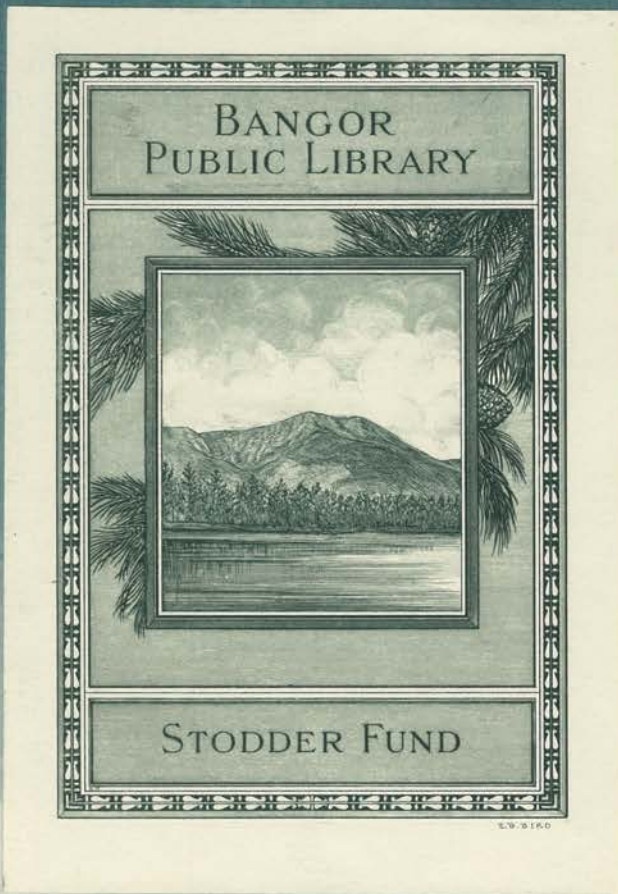

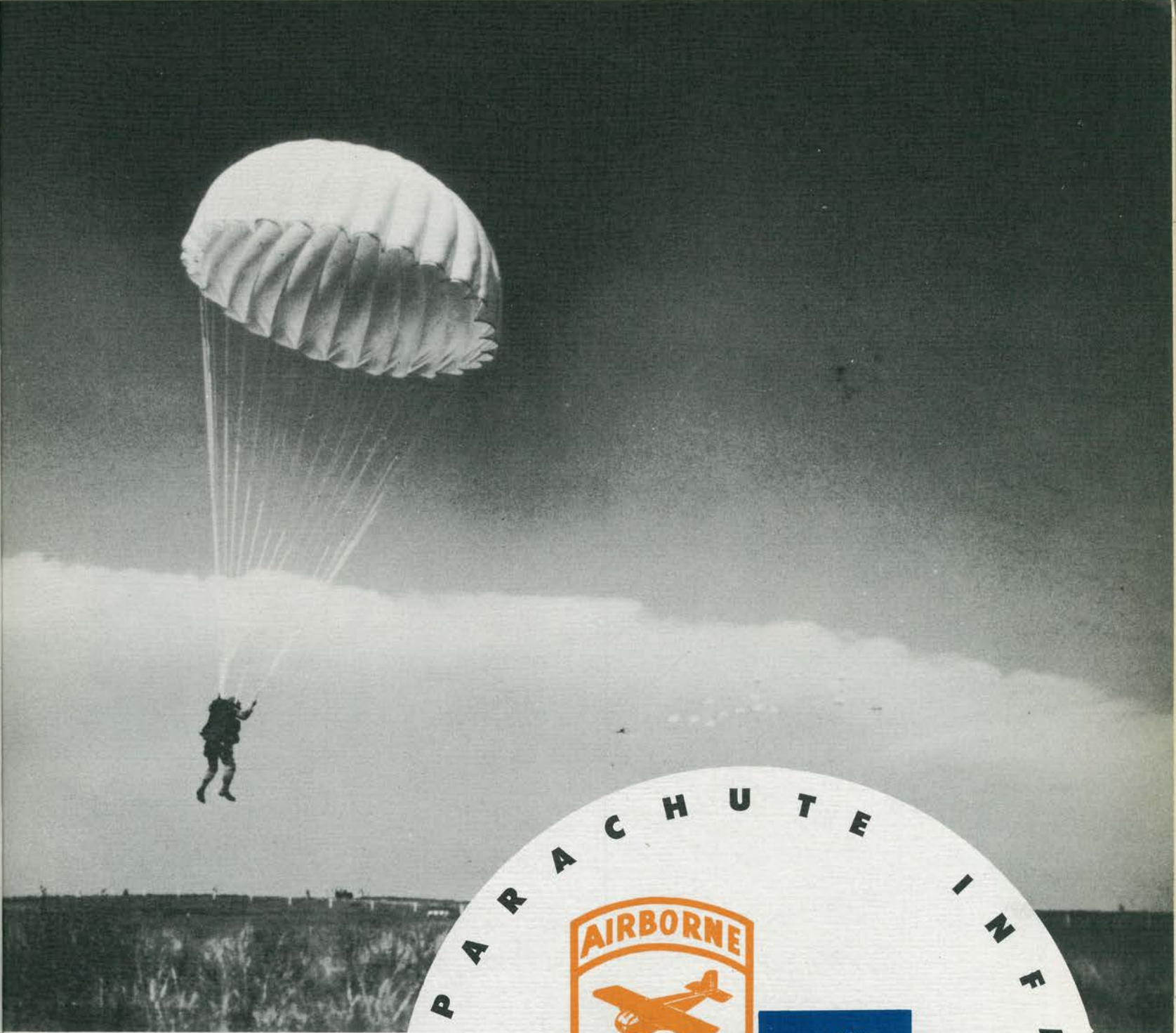

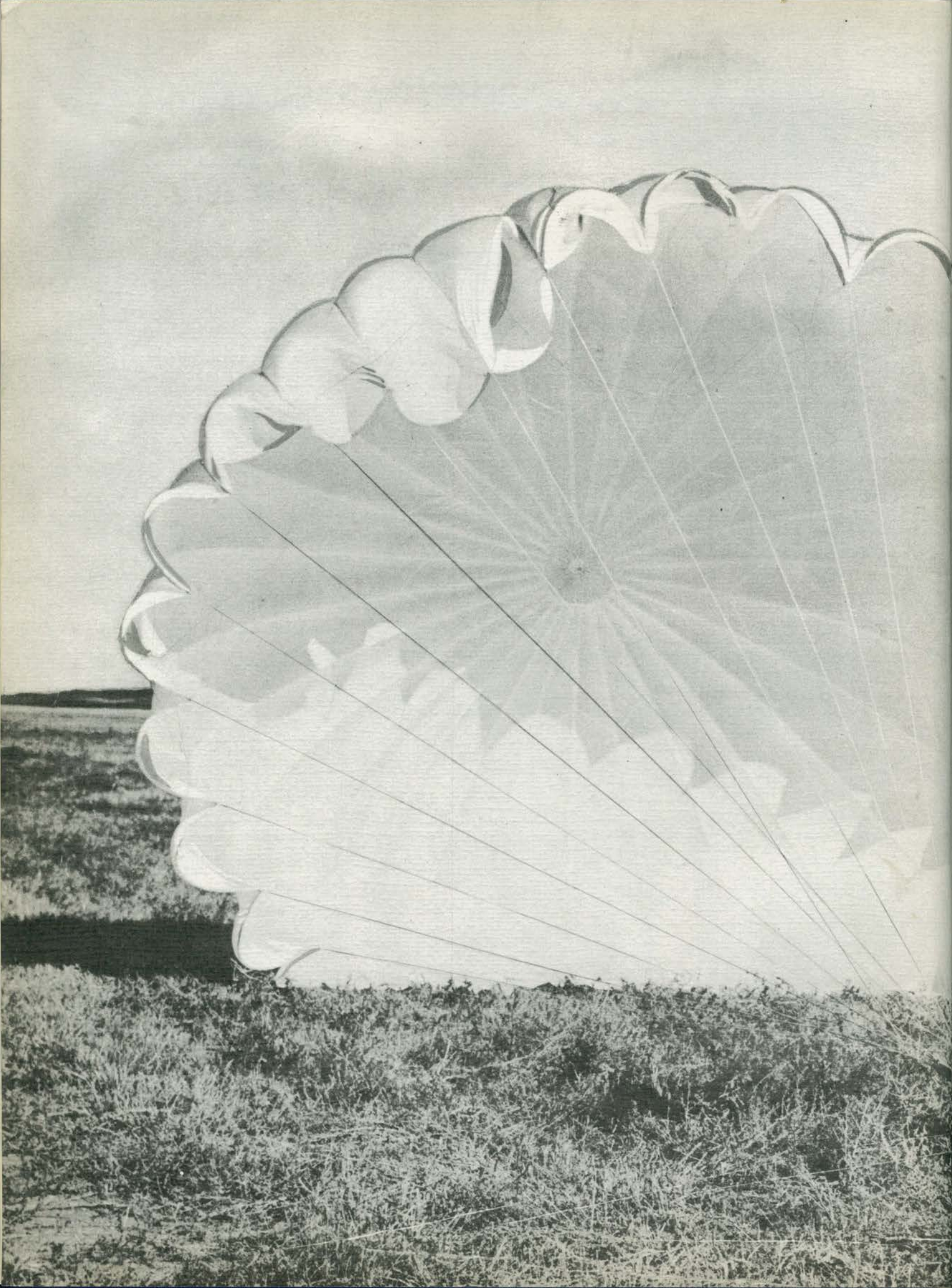




# Dedication

# Foreword

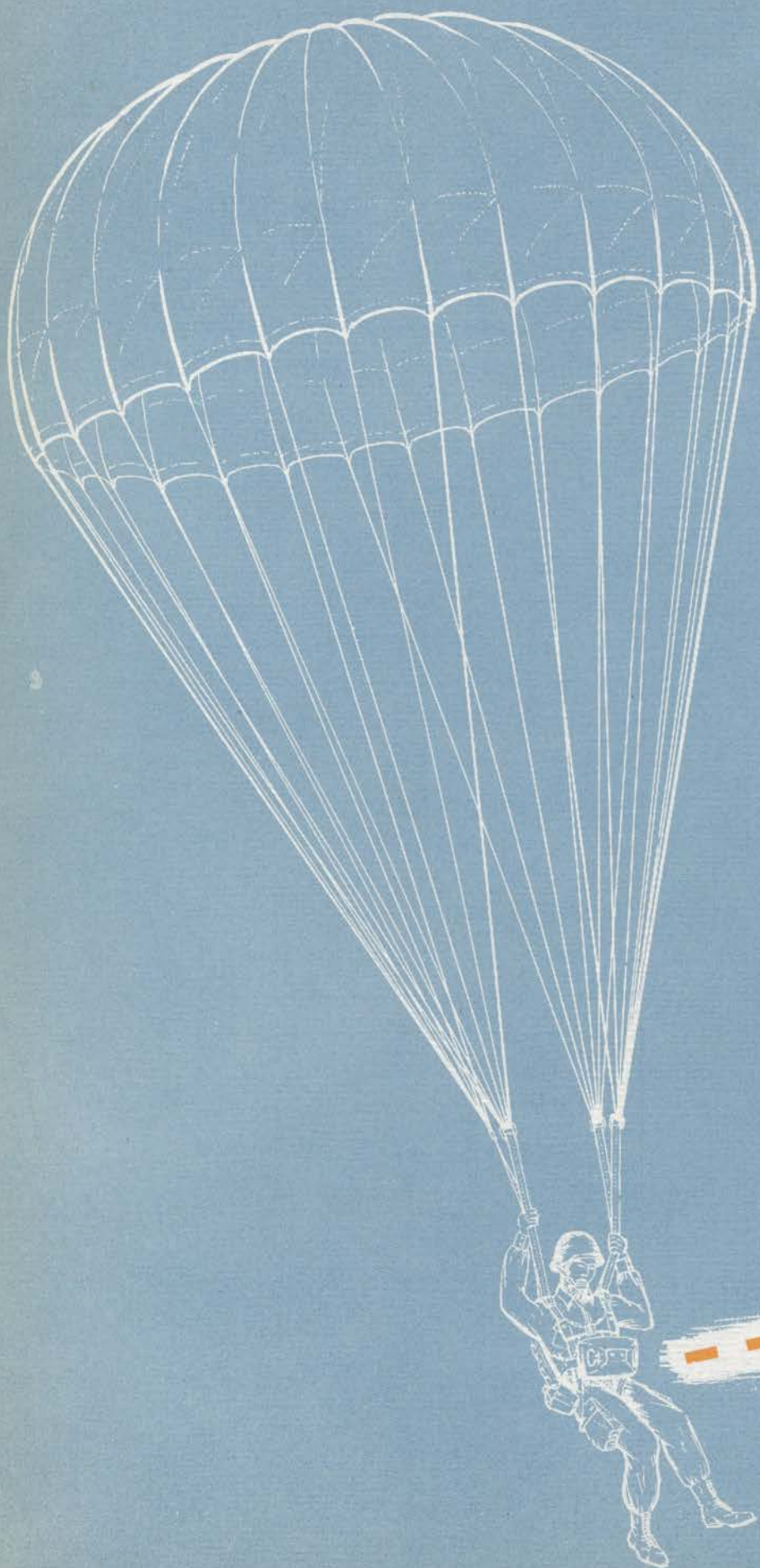
## *Reminiscent of another era...*

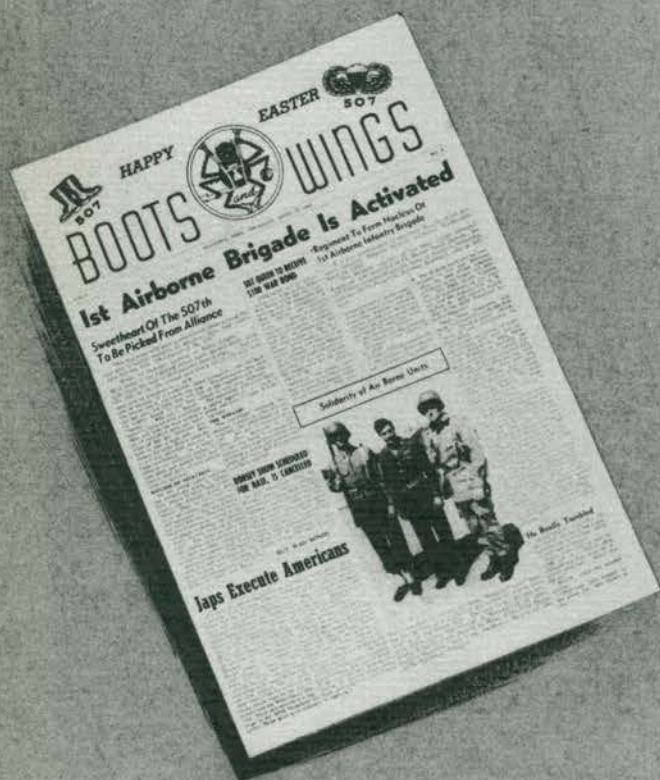






## *Hand Mimeographed to Printed Copies*

• The first issue of Boots and Wings appeared in the "Frying Pan" (Fort Benning) November 1, 1943. 1500 copies were run off on the hand operated mimeograph machine . . . 20 pages per issue. From this humble beginning Boots and Wings has progressed until today it is rated by many as the finest regimental publication in the United States Army . . . When Boots and Wings was first conceived in October of '42 and the initial stages of development had been overcome, there were still a great many obstacles to be hurdled. The regiment was still under strength at the time, a great many people were skeptical as to the advisability of having a regimental paper . . . The one-time skeptics are now the staunchest supporters of Boots and Wings. The paper has attempted to mirror to "whomever it may concern" the life and activities of the 507th Parachute Infantry. The editors hope that they have succeeded.

Colonel Maloney, Major Smith, Major Pearson, Captain Keller, Captain Brakonecke, Captain Fagan, Lt. Farnham, Lt. Higgins, and Lt. Hathaway. The jump was made with clothing, steel helmet, and jump boots fully laced. Of the nine men that jumped seven managed to land in the water, while the other two were carried off into the trees by the wind. The men were supposed to slip from their harness when they were 10 feet from the water and inflate their life preservers. Some managed to slip from their 'chutes, and others didn't. However, the important thing is nobody got hurt.

