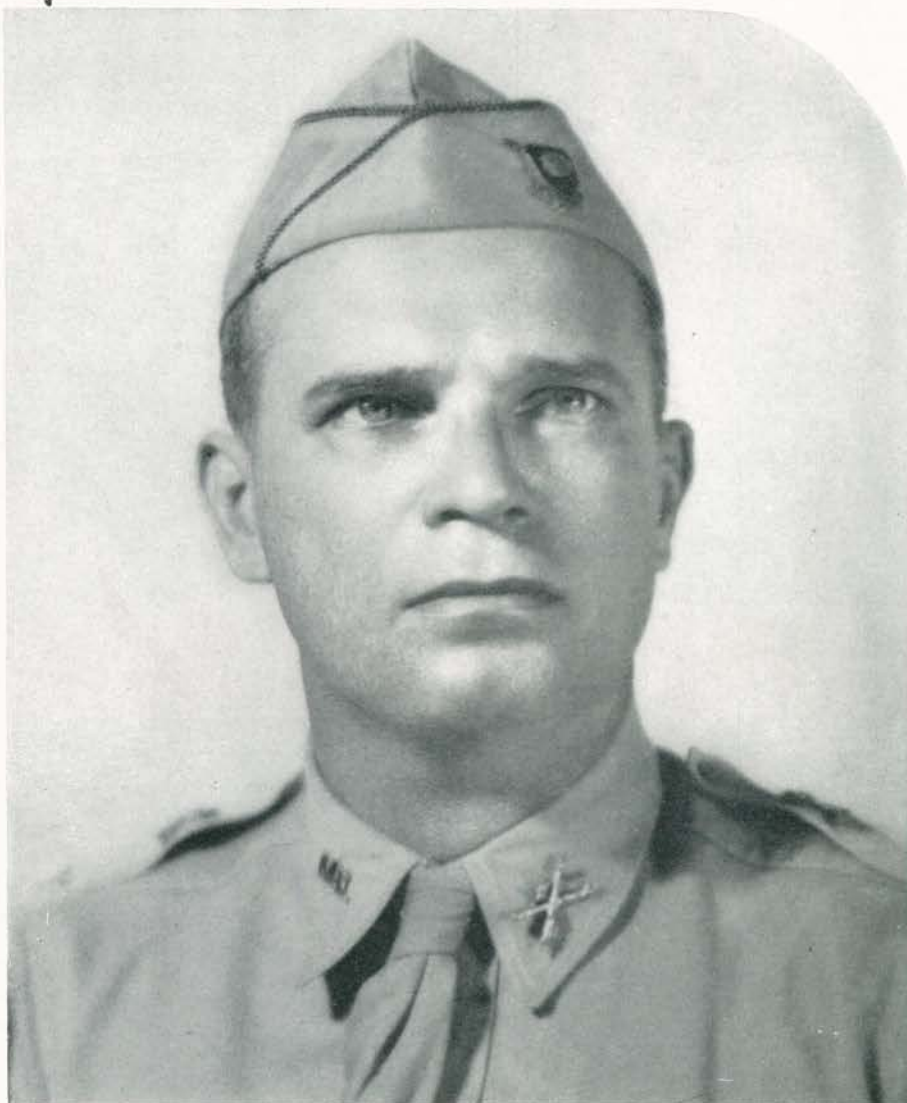
Coat of arms: Approved December 13, 1936. Shield: Gules, a tiger's face or langued of the first. Crest: That for regiments of Louisiana National Guard. Wreath: Or and gules. Motto: Try us. Description: The shield is red for Artillery, the tiger's face has appeared as an emblem for the 141st F.A. since its organization. Distinctive insignia: Approved October 2, 1939. Shield and motto of the coat of arms.

The official history of the 141st Field Artillery commences in 1838, when it was known as the Native American Artillery. Records prior to that time were destroyed when the Confederate forces seized the Baton Rouge armory at the beginning of the War between the States. The first commanding officer was Captain E. L. Tracy, the unit at that time consisting of one battery. In 1841 the battery was attached to the Washington Battalion, a body of volunteer infantry commanded by Major C. F. Hosey. In 1843 Captain Tracy was promoted to command the entire Battalion, and Captain Henry Forno succeeded to the command of the artillery battery. The following year three other companies were added and the unit became the Washington Regiment, commanded by Colonel Persifer F. Smith, who later became a Brigadier General in the regular Army. The artillery battery left New Orleans August 22, 1845, for its first official service with General Zachary Taylor's army in Texas, equipped with six 6-pounder bronze guns. After three months' duty it was relieved by the artillery of the regular army. The following year the battery responded to a call for volunteer infantry for service with General Taylor. Three days after receiving the call the battery, under command of Captain Isaac F. Stockton and equipped as infantry, left for the front as Company A, Washington Regiment. Shortly after its return the regiment disintegrated and the artillery battery assumed the name Washington Artillery, by which it has been known ever since. The center of the red silk standard, only relic of this period, is still preserved. It bears the tiger's head and the motto, "Try Us," the same as the present-day regimental insignia.

