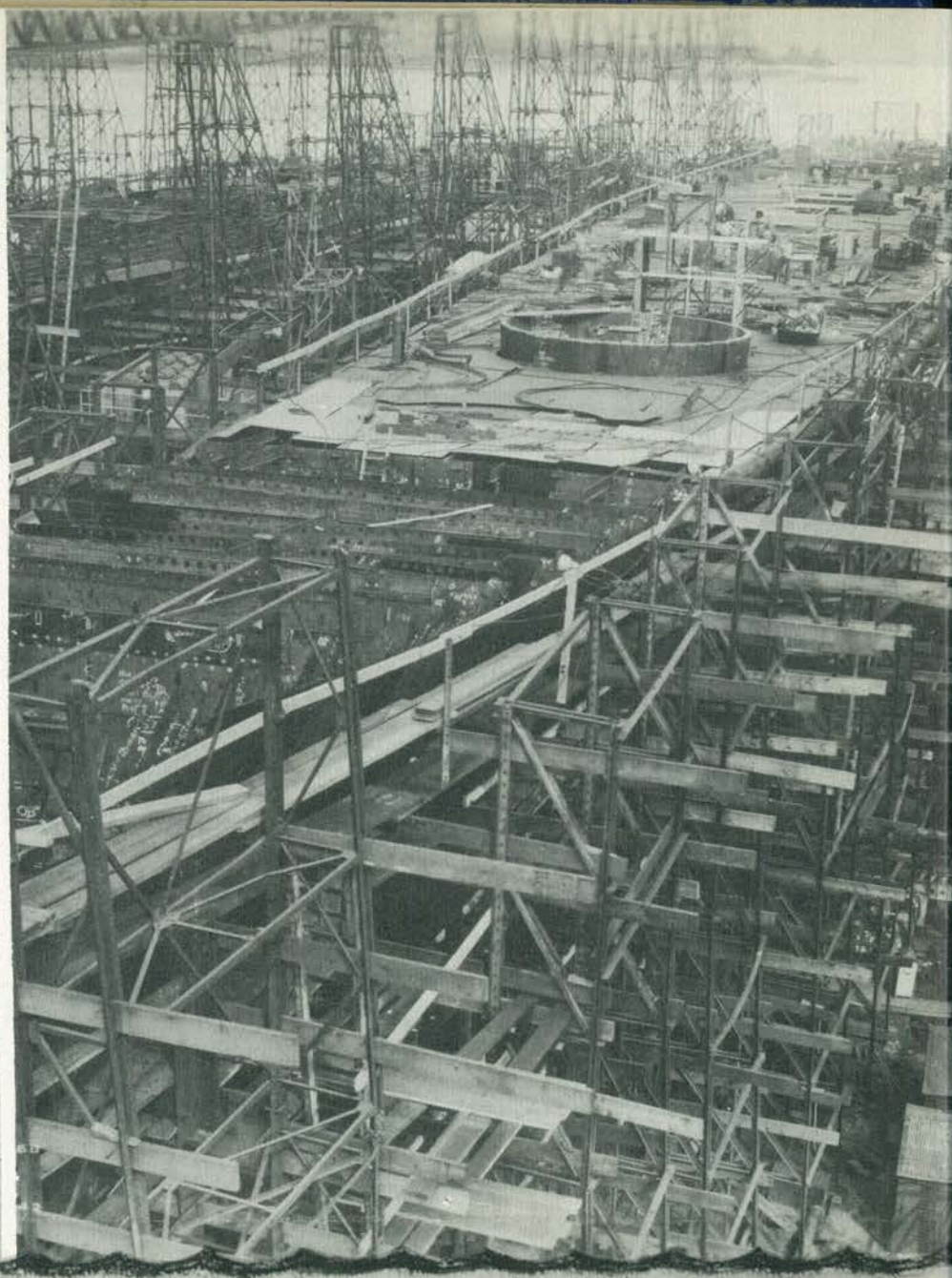
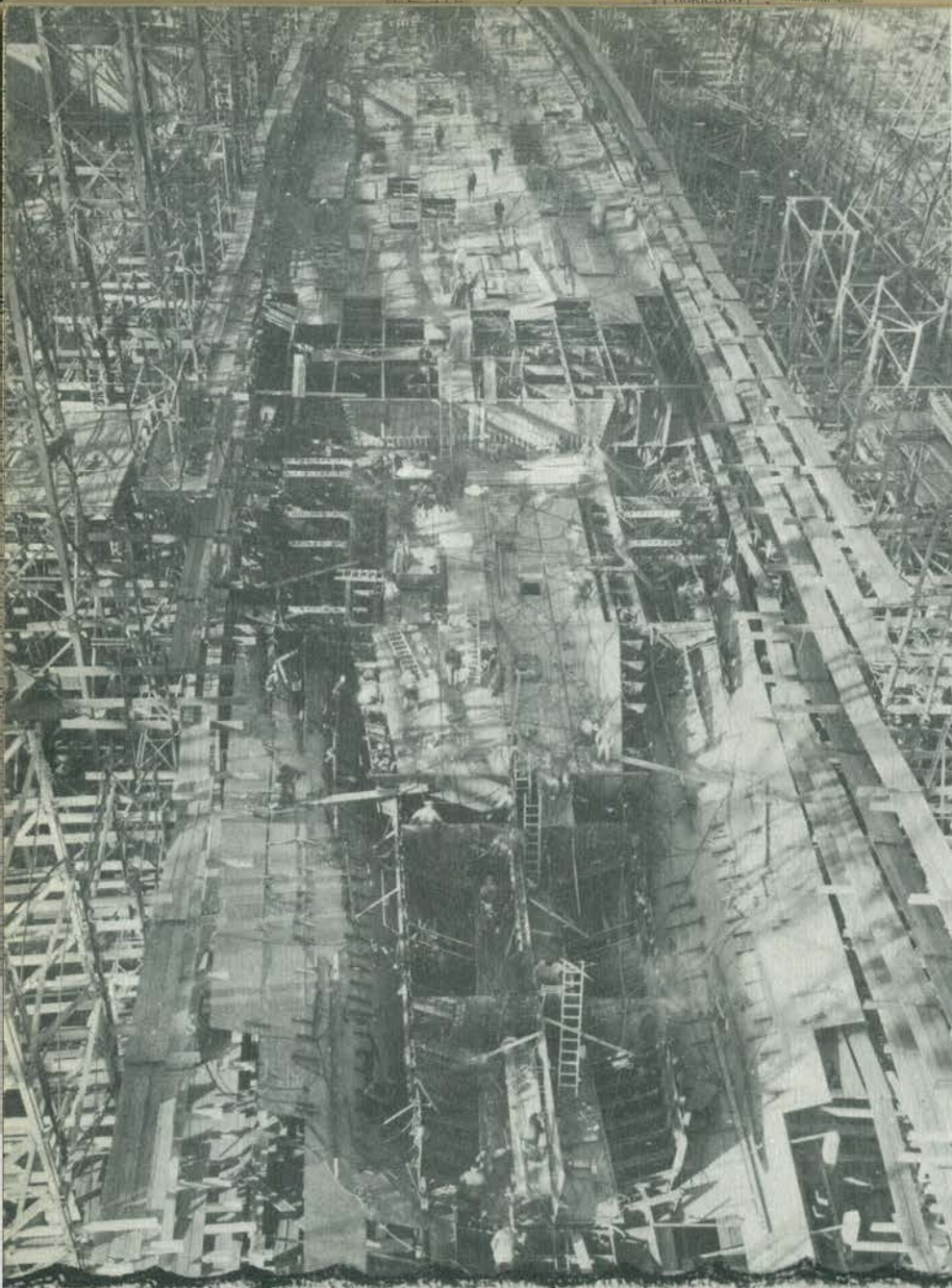