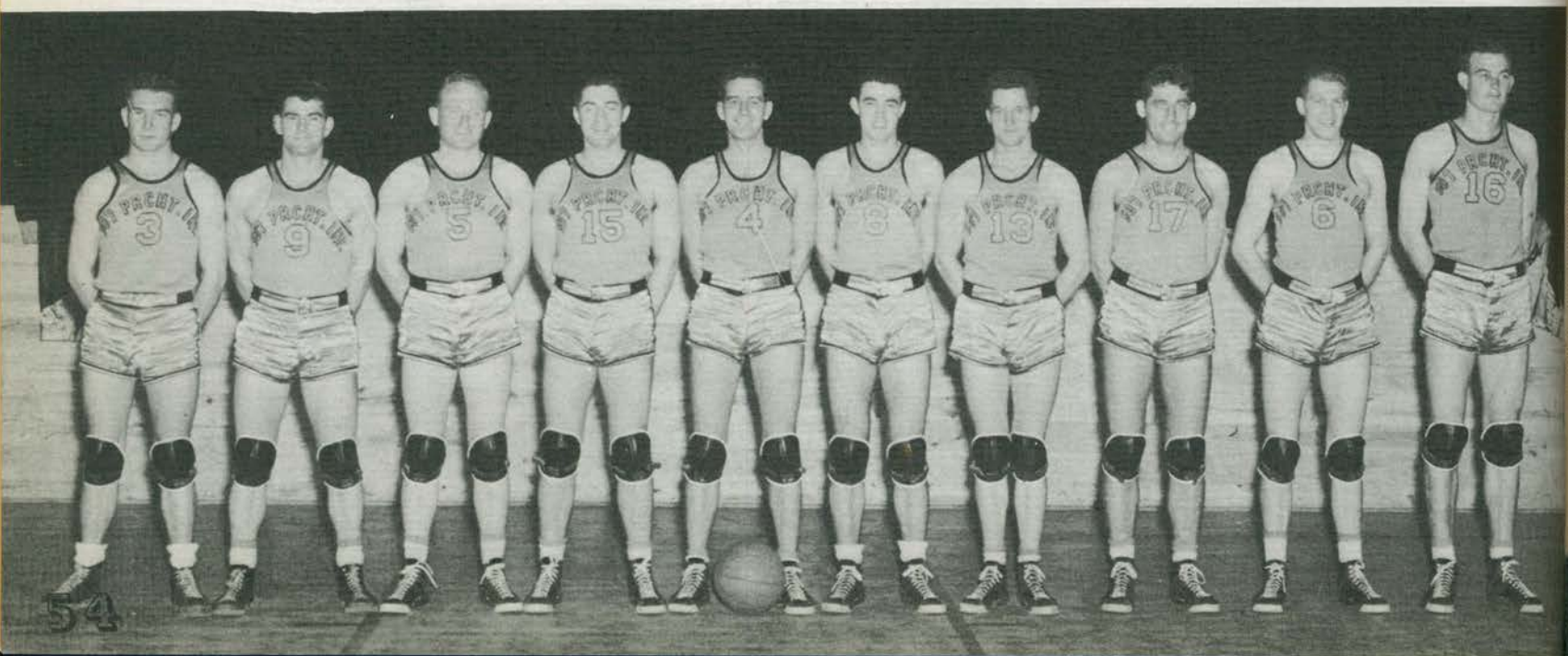

The offensive power of the team relied upon such worthies as Terry Scott, "Tex" Walters, "Slim" Stout. Lieutenants Lillge and Ardziejewski were the guards on the team. Pvt. Terry Scott (now with the 515th) played with Oregon U. before Uncle Sam beckoned. Scott played the right forward position, setting up plays and bolstering the defensive game. Left forward was handled by Sgt. Harmon Walters, who played with Rice Institute of Texas before entering the Army. "Tex" was the chief scoring threat on the quintet and one of the sparkplugs that contributed to making the 507th team the heads-up ball club that it was. In the center slot Pvt. "Slim" Stout of Cumberland College, Kentucky, was the man who got the rebounds off the backboard and "fed" Walters and Scott from the "bucket." Lt. Karl Lillge, who coached and captained the team, was the starter at right guard and the steadying influence on the team. Lt. Lillge was also a threat on the offense as well and could always be depended upon for 15 or 20 points per game. Lt. 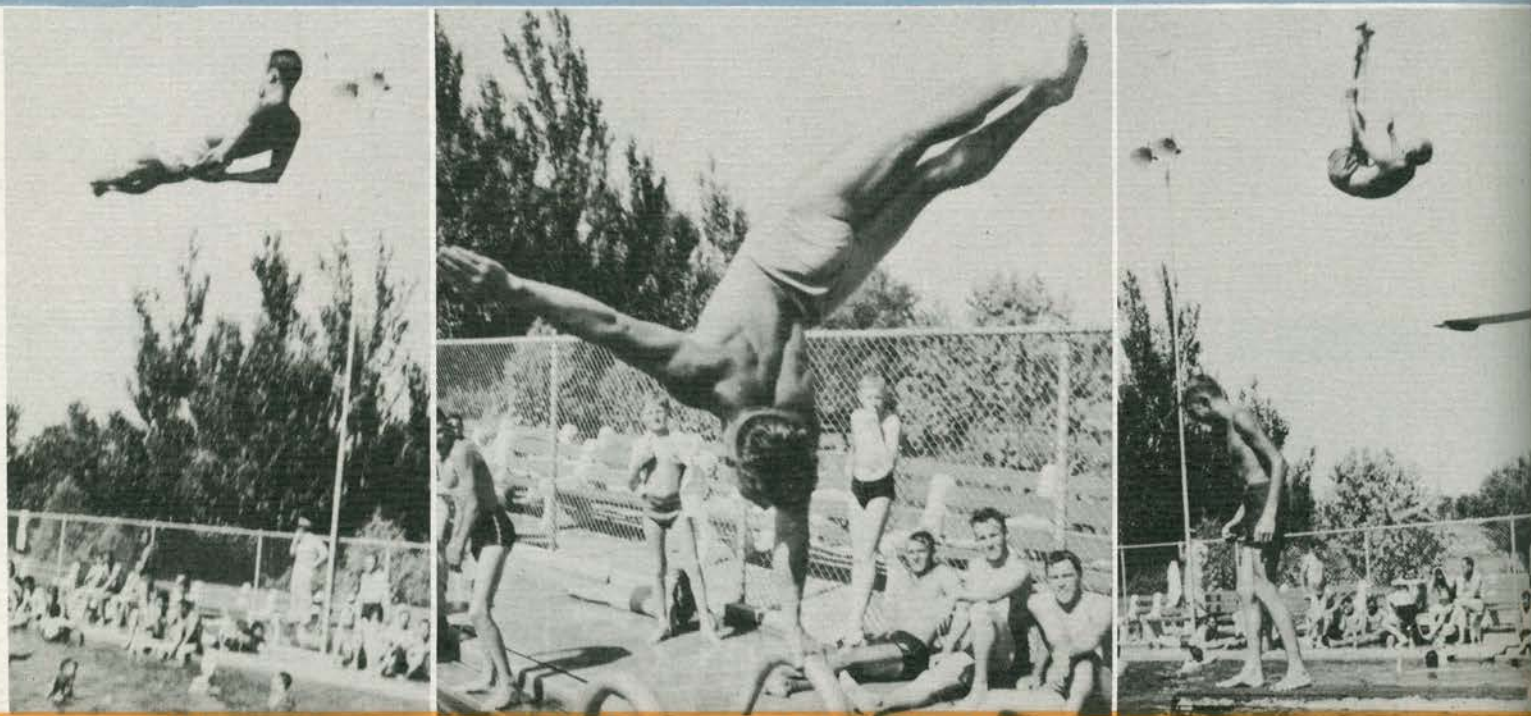

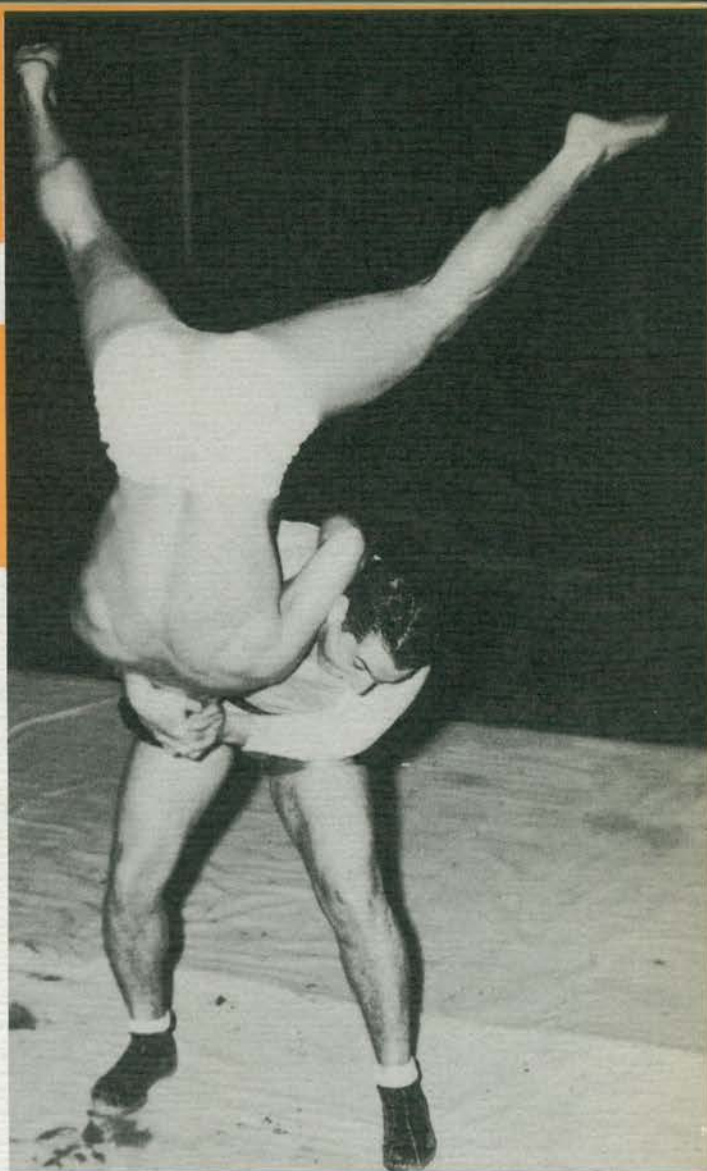
Besides diving honors attained, two pool records were shattered and one tied.

- When the waters had subsided at the Alliance municipal swimming pool, August 1, 1943, the 507th had emerged the victors over civilian and Army competition.
- George Tullidge of the 507th was the outstanding performer of the meet, winning two firsts, a second and swimming on the winning relay team. Tullidge swam the 40-yard backstroke in 23.6 seconds to better the old pool record of 24.6 set by Dick Klamer of Kearney in 1940.
- Captain Gordon S. Allyn, commanding officer of "I" Co., clipped 1.2 seconds from Bob Benson's 40-yard breaststroke record, doing the distance in 26.5. The 507th relay team consisting of Tullidge, Slosson, Klein, and Yoho, equalled the mark of 1:33.5 set by Gering in 1939 and tied by Grand Island in 1940.
- In diving the 507th made a clean sweep. Lt. E. F. Farnham, first; Sgt. Tom Yoho, second; and Cpl. George F. Klein, editor of "Boots and Wings," third.