In the 1850's the city of New Orleans offered the command a site for an armory and a building was commenced. It was completed in 1858 on Girod Street and stood there until 1940, when the facade was removed and re-erected in Bienville Plaza, opposite the ancient Cabildo and Place d'Arms as a permanent monument to the organization. In 1846 Lt. Col. J. B. Walton assumed command of the Washington Artillery and led it from then through the War between the States. The organization answered the call to arms for the Civil War and by March 3, 1861, had expanded to a full battalion of four batteries. It was mustered into the service of Confederate States May 26 of that year. One day later it entrained for Richmond, Virginia, under command of Col. James B. Walton, with W. Miller Owen as Adjutant. They took with them their own equipment, consisting mainly of the four guns used in Mexico, two 12-pound howitzers and one 8-pounder rifle. The batteries were known as the First, Second, Third and Fourth Companies and were commanded by Captain H. M. Isaacson, First Lieutenant C. C. Lewis, Captain M. Buck Miller and Captain Franklin Eshleman, respectively. July 1861 the Battalion participated in the battle of Bull Run. Although not engaged, at the battle of Seven Pines, Captain Miller secured and carried off four Napoleons from the opposing forces, and they were used from then on during the war by the Battalion. On June 6th the First Company engaged in an artillery duel at New Bridge, Garnett's farm on the Chicahominy. On June 20th the Washington Artillery was assigned as reserve artillery of Longstreet Division and Col. Walton as chief of artillery on Longstreet's staff. The Fifth Company was formed and mustered on March 6, 1862, and assigned to Anderson's Brigade, Ruggles' Division. On April 6 and 7 it fought in the battle of Shiloh from five successive positions. The battery, under command of Captain C. H. Slocumb, played a conspicuous role in the capture of Mumsfordville, Perryville, Knoxville, Murfreesboro and Jackson. It distinguished itself in the great battle of Chickamauga and lost six guns on Missionary Ridge. It captured other guns and fought desperately throughout the Georgia campaign. After the siege of Atlanta, this battery returned to Nashville, spiked their four guns and ended their career in the siege of Spanish Fort at Mobile. The balance of the Battalion fought throughout the war: at Beverly Ford near Rappahannock, in the Second Battle of Manassas, the Battle of Sharpsburg or Antietam, at Fredericksburg and Chancellorsville. The position of the command is plainly marked at Marye's Hill by an ammunition chest under one of the trees. The works occupied by one howitzer to the left of the plank road are still plainly visible. So on through the battles of Gettysburg, Drewry's Bluff, Petersburg the command fought in over sixty battles and many minor engagements. Six officers were promoted out of the command, several rising to the rank of Major General. After the war, reorganization was prohibited by the Federal Command at New Orleans and the Battalion took on the aspects of a fraternal and benevolent

Colonel Curtis was born in New Orleans, December 7, 1895. He was educated at Jesuit High School at New Orleans and at Loyola University, where he received both an A.B. and a LL.B. degree.

In 1916 Colonel Curtis enlisted in Battery C of the Washington Artillery (1st Louisiana Field Artillery), and served on the Mexican border until February 20, 1917. The Washington Artillery was called back into Federal service March 23, 1917, and Colonel Curtis was promoted to the grade of Corporal, and on August 5, 1917, when the artillery was expanded to a regiment designated as 141st Field Artillery he was made a sergeant. He attended the Officers' Training Course at Leon Springs, Texas, in 1918, and was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant and thereafter sent overseas with the 141st Field Artillery, remaining in France until August, 1919.

When the Louisiana National Guard was reorganized in 1920, Colonel Curtis was reappointed 2nd Lieutenant. In 1922 he was made Battalion Adjutant and in 1923 was put in command of the Washington Artillery (141st Field Artillery).

This organization was expanded to a regiment in 1939 and Colonel Curtis was promoted to his present rank.

He is a graduate of the Field Officers' Course, Field Artillery School, and has just recently returned from his second tour of duty at Fort Sill, where he attended the advanced course for Field Artillery Officers.

Born in New Orleans, Louisiana, September 17, 1894. Attended Public School No. 9 and Boys' High School of New Orleans. Enlisted at New Orleans in the Battalion Washington Artillery, Louisiana National Guard, December, 1915. Called into Federal service in June, 1916. Served on Mexican border until the Battalion was mustered out of Federal service, February 28, 1917. Called back into service when World War began, April, 1917. Served throughout the war until June, 1919, with the 141st F.A. (Washington Artillery), eight months of which were spent in France. He was appointed 2nd Lieutenant, Field Artillery, September 25, 1917, a rank he held until the termination of the war.

When Battery A of the Washington Artillery was reorganized after the war, Lt. Col. Benezech was among the first to enlist. He was not called into the service, however, until Battery B was reorganized, August 21, 1921.