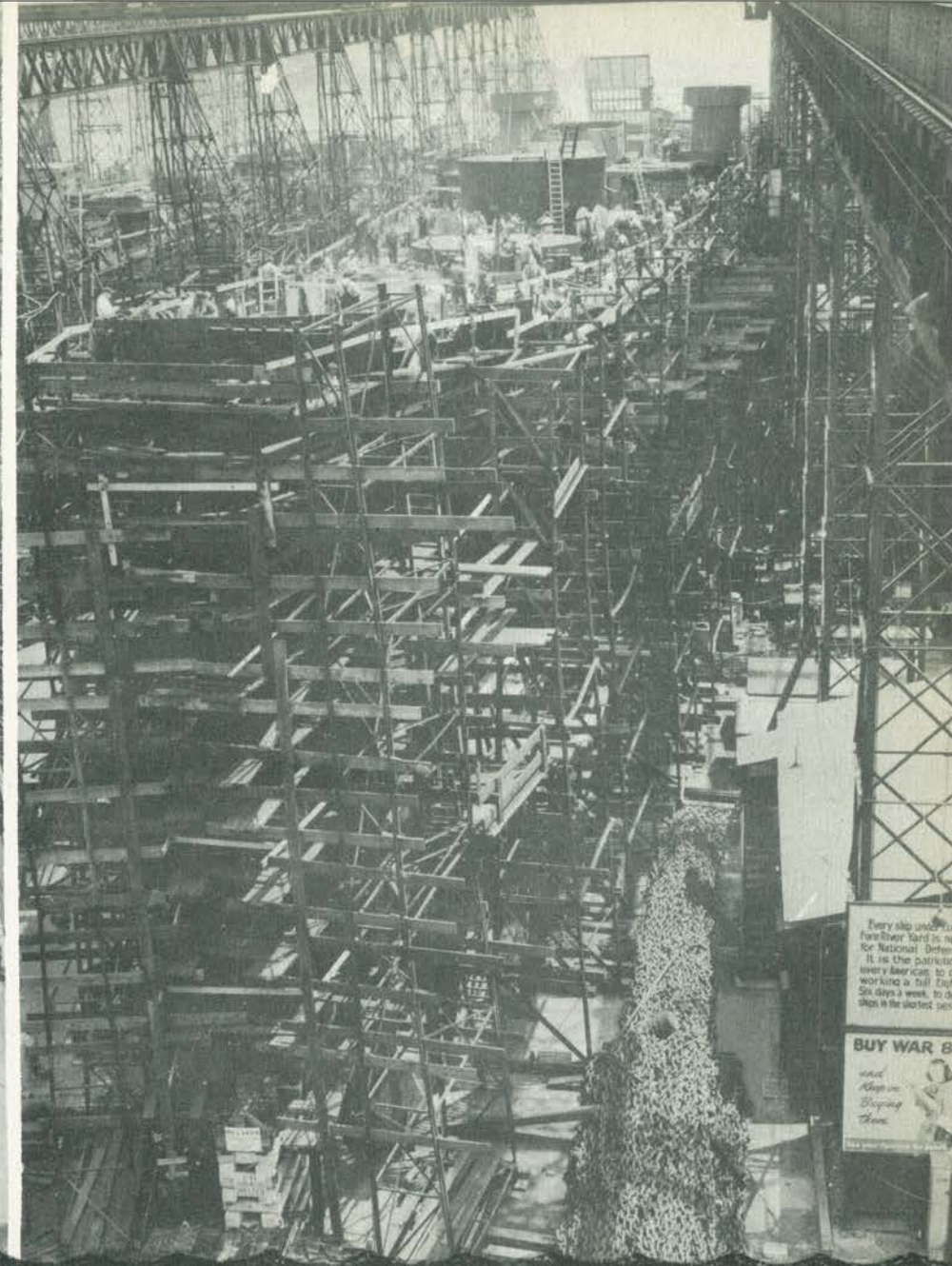
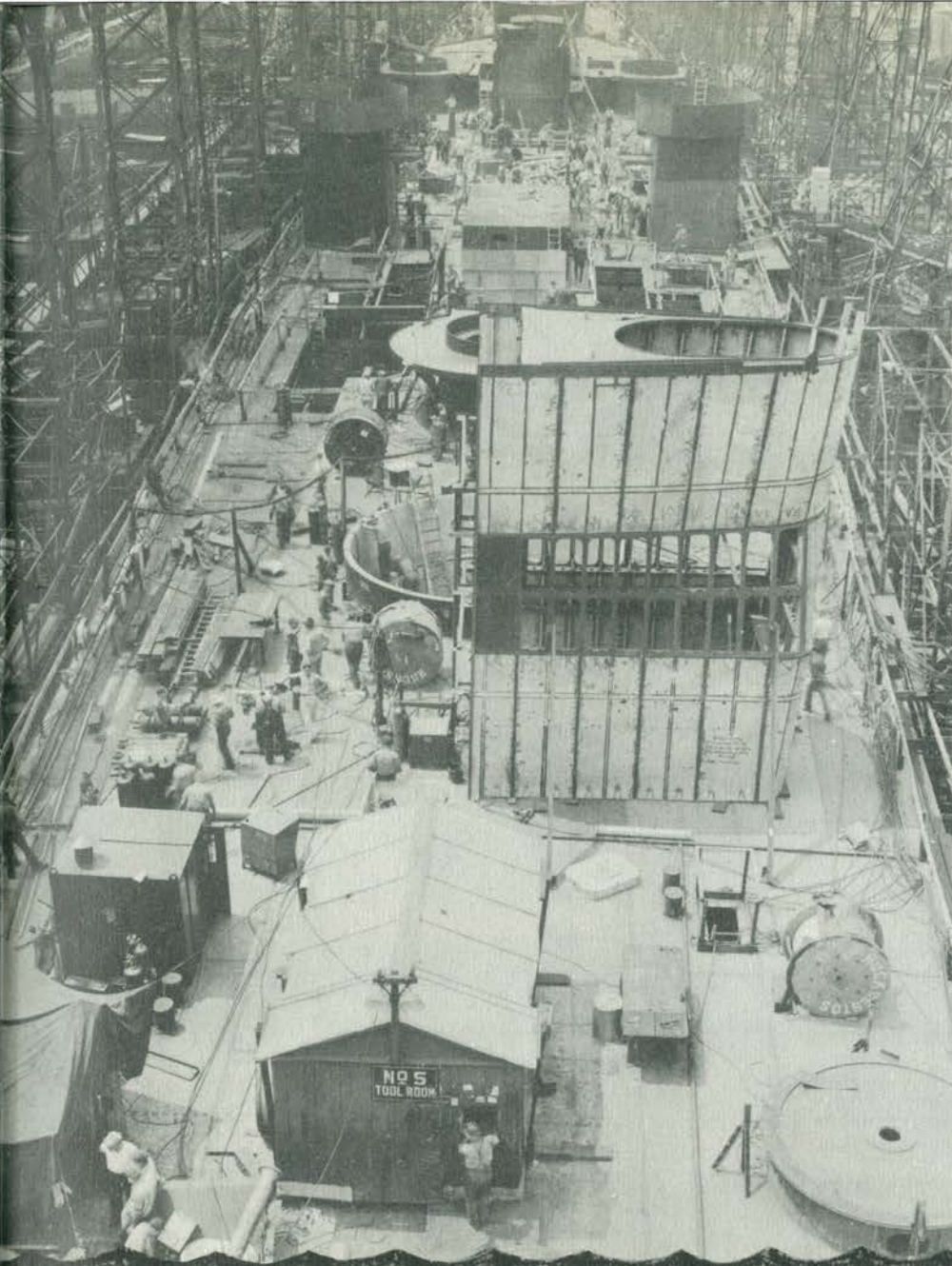
July 3, 1941 — Building ship — August 2, 1941





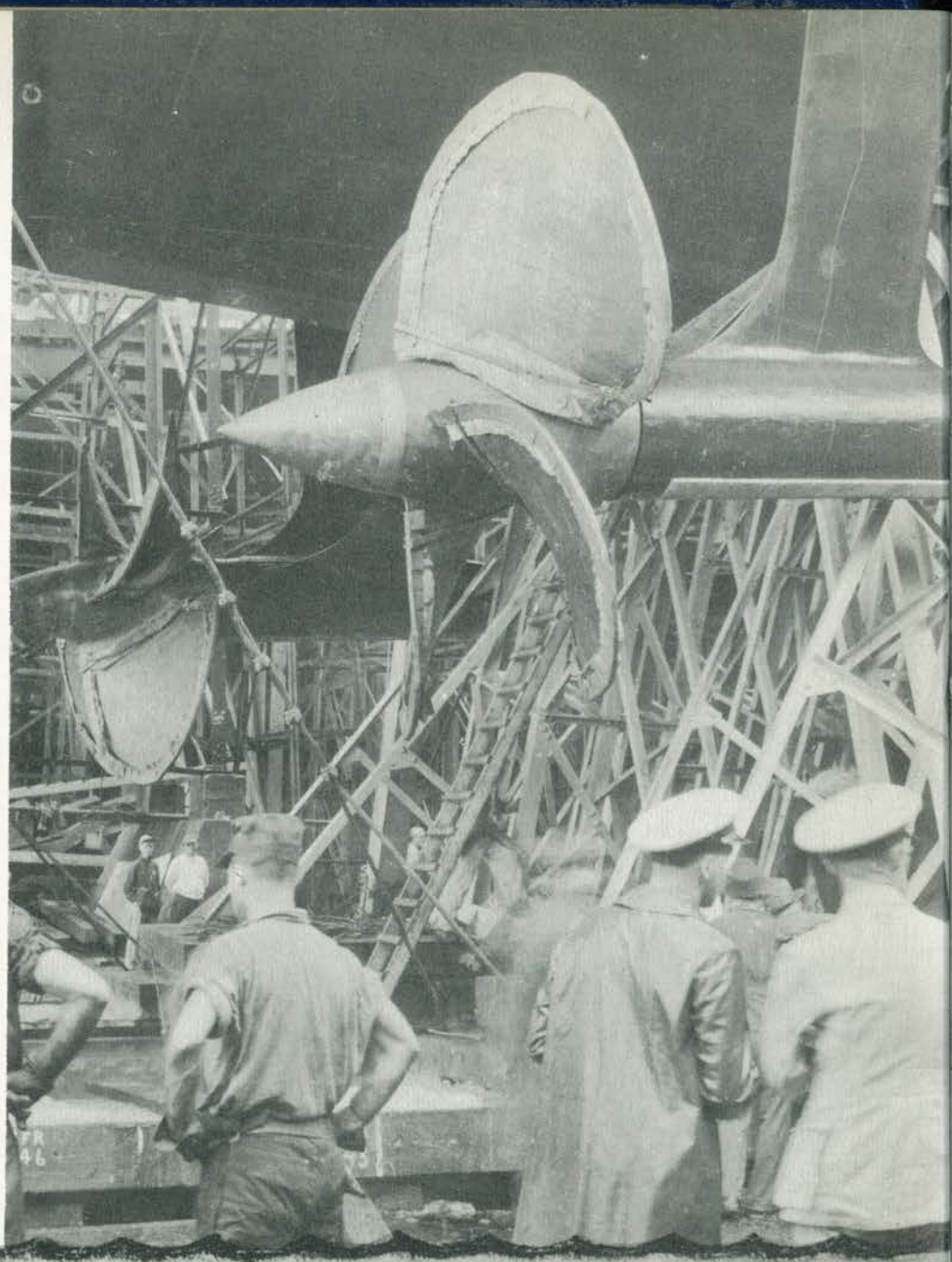
January 3, 1942 — Building ship — May 1, 1942

# Ship Organization

## THE ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

The Engineering Department, consisting of eight officers and 201 enlisted men, is divided into four divisions, "A", "B", "E", and "M". These divisions are charged with the running and upkeep of the main engines, boilers, auxiliary machinery, distribution of fuel and furnishing the ship with lights, electric power and fresh water.

"A" Division, the auxiliary gang, is comprised mainly of those machinists who understand machine shop work, the running of lathes, milling machines, shapers, etc., and the upkeep of the small boat engines, steering machinery, diesel engines for auxiliary light and power, crane and elevator machinery, air conditioning and ice machine units.

"B" Division, the division formerly known as "The Black Gang" in the old coal burning days, are the men who fire the huge oil burning superheated boilers and maintain and operate the various fireroom auxiliaries, such as feed pumps, forced-draft blowers, fuel-oil heaters, and see that steam pressure is constant at all times. A modern Navy fireman is a far cry from the old days when all a man needed to be a fireman was "A strong back and a weak mind."