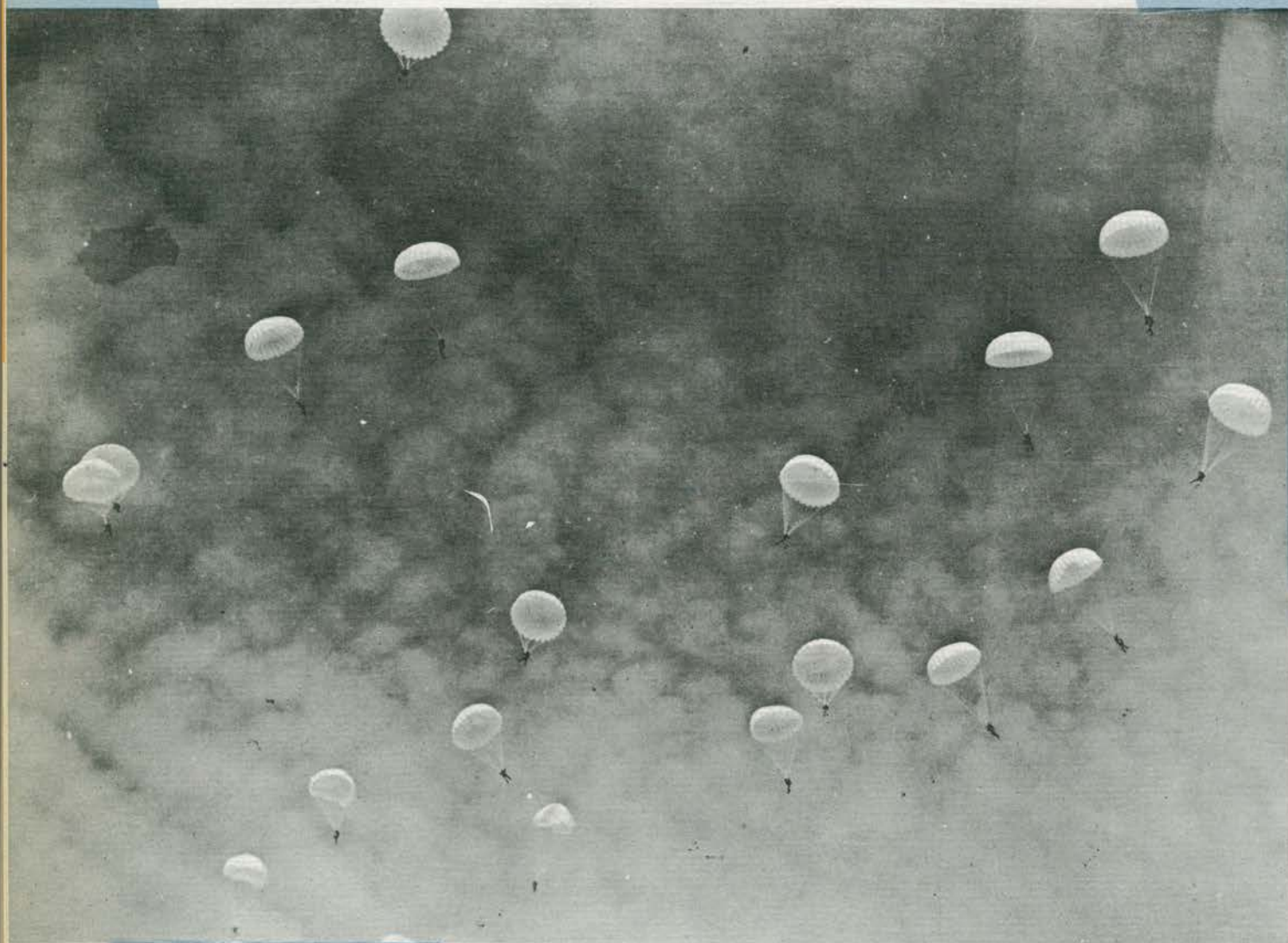

● PARATROOPERS CREATE  
STRONG PATRIOTIC SENTIMENT



**ESTIMATED OVER 18,000 PEOPLE**

*witnessed the war maneuvers at Gregory  
... a great patriotic show*

• A crowd estimated to be between 15,000 and 18,000 witnessed the demonstration put on by a company of paratroopers based at the Alliance Air Base, Alliance, Nebraska, at the Gregory July Bond and Stamp sale celebration. • The demonstration was set for three o'clock, but long before that hour crowds had gathered along the section lines, the railroad track and line fences enclosing the alfalfa field, where the demonstration took place, eagerly watching the western skies for the approach of the bombers, bringing the paratroopers. • Shortly thereafter three planes appeared in the southwest, flying seemingly low. As the planes approached they circled to the north, and came across the field north to south. Again circling, they came across the same way and this time dropped a dummy 'chute to enable the jumpmaster to judge the prevailing wind conditions. The planes then made three passes, each time unloading about 25 paratroopers. There were anxious moments as two of the troopers dropped into the high line carrying 22,000 volts. One of the boys dropped between the wires, and it took quick thinking on his part to make a contact with the buckles on his belt to make a circuit which threw the switch at the power house without injury to himself. Another trooper was injured as he landed on the highway pavement, breaking both his ankles. The injured men were taken to the Mother of Grace Hospital, where first aid was administered. • After the boys had collected their equipment and taken arms from the bundle dropped by parachute, they assembled along the west side of the field, coming eastward, as in regular warfare. While these maneuvers were going on the planes circled low over head as if to bomb and machine gun the supposed enemy. • The celebration gave the public an opportunity to witness a military demonstration of the more hazardous type and brought home to every person who witnessed the jump the seriousness of the war and great amount of courage and fortitude one must have to train for this division of the armed forces.

### *The 507th Boxing Team*

was first organized in the "Frying Pan" area of Fort Benning, Georgia. The team was continued after the migration across the Chattahoochee River to the Alabama area under the expert tutelage of Capt. Howard Stephens, former Fort Benning heavyweight champion. • Fights, however, were hard to get so that only a few of the men managed to gain any actual ring experience. "Red" Grant, one of the mainstays of the team, defeated a fighter from the 505th Parachute Infantry the night the 505th held their boxing show in the old Alabama area Recreation Hall. Grant, Melvin "Chief" Meyers, Franny Sharpe, Dickie Elliott, Eddie Ely, Joe Nicholson, and Joe Crespín were on the original team. • During the maneuvers in Louisiana, the Paratroopers met and defeated the strong Barksdale Field team before a capacity crowd in Hangar 9. It was here that Bill Esquibel got his start by knocking out Whitey Couch, 175 pounds, and holder of the Base title. Grant, Meyers, Sharpe and several others also won for the 507th, most of them via the KO route. • When the regiment moved to Alliance, the 507th immediately proceeded to defeat the best that the Base had to offer. After they had won six for six in one evening the Air Corps decided that discretion was the better part of valor and that the troopers would have to seek elsewhere for opponents. • It was at this time that Capt. Alfred Britton, Jr., the Special Service Officer, and a former boxer at San Jose State College and boxing coach at the University of Santa Clara and Moffet Field, California, assumed the duties as coach of the team. • Attempts were now made to contact other posts for competition, but Fort Warren, Wyoming, was the only one that registered a favorable response. Fort Warren, with one of the best teams in the nation, handed the troopers their first setback. Throwing an array of ex-professional fighters into the ring the Fort Warren margin of victory was decisive. Despite the fact that we only took two of the fights the representatives of the 507th gained the respect of their opponents and fans alike by refusing to recognize defeat and managing to stay in there on guts

alone. The coaches and boxers at Fort Warren stated that the Paratroopers were the only ones who had ever given them any real competition. • "Lefty" Brothers and Bill Esquibel were the two winners for the 507th that night. Brothers, who was strictly a novice, defeated Gerard Piche, the best featherweight Fort Warren had to offer, and is definitely a "comer." • On the heels of the Fort Warren fights the 507th entered the Seventh Service Command All-Service Tournament, held in Denver, Colorado, on the 8th, 9th and 10th of July. Five men from the 507th made the trip. They were "Chief" Meyers, Dickie Elliott, Joe Crespín, "Red" Grant, and Sammy Angello. Grant won the featherweight title for the 507th, which was the only crown taken by us. All of the men fought well and the fights were close in all cases. Three of the five men who made the trip to Denver were in there "pitching" on the night of the finals. • The men of the regiment got another look at the team when Fort Warren traveled to Alliance for a return match. This time the troopers won three and lost five. It was the same old story—too much experience on the side of the Fort Warren battlers. Grant, Ely and Arelano were the winners for the 507th. • The last fight card was held at Fort Warren to support the Third War Loan Bond Drive. Lt. Commander Jack Dempsey was present as referee, and the entire team flew to Fort Warren for the match, although only four men from the 507th fought. Grant defeated his perennial foe, Gerard Piche, for the third time. Eddie Ely was handed the short end of a decision, on a bout that could have gone either way. Meyers and Arelano lost decisions to Roberts and Janoski of Fort Warren. • The members of the 507th team at this writing are "Red" Grant, Eddie Ely and "Lefty" Brothers, featherweights; Sammy Angello, lightweight; Eddie Curtin, welterweight; Dickie Elliott, senior welterweight; Auggie Arelano, middleweight; Melvin Meyers, light-heavyweight; Johnny Jarosik, heavyweight. • At the present time Uncle Sam has a schedule for us overseas. The free peoples of the world "are in our corner." We are confident of victory.