From that day until the present date he served with the 141st Field Artillery, rising from a Private to Corporal, Sergeant, 2nd Lieutenant, etc., to the Commanding Officer of the 1st Battalion. He held this rank as a major from September, 1939, until January 11, 1941, when he was commissioned Lieutenant Colonel, the rank he holds today.

He is a graduate of the Battery Officers' Course, Field Artillery School, Fort Sill, Oklahoma, 1925. He also is a graduate of the 39th Division Signal School held in Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, in the spring of 1918.

One of the achievements Col. Benezech points to with pride is the fact that during the 26 years he served with the Washington Artillery he has never been absent at a formation or call of any sort by the State or Federal Government.

# HISTORY OF THE 166th FIELD ARTILLERY



Shield: Per fess gules and or on a canton of the second a saltire azure.

Crest: That for the regiments of Pennsylvania National Guard, on a wreath and or gules, a lion rampant guardant proper holding in dexter paw a naked scimitar argent hilted or and in sinister an escutcheon argent on a fess sable three plates.

Motto: Fire for effect.

This is a young regiment with its history in the future, but the history of the individual units is very interesting. Some of them rank with the oldest in the United States. The fact that this regiment has with these old units some new batteries that were organized no later than 1940, gives the complete unit an attitude that is most desirable for success.

The majority of the officers are well trained, ambitious young men with progressive ideas, the American spirit and the desire to succeed. With these new officers are a well balanced number of seasoned campaign officers, who are level headed executives.

The troops are from both national guard and selective service, and are in the hands of experienced non-commissioned officers who have the respect of the men.

With personnel such as these of the 166th Field Artillery, there can be no doubt of a creditable regimental history.

The 166th Field Artillery was originally organized in the spring of 1939 as the field artillery of the 22nd Cavalry Division, armed with 75 mm. guns, truck-drawn. Lieut. Col. Albert H. Stackpole, of Harrisburg, Pa., was the first commanding officer. It was in camp that year, with one battalion actually arriving as cavalry and changing the next day to field artillery. In May, 1940, Colonel Brenton G. Wallace assumed command, and three months later, in the First Army Maneuvers, the regiment started its reputation when it earned a citation for operating with exceptional mobility and initiative and execution of an unusual number of fire missions around Colton, New York, during the First Army maneuvers in August, 1940. It was changed to 155 mm. howitzer, and organization was completed during the next few months. The regiment was inducted into federal service on January 13, 1941, as part of the 73rd F. A. Brigade, the Corps Artillery of the V Army Corps.

1. Regimental Headquarters Battery of Philadelphia was recognized as Supply Troop, First Pennsylvania Cavalry in 1917. During the World War it was assigned to the 103rd Engineers of the 28th (Keystone) Division, and took part in these campaigns for which Silver Bands were authorized:

Champaigne-Marne, Aisne-Marne.

After the war it was transferred to be Service Troop, 103rd Cavalry in 1921, and then in succession, "I" Troop; Machine Gun Troop; and "L" Troop, Redesignated Headquarters Battery of the 166th Field Artillery in June, 1939, it has remained as such until the present time.

2. "A" Battery, formerly Troop A, 104th Cavalry of Philadelphia, has an enviable history. Organized in 1861 for duty in the Civil War when it was known as the "Keystone Battery." For distinctive service in Washington, D. C., for campaigns in West Virginia, Maryland, Virginia and Pennsylvania, it earned a silver band on its guidon staff. In the Spanish War the designation was changed to Light Battery A, Pennsylvania Volunteer Artillery, and was stationed first in Virginia, and then in Porto Rico, where another silver band was awarded. A year on the Mexican border in 1916 as Troop A, First Pennsylvania Cavalry, was followed by a transfer to be Headquarters Company, 108th Field Artillery, of the 28th Division, and the outfit was in "the thick of it" in the major operations of Champaigne, Champaigne-Marne, Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne, Lorraine, and the Meuse-Argonne. Again to cavalry, this time as Troop "A," of the 104th, until it joined the 166th Field Artillery in 1940.

3. "B" Battery is the old "Second City Troop," Philadelphia Cavalry, which was in existence as far back as 1775. During the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812, and Mexican War. At the beginning of the War with Spain, it was known as Troop "D," First Pennsylvania Cavalry, and was stationed in Virginia and Georgia. On the Mexican Border it campaigned from El Paso, Texas. Like many cavalry units it was changed to Field Artillery when we entered the World War and it was on active duty in the campaigns of Oise-Aisne, Meuse-Argonne, Ypres-Lys, Champaigne, and Lorraine. After the war it was again cavalry, first in the 103rd, then in the 104th Cavalry. Returned to Field Artillery in 1940 when it joined the 166th F. A.

4. Several of the batteries of the regiment are entirely new. Although for several years it had been planned to have organizations in their localities, actual recruiting did not begin until the fall of 1940. However, after recognition in the fall of 1940 they made fine progress and were very active when the regiment was inducted into the federal service in January, 1941.