"M" Division is composed of the men who operate and keep our main turbine driven engines in operating condition. These engines are capable of developing 30,000 shaft horsepower per unit and force the ship through the water at a speed exceeding 32 knots. Machinists mates repair and maintain the various pumps and the condensers which turn the steam, used to drive the turbines, back into water so that it may be used again, for water is a precious item aboard a man-of-war. The evaporating plant, which distills fresh potable water from sea water, for use in the boilers and for the use of personnel on board for drinking, laundry, showers and cooking purposes, is also operated by the "M" Division.

Last but not least the "E" Division is made of electricians who maintain and operate the four main turbo-generators which furnish us with electrical power, which would be adequate to meet the needs of a city of 10,000 population. But this is a small part of their work, for there is an automatic dial telephone exchange, search-lights powerful enough to illuminate an object

many miles away, hundreds of electrical motors for driving pumps, vent fans and all types of power machinery to provide fire power for our guns.

Although most people, unfamiliar with the Navy, picture the engineers as men who work in hot, dirty spaces and clad in oily dungarees, this is certainly not the case. Engine rooms and firerooms in this modern Navy are as clean as any particular housewife's kitchen and are far better ventilated. Although the men do stand their watches and perform their duties in dungarees they are clean and neat as pins and when ready for liberty, leave or inspection, are generally the outstanding men in appearance.

Most of the men in the Engineering Department are picked men with former experience in their trade in civilian life or who before reporting aboard ship, have completed a course in instruction in one of the various trade schools maintained and operated by the Navy to train new men. Advancement is usually rapid and no better place could be found to learn a trade and work with the most modern equipment in the world than in the Engineering Department.

## THE NAVIGATION DEPARTMENT

The Navigation Department is a small outfit consisting of two officers and 30 men. Of course, its main function is to navigate the ship safely on all its voyage. Its other functions are: Supervision of education on board ship, care of the ship's library, public relations, upkeep of charts, and supervision of the watch on deck. In order to accomplish the above functions the department is made up of quartermasters, aerographers, photographers, yeomen and seamen.

The department is responsible for the upkeep of the Pilot House, from where the ship is "conned", the navigation bridge, the chart house (where the navigator lays out his track and figures out his position), the aerology laboratory, the photography laboratory, and the steering gear compartment. Because the department was fortunate enough to obtain excellent reserve enlisted men of good character and education, (90% of its men are reserve), it operates smoothly and efficiently.



## SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

The Supply Department aboard this vessel is responsible for the procurement, receipt, custody, care and issue of all stores and materials required by the ship of the line to carry out her duties as one of "Uncle Sam's" frontline defenders. Regardless of where you wander on your visit, you will find this job being carried out in a manner that bespeaks coordination and efficiency. Lay aft on the fantail and observe the storekeepers with their working parties busily engaged checking and rechecking stores as they are struck below, each in its proper place for ready issue when the need arises, or go below to the second deck and find barbers dealing out the "Regulation" haircuts, the tailor plying his trusty needle; cooks, bakers, butchers preparing a meal that will be served hours later, laundrymen cleaning, washing, pressing dungarees and liberty whites or blues, the ship's store storekeeper hawking his attractive wares, the ice cream and coke dispenser. Now to officer's country up forward where the steward's mates under the watchful eye of the stewards are preparing the officers' meals or readying officers' staterooms; that is also the workings of the Supply Department. Don't fail to observe the paper work that transpires in the little Supply Office. The endless task of keeping the "books that tell "ALL" what the requirements are, what expenditures have been made, who has what, and principally how much money is needed for payday.

This, then, briefly is the Supply Department of the Baltimore, four officers and 129 men, who do their thousand and one jobs with a courtesy and a manner of "Know How" that has earned more than one "Well Done" from Captain and crew members alike.

## GUNNERY DEPARTMENT

The Gunnery Department consisted, during the war, of about 950 men and 50 officers. This complement was necessary to fully man all the batteries of the ship. There are twelve divisions in this department, each having its own function. Divisions 1, 2, and 3, each, man one of the 8" turrets. Divisions 4 and 5 each man the 5" dual-purpose mounts. The 6th and 7th Divisions each have stations on the 40mm machine guns, while the 8th Division man the 20mm machine guns. The 9th Division is the Marine Detachment on the ship. The 10th Division has the care and operation of all radar equipment. The "F" Division men operate the equipment for controlling the fire of the guns. The "V" Division is the aviation unit.

The men assigned to each unit of ordnance equipment comprise a highly organized and trained crew. Many of the men have a high degree of technical skill. Modern warfare at sea is no longer a problem of individuals but of the group as a whole. Teamwork is the watchword of gunners, and many hours have been spent in drills to produce a smooth running, efficient organization.

We have never been fortunate enough to engage an enemy surface vessel, although several times we have been at battle stations expecting action. There were never more disappointed men than the main battery crews when no action materialized.

However, the main battery was able to shoot seven shore bombardments against the enemy. The anti-aircraft units have had their share of action in every operation from the Gilbert Islands to Okinawa. They have twelve enemy planes to their credit as definite kills, and many more were driven off. The fact that we have never been hit speaks for itself.

Our Naval aviators have made numerous rescue missions at sea. We were distinguished when one of our aviators landed in Truk lagoon to fish out a downed fighter pilot. He was the first man of the war to land voluntarily at that Jap base.

## COMMUNICATIONS DEPARTMENT

The Communications Department consists of all radio, signal and clerical personnel and is under the direct supervision of the Communications Officer.

The department is charged with the responsibility of providing an adequate means of communications at all times, and the dissemination of information to those who need to know. All ship communications, including official letters, radio and visual dispatches, and personal correspondence are handled by this department.

For purposes of efficient administration the department is organized in three divisions. These include: the CR Division, consisting of all radio personnel; the CS Division, or signalmen; and the CY Division, composed of yeomen, printers, and mailmen.

## HULL DEPARTMENT

The Hull Department is headed by the First Lieutenant. Under his cognizance comes the maintenance of the ship, policing of the ship, and supervision of damage and damage control. It is perhaps an unexciting parallel to draw, but the First Lieutenant is somewhat akin to the head janitor of a large hotel. His welders, carpenters, plumbers, etc., are forever busy at the little endless jobs which plague the head janitor. There is no rest for the First Lieutenant; something always comes up. His department is not composed of flashy colorful gunners, grimy engineers, tanned signalmen or aloof radar men. Instead his myrmidons must go along with the menial, trying task so essential to keep an organization at its material peak.

When the ship comes into port, its sides sparkling with fresh paint, its bright work a gleam, you can rest assured that the First Lieutenant has spent a harrowing week plagueing the



other departments and his own, and his pride is pardonable as he gives the orders to drop the anchor or throw over the lines which will moor us to a dock.

There are times when the First Lieutenant and his men are no longer janitors and policemen. The ship may be at general quarters, all hands tense for attack. The Hull Department is scattered throughout the ship waiting for possible damage. If a fire breaks out, a seam springs a leak, a bomb is placed too well, or a collision materializes in the confusion of sudden maneuvering on a dark night, it is the Hull Department that will rush to the scene of the casualty and will endeavor to effect the necessary repairs. It is not pleasant, the job of waiting, hoping your gunners, up there having all the fun, will not miss. It is not pleasant to be the ones who work after something tragic has happened.

But the Hull Department, you will see, are the men who rigged those display lines, printed the guide signs, and turned a warship into a lean, presentable model of good housekeeping.

### MEDICAL DEPARTMENT

The Medical Department of a large cruiser is quite an extensive organization and is equipped to take care of anything to major surgery of war wounds of the most severe type. The main Sick Bay is located in the forward part of the ship on the third deck, and consists of a major operating room, equivalent in equipment to that found in any shore-side hospital; a main ward; an isolation ward, dressing room, dental office, a laboratory and pharmacy. All of the sick bay spaces are air conditioned, a most valuable aid in the treatment of diseases in tropical climates.

In addition to the main installation there are three additional main battle first aid stations located in various parts of the ship, each of which is equipped to operate independently in the event of damage to the main station. Supplementing these primary installations are eight first aid stations manned by hospital corpsmen, so that first aid is immediately available and within quick reach of all personnel, no matter what their battle station.

The equipment and supplies available in battle areas include two X-ray machines, adequate supplies of blood plasma, and whole blood which was collected from donors on the west coast and transported by air to the battle areas.

The personnel for this department total four officers and twenty-two enlisted men, all in the Hospital Corps of the Navy. The officers consist of two commissioned medical officers, who are graduate physicians, and two dental officers, graduate doctors of dentistry. The hospital corpsmen are trained in all phases of medical care and include among their number Pharmacy Technicians, X-ray Technicians, Dental Technicians, and Surgical Technicians. All of these have had training in a Hospital Corps School at a major Naval hospital before being sent to duty at sea.

In war time a cruiser of this type carries medical supplies in a variety and quantity estimated to meet at least 18 months'

needs in any part of the world to which the ship might be sent on short notice. These supplies are so distributed so that damage to one part of the ship will not leave the crew without medical supplies and personnel.

### SHIP'S RECREATION

During war time recreation is vital to good morale. After long periods of combat, it is necessary to provide ways and means for men to relax, and have opportunity for self expression in some activity.

The ship's band, although non-rated, has been one of the best morale builders. The band's complement has worked hard and long to provide the ship with good music. A band concert is usually held every evening preceding movies, while the ship is at rest in port. Now that the war is over the band plays at sea as well as in port. Along with the ship's band, a string quartet has been organized to provide music for those who like the old fashioned reels and ho-downs.

In the way of sports the ship has an organized boxing, basketball and softball team. These various sports have been popular with the ship, and many men have participated in the sports. The BALTIMORE'S competitive record speaks for itself.

The ship's paper, "The Oriole" has been another form of activity that has meant much to the crew. Approximately 40 men, composing the paper's staff, have worked diligently to provide the ship with a paper of the highest type. Enlisted personnel have run the paper completely. These men have taken over the responsibility of compiling, editing, printing, and distributing the paper to all hands. The BALTIMORE is proud of her paper.