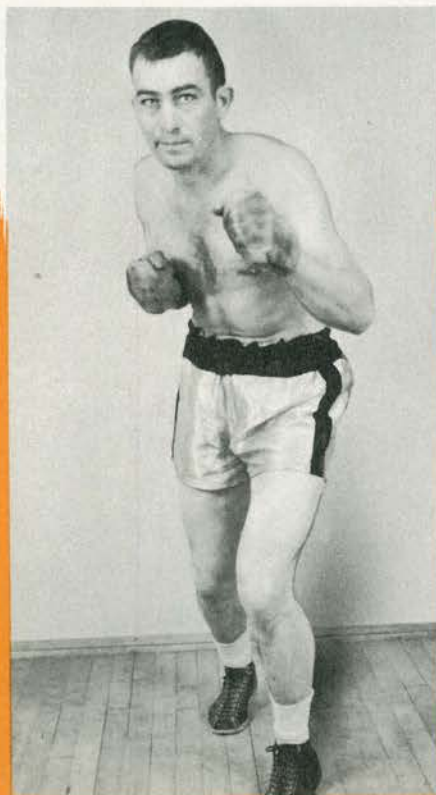

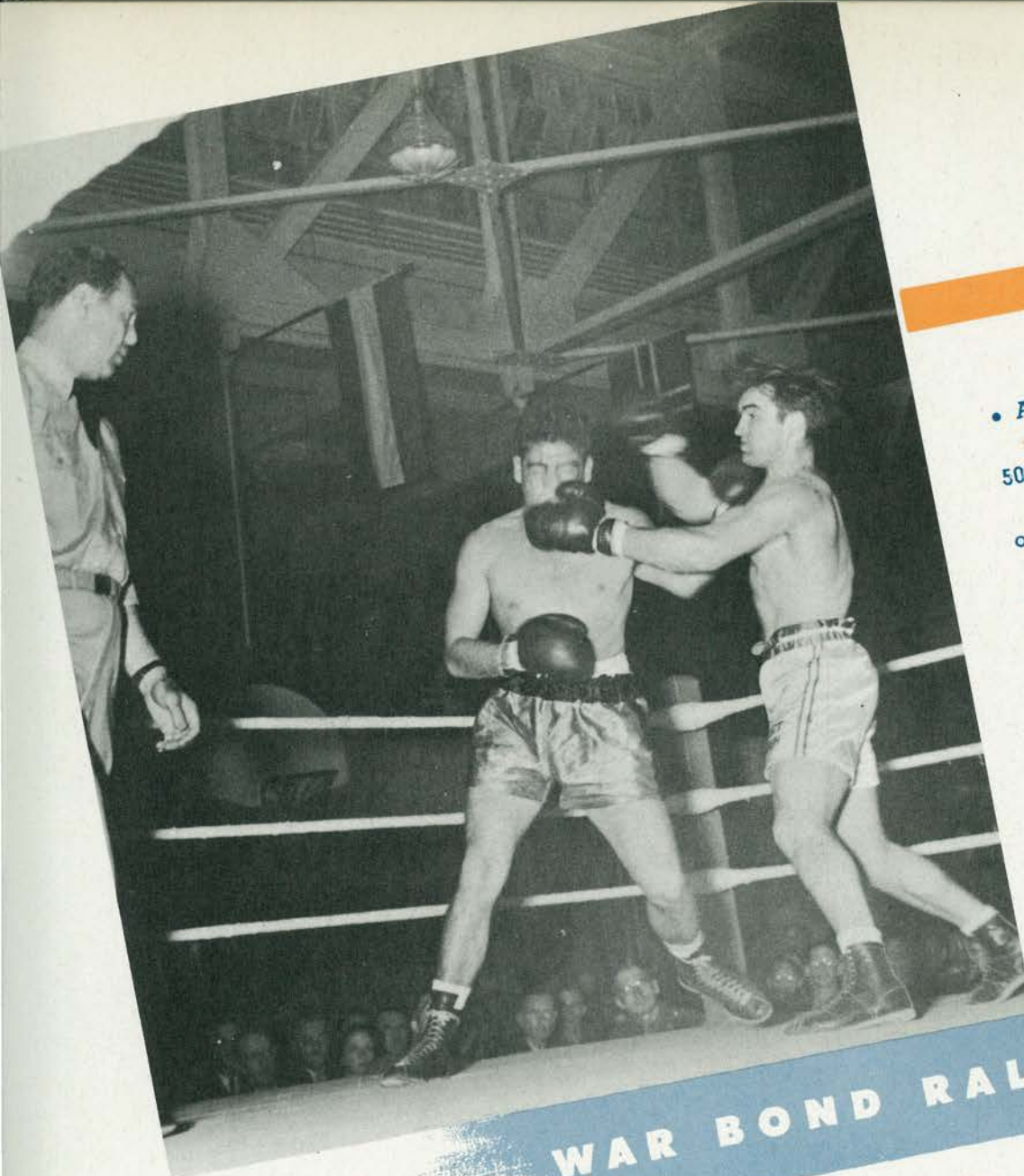

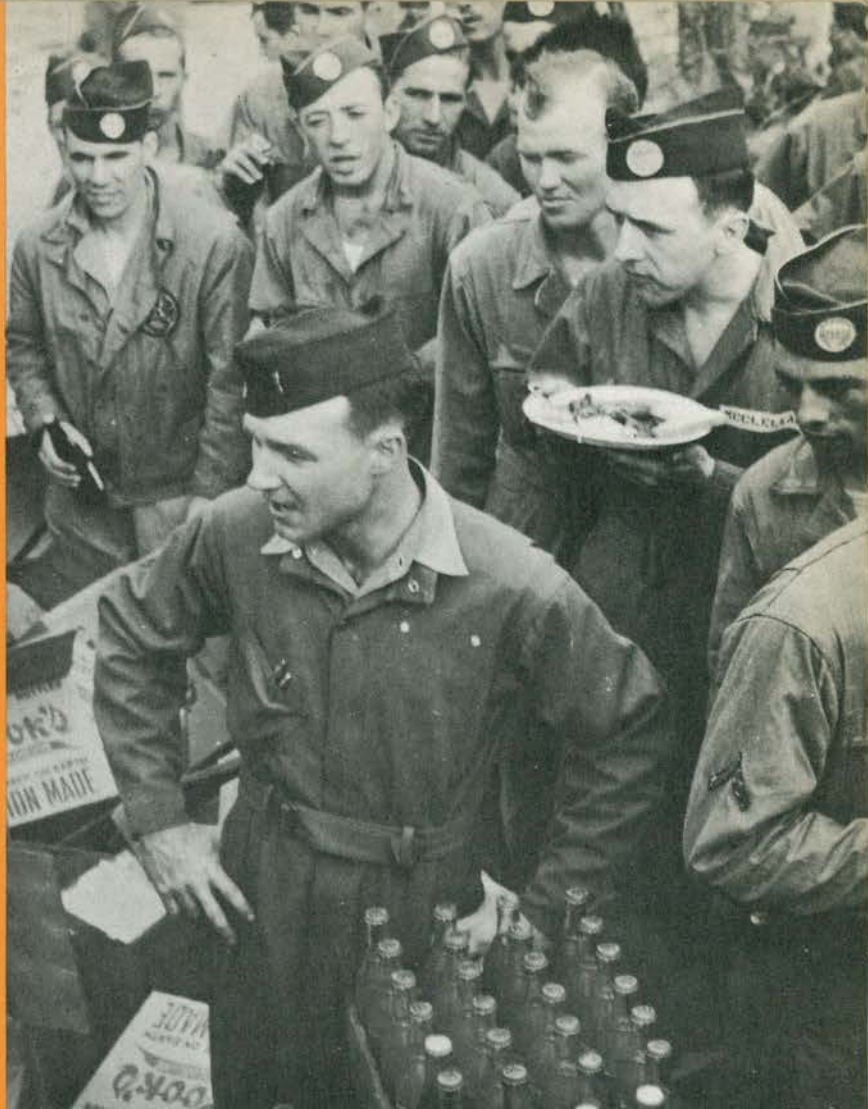

**MILE HIGH CITY...**

• Saturday afternoon, July 3, 1943, the regiment staged a mock attack upon the Denver Municipal Airport. Admission was one pint of blood and the Denverites who attended were expected to fulfill their end of this "gentlemen's agreement." The blood was collected by the Red Cross Mobile Unit and then flown to the Fitzsimons General Hospital, for preparation into plasma, by the Colorado Civil Air Patrol. • The plan of action called for one group of men to move against the north gate while a second group moved to the center of the field, covering the advance of the first. The third group deployed on the south gate, thereby enveloping the airport in a viselike pincer movement. • The equipment used by the 507th Parachute Infantry was displayed in Denver's Courthouse Square and included everything from carbines to parachutes. Also on display was a living tableau of the battle use of blood plasma, presented by the Denver Red Cross. The 507th display was under the direction of Col. Millett, Jr. Maj. Charles D. Johnson was in charge of the jump, which was witnessed by 100,000 people.

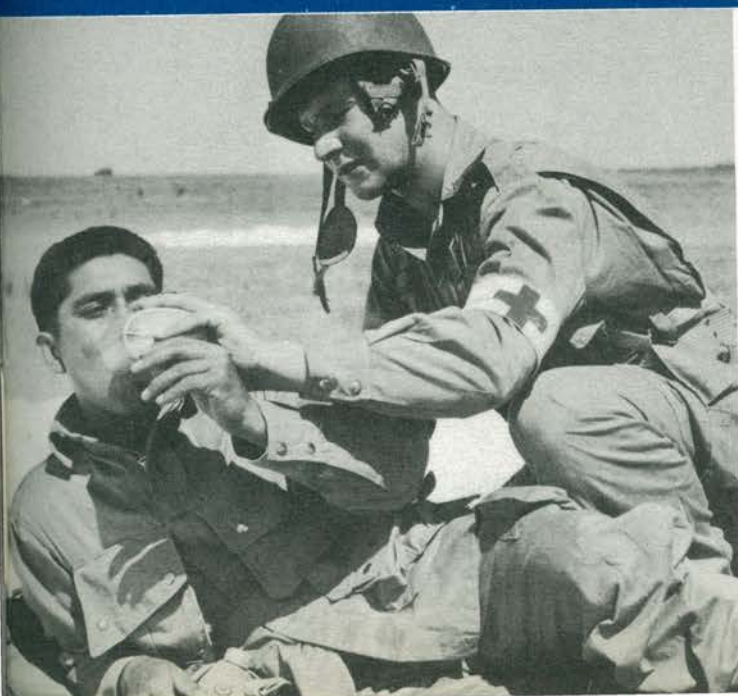




## **"SOFT" LANDING IN DENVER**

The attack was worked in collaboration with "Fortresses" based at Lowry Field. Twelve planes, units of the 73rd and 74th Troop Carrier Squadrons of the 434th Troop Carrier Group carried the men into the fray. The show was arranged by the Kiwanis Club of Denver to call attention to the need for donating blood to Denver's two blood banks. Two hundred military observers from Lowry Field witnessed the jump and were favorably impressed by the manner in which the men handled themselves after they had hit the ground. After the simulated attack the men were entertained by the Kiwanis Club of Denver in royal fashion.

Like everything in wartime, it will serve real utilitarian purposes, of which giving the public a demonstration of modern air warfare is only one.

The parachute "attack," arranged by the Denver Kiwanis Club with the full co-operation of commanding officers of Brig. Gen. Leo Donovan's 1st Airborne Brigade and other air force branches, will be first of all a combat maneuver for the training of the troops themselves, and the Army will utilize every possible phase of the attack for the instruction of its own men.

For the paratroopers themselves, the long 200-mile thrust from their big base at Alliance will be one of the most difficult maneuvers the well-trained "sky infantry" has yet attempted. Working only from carefully prepared charts of the Denver airport area and battle plans drawn up in their own headquarters, pilots of the 434th Troop Carrier Command, who will be in charge of the 12 heavily loaded transport planes, will be required to navigate with hairline accuracy so as to strike the Civil Air Patrol airport here in perfect formation as if they were surprising a real enemy.

Spectators will see a large number of single parachutes with supplies and a few multiple "cluster" chutes bearing heavier equipment, such as field mortars.

On the second and third quick passes over the field the planes will fly in tandem formation and the men will come down, half of each plane's quota of 20 leaving the plane of each swing. Once on the ground, the men will tumble out of their parachutes, race to their bundles of guns and proceed to the attack, swinging eastward to "take" the main airport, as approximately 75 high-rank-

ing officers of Colorado Army bases, together with city officials, observe the entire tactics from a reviewing stand.

Also present to learn from their first opportunity of witnessing a real parachute attack will be several hundred men from an airborne engineer detachment at Camp Carson, Colorado Springs, and pilots and crews from a bombardment group at Lowry Field.