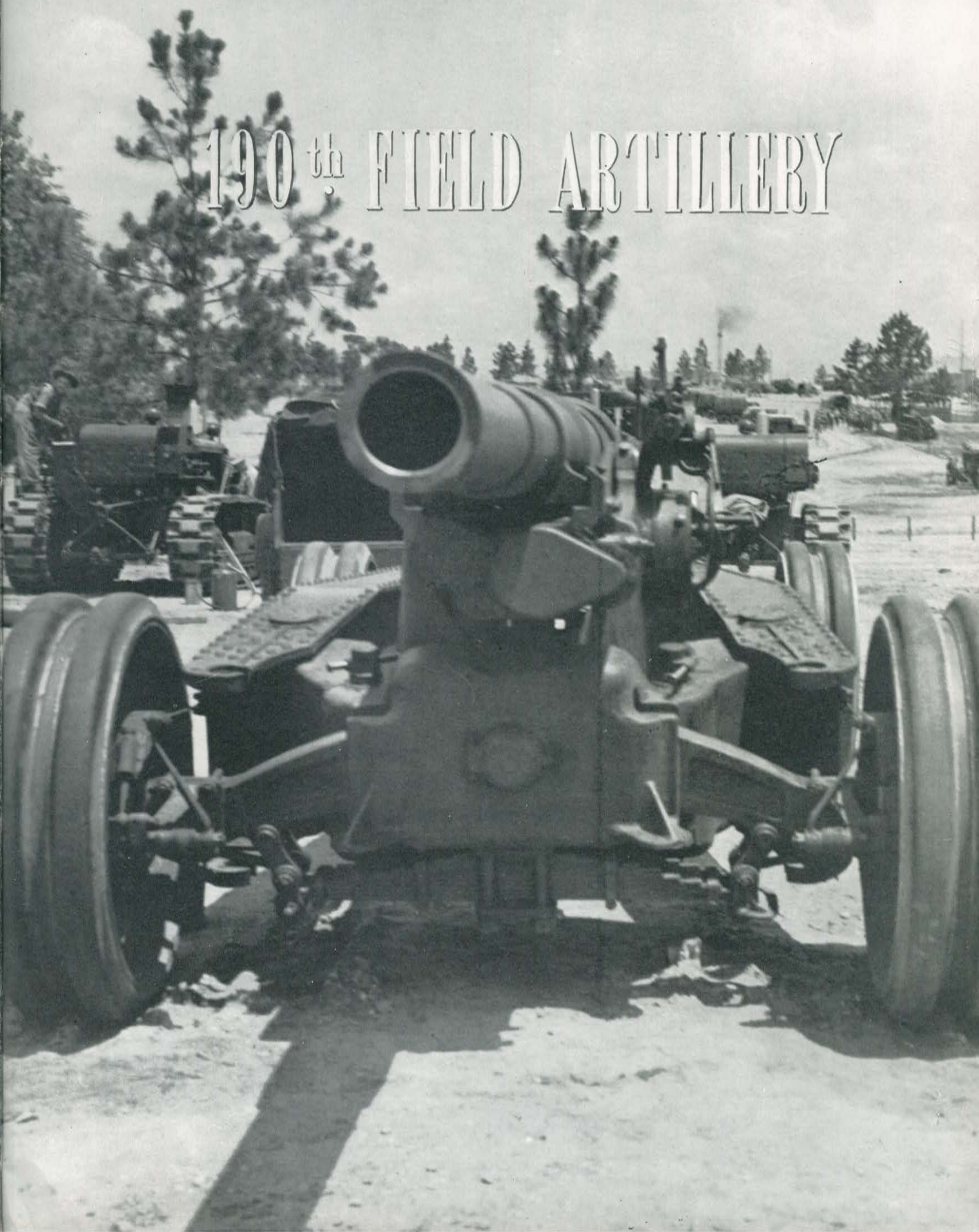

# HISTORY OF THE 190th FIELD ARTILLERY



Shield: A saltire vert between a keystone, a Spanish castle and a snake coiled to strike gules a fleur-de-lis of the first.

The Shield is yellow for Cavalry. The green saltire represents the Civil War. The colors, yellow and green, have been the Regimental Colors for many years. The Spanish castle symbolizes service in Puerto Rico in 1898, while the rattlesnake denotes service on the Mexican border in 1916.

The fleur-de-lis is for World War service. The Keystone is the shoulder sleeve insignia of the 28th Division, to which the Regiment was assigned during the World War.

Motto: "Scatter, Come Together," symbolizes the Cavalry tactics in many a hard-fought action.

Streamers authorized: *Civil War*—West Virginia, 1861; South Carolina, 1862. *World War*—Oise-Aisne, Meuse-Argonne, Ypres-Lys, Champaigne, Lorraine.

"From a noble heritage springs the compassion of glorious tradition."

Generously serving its country in the cause of Liberty—protecting the American birthright—the regiment's lineage is of proud display.

Represented in nearly every phase of the nation's history-making, the regiment stands on its brilliant past, speaks for itself with the present, and promises fulfillment of greater duty in the future.

The 190th Field Artillery of Pennsylvania, under the command and guidance of Colonel Samuel B. Wolfe, has in the current year swiftly been welded into a potent armed force.