During long periods at sea, when it was impossible to have movies or band music, the RBO system was used to hold evening broadcasts. Programs consisting of variety shows, quiz programs, and musical hours, were conducted by ship's company.

To help break the monotony of general routine, contests have been held between divisions. The contests have consisted of checkers and acey-ducy.

The ship boasts a fine library. At present there are over 1,600 new books available for the crew.

At various times, when the ship has been in port, dances have been held for all hands.

Magazines, record players, movies, and many other forms of entertainment are available at all times for the benefit of the crew.

In conclusion it is well to remember that a heavy cruiser resembles a small city. This ship has everything a city can boast of on a small scale. We have a laundry, clothing store, general store, soda fountain, barber shop, newspaper, hospital, movie house, and church. While at sea life runs smoothly. Although at times we are far from home we have managed to take along a little of home with us.







# the Baltimore Story

Now At Wars' End The Story Of The Heavy Cruiser U.S.S. Baltimore  
Can Be Told!

LIKE other battle seasoned and scarred heavy cruisers, the USS Baltimore has lived a full war life, sampled its first battle with a bombardment of Makin island, stormed through the Gilbert, Marshall, and Marianas campaigns, leveled the synchronized fury of its nine protruding eight-inch rifles on Satawan island in the Caroline group; but unlike many less fortunate cruisers, the Baltimore had run the gamut unscathed.

SOME of her actions and deeds—like carrying the late President Roosevelt to his historic triumvirate at Pearl Harbor with five-star Admiral Nimitz and General MacArthur—were tagged as "top secret", thus remained untold 'til war's end. But probably the main reason for her silent satirically and smothered blackout was that in doing a thorough workmanlike job for over two years, the Baltimore's skippers (Captains Calhoun and Fink), officers, and crew had clearly defied, coldly thwarted, and precisely out maneuvered every Nip attempt to register a single hit on its six hundred and seventy feet of armored deck and superstructure. NOT ONCE DID SHE WEAR A HURT, MARYED LOOK, OR LIMP INTO THE NEWS AS A BATTLE CASUALTY—NOT A MAN DID SHE LOSE THROUGH ENEMY ACTION. BUT THE BALTIMORE WAS ALWAYS THERE, AS HER CREW SO LOUDLY AND PROUDLY ECHOES: "They don't wear service stars for nothin'!"

THE names of the now historic sea battles and engagements—Luzon and Mindoro in the Philippines, Iwo Jima, Guam, Rota, Tinian, Saipan, Truk, Okinawa, Formosa, strikes at the China Coast and Japan proper, are like vast orchestrations of pages from the Baltimore's war diary, or just the passing life of this great ship and its fighting crew.

BUT what most of her 1,500 man-crew likes, and are proud of: The Baltimore is big enough to feel self-respecting about her part in the war, yet always has remained small enough to be intimate. Full dress inspections have never been conspicuous in her routine, for the Big "B" was born of this war, and grew of age under battle conditions.

HER war record is a curiously, interesting document. The

Baltimore came into being as a part of the nation's answer for a two ocean Navy. That fateful December day in '41, when the Japs struck at Pearl Harbor, found her little more than a fast growing shell on the ways at the Bethlehem Steel yards at Quincy, Mass., and it was not until a very chilly spring day in April of '43 that she received her war time commission in the South Boston Navy yard and Captain Walter C. Calhoun was handed its command; Commander Frank Monroe was named its executive officer. Aboard her now, shining, stainless hull came a crew of officers and men, most of whom had never been to sea—some that had never seen the ocean. To them the shake down cruise in the West Indies was the business of learning to be sailors the hard way. In those sub infested waters, the officers and men of the Baltimore learned the hot, exhausting, and monotonous meaning of morning and evening general quarters, day anti-aircraft practices, night spotting practices, launching and recovering aircraft, fueling at sea and everything that goes to make a crew seasoned, though, hardened, and inured to the discomforts of war, and the ship, a fighting unit of the fleet.

AFTER the usual short shake-down and training period allowed a new ship in time of war, the Baltimore started its screws churning down the Eastern Atlantic seaboard, swooshed through the Panama Canal, swung crisply around to the West Coast and the Pacific war. It was there that she was finally readied to taste battle and her course charted for her first major engagement. Operating directly under Rear Admiral Richmond Kelly Turner, the Baltimore took part in the bombardment on November 20, 1943, that rocked little Makin island from bow to stern, paving the way for the famed 27th infantry division to dash ashore and seize that important island.

AFTER this first show of strength, the Baltimore was teamed up with carrier Task Group 50.1, and on December 4, 1943, helped shepherd our carriers into striking distance of the Marshall islands, where their planes rained death and destruction on Jap airfields and shore installations on Kwajalein. Two months later, she was back again with carrier Task Force 58.4, as car-



rier planes pounded Wotje, Maloelap, and Eniwetok, and the Baltimore added its fire power to cover the first landings on Kwajalein.

OPERATING DAY AND NIGHT on a devil-take hindmost policy, the Baltimore with its heavy siege guns cocked for action, supported a carrier strike at TRUK on February 16, and 17, 1944. For this action Captain Calhoun was awarded the commendation ribbon "for gallantry and high professional excellence during the operation." The ship's scout pilot, Lt. Baxter, was awarded the distinguished flying cross, and his crewman R. F. Hickman, ACRM, the Air Medal, for their heroic rescue of a downed fighter pilot (Lt. G. M. Blair off the ESSEX) from under the Jap guns of nearby Dublen Island in the Truk Atoll.

RANGING further west and into the inner circle of the Japanese defenses, The Big "B" steamed alongside as planes from carrier Task Groups 58.2 and 58.3 sent their first bombs spiraling down on Saipan, Tinian, Palau, and Yap. During the Palau engagement a surface battle appeared to be in the making, but heavy units of the Nip fleet fled to the West instead of risking a battle with the onrushing might of the Task Force. As General MacArthur's leap-frog tactics branched out along the New Guinea Coast, the Baltimore stood by as part of the strong supporting carrier Task Group 58.2, as United States and Australian troops hopped ashore at Hollandia. From there she steamed north and westward again covering the strikes on Saipan and Guam, until the long hoarded remnants of the desperate Jap fleet finally struck back in its bitter, frustrating fight—The First Battle of the Philippines. There the Big "B's" anti-aircraft guns spoke death, and her total of Jap planes mounted towards its final score of twelve, as Hellcats, and Corsairs swarmed from accompanying carriers to destroy nearly 600 Nip planes in the air and on the ground.

THE Baltimore was just feeling its oats in its buccaneering career, when top secret orders from Washington were radioed to Captain Calhoun to leave Task Force 58, and turn the Baltimore full-speed toward San Diego for a special assignment with the late President Roosevelt. On July 22, 1944, the presidential party was piped aboard, and with the late President stuffing a cigaret in his ivory holder and leaning back in his big deck chair, the Baltimore cast off its lines to get under way. As the Baltimore steamed toward Pearl Harbor, with her bow plowing a statesman-like furrow through the Pacific waters, the ship's crew toyfully, and thoughtfully edged each other with scuttlebutt and questions, speculating the reason for the trip. To the crew, the trip with generals and admirals aboard in profusion, seemed to have a dash of everything, intrigue, glamor, mystery, fabulous plannings, and the irresistible atmosphere of important people doing important things. This was the President's conference with Admiral Nimitz and General MacArthur to plan and pave the way for the invasion of the Philippines.

AFTER this historic trip, Captain Calhoun turned the reins of the Baltimore over to Captain C. K. Fink, and Comdr. R. V. Hull came aboard as the next executive officer, as the hulking form of the Baltimore turned again to the Pacific war. Back in the midst of the battle again, the Baltimore ranged up and down the China Coast, as the might of Task Force 38, raked ports

and Jap shipping with annihilating gunfire in French Indo-China, Camranh Bay, Hong Kong, Formosa, and then Okinawa. The Big "B" was off Japan with Task Group 38.1 that pinned the Jap ships to their home ports, while MacArthur's soldiers were returning to Lingayen gulf. Then came the surprising carrier raids on Tokyo, and the death-stenched invasions of Iwo Jima and Okinawa. These were the sandbag blows in which the Baltimore was just one of the many symbols of American sea power, now masters over the 35,000,000 square miles of the Pacific. Until the end of the war, the mighty 15,800-ton cruiser swung hard in its many Pacific engagements, but still remained untouched by enemy action, a great tribute to its Captains and crew.

NOT even the mounting fury of two tropical hurricanes could dent the hulking hull of the mighty Baltimore, although it did claim the ship's only casualty when a seaman was washed over-board. She was standing by when three destroyers turned turtle and sank, and when the Pittsburgh sprung open at its forward seams to lose its bow under the savage pressure of the pounding waves.