The engineer battalion will be scattered about the Civil Air Patrol Airport, where the landings will be made, and will assist several hundred city, auxiliary and military police in guarding the fields and the valuable parachutes, which will be temporarily abandoned on the ground until the attack is completed. The bombardment group will be circling the area in B-24 Liberators at an altitude of 3,000 feet or more.

Finally, the event will be the means of multiplying interest in the donation of blood for our fighting men and for civilians at home. The whole show has been arranged by the Kiwanis Club for the benefit of the Belle Bonfils Memorial and the Red Cross Blood Banks.

"This event is being staged at much expense locally and at a great expenditure of effort on the part of the Army," Philip H. Gray, co-chairman in charge of the arrangements, stated.

# Invasion of Denver Field

## Paratroopers to Donate Blood to Red Cross Bank

• If all the spectators at the "paratroop invasion" of Denver Municipal Airport at 3 p. m. Saturday pay their only admission charge—a pint of blood to the Red Cross Blood Bank—it will be a 100 per cent affair.

For every soldier in the 507th parachute regiment headquarters at Alliance, Neb., which will make the jump and demonstration attack, has volunteered as a donor to the Denver Blood Bank.

The first trip of the mobile unit, donated to the Red Cross to enable collection of blood in communities where equipment is not available, will be to the paratroop base at Alliance. The blood will be flown to Fitzsimons General Hospital, for preparation into plasma, by the Colorado Civil Air Patrol. The patrol will accompany the mobile unit in all its trips to outlying communities and deliver the blood without delay.

Saturday, about 3 p. m., a formation of Army transport planes will wing in over Municipal Airport. Small parachutes will come floating down on the Civil Air Patrol field—the weapons and equipment of the paratroopers. These will be followed by the soldiers themselves.

Releasing themselves from their chutes, the soldiers will assemble their weapons, take battle formation and "capture" the administration building. All this, according to Col. G. V. Millett, Jr., commander of the 507th Regiment, will take little longer than it does to tell "tack" is under way.

Blank ammunition will be used in heavy and light machine guns, rifles, tommy guns and pistols, while the "attack" is under way.

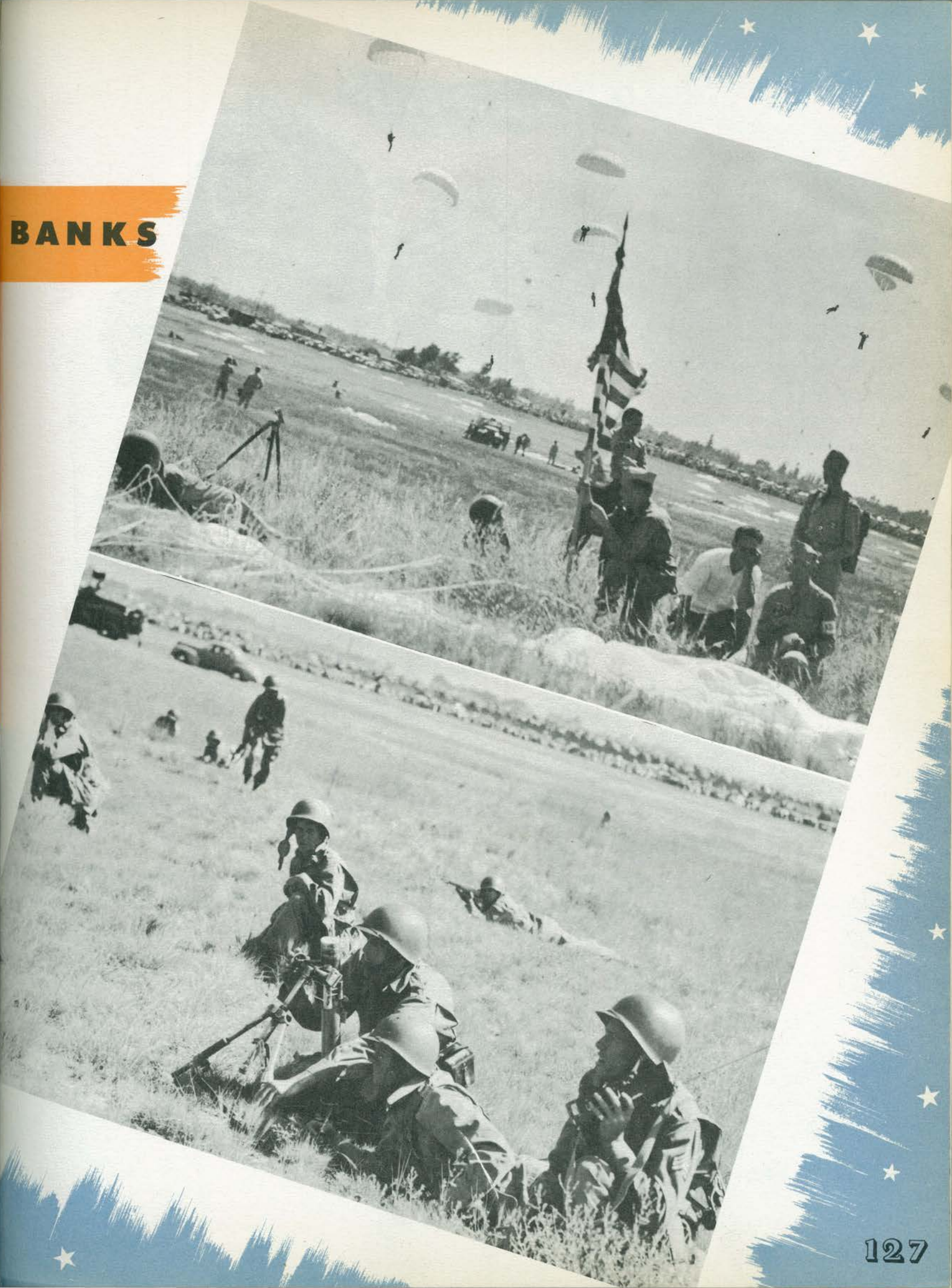

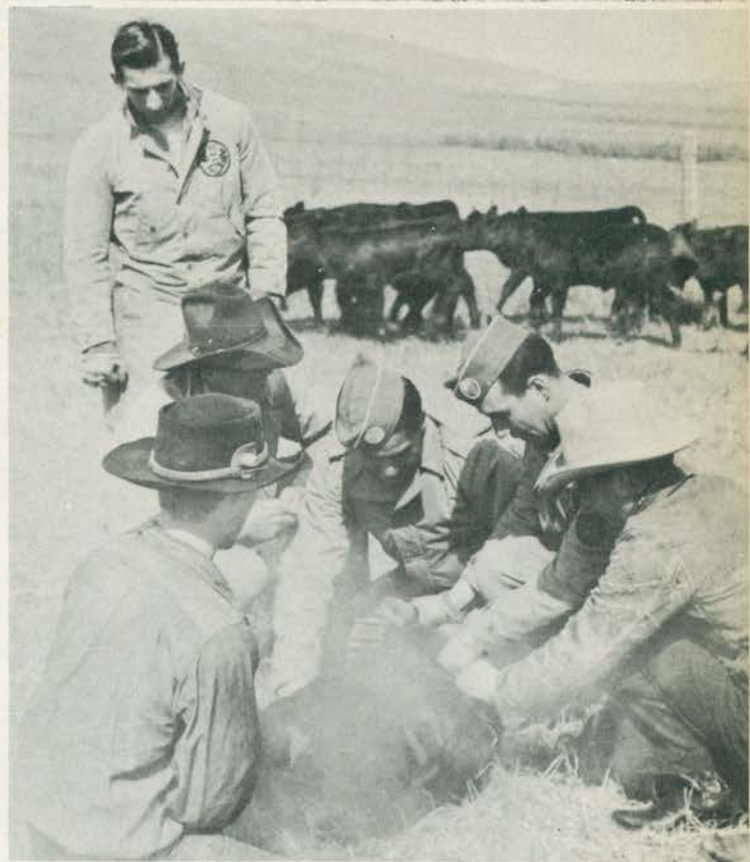

# LOUISIANA MANEUVERS



**March 7, 1943**—The regiment was transported from Fort Benning to Barksdale Field, Louisiana, to participate in the Third Army maneuvers.

**Friday, March 11, 1943**—Col. George V. Millett, Jr., was ordered by Red Task Force to commit the 507th to the maneuver.

**Objectives Outlined**—Destruction of enemy held bridge over the Sabine River. Destruction of enemy emplacements northeast of bridge. Destruction of all enemy forces in vicinity.

**S-2 in Action**—Advance detail of one officer and six intelligence, two communication men, to jump Sunday evening, March 13, and radio back the enemy's disposition of men and weapons.

**Mission Completed**—The information is sent direct to Red Task Force and then to 507th headquarters. Col. Millett prepares to move out.

**Plan of Action**—First and third battalions take off from Barksdale Field, together with staff, at 1720 hour and utilize two jump fields located about 15 miles northeast of bridge. Battalions organized and moved on bridge as a unit.

**Objectives Secured**—After 10-mile march a bridge was taken, together with numbers of personnel at 0600 hour; resistance from motorized division located near the bridge was encountered.

**Reserve Used**—Second Battalion and Regimental Headquarters Company jumped the next morning at dawn, to reinforce the party holding the bridge, and to prevent any counterattack.

**Red Task Force Army** was adjudged the winner of the maneuver, largely because of the part played by the 507th Parachute Infantry.