The heaviest artillery outfit stationed at Camp Shelby, equipped with the great fifteen-ton 155mm long range field guns, the regiment has earned a reputation for wide-awake efficiency and the acme of the military—soldiering power.

Before the Declaration of Independence, at Valley Forge and Yorktown, the ancestry of the regiment was developed with the quickly-organized volunteer organizations. Subsequently, from 1774, the regiment descended in history to a more definite military recognition with the formation of the Sunbury Guards in 1818, now Battery "A," and the Bellefonte Fencibles in 1858, now Battery "B."

In the First and Second Divisions of the Ninth Army Corps during the Civil War, the organization participated in Patterson's famous operations occurring in 1861; accounted supremely for itself in the action in South Carolina, 1862, and contributed widely during the Antietam, Fredericksburg, Vicksburg and Jackson, Mississippi, campaigns.

Near the end of the War between the States, the troop remnants figured in the operations of Knoxville, Wilderness, Spottsylvania, Cold Harbour, Petersburg and Appomattox.

Many memorable accounts are noted for the regiment's aid in the Spanish-American conflict in 1898, when representative units were mustered in as Volunteer infantry commands and were readied at camps in Virginia, Georgia, Pennsylvania and Kentucky.

Although the regiment, since its infancy through to its present status, has undergone voluminous redesignations and transfers, the force of a well-knit organization was first made evident in 1914. Then it was organized as the 1st Cavalry on July 6th.

At the outbreak of trouble on the Mexican border, the regiment was Federalized and sent southward, July 6, 1916, where it was stationed at El Paso, Texas. On January 21, 1917, it was mustered out of service.

The regiment remained a Pennsylvania National Guard unit until the entrance of the United States into World War I when again its personnel became Federal troops on July 15, 1917.

Complementing the 28th Division, these troops were assigned as units and individuals to primarily the 53rd Field Artillery Brigade and various other allied organizations of the famed "Keystone Division" on November 1-3, 1917.

Serving in France and Belgium the brigade valiantly fought in the Oise-Aisne, Meuse-Argonne, and Ypres-Lys actions and in the defensive sectors in Champaigne and Lorraine. The Division returned from abroad in 1919 and the units were mustered out at Camp Dix, New Jersey, April 3rd.

In 1919 and 1921, the existing representation was reorganized, functioning as the First Cavalry. The horse has always been the regiment's greatest love and the "devil-may-care" spirit which inspires cavalry commands to staggering heights of gallantry remains instilled in today's organization.

On June 1, 1921, the organization was redesignated the 103rd Cavalry. A period of civil misfortunes during the next decade required the faithful attention of the regiment in labor disputes and natural disasters.

The Saint Patrick's Day Flood of 1936, long to be remembered as one of the worst devastations to hit Pennsylvania, called the National Guard to the "alert" protecting life and property throughout the state. Meritorious service in the face of danger during this disaster won commendations and decoration for the regiment's personnel.

## SAMUEL B. WOLFE

### COLONEL U. S. A.

#### COMMANDING THE 190th FIELD ARTILLERY

A magnificent record of forty-six years of continuous military service to his country belongs to the Regimental Commander of the 190th Field Artillery Regiment.

This regiment, the heaviest artillery organization stationed at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, having the great 155mm long rifle field guns as its armament, is the proud possessor of one of the United States Army's recognized military authorities as its commanding officer.

Colonel Samuel B. Wolfe was born in Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, on August 4, 1878. He was educated in the Lewisburg public schools and later graduated from the Keller's Business College, Lewisburg, in 1900.

The Colonel's service record dates back to 1895, when, on September 23, he first enlisted as a private in Company A, 12th Infantry Regiment, of the Pennsylvania National Guard.

He was mustered into Federal service with his company for the Spanish-American War, serving as Corporal in the 12th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry, from May 12, 1898, until October 29, 1898.

The organization returning to State status, Colonel Wolfe became a Sergeant, Battalion Sergeant-Major, and Regimental Sergeant-Major, and on June 18, 1905, he was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the 12th Regiment of the Pennsylvania National Guard. May 18, 1908, he received his First Lieutenantcy.

He was appointed Captain and Adjutant of the 12th Regiment on December 19, 1910.

In 1916, February 18, the Colonel was transferred as Captain of Cavalry to the command of Troop "M," First Pennsylvania Cavalry, serving on the Mexican border with the 28th Division from June 22, 1916, to the twenty-first of January, 1917, after which his regiment again reverted back to State status.

With America's entrance into World War I, Colonel Wolfe was inducted with his troop into Federal service as Captain of the 101st Pennsylvania Cavalry, later being assigned as Captain, 306th Cavalry.

With his Cavalry Regiment, in August, 1918, he was transferred to Artillery, and on October 15, 1918, was appointed Major of Artillery and served with the 49th Field Artillery.

Subsequently, the present commander of this "big gun" regiment, experienced numerous transfers between two arms—the Cavalry and Artillery—in both of which he was skillfully qualified to command.