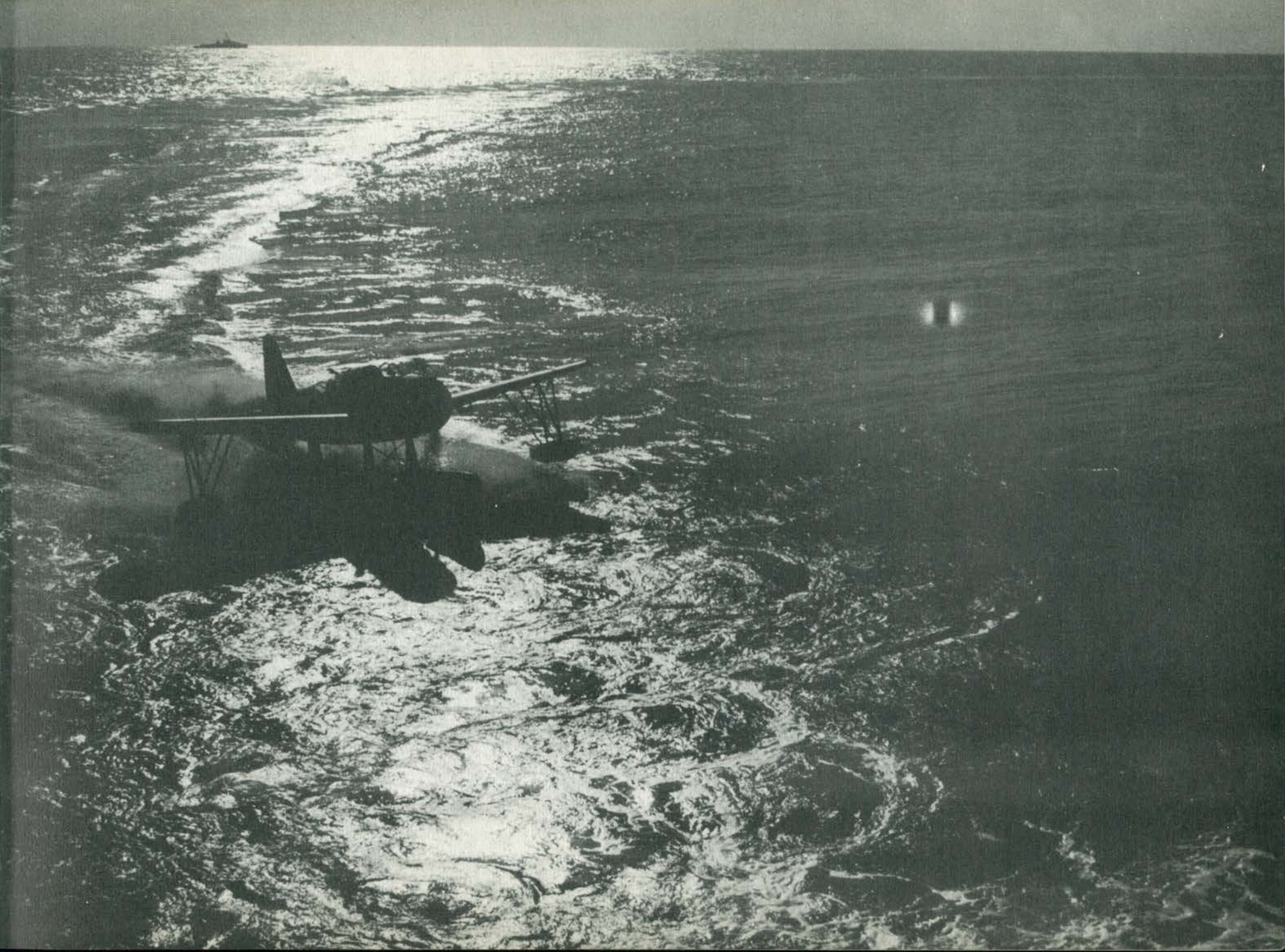
THE BALTIMORE'S present skipper is Captain C. E. Olsen, USN, a broad-shouldered, medium-sized man, who took over his new command on August 11. Captain Olsen's thought-lined-face reveals and hints of his former duties as senior member of the Naval Mission to Moscow; but to his officers and men he is best known for his good-nature, and his chatty, informal way of meeting them. To them, his handling of the Baltimore is as reassuring as Thanksgiving, as shrewd as a small town banker.

NOW, tonight as the sun sinks off our our starboard bow, and a few of its crew gaze pensively to sea, the Baltimore churns through the calm Pacific waters toward Pearl Harbor. At the moment her job is shuttling troops on the "Hawaii to San Francisco Run", emancipating the "slaves of war" who have so well earned their discharges.

IN a parting way, the Baltimore is like a horse whose race was run and won. The Big "B" is now galloping in the home pastures, awaiting word from the nation, that she helped save, as to what her postwar role will be. For this role, whatever it may be, training has already begun. Of her war time crew some 400 have the necessary points for discharge. Half are already tasting the sweetness of home life after 29 months of strenuous war at sea. The others will soon follow, while the less seasoned ones stay to carry on. That's the Baltimore's story!

After two and a half months of shuttling between Hawaii and the West Coast, the Baltimore was given three weeks of leisure in Los Angeles Harbor. On Navy Day, thousands of visitors swarmed aboard for a closer look at the mighty "B". On November 10, she headed for Tokyo for a brief tour of occupation duty. During the following three months, Tokyo, Kure, Wakayama, Matsuyama, Sasebo and Nagasaki were visited. During the two months at Kure, opportunity was given for all hands to visit Hiroshima, the place where the first atomic bomb was dropped. In Kure Harbor, her men saw the sorry remnants of the Japanese fleet and what the powerful Task Force 38 could do. On February 18, 1946, the BALTIMORE left Japanese waters and headed for San Francisco, arriving on the morning of March 3, 1946.