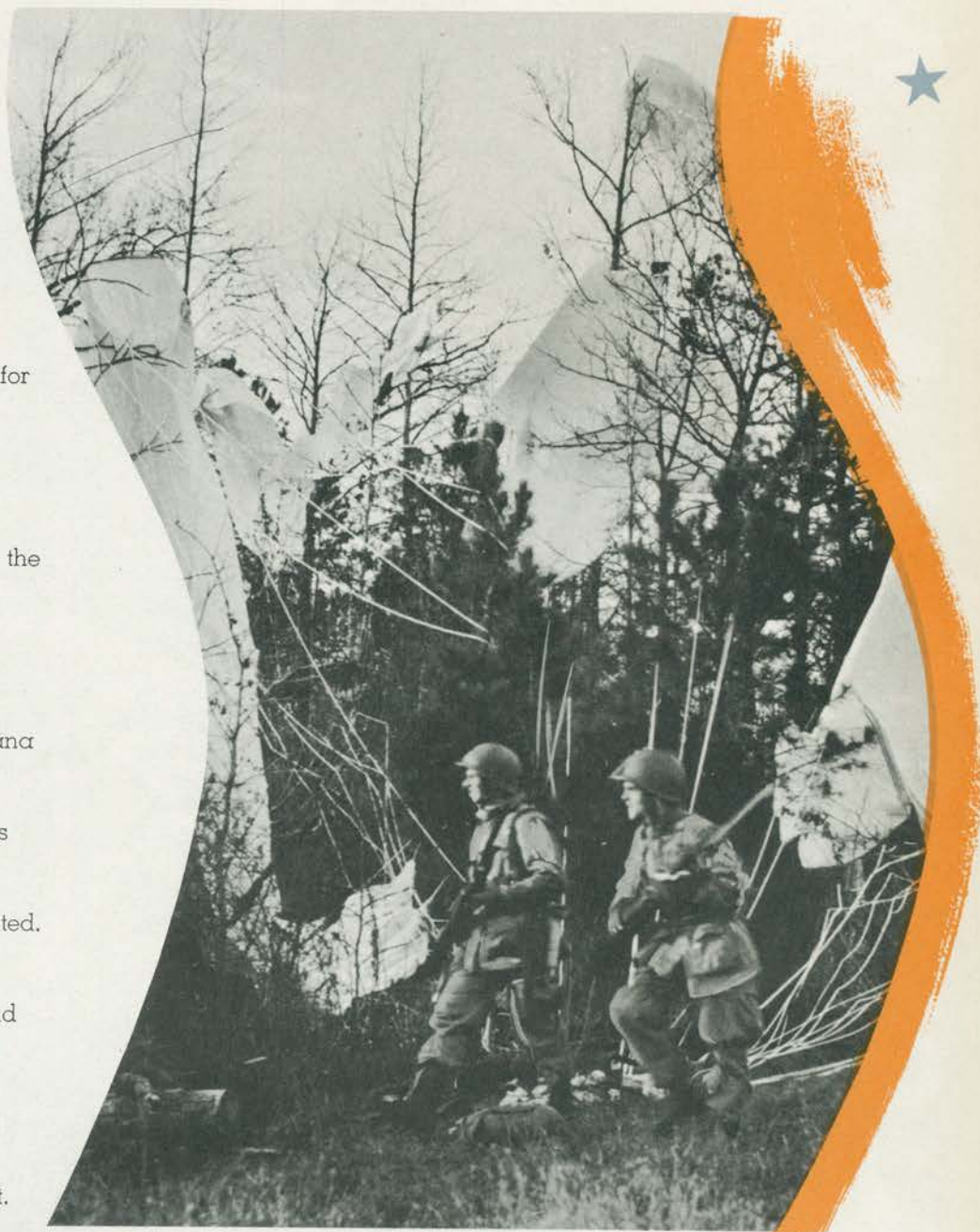

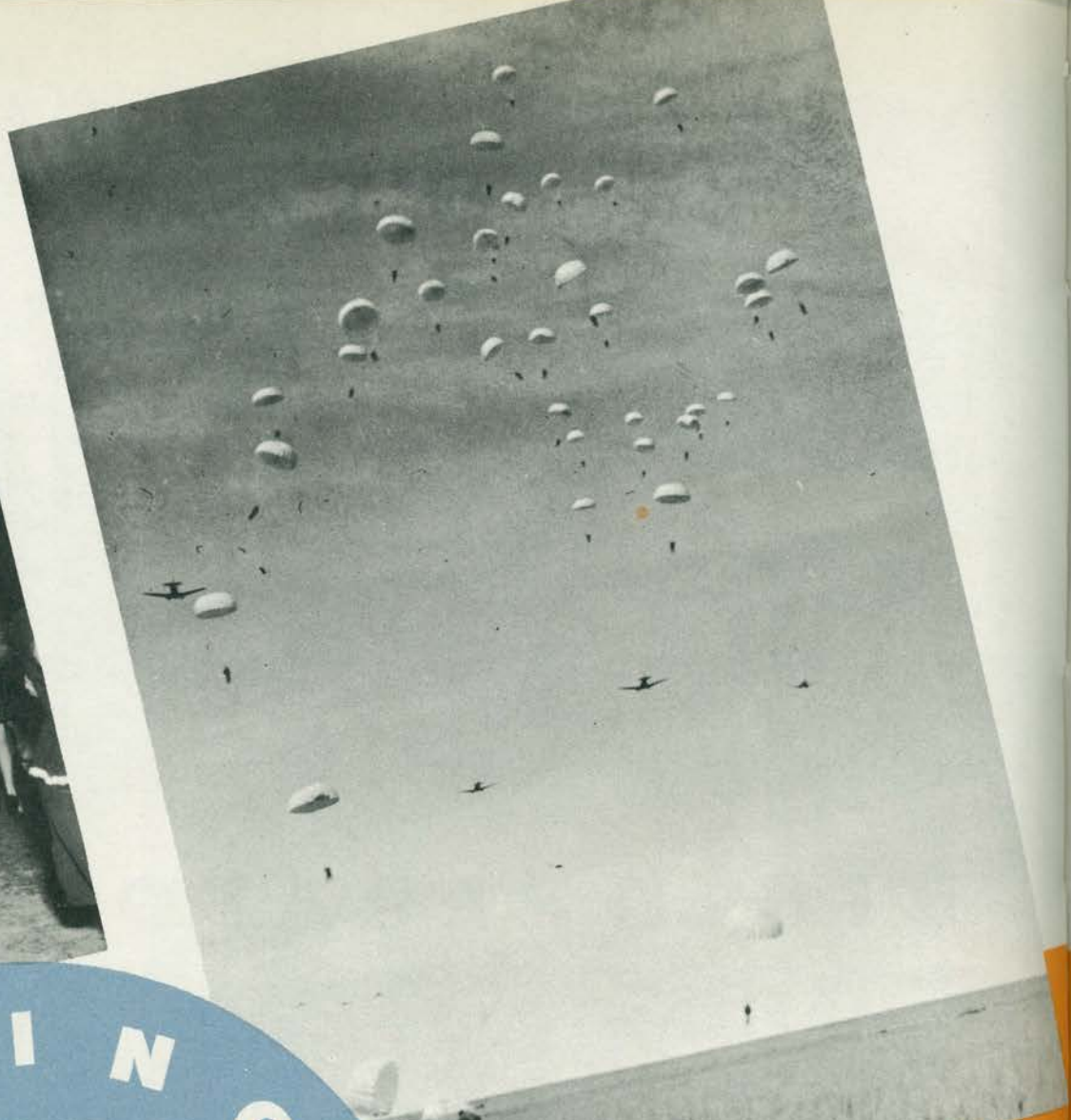

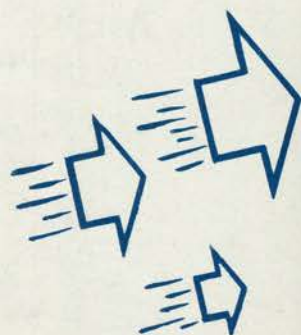

### *Paratroopers to Jump Here Sunday*

• The paratrooper "attack" on Omaha, scheduled for next Sunday, has been postponed to some later date, it was announced Tuesday by Col. Joseph W. Leedom, liaison officer for the Seventh Defense region. The air raid test planned for Sunday also has been canceled. However, the mass jump by Geronimo and 16 paratroopers will be held as planned Sunday in connection with the dog show.

In the tactical jump, it had been planned to use more than one hundred parachutists in an attempt to "seize"

the Omaha municipal airport. But Tuesday morning Capt. James A. Dickerson and Capt. Ben F. Pearson, intelligence officer and operations and training officer, respectively, for the 507th Parachute Infantry regiment at Alliance, decided the airport wouldn't be a suitable location for the problem because of its proximity to the river.

Tactically speaking, they say, it wouldn't be practical to jump onto the airport itself. That would result in the paratroopers' immediate "capture" by the state guards. In actual warfare, the officers explain, the paratroopers would not jump directly onto the airport—and it's warfare for which these paratroopers are practicing.

Other open spaces there are too close to the river. Some of the 'chutists might be blown into it. Many Omahans will remember that a parachute jumper was drowned in the Missouri during the Pulitzer races here some years ago.

## Entertains 507<sup>th</sup>

• The chutists called it a rough jump. The wind was a shade over 20 miles an hour and they leaped through the wide door of the army transport from eight hundred feet as it headed into the south wind. A three hundred pound box of equipment under red, white and blue parachutes was tossed out on the first circuit.

On the second, Geronimo and his master, Pvt. Ken Williams of Chester, Pa., made a dual leap. The other 16 jumped on the third swoop, leaving the plane in rapid succession in full gear and landing at scattered points. Pvt. Williams admitted he was under nervous tension.

"That was my thirteenth jump," he said. "I didn't think I'd make it."

"It was pretty rough," said 1st Sgt. H. H. Jordan of Lexington, N. C. He estimated it was No. 20 for him.

A sprained ankle for Maj. G. K. Vollmer, regimental medical officer, and a few minor cuts and bruises were mementoes of the day for the troopers.

After the jump the men were introduced to the crowd at the Field club dog show by Brick Hawley, member of the kennel club. Officers to speak, besides Maj. Vollmer, were Col. George V. Millett, Jr., commander of the 507th parachute infantry, and Capt. James A. Dickerson, regimental intelligence officer.

During the ceremonies a blanket in regimental colors was presented to Geronimo by the American Women's Voluntary Services, while the Nebraska Kennel club gave him a collar bearing paratrooper's wings, and a certification that he had been made a sergeant in the K-9 corps.