Transferred to the 4th United States Cavalry, he served with this organization until August 13, 1919, when he was discharged from Federal service.

Following the World War, the Colonel was appointed Major of Cavalry and organized the 2nd Squadron, 103rd Cavalry, Pennsylvania National Guard, which he commanded until October 9, 1935, when he was appointed Lieutenant Colonel.

His promotion to the Colonelcy of that regiment occurred February 2, 1940, and on September 23, 1940, his regiment was redesignated as the 190th Field Artillery and he was appointed Regimental Commander.

With his regiment, he was inducted into Federal service on January 13, 1941, and became the first and present Colonel of the 190th Field Artillery.

Augmenting the Colonel's successful rise through all the grades from private to his present rank—results of natural soldiering ability—his formal military education consists of graduation from Field Officers' Course, Cavalry School, Fort Riley, Kansas, in 1928 and the Advanced Course, Field Artillery School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, this year.

In addition to his military career, Colonel Wolfe has been active in many business enterprises. These civilian affairs include: Member Board of Directors, Lewisburg Chair and Furniture Factory and United Stone Quarries. Former local editor and business manager of the News Publishing Company of Lewisburg.

From 1900 to 1906, the Colonel was secretary to the Honorable Ben K. Focht, congressman from the 17th Pennsylvania District.

Civically-minded, Colonel Wolfe was president of the Borough Council and Burgess of Lewisburg, from 1934 to the date of his last induction.

As one of Pennsylvania's leading citizens, he was a member of the Pennsylvania Legislature from 1920 to 1922.

Colonel Wolfe is president of the Stewards' Board of the Evangelical Church, and has taught the Women's Bible Class for more than thirty years.

The Colonel retains residence in Lewisburg, where Mrs. Wolfe, the former Bertha G. Gellinger, resides. The Colonel and Mrs. Wolfe were married February 6, 1918.

In addition to his voluminous military interests, the Colonel finds time for several favorite hobbies. A fancier of fine horses, he also likes to fish and survey political life.

## History of the 141st Field Artillery

organization. However, in 1875 it was permitted to again function, and three batteries were formed under Col. Walton with the same old officers. In 1877 Col. Owen, Adjutant during the Civil War, assumed command. In 1881 Lt. Col. John B. Richardson was promoted to command and a new arsenal was purchased on St. Charles Street. The Battalion volunteered for the Spanish-American War and one battery, commanded by Captain Fred Kornbeck, was accepted, but the war ended before it was equipped for the field. Following the Spanish-American War the Battalion was expanded to five companies, but fearing that it would lose its identity under the Dick bill, it was mustered out of the service and existed until 1909 at its own expense. At that time the Dick bill had proved to be beneficial and it was again mustered into service with three batteries. Col. Richardson had died in 1906 after 26 years as the Battalion Commander. He was succeeded by Major W. D. Gardner, who, however, was promoted to Brigadier General shortly after and was followed by Major Thomas McC. Hyman. Major Hyman died in the early part of 1909 and was succeeded by Major Allison Owen, son of the Civil War Adjutant. Under Major Owen there occurred a period of activity during which the personnel was developed progressively for service and the unit was sent to camp at Alexandria and the officers to Artillery schools. The organization performed much public service during this period of peace, including riot duty and flood duty. Its competitive drill teams won places in many parts of the country.

On June 18, 1916, the National Guard was mobilized for the Mexican border service and the batteries reported for duty 100 per cent on the morning of the 19th. On the 24th the Battalion entrained for camp at Alexandria with 17 officers and 470 men. Major Owen commanded the Battalion with Captain Stanley Lemarie, Adjutant. Batteries were commanded by Captain Schaumburg McGehee, Battery A, Captain James E. Edmonds (now Major General), Battery B, and Captain Bryan Black, Battery C. The unit was officially designated the First Louisiana Field Artillery (Washington Artillery) and entrained for the border on its 55th anniversary of the battle of Bull Run equipped with twelve 3-inch rifles. They served on the border under Colonel R. L. Bullard, who later commanded the second army in France. The unit was mustered out of the service February 28, 1917, Mardi Gras Day, in New Orleans.

