## Present Projects

THE PEDIATRIC CLINIC now in its fourth year, is an important part of the Eastern Maine General Hospital. League volunteers work here each Saturday morning. They take histories of the patients, weigh children, assist the doctors, and act as receptionists. Financial obligations met by the League are for medication which parents cannot afford.

A CHILDREN'S ART CENTER benefits sixty children of the 4th, 5th and 6th grades from the Bangor area with art instruction. The children are selected by their teachers. The League pays for a professional teacher and for all the equipment and supplies. The Art Center is staffed by League volunteers.

A TRAVELING ART exhibit, consisting of twelve reproductions of Famous Paintings was purchased by the League. These pictures are exhibited in the Schools of Bangor and other Communities.

OUR CHILDREN'S THEATRE endeavors to arouse in children an interest and appreciation for live drama. Dramatized tales with all parts played by League members are given annually with all costumes, scenery, and staging produced by Bangor Junior League members. The admission fee is minimum, and the play is not a money making event.

### Members For Responsible Citizenship

A new member is trained to fulfill the object of the Junior League of Bangor —“to foster interest in its members in the social, economic, educational, cultural, and civic conditions of their community and to make efficient their volunteer service.” She is required to take a provisional training course which is given by competent lay and professional leaders.

A new member learns that the Junior League idea is not confined to Bangor but that Bangor is only one of 182 Junior Leagues. These Leagues are banded together in the ASSOCIATION OF JUNIOR LEAGUES OF AMERICA.