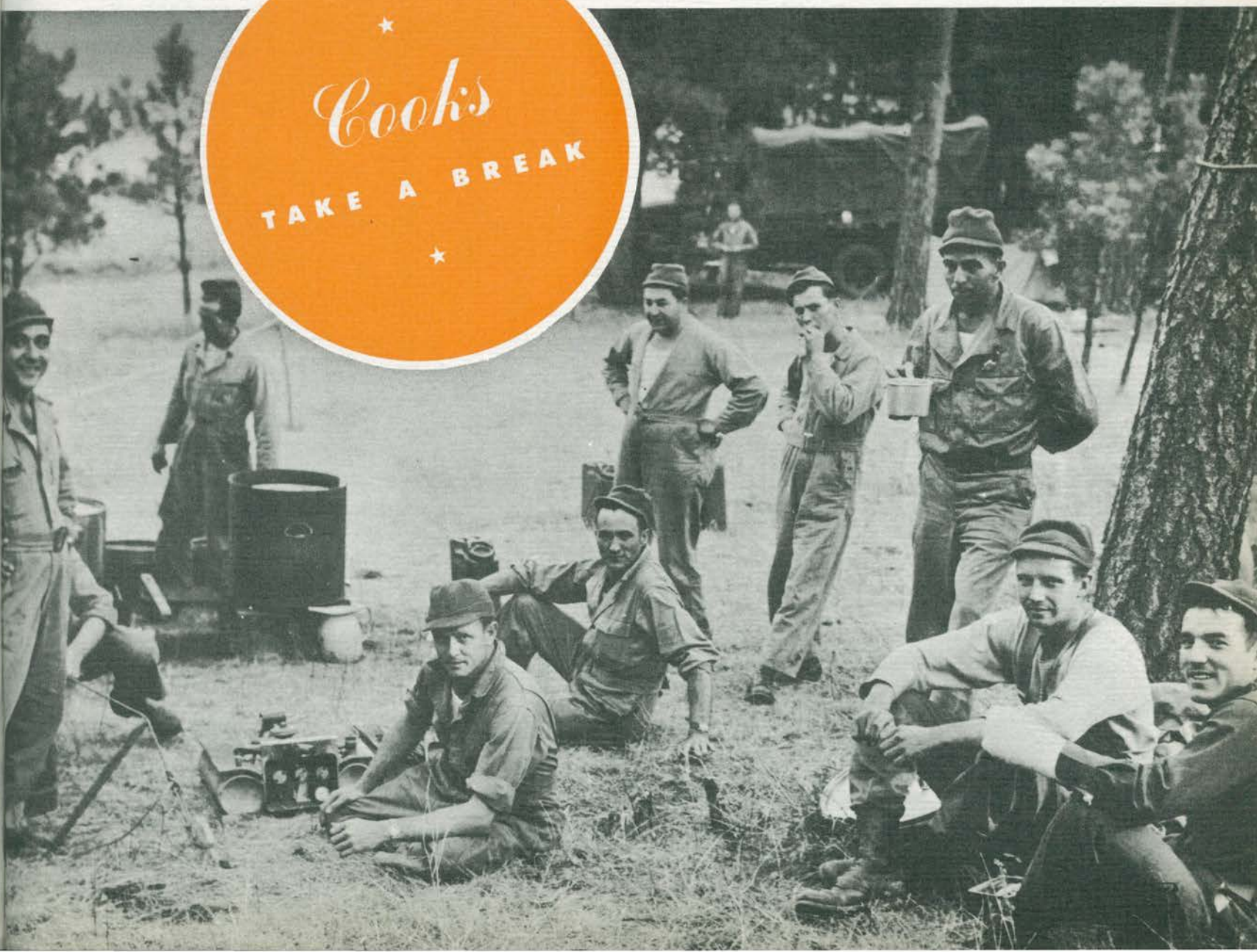

*September 24, 1943* two composite groups from the 3rd Bat-

talion, 507th Parachute Infantry and Company A of the 326th Glider Infantry, representing the Black Task Force, captured the Sedalia Air Field in Missouri.

- The take-off was made from bases in South Dakota, due to the fact that the regiment was bivouacked in the Black Hills. The group took to the air at 0400 on the morning of the 24th to enable them to arrive over their destination at 0630. The Black Task Force was preceded by a squadron from the 437th Troop Carrier which dumped dummies west of the field at 0620 to act as decoys and induce the defending force to reveal their positions. The ruse was accomplished and when the 3rd Battalion jumped at 0630 the "enemy" was temporarily caught off balance. • The capture was effected at 1000 and the Air Base was being operated by Black Task Force at 1130. • The unit was commanded by Maj. William A. Kuhn, commanding officer of the 3rd Battalion.

# Highlights...

## OF THE 507<sup>th</sup>\*

Activated July 20, 1942, at Fort Benning, Georgia, in the famous "Frying Pan" . . . Moved from the "Frying Pan" area in Georgia, across the Chattahoochee River into Alabama, and trained there until March, 1943 . . . Saturday, February 27, Orange and Black, 507th basketball team, closes season with 24 out of 26 wins; defeated the best colleges in the Southeast and the best pro team in the East . . . Moved March, 1943, to Barksdale Field, Shreveport, Louisiana . . . While at Barksdale participated for twelve days in the Third Army maneuvers . . . Successfully jumped behind the Blue lines and decisively defeated the Third Army . . . On March 20, 1943, traveled again, this time to the Army Air Base, Alliance, Nebraska . . . On Sunday, April 4, 1943, the 507th performed a tactical jump and paraded before 20,000 spectators at Alliance . . . Wednesday, April 14th, the First Airborne Infantry Brigade was activated, with the 507th Parachute Infantry Regiment forming the nucleus . . . Sunday, May 23, 507th paratroopers and "Geronimo," the mascot, thrilled 25,000 spectators as they jumped in a 23-mile-an-hour wind at Omaha . . . It was here that "Geronimo" received his sergeant's stripes and silver wings . . . Saturday, July 3, 1943, paratroopers of the 507th thrill and delight 150,000 spectators with an intricate but highly successful jump and attack on the Municipal Airport at Denver, Colorado . . . Saturday, July 10th, after a successful season, the boxing team hangs up trophy of featherweight title won by Red Grant in Denver, Colorado, at the 7th Service Command All Service Boxing Tournament . . . Tuesday, July 20, 1943, the 507th Parachute Infantry Regiment is one year old! . . . The future? . . . The 507th is decidedly instrumental in wiping the Axis powers from the face of the earth!

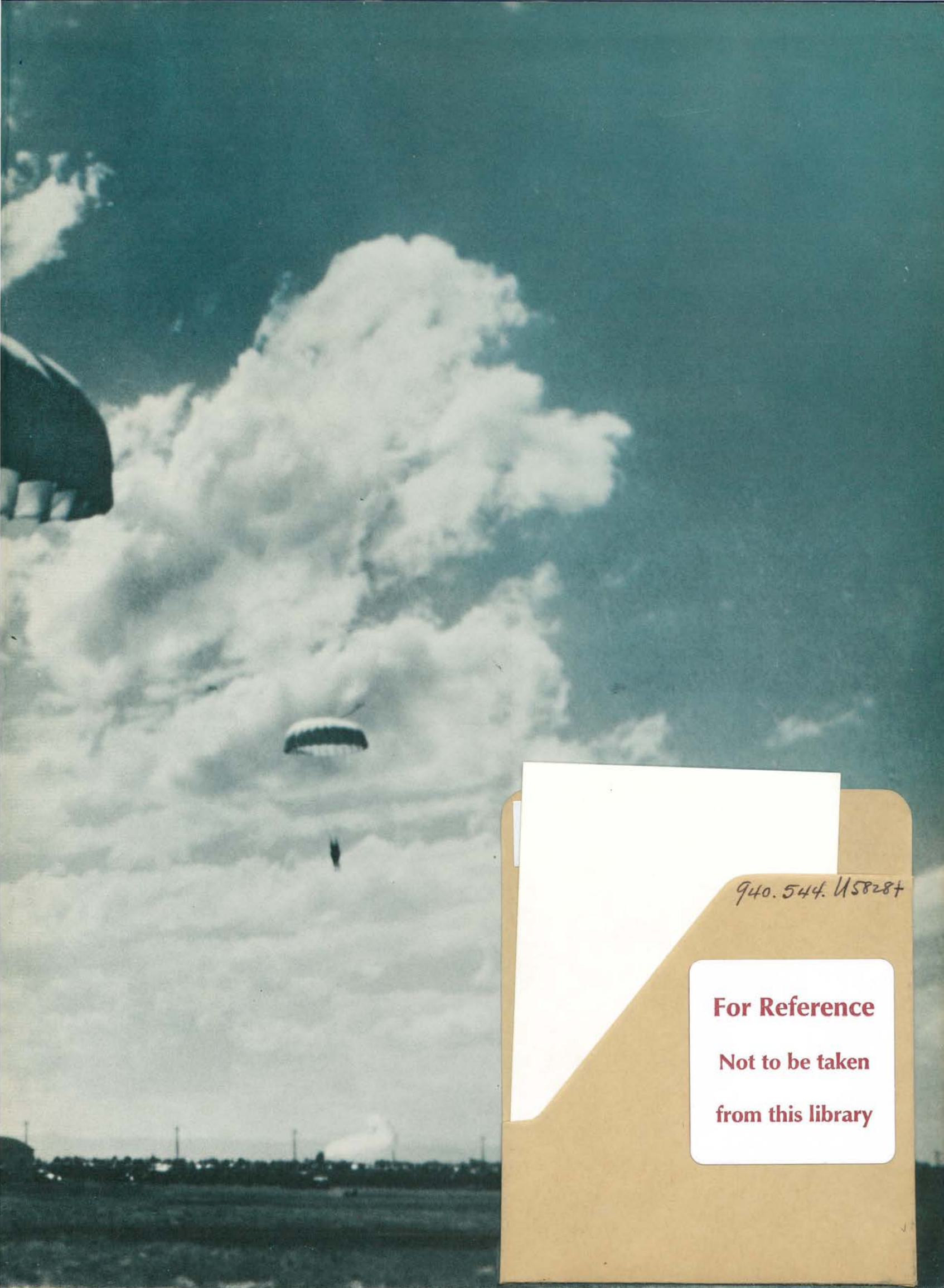