At this time diplomatic relations with Germany had been severed and the Battalion was raised to regimental strength. On March 26th the Mayor of New Orleans, the Governor of Louisiana and the State Adjutant General, in meeting with a group of citizens, decided to mobilize the Washington Artillery and the Naval Reserve for duty along the docks of the city, inasmuch as great amounts of munitions were moving through the port. On March 28th the regiment was called to duty for the sixth time in its career. On April 6th the United States declared a state of war with Germany and on April 10th the organization was recalled into the Federal service. When General Pershing sailed for France on May 28th he took with him Captain Gabe Filleul, a former officer of the command and also father-in-law of the present regimental executive, Lt. Col. P. A. Dayvis, in addition to four other New Orleans men, including the son of one of its Civil War veterans, Colonel T. L. Bayne. The command went into training at Camp Nicholls and on October 15th was sent to Camp Beauregard as part of the 64th F. A. Brigade of the 39th Division under Brigadier General Ira H. Haynes and Major General H. H. Hodges. The organization was now designated the 141st Field Artillery. Numerous officers were transferred to newly-formed commands. Seventy-five French-speaking members were sent to France as military police. A large number of noncommissioned officers were sent to officers' training schools and commissioned, among them the present Commanding Officer and most of the senior officers and staff members of today. On June 16, 1918, 400 men sailed for France, many of whom saw service with the Rainbow Division. On July 29th a group of officers and noncommissioned officers left for France, and on August 13th the regiment entrained for Camp Mills, Long Island, to be prepared for departure for France. On August 26th the entire regiment sailed for overseas on the North German Lloyd liner Kaiser Wilhelm II, rechristened the Agamemnon, and arrived in Brest September 3rd. The command engaged in training with the French 75s at Coetquidan and the armistice was signed before it entered combat. Early in 1919 the regiment embarked for home and arrived in New Orleans April 28th. Early in 1920 the Battalion reorganized under the National Defense Act with Colonel Owen (now General), Captain Fleming (now General), Colonel Edmonds (now General), and Colonel Molony, active in its rebirth. The first battery to form (Battery A) was commanded by Captain Luther E. Hall with Lieutenants Paul Loeblich, Thurber Richey and Henry B. Curtis, and was called to State service September 14, 1920, by the Governor. Captain Hall resigned and when Federal recognition was received the officers were Captain Fleming, Lieutenants Richey, Curtis and Thomas A. Williams. Major Norman P. Morrow, USA, was assigned as instructor. Later in the year Battery B was formed. The Battalion was redesignated the 2nd Battalion, 141st Field Artillery, and the batteries were then redesignated D, E, and F (Battery F formed in 1922). June 27, 1922, the Battalion was again changed to the 1st Battalion, 141st Field Artillery, and the unit was entitled to have following the number in parentheses "Washington Artillery." The designation was again changed in 1926 to the 167th Separate Battalion, Field Artillery, but the War Department was petitioned and in 1927 the old designation, "141st Field Artillery," was returned as the 141st Separate Battalion, Field Artillery. Captain Curtis was promoted to Major and assumed command in January, 1929, Colonel Fleming being selected Adjutant General of Louisiana. During this time, numerous calls to State duty were answered, the longest tours being of several months' duration. Many of the present officers were commissioned. In 1935 the Battalion was "motorized," although the horses remained for some time. In June, 1936, the organization parted from its oldest friends, the horses, and became the Separate Field Artillery Battalion (Motorized). The Battalion participated in the Third Army maneuvers in the DeSoto Forest in 1938 as part of the 55th Cavalry Brigade and was highly commended. On February 18, 1939, the organization celebrated its 100th anniversary and commenced it by firing one round over the Mississippi River for each of its years of service, one round each hour for 100 hours.

In June, 1939, the Battalion commenced expansion into a regiment, beginning with the addition of Batteries D and E. Battery F was added later in the year. In 1940 it participated as a regiment

in the maneuvers in South Louisiana with the Third Army. Upon return plans were made for the addition of the Service and Anti-tank Batteries in preparation for conversion to 155mm howitzers as its weapon. Complete expansion was effected before the close of the year in preparation for call into active service with the Army of the United States. The 141st Field Artillery (Washington Artillery) was inducted into Federal service January 13, 1941, as part of the 73rd Field Artillery Brigade (Corps). Its present station is at Camp Shelby, Mississippi.

First Battalion Headquarters Battery, Philadelphia; "C" Battery, Conshohocken; "G" Battery (antitank), Upper Darby; Second Battalion Service Battery, Lewistown; "D" Battery, Wayne; "H" Battery (antitank), Upper Darby.

5. Headquarters Battery, 2nd Battalion, is one of the oldest in the regiment. Organized as the "Logan Guards" in 1858, at the time of the Civil War, it was one of five companies of the "First Defenders." Later in 1861 it was redesignated Company "E," of the 25th Pennsylvania Vol. Inf. and it served at Ft. Washington, Md. For most of the war it served in the Army of the Potomac, and with Sherman as Company A of the 46th Pennsylvania Vol. Inf. Civil War Silver Bands were authorized as follows:

Shenandoah Valley, Chancellorsville, Manassas, Gettysburg, Antietam, Atlanta.

During the Spanish War in 1898, it was redesignated Company "G" of the 5th Pennsylvania Vol. Inf. and was stationed at Chickamauga, Ga., and Lexington, Ky. Redesignated as Company M of the 8th Pennsylvania Inf. in 1910. During the World War it was a part of the 28th Division which received special recognition in six major battles:

Champaigne, Oise-Aisne, Champaigne-Marne, Lorraine, Aisne-Marne, Meuse-Argonne.

In 1921 it was changed to Company M of the 8th Inf., and then to Troop "C" of the 52nd Machine Gun Squadron. Then in 1929 it became the Machine Gun Troop of the 104th Cavalry.