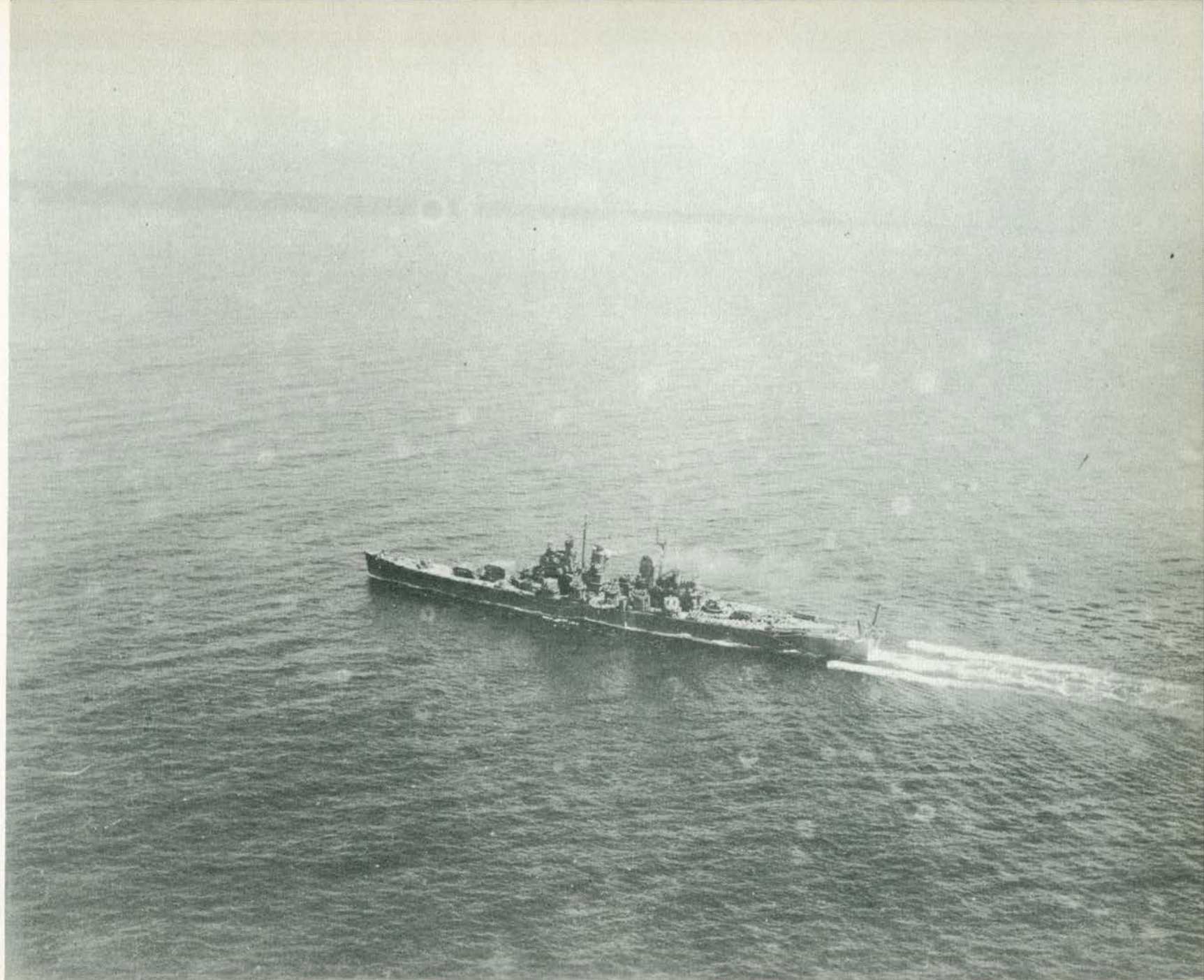




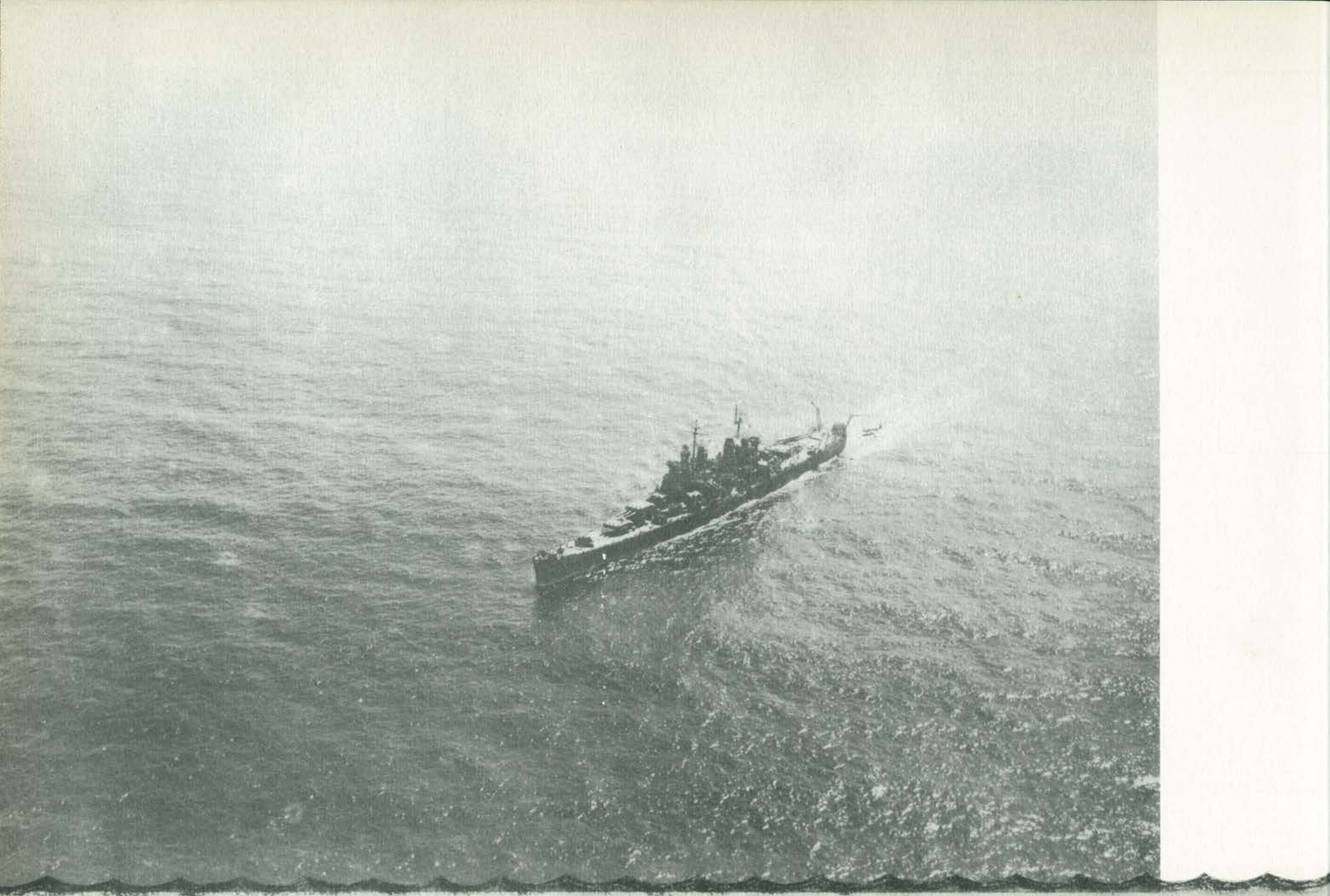

# Admiral Wiltse

U.S.S. BALTIMORE

In August 1944, Rear Admiral Wiltse relieved Rear Admiral Thebaud as Commander Cruiser Division TEN. At this time, the division flagship was the BOSTON. Admiral Wiltse took the BOSTON through the Western Caroline operations and the initial attacks on the Philippines, the THIRD Fleet attacks in October against Okinawa, the Ryukyu Islnds, Formosa and Aparri. Heavy Japanese counter-attacks resulted in torpedoing the CANBERRA and the light cruiser HOUSTON in waters dangerously near the Formosan coast. Admiral Wiltse commanded the towing and support groups that successfully fought off savage Japanese air attacks to bring the two damaged cruisers out to quieter waters. This was followed by service with Task Force 38 through the period of the Second Battle of the Philippine Sea, the raids on Luzon, and the South China Sea sweep. In January 1945, the flag shifted to the BALTIMORE and served with Task Force 58 in the support of the capture of Iwo Jima, the first carrier raids on Tokyo (since the aircraft carrier HORNET's daring raid in April 1942), the raids on Kyushu which culminated in the serious damaging of the group flagship, the aircraft carrier FRANKLIN. Whereupon Rear Admiral Wiltse assumed command of Task Group 58.2 until operations could be initiated to bring the FRANKLIN out of enemy waters. Then followed the long days of Kamikaze attacks on Task Force 58 as it supported the Okinawa operations, and later raids on Southern Japan, the Inland Sea, and Kyushu in May and June 1945.

The scheduled overhaul of the BALTIMORE obliged the flag to shift to the QUINCY in June 1945. During the next two months, the THIRD Fleet kept at sea continuously while raining trip-hammer blows against Japan from Kyushu to Hokkaido, until the last days in August when Japan admitted complete and utter defeat. Admiral Wiltse was privileged to represent Cruiser Division TEN by being a witness to the surrender ceremonies held in Tokyo Bay aboard the battleship MISSOURI on September 2, 1945. Shortly afterwards, the admiral, the officers and the men were ordered to proceed to Pearl Harbor to rejoin the BALTIMORE for the return trip home.

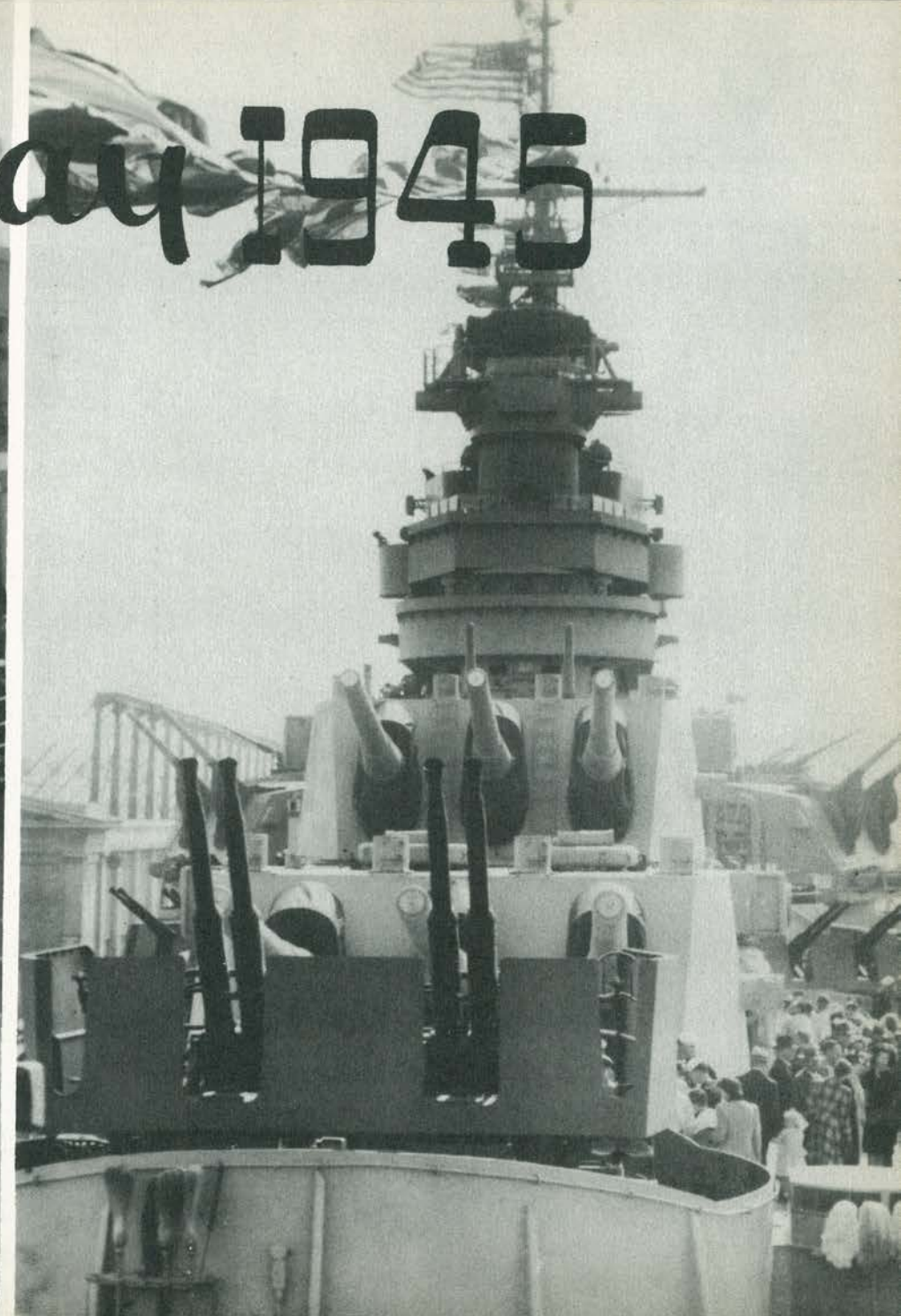
During the latter part of November, Rear Admiral Wiltse was relieved as Commander Cruiser TEN by Rear Admiral E. P. Forrestel who employed the BALTIMORE as his flagship during the tour of occupation duty in Japan which lasted from November until February.