6. "E" Battery was formerly Troop "E," 104th Cavalry, and has a long and distinctive history. Organized in 1878 as the "Franklin Guards," it was designated Company "C" of the 8th Inf. With the 8th Inf. it received recognition in Puerto Rico during the Spanish-American War. It campaigned from El Paso, Texas, on the Mexican border in 1916. Redesignated at the time of the World War as part of the 112th Infantry, Keystone or 28th Division, it participated in the following battles:

Champaigne, Oise-Aisne, Champaigne-Marne, Lorraine, Aisne-Marne, Meuse-Argonne.

Early in 1921 it was again Company "C," 8th Inf., of the Pennsylvania National Guard, but in the same year it became Troop "E," 104th Cavalry. It was redesignated a Field Artillery Battery when it joined the 166th in 1940.

7. "F" Battery—Another of the units of long standing, Battery "F" traces its origin to the Gobin Guards, Company G, of the 8th Inf., in 1879. With the 8th Inf. it served in Virginia, Georgia, and in Puerto Rico during the Spanish-American War. Again in Federal service in 1916, it was stationed at El Paso, Texas. At the time of the World War it was part of the 28th Division (Keystone Div.), in the battles of:

Champaigne, Oise-Aisne, Champaigne-Marne, Lorraine, Aisne-Marne, Meuse-Argonne.

1921 found it redesignated as Troop "D," 104th Cavalry. In 1929 it was Troop "G," and 1939 found it again redesignated as Troop "F," 104th Cavalry. In 1939 it became a field artillery battery and was one of the original gun batteries of the 166th Field Artillery.

A reorganization came again on April 1, 1939, but without change in the regiment's designation. It was February 2, 1940, that Colonel Samuel E. Wolfe became commander of the 103rd Cavalry, Pennsylvania National Guard. In the New York State maneuvers in the spring of 1940, the rough and ready 103rd was observed as a steel-tempered outfit by Lieutenant General Hugh Drum and the First Army.

Ordered to redesignation, this regiment, so long mounted, was transformed overnight to field artillery on September 23, 1940, with Colonel Wolfe in command.

World conditions demanding united mobilization found the 190th Field Artillery inducted into Federal service on January 13, 1941, and assigned as the 155mm "big gun" regiment in the 73rd Field Artillery Brigade, Fifth Army Corps.

Upon orders, Colonel Wolfe brought his command from Pennsylvania to Camp Shelby, arriving February 3, 1941, and immediately inaugurated a 12-month program of intensified training.

The first complement of Selective Service trainees assigned to the 190th arrived in April, augmenting the original cadre of guardsmen until today the strength of the regiment is 64 officers and 1,165 enlisted men.

Leaving his regiment for three months, Colonel Wolfe attended the Advanced Officers' Course, Field Artillery School at Fort Sil, Oklahoma, entrusting the command of the regiment to Lieutenant Colonel John T. Bell, 2nd Battalion commander.

The gunnery prowess of the regiment is as great as its weapon. Manning twenty-four 155s, the six firing batteries have proven their abilities during numerous tactical field and range problems. This heavy armament, capable of an effective range of 10 miles, has neutralized targets with duplicating finesse at such distances. It fires a projectile weighing 96 pounds.

Men and soldiers all, distinctly proud of their illustrious forbearance, the officers and ranks of the 190th Field Artillery zealously guard the trust of Americanism, and are prepared to counteract any violation that endangers the rights of human happiness.

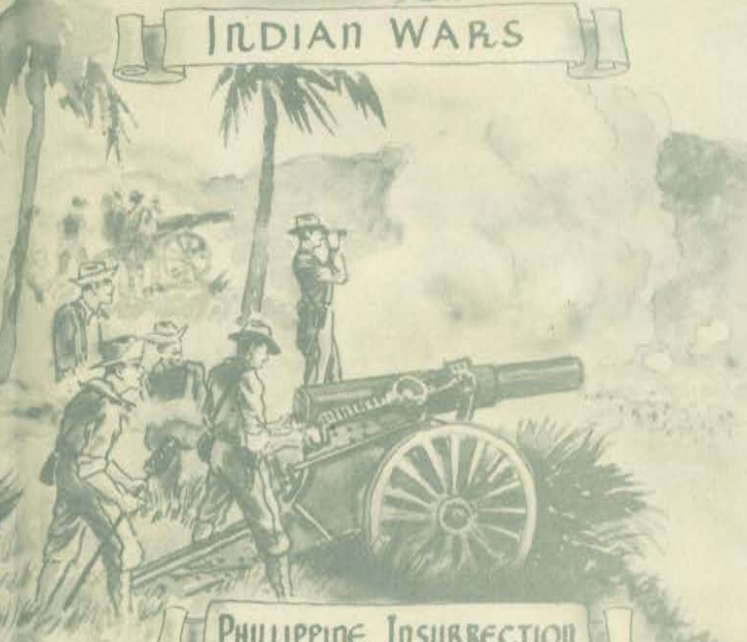