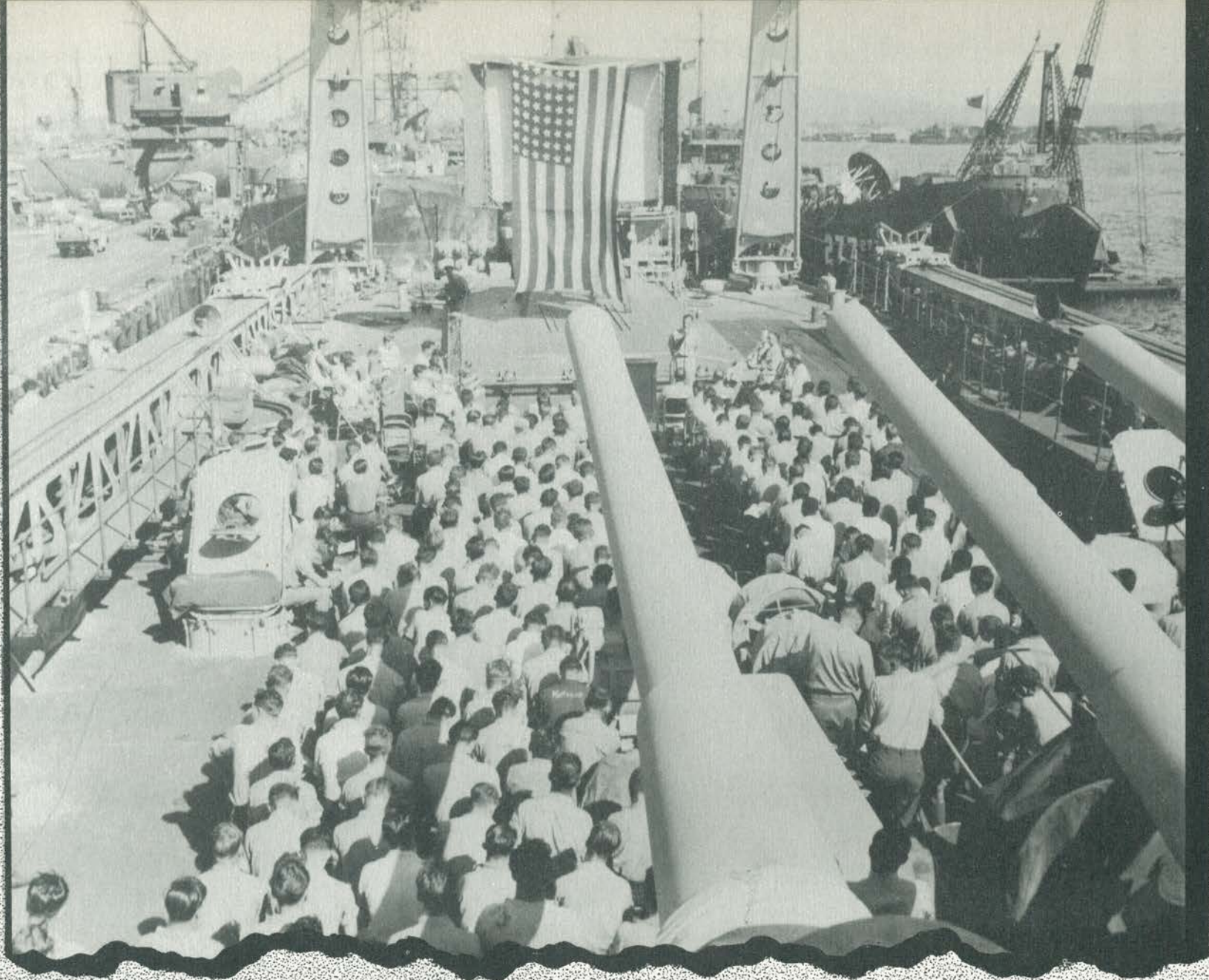

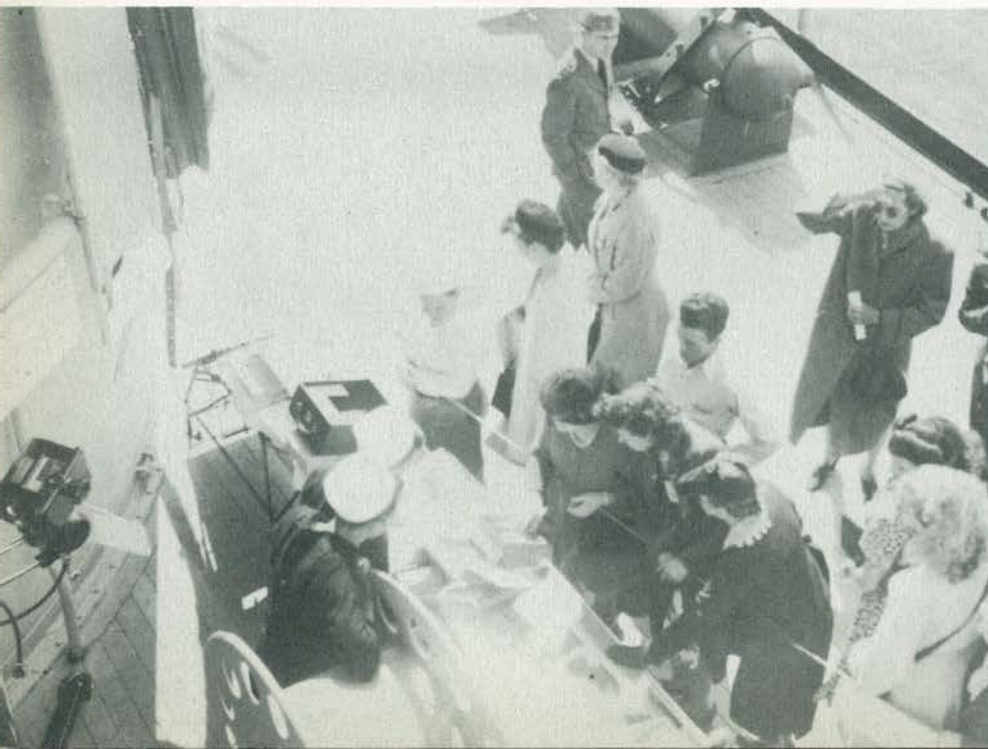

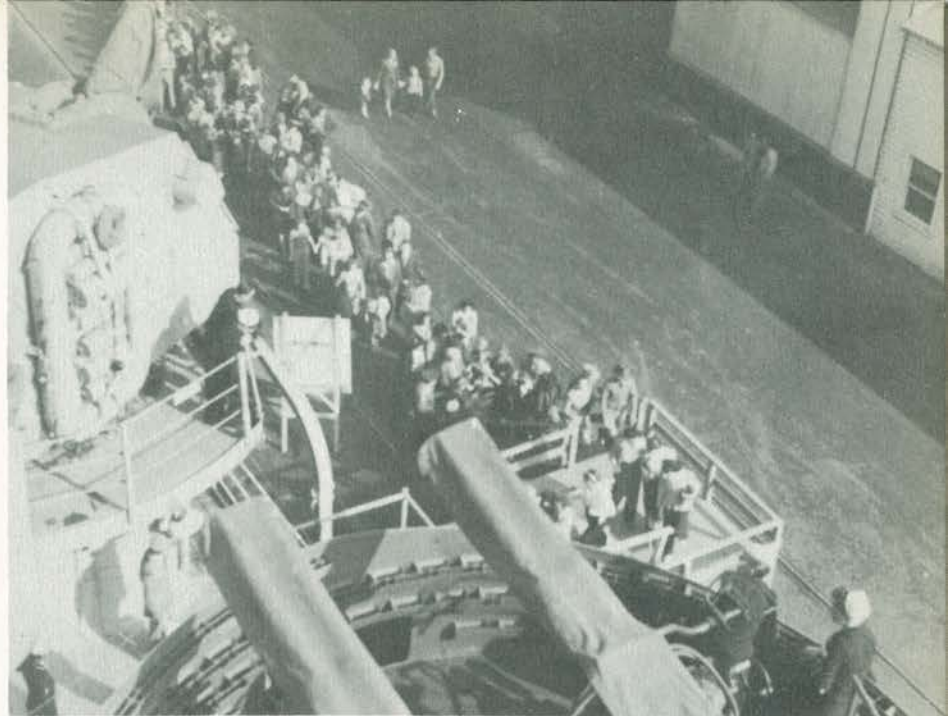






















# Cruiser Baltimore At Sea Two Years

## HOMeward-BOUND

Another of the stories now revealed with the lifting of the security curtain is that of the war exploits of the cruiser Baltimore, which fought in many parts of the Pacific and participated in the first carrier raid against Tokyo.

Successor to a line of the cruisers of the same name, the new Baltimore was commissioned April 15, 1943. A recital of the engagements in which the ship took part has been received by Mayor Theodore R. McKeldin from Capt. C. K. Fink, in command of the vessel.

### *In Pacific Two Years*

Dated in August before the end of the war with Japan his letter was released by the security authorities several weeks ago. Captain Fink wrote, in part:

"I would like to take this opportunity to let the good people of Baltimore know what their "namesake" has been doing out here in the Pacific. Needless to mention, the U.S.S. Baltimore is strictly an instrument of war. The vast Pacific has been her home for over two years. Her participation in actual combat has been wide and varied."

### *Bags 12 Jap Planes*

Twelve Jap planes were brought down by the cruiser's guns and several island installations were bombarded, Captain Fink wrote. The vessel's active operations began with the attack on the Gilbert Islands. Then came attacks on Kwajalein and Maloelap in the Marshalls as part of the escort of fast carriers.

In February, 1944, the Baltimore, operating with fast carriers, participated in the attacks on Truk and Saipan. Next the ship was part of the fleet that blasted a path for the landings at Hollandia, New Guinea. Captain Fink continued:

"The Central Pacific had now become our habitat. We

helped cover the invasions of the Marianas and struck at Iwo Jima. Under Admiral Halsey strikes were made against Formosa and Luzon. Early in 1945 found the Baltimore steaming into the South China Sea.

### *In Iwo Jima Invasion*

"Strikes were made against Camrahn Bay in French Indo-China and Hong Kong. In February the Baltimore participated in the first carrier raid against Tokyo. These strikes finally led to the invasion of Iwo Jima. On Easter Sunday, 1945, the Baltimore operating with fast carriers, opened the way for the invasion of Okinawa.

"This ship is only one of hundreds doing her part in the defeat of Japan. Wars are not won by taking a defensive stand, but by striking the enemy whenever and wherever he may be found. It is the new ships, the products of American skill, labor, money and experience, learned the hard way, that form the overwhelming bulk of the huge task forces that will finally bring the enemy to his knees."

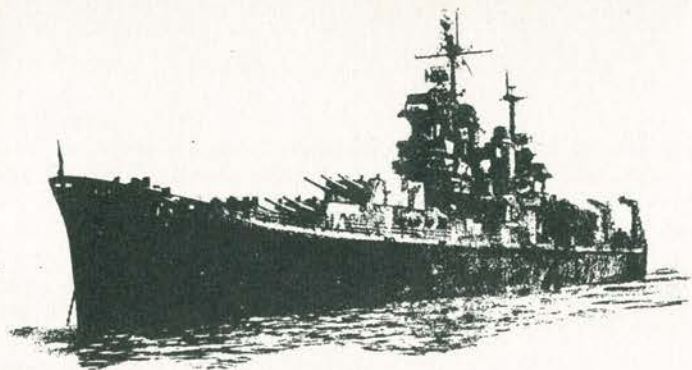
### *Ship Like Community*

Captain Fink described life on shipboard as like that of a large and well-integrated community with a laundry, barber shop, shoe repair shop, clothing store, ice-cream "parlor", movies and other facilities available.

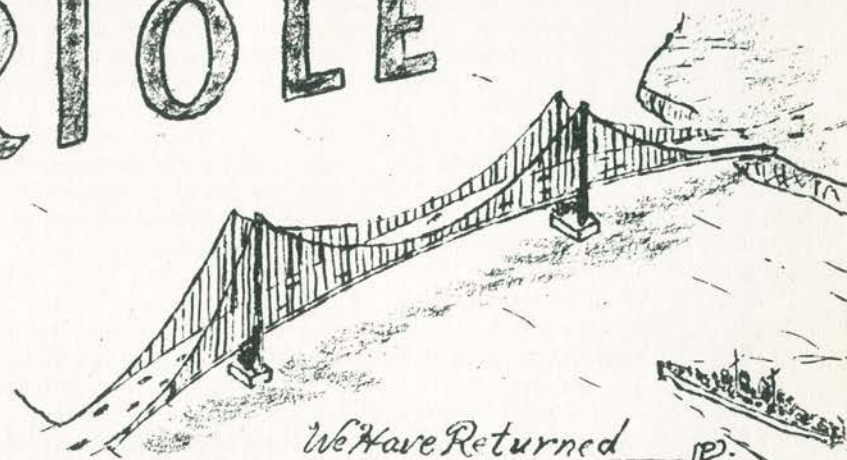

## BALTIMORE COMPLETES OCCUPATIONAL DUTY

To certain "Old Hands" the cruise of the BALTIMORE now coming to an end presents a sort of anti-climax, but to new hands, a trip to foreign shores holds new and different sights, strange adventures and the culmination to vivid imaginations. Fresh memories and important facts concerning our voyage and material to endless sea stories include the ship's arrival to the Island of Honshu, Japan, anchoring at the Koko-suka Naval Base. Such visions as the fishing boats, island formations and the peculiar rays of the sun that morning formed our first striking impressions. We anchored at peace with such famous and interesting enemy vessels as the NAGATO. The first liberty party came back from Tokyo impressed and repulsed by the poverty, dirt, and smells . . . a good look at the Japanese here-to-for witnessed in movies . . . in some cases in battle. Mount Fuji glowed white and pink in the sun over a fog on the morning of Nov. 26th. The BALTIMORE anchored at Kure Naval Base the next day where we

Souvenir collections found an almost untouched field of operations in such places as Hiro Wan, Kure, and Eta Jima where they stalked about in quest of something new—different—unique and unique some of them have been! During a firing run on January 7th, through Army transport, we witnessed Matsuyama on Shikoku, an almost intact Japanese town.

We invaded Sasebo on January 31st, and danced at the famous advertised Rose Land. At Nagasaki on February 4th we studied for a few moments the horrible and stark destruction of the second atomic bomb. February 5th found us spending an interesting week at Wakayama, unmarred and friendly with free run of subversive activities and yen-hungry Japanese.

Finally the ship returned to Tokyo on February 15th, puzzled by the many rumors and doubt about our return to Uncle Sugar and eager to see the largest city on the West Coast.

And so we look back upon such lucid scenes as the sunken Japanese craft in Kure Harbor, Mount Fuji, Hiroshima, Nagasaki, Kii Suido, dirty Japanese children, oriental temples, the cooley and the back breaking load of hay on his wife, snow falling at Matsuyama, the old woman selling her daughter at Wakayama, the live volcano at Kirishima, the Imperial Theatre, Imperial Hotel, and the Imperial Palace of Tokyo to chalk a lasting experience.

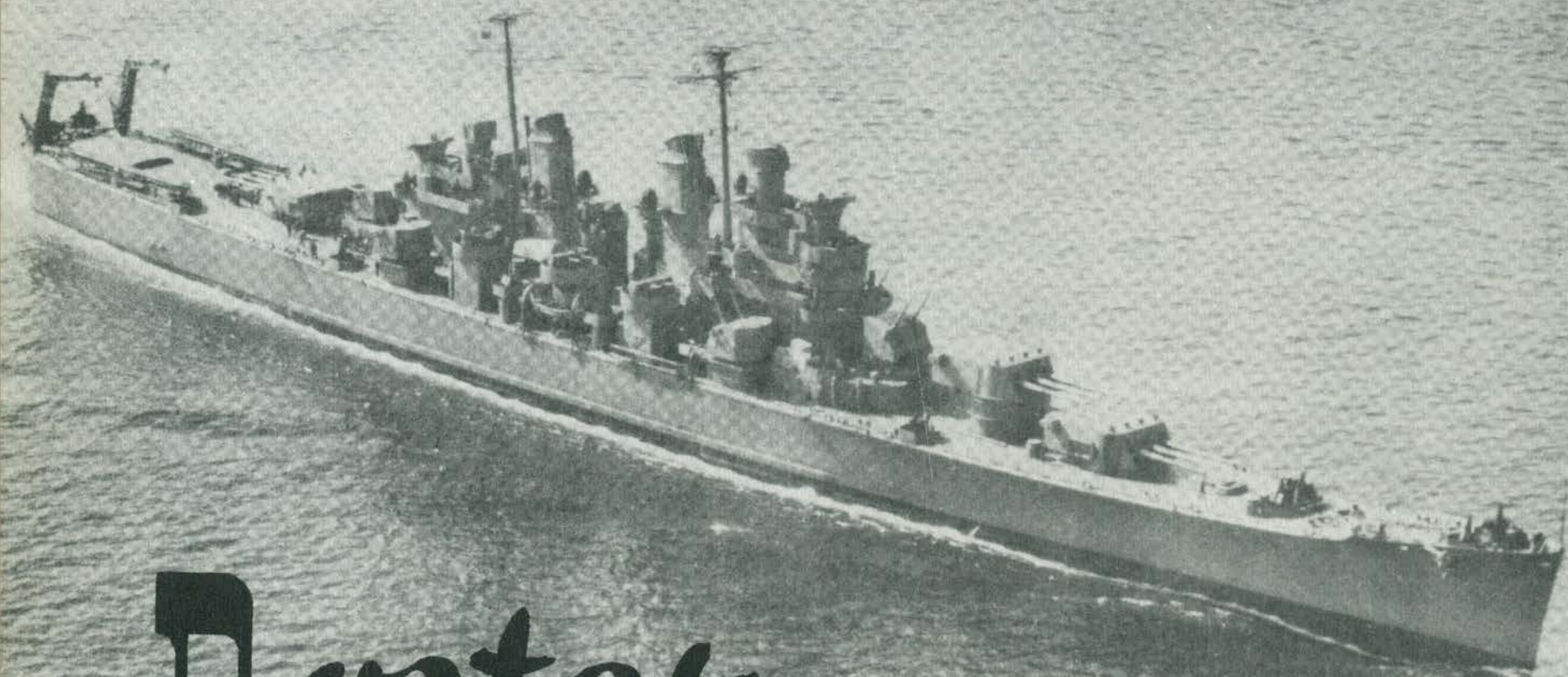

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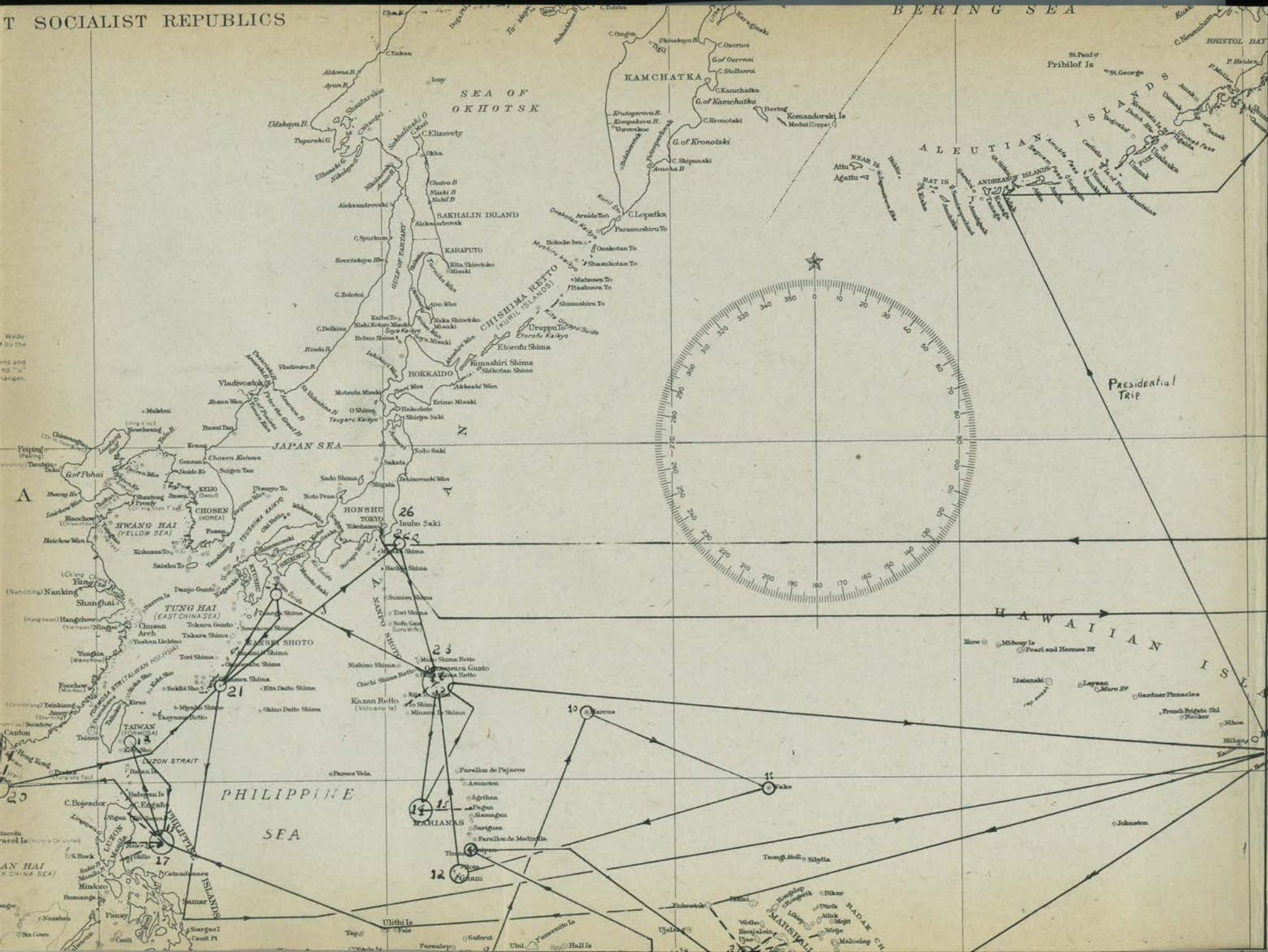
